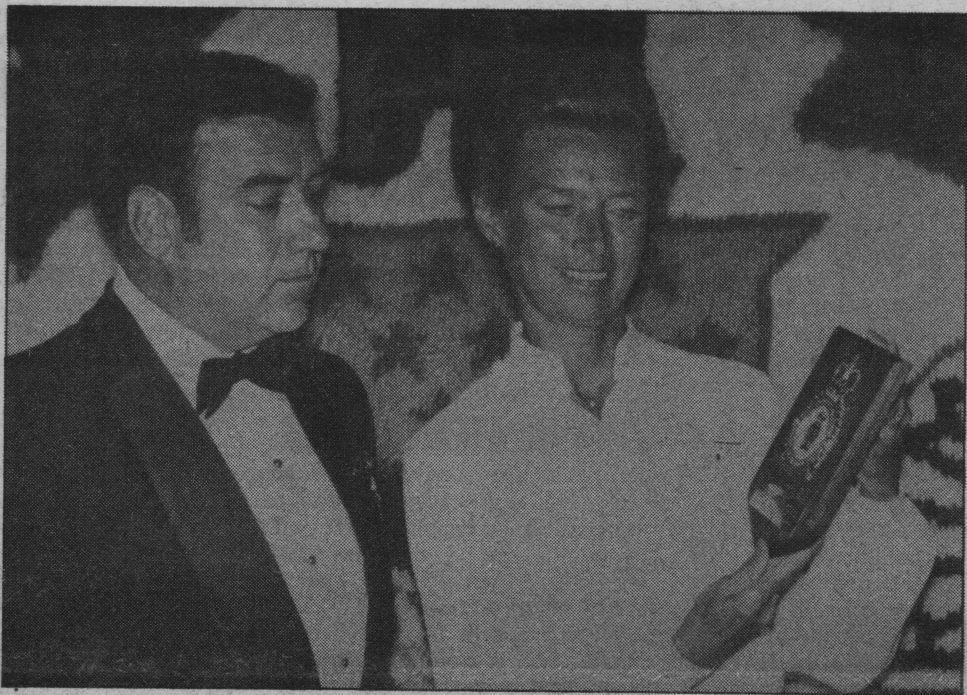


402 SQUADRON CELEBRATES 50th ANNIVERSARY

TAX TIPS

Recent tax legislation, which will be effective for the 1983 taxation year, has eliminated the automatic \$100.00 Charity/Medical deduction. This will essentially cost most people \$30 - \$50 per year depending on their tax bracket.

The medical deduction was never very realistic. It still exists but is only claimable for valid medical expenses not covered by any type of insurance plan. The deduction is limited to only those expenses in excess of 3% of net income. In other words, for someone making \$30,000 per year, he must have at least \$900 in medical bills before even one cent is claimable, and then only the difference between the expenses and the \$900!

The original intent of the deduction for charitable donations was to permit the tax payer to avoid keeping numerous receipts for trifling amounts. In general only about 8% of all tax returns claim charitable donations in excess of \$100 but in this case, receipts are necessary for everything. Henceforth, shrewd tax payers will have to keep legal receipts if they wish to claim any charitable deductions.

There is however, one way to avoid the hassle of keeping a shoebox full of crumpled receipts to qualify for this deduction. It is a surprisingly

simple and painless solution to the problem: this year give to the United Way on the Payroll Deduction Plan. Your receipt will be included on your T-4 statement of earnings at year-end. Besides being convenient, it is the most efficient way to allocate your charity dollar. Remember: your United Way contribution helps more Winnipeggers, in more ways, than any other contribution you can make.

SCAN CORNER HINTS ABOUT WANTS ADS

Have you looked closely at the want ad section of your newspaper lately? The want ad section is a useful indicator of the economic health of a region or country; so useful in fact that business and governments compile statistics based upon their number to discover in which direction the country is going.

You too can use want ads in your planning for retirement. Some hints are as follows:

- Want ads can be used as an excellent source of job descriptions. This is true even if it is still too early to follow up an ad with a formal application. Used in this manner the language of industry can be studied, qualifications for particular jobs determined and the location of certain industries noted. Start collecting interesting advertisements early so that your career resume is built up around the language of the employer.
- A list of contacts can be collected from the want ad section. Names and addresses in most cases are provided which can be used at a later date. You will need such a list.
- The best way to find out about the employment situation in another part of the country is through the want ad section of the local newspaper. New industries can be spotted. If Kaiser Resources needs coal miners in British Columbia they will probably also need electricians, heavy equipment operators and payroll clerks.
- Want ads can be used creatively to provide leads for more than one employment opportunity. For example, if one job that you find interesting is advertised by a university every other university in Canada is a possibility for the same position. The advertisement is the job description. You can zero in with your career resume or letter and with a list of universities apply for thirty jobs instead of only one.

The want ad section or careers page of the daily newspaper is one of the best channels available for entry into the employment marketplace. The secret for success in its use is the same for all elements of your job campaign — early preparation. If you are getting close to retirement start reading the want ad section very carefully now.

GOVERNMENT JOBS

Servicemen approaching retirement often consider government service — either Federal, Provincial or Municipal — as a second career in the outside world. Yes, working for a government agency offers a number of advantages.

A lateral shift into a new career can be achieved more easily than in industry by the serviceman whose skills acquired in the Armed Forces relate well to positions in other government departments. Speaking the same language, retiring servicemen are often happier in choosing this approach.

