## Arriving from Yugoslavia, new Base Commander takes the helm

Colonel Loren Reynolds was born in the Eastern Townships, Quebec in 1941 and enrolled in the Royal Canadian Navy as an Officer Cadet in 1959. He received his wings in 1962, undertook training in helicopter anti-submarine warfare, and was posted to HS-50 Squadron in Shearwater, Nova Scotia in 1963.

In 1964, Colonel Reynolds was posted to the U.S. Coast Guard in San Diego, California for search and rescue duties. In 1966 he was posted to HS-50

in Shearwater flying the Sea-King. In 1972 he returned to the U.S. for exchange duties with the U.S.N. in Washington, DC and in 1975 he attended the U.S. Air Force Air War College.

In 1976 Colonel Reynolds returned to Canada to become the Deputy Commander of CF Maritime Warfare School in Halifax. He was appointed CO of HS-443 in Shearwater in 1978 and was posted to the staff of Air

Command Headquarters in Winnipeg in 1980. Promoted to Colonel in 1982, Colonel Reynolds undertook language training in Ottawa prior to being posted as the Canadian attaché in Yugoslavia.

Colonel Reynolds is married to the former Penelope Parker of San Diego, California and they have two sons Joseph 18 and Christopher 17. Colonel Reynolds is decorated with the CD and Clasp and the Air Medal.



## "Little Black Devils" start Base Winnipeg

The Military has had a long association with Winnipeg. The first army units date from 1883 when the 90th Rifle Battalion, later renamed the Royal Winnipeg Rifles (Little Black Devils), was formed. This association has been maintained to the present, for that unit is still active in the Minto Armouries along with others. There is also a regular force battalion based here, the Third Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment.

HMCS Chippawa is a naval establishment which has been in Winnipeg since 1923 and still serves as a reserve and cadet training unit.

Air Force units have been stationed in and around Winnipeg since 1922. During WWII, the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan saw Winnipeg become a major center for aircrew training as well as for supply, repair and inspection. For many years the RCAF, and then the CF, had their training headquarters located here, which was replaced by Air Command Headquarters in 1975. In August 1981, 14 Training Group Headquarters was reformed in Winnipeg. Although there have been others at times, since WWII major flying units have been the Canadian Forces Aerospace and Navigation School, 429 Transport Squadron, Central Flying School and its Instrument Check Pilot School, and of course 402 "City of Winnipeg" Air Reserve Squadron.

On May 7th, 1986 CFB Winnipeg witnessed the opening of the new Air Command Headquarters.

### Red River Cart on Crest

The centerpiece of the crest consists of a Red River cart wheel superimposed on a compass rose, with both wheel and compass centred in front of a terrestrial globe. (The detail of the Red River cart wheel is historically accurate in both design and colour).

The famous Red River cart originated in the Winnipeg area and takes its name from the Red River which flows through the city. (The Red River cart wheel is unique to this area of Canada). Winnipeg is known as the transportation hub or crossroads of Canada and our crest uses the Red River cart wheel to symbolize this position.

The compass rose has a dual purpose. Firstly, by its central position on

## "In Flanders Fields" poet John McCrae family tree mystery finally solved.

Dear Editor,

May I thank you for the three letters which you forwarded to me a few days ago re the poet Col John McCrae. I have come to the end of my research.

When a gentleman in Guelph aged 91 told me about the museum there, I wrote the Curator for any information she could give me. I was delighted to receive a booklet published in 1972 commemorating the centennial year of the birth of the famous Canadian Soldier, physician and poet. The cover has some poppies and a copy of "In Flanders Fields". Inside, it gave the history of the poem, "The Saga of John McCrae", mentioning his other poems; pictures of his birthplace in Guelph, both interior and exterior which is now a shrine; letters from the Queen at Buckingham Palace, from Government House Ottawa, and from Mountbatten of Burma.

The Curator also enclosed a copy of his family tree going back six generations to one Robert McCrae, Cuinrock, Ayrshire, who probably left Kintail, Rosshire, after the first Jacobite Rebellion in 1715. This disproves any immediate relationship with my late husband, but all the MacRaes in Kintail stemmed from the same source.

I was also sent, by another lady, an obituary notice of the Poet's grandfather, Thomas McCrae, taken from the Guelph Mercury Feb 23rd 1892.

There have been several suggestions being thrown around the office, some good, some great, and some down-right lousy, but we're trying to turn the finances around. If we can succeed in making Voxair pay for itself, then indeed we've accomplished a great deal.

However, in order to come to this goal, we must tighten our belts and put on our thinking caps. So any suggestions are more than welcome.

As we have tried to cut the paper down to eight pages and found that it did not work well, we have brought it back to twelve. We have, so far, hung onto our color; though we may be in danger of losing that luxury.

Advertising is our only income, therefore we must attempt to increase our advertisers. We must try to make the merchants of Winnipeg, in particular those in the immediate areas of North and South Sites of CFB Winnipeg, how much of a market the Canadian Forces can bring to their business.

A major change coming about in Sep is that there will be a charge for all classified ads paid in advance of publishing. The only ads which will remain free of charge will be the public service type announcements, i.e. lost and found. This change is a necessary, albeit small, portion of the solution to the large problem of funds for Voxair.


And don't forget to phone in about the neighbor who has a great yard for "The Prettiest PMQ" Contest.

He was a leading farmer and stock breeder in that Section. He, it was, who emigrated to Canada from Ayrshire. His son, Col David McCrae, was the poet's father. The poet left no issue, neither did his brother Thomas, but his sister, Mary Ainslie Geills, married a James Kilgour and they had four children.

On a recent visit to Eilean Donan Castle, I was told that some of the poet's relatives had visited there some years ago. They have promised to send me on some papers left by them. The Castle is owned by John MacRae. Another famous Poet by the same name emigrated to North Carolina with lots of other MacRaes from Kintail and was killed in the American War of Independence. Poems written in exile were brought home to Kintail by a one armed soldier of the same name.

Thank you for all the trouble you have taken. I have replied to all letters. I will remember you all on Armistice Day, when you can be justly proud of your poet — as I am.

"Drink! Drink! Drink!", no, it is not the Sgts Mess on a Friday evening, but the first act of *The Student Prince*, now running at Rainbow Stage. Along with other lively tunes, this stein-banging number helps to give us another fine night of summer musical theatre.

For those who do not know, Rainbow Stage, located in Kildonan Parkway, north on Main Street, boasts that it is the biggest and longest running outdoor summer theatre in Canada. For those who live in the North End of the city, it is both an institution and a meeting place. It has in the past 33 years become a part of the culture of the city, and regardless of the show to be seen, should be visited as an experience.

*The Student Prince* is even older than Rainbow, as it was first presented on Broadway in 1924, based on a story and stage play which ran back to the 19th century. As with all light-hearted musicals, the story is not important, and it is the singing and music that provides the bulk of the fun. Local lead singer Richard Hurst, along with Toronto imports Brian Gow and Dianne Parke-Jones, have first class voices, as do all members of the cast and chorus. The Sigmund Romberg music is not modern, but is it memorable.

In past years, the one problem at Rainbow Stage has been the sound system. A new backstage area has been built, and the backstage personnel list boasts both a sound engineer and an audio consultant. All three factors make for great improvements. We sat in the 28th row at the side, and could hear every word (for a change) except of course when some of the leading ladies tried to hit 10 levels above high C.

The Prince runs until July 26th, and may be held over for a night or two. Tickets are at BASS ticket locations, C.B.O., and at Kildonan Park prior to show time — 8:30 p.m. Next on the bill will be "The Sound of Music" to run from August 5th to 24th, the memorable Rogers and Hammerstein hit.

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

the globe, it emphasizes CFB Winnipeg's position at the crossroads of both east-west and north-south flight lines. Secondly, the compass rose covers the globe to represent worldwide field in which CFB Winnipeg's navigation school graduates will serve. The cardinal points extend beyond the boundaries of the globe to symbolize the modern developments in communication and navigation training at CFB Winnipeg's schools.