The same careful job campaign is needed for government jobs as with industry but with certain modifications, for example:

- government jobs are filled by competition. This means the time frame for filling an opening is usually longer than in industry. Procedures are more involved with forms, several interviews and waiting periods after you first apply.
 - a good career resume is vital. Specific to the position or category of employment for which you are applying, base your resume on the job description contained in the competition notice.
 - you must be alert for special regulations such as those of residence. The Federal and Provincial governments both have these regulations and apply them to many entry positions. This fact could limit your search for employment with the government.
- One last word, with the government don't try to fight the system. Study the procedures, learn the organization structure and particularly those which offer employment opportunities. Above all, be patient.

POMV SAFETY CORNER

RIDING ON AIR

You're driving along the highway at 90 km/h, carefree and happy in your superbly engineered, well tuned car. Suddenly you realize you have a flat tire.

Annoying, isn't it? But what if it has been a blowout at that speed? That could have been fatal.

When did you last check your tires? Tires are the most neglected part of a car and yet without them your car wouldn't be of much use to you.

The tires on your car have, since 1978, had to meet standards set under the Motor Vehicle Tire Safety Act. But you are responsible for keeping them in top condition.

According to a 1979 survey carried out by Transport Canada, about 70 per cent of the tires on the motor vehicles on Canadian roads are underinflated. Moreover, nearly 90 per cent of all vehicles have at least one underinflated tire.

Tire manufacturers say that improper inflation can affect tread life and gas consumption. But underinflation can lead to sudden tire failure. If that happens on a busy highway, it can be catastrophic.

Underinflation causes the side walls to flex. This builds up heat which damages the material of the tire. A tire is dangerously underinflated when it is 28 kPa (four pounds per square inch) or more below the recommended pressure.

You can't tell if your tires are properly inflated just by looking at them. Kicking them may relieve your pressure but won't tell you much about the tire's pressure. You can check the amount of inflation with a tire pressure gauge. The pocket gauges available at automotive supply stores generally are more accurate than gas station air pump/pressure gauge systems.

You can find the recommended



pressures quite easily. They are in your owner's manual and are also printed on a label on the inside of the door frame or inside the glove compartment. The best place to look, however, is the sidewall of the tire itself.

Once you have the recommended pressures and your gauge, you should check the pressure of each tire at least once a month (more often if there are extreme temperature changes).

Of course, tire maintenance doesn't end with proper inflation. Examine your tire treads for signs of wear, faulty front end alignment or wheel balance, and for gashes, cracks or slits which may indicate a potential breakdown. At the same time remove any stones or other objects imbedded in the surface of the tread or sidewall.

Blisters or bulges indicate possible structural damage. Remove the tire from the rim and have it thoroughly examined by an expert. Replace the tire if necessary. You should also replace bent, loose or cracked wheel rims.

Because front and rear tires wear differently, rotate your tires every 8000 km to equalize wear and riding comfort. With radials, rotate only from front to back on the same side of the car because of their "set". One final note: **never** mix radial and non-radial tires.

It makes sense to check your tires. It will prolong their lives — and perhaps yours as well.

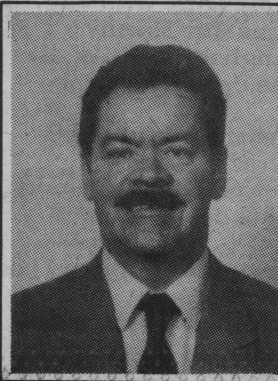

FIRE PREVENTION NEWS

HONEYWELL SMOKE DETECTOR RECALL

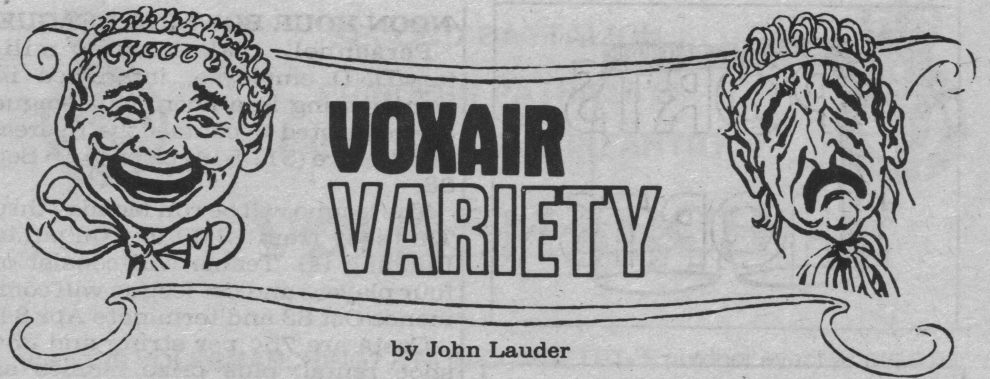
Honeywell announced today the voluntary recall of an estimated 35,000 of its battery operated model TC89C smoke detectors sold in Canada between January, 1976 and May, 1978. The recall also affects approximately 77 of its battery-operated model TC89B detectors. Both were manufactured in the United States.

Some of these models, because of the way the circuit board is mounted, may malfunction when smoke is present, though the unit would still alarm if the test button is pressed.

Owners of the TC89C and the TC89B are urged to call Honeywell in Toronto at 293-9100; toll free in British Columbia at 112-800-268-5554, and from other areas at 1-800-268-5554. The affected models will be replaced with a comparable model at no charge by returning it to Honeywell. A similar recall is underway in the U.S.

The model numbers and date codes can be found under the smoke detector cover, inside the detector on a piece of gray cardboard. Honeywell recommends consumers check the operation of their smoke detector by extinguishing a candle to create smoke near the detector. If the detector does not alarm with the presence of smoke, consumers should call the company's appropriate toll free telephone number.

The company withdrew from the smoke detector market in Canada in December 1980. The units were distributed nationally through the company's Residential division.