The motto "Prospice" is derived from the latin form of "Look to the future" (symbolizing the direction and philosophy that training and operational functions at CFB Winnipeg must adopt to remain abreast of current developments in their respective fields).

**UN BREF HISTORIQUE DE**

Les militaires connaissent une association de longue date avec Winnipeg. Les premières unités armées datent de 1883 alors que le 90<sup>e</sup> Bataillon

carabinier, rebaptisé plus tard sous le nom de "Royal Winnipeg Rifles" (surnomme "Les petits demons noirs") fut formé. Cette association fut maintenue jusqu'à aujourd'hui car cette unité de combat est encore active et fait partie des unités de Milice-Arsenal de Minto. Il y a ainsi, bien sûr, un bataillon de la kForce régulière, celui du 3<sup>e</sup> Bataillon; The Royal Canadian Regiment.

L'HMCS Chippawa, frégate au sol de Winnipeg, est une unité navale de réserve, située à Winnipeg depuis 1923. Elle assure encore aujourd'hui l'initiation et la formation des cadets et des membres de la Réserve navale.

Quant aux unités de l'air, elles sont installés dans les environs de Winnipeg depuis 1922. Au cours de la Seconde Guerre mondiale, le plan d'entraînement aérien du Commonwealth britannique fit de Winnipeg un emplacement d'importance majeure pour l'entraînement du personnel des équipages aériens. Winnipeg fut éga-

lement un centre militaire d'approvisionnement, d'entretien, de convoyage et d'inspections. Pendant plusieurs années, l'Aviation Royale Canadienne, puis les forces armées canadiennes, eurent leur quartier générale du Commandement aérien. En août 1981 le 14<sup>e</sup> Groupe d'instruction fut fondé à Winnipeg. Bien qu'il y ait alors eu d'autres escadrons, les principales unités aériennes depuis la guerre furent l'École d'aérospatiale et de navigation des forces canadiennes, le 429<sup>e</sup> Escadron (Transport), l'École central de vol qui fut reformée en août 1981 ainsi que son école de pilotage — contrôleurs de vol aux instruments. Enfin il y a le 402<sup>e</sup> Escadron de la Réserve.

En mai, 1986 la base de Winnipeg a témoigné l'ouverture de l'édifice du Quartier générale du Commandement aérien.

**L'ECUSSON**

La partie centrale de l'écusson se compose de la roue de la Charrette de la rivière Rouge que est surexposé sur un compas de la rose des vents, dont les deux sont centres devant un globe terrestre. (Le détail de la roue de la Charrette de la rivière Rouge est historiquement précis tant dans son dessin que dans ses couleurs).

La célèbre Charette de la rivière Rouge prend son origine dans la région de Winnipeg et son nom provient de la rivière Rouge qui traverse la ville. (La roue de la Charrette de la rivière Rouge est unique dans cette région du Canada). Winnipeg est reconnu comme le pivot de transport ou, la croisée des chemins du Canada; ainsi l'écusson emploie cette roue afin de symboliser cette position stratégique.

Le compas de la rose des vents a un double but. D'abord, par sa position centrale sur le globe, il met en évidence sur l'emplacement de la BFC Winnipeg a la croisée des lignes aériennes est-ouest et nord-sud. Deuxièmement, ce compas couvre le globe terrestre afin de représenter l'étendue universelle dans laquelle les gradués de l'École d'aérospatiale et de navigation de la BFC Winnipeg serviront. Les points cardinaux qui s'allongent pour s'étendre-au-delà des frontières du globe, symbolisent les développements modernes en communication et en navigation des écoles d'entraînement de la BFC Winnipeg.

La devise "Prospice" dérive de la racine latine "Regardez vers le future" (symbolisant la direction et la philosophie que l'entraînement ainsi que les fonctions opérationnelles de la BFC Winnipeg doivent adopter afin de se maintenir en ligne avec le cour des développements modernes courants dans leur champs respectif d'action).

**A Fond Farewell**

Colonel Stewart McGowan was born in 1938, enrolled in the Royal Canadian Navy in 1955 and graduated from Royal Military College in Kingston.

After completion of pilot training Colonel McGowan's first operational tour was with VS-880, based at HMCS Shearwater in Nova Scotia flying the Tracker aircraft. He then joined the aircraft carrier HMCS Bonaventure in 1962 and in 1966 went as Deck Officer aboard the destroyer HMCS Ottawa. Following conversion to the Sea-King helicopter, with subsequent service in HS-50 Squadron, he again served in HMCS Bonaventure before joining the destroyers HMCS Margaree and HMCS Assiniboine.

In 1970 Colonel McGowan attended the Canadian Land Forces Command and Staff College in Kingston, Ontario. This was followed by tours at the U.S. Navy Air Development Centre in Warminster, Pennsylvania and as Commanding Officer of Recruiting Zone Headquarters, in Halifax.

Colonel McGowan assumed command of 408 Tactical Helicopter Squadron in August 1977 until January 1980 when he became Deputy Commander, Air Reserve Group Headquarters, in Winnipeg. In 1982, Colonel McGowan attended the Continuous French Language Course prior to assuming his appointment as Base Commander Canadian Forces Base Winnipeg.

Colonel McGowan is married to the former Paddy Johnston. They have two sons. He is posted to the New Ship-borne Aircraft Program at NDHQ, Ottawa.

**Ex-Black Watch becomes CFB Winnipeg's new Base Chief**



**CHIEF WARRANT OFFICER F.P. SMITH, MMM, CD**

Chief Warrant Officer Smith was born 5 November 1938 at Yarmouth, Nova Scotia. He enrolled in the Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery on 10 November 1955 and served with 4 RCHA in Camp Utopia, New Brunswick; Shilo, Manitoba; and Petawawa, Ontario until 1958 when he transferred to The Black Watch (RHR) of Canada, where he served with the 2nd Battalion in Camp Gagetown, New Brunswick and West Germany. In 1966 he was transferred to the Logistics and Administrative Staff at

St. John's, Newfoundland, where he served until 1969. He was promoted to Sergeant in 1967. In July 1969, CWO Smith began employment as an Administrative Clerk trade instructor with the Canadian Forces School of Administration and Logistics at CFB Borden, Ontario, and was promoted to Warrant Officer in March 1972. In 1974 he was transferred to HMCS Ottawa, at Halifax, Nova Scotia, where he served for two years. In January 1976, he was posted to The Canadian Forces Junior Leaders School/Canadian Forces Leadership Academy at CFB Borden, Ontario. He was promoted to Master Warrant Officer in May 1976, and in May 1977 assumed the position of Senior Instructor with Administration Training Company, Canadian Forces School of Administration and Logistics at CFB Borden. In July 1979 he was transferred to Ottawa, Ontario, and served three years with the Deputy Chief of Defence Staff/Chief of Maritime Doctrine and Operations at National Defence Headquarters. In July 1982, he assumed duties as the Superintendent Clerk at CFB Edmonton, Alberta, and was subsequently transferred to CFB Winnipeg, Manitoba as Superintendent Clerk in January 1984.

CWO Smith was appointed to the Order of Military Merit in the grade of Member in 1976, and received the Warrant of Office to the Rank of Chief Warrant Officer 30 September 1983.

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## NDHQ analyst extended PPCLI Colonel

OTTAWA — The Chief of Defence Staff, General Gérard C.E. Thériault, has announced a one year extension for retired Colonel William B.S. Sutherland, CD, as Colonel of the Regiment Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI). Col Sutherland has held the appointment since July, 1983, and it will be extended until July 5, 1987.

Col Sutherland, a native of Nelson, B.C., began his military career in 1941 with the Calgary Tank Regiment. He was commissioned lieutenant (Royal Canadian Armoured Corps) in January 1945. His association with the PPCLI began in 1945 when he transferred to the Royal Canadian Infantry Corps and served with the Third Battalion PPCLI in the Far East. During his career, Col Sutherland held a vari-

ety of posts including: deputy assistant quartermaster general for the Canadian Delegation in Vietnam; Director of Operational Readiness Land; and immediately prior to his retirement in 1975, he was appointed senior policy analyst at National Defence Headquarters.

Col Sutherland, now living in Ottawa, is currently employed as director of the Task Force on Revitalization with the Department of Immigration and Employment.

The position of colonel of the Regiment is an honorary appointment of great prestige awarded to a high-ranking retired officer in his field of specialization. A Colonel of the Regiment acts in an advisory capacity on matters of significance to his regiment and plays an important role in fostering esprit de corps.

## Nova Scotian on two year loan for overseas

OTTAWA — The Department of National Defence has announced the appointment of Mr. James Elmer MacDonald, of New Glasgow, N.S., as Assistant Director of Dependants Education Overseas. The appointee, who will be on a two year Loan of Service Agreement, assumes his duties in July 1986.

Mr. MacDonald, who is currently superintendent of operations, Pictou District School Board in Westville, N.S., will replace Dr. Ross White who


will be returning to School District No. 68 in Nanaimo, B.C.

The staffing of the position was done by means of a competition for which 58 applications were received from across Canada.

The Department of National Defence Dependants School System Overseas provides elementary and secondary education in both English and French to some 3,500 dependants of members of the Canadian Forces serving with the NATO Forces in Europe. It encompasses nine schools staffed with 262 staff members on Loan of Service Agreements from school boards across Canada.

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


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# Team work provides a happy ending even in Pine Falls dense bushland

WINNIPEG — On Saturday, July 12 a 31-member search party made up of members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and civilian volunteers from the Fort Alexander Reserve found Mrs. Madeline Grisdale in dense bush just west of the small town of Pine Falls, Manitoba.

When found, Mrs. Grisdale, 49, was cold, wet and suffering mild shock but nonetheless in good condition considering she had spent nearly six days lost in the mosquito-infested bushland just south of Lake Winnipeg.

The search was coordinated by members of the RCM Police from the nearby Powerview detachment and at its peak involved 15 members of the CFS Gypsumville Ground Search Team as well as 40 personnel from the

Third Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment stationed at CFB Winnipeg's Kapyong Barracks. Over 80 civilian volunteers from the Fort Alexander Reserve and other nearby communities also took part in the search.

Mrs. Grisdale went missing from the George Guimond Personal Care Home on the Fort Alexander Reserve Sunday, July 6, while picking berries along Highway 11. RCM Police were advised of her disappearance that same day and began scouring the area for evidence of her whereabouts. The following day, RCM Police dog teams entered the area and the search began to gain momentum. By Wednesday RCM Police had determined that additional professional resources were required to augment their personnel and

the civilian volunteers and a request was made for military assistance.

The CFB Gypsumville Ground Search Team was the first organization tasked to join the search. A second request for CF assistance resulted in 3 RCR sending 40 men into the area on Thursday, July 10. The RCR contingent had returned to Winnipeg from a training exercise at CFB Shilo only hours before they received the tasking to head for Pine Falls.

Mrs. Grisdale is now recovering in the Pine Falls Hospital after her ordeal and both RCM Police and civilian volunteers agree that the contribution made by the CF to SAR Grisdale in no small way contributed to that search's happy ending.

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





# BEWARE OF

## Children's Products Found At Garage Sales, Flea Markets, Auctions, Second Hand Stores or Received As Hand-Me-Downs

Second hand baby products can often be purchased at bargain prices. However, you may be buying a serious problem. That old crib, playpen, toy or car seat can be very dangerous. When considering a purchase, check for safety first.

Every year, thousands of children who are too small to protect themselves are injured and many die needlessly. Often a tragic accident could have been prevented if the product had been chosen carefully and maintained properly.

**Cribs**—Since 1972, 46 children in Canada have died in faulty cribs as a result of:

- Mattress supports giving way.
- Becoming wedged between an undersized mattress and the side of the crib.

- Clothing being caught on a corner post, and the child falling back and suffocating.
- Squirming feet first through the vertical slats and becoming caught by the head and asphyxiating.

Mattress support system failures have led to many reported near misses and tragically to the deaths of nine babies in the last three years. Most cribs today have metal "S" hooks which are used to attach the mattress support to the end panel. This type of suspension can become detached when the support is given an upward push. This could result in the child sliding down and becoming wedged between the mattress and side of the crib. Be careful when changing the sheets and **do not** allow children to play underneath or near the crib. As an extra precaution make sure the "S" hook is secured to prevent it from becoming dislodged from the hanger bracket. Place a large secure base such as books or boxes directly underneath the mattress support so it cannot fall.

**New Regulations** expected soon, will address this problem and ensure a safer, stronger crib. This will not however, solve the problem of older cribs.

### Playpens

- Avoid mesh walls large enough to catch a button or hook. Chil-

dren have strangled while struggling to free themselves.

- Never leave an infant in a drop sided mesh playpen when one of the sides is not fixed in the fully raised position. A child can fall into the space between the floor and loose mesh side and suffocate.

### Toys

- Choose the toy to suit the age of the child.
- Look for sturdy toys. Make sure the toy will withstand being dropped, thrown or banged. **Remember**, small detachable pieces such as eyes and noses can choke a small child.
- Throw away toys with sharp edges, or exposed points which cannot be repaired.

### Car Seats

- Choose a car seat carefully.
- That old car seat you buy could turn out to be the worst investment you've ever made. Each year about 70 children under the age of 5 die in Canada and more than 1000 are injured in motor vehicle accidents. Many of these injuries and accidents are due to unrestrained or poorly restrained children. These grim statistics could be improved by choosing the proper seat and installing it properly.

- A car bed, a feeder seat, a car seat which merely hooks over a seat or otherwise does not meet

Canadian Motor Vehicle Safety Standards, can be very dangerous.

- Children who are unrestrained in a car, standing on the seat, sitting on someone's lap, or placed in an inferior seat are in grave danger in a motor vehicle.
- On collision, unrestrained or poorly restrained children can be slammed against the vehicle interior or thrown out into the roadway.
- Car seats must not only meet Canada Motor Vehicle Safety Standards, but to continue to be safe, they must be maintained, and all required pieces must be used.

These are but a few of the dangers lurking out there. Choose your children's products with care. After all, "Is It Really Worth The Risk?" Selection, use and maintenance of all children's products are vital to the safety of your child. Remember, these regulations apply to everyone, including the homeowner as well as other vendors.



# Frobisher Bay wakes up to sonic booms

**FROBISHER BAY NWT:** Strange things are done in the midnight sun, and one of the stranger ones was the teaming of a 402 Squadron Dakota with a CF-18 in a northern defence exercise. Two C-47's from the City of Winnipeg Squadron; the oldest and slowest flying machines in the Canadian air force, flew support for the newest and the fastest jet fighters in Canadian airspace.

The exercise harnessing the good points of the CF-18 and the C-47 Dakota was part of the North Warning Program, an exercise prompted by the revival of low-level attack technology leaving our Arctic flank vulnerable. It was also an exercise integrating the strike capability of 425 Squadron of the regular force, and the support capability of 402 City of Winnipeg Air Reserve Squadron. The Hercules C-130's launched the deployment with a rapid shift of men and machinery to Baffin Island, but the Squadron's support while deployed involved the venerable old Daks moving men and supplies from Bagotville.

Little things, like tow-bars and technicians had to be moved, too small for a Herc, but vital for a smooth running deployment.

Two Daks were tasked for economy of manpower. One set of technicians remained at Bagotville to maintain both aircraft and, in event of a mechanical problem, one aircraft was

capable of maintaining the service while the other was either ferried out or repaired with a crew flown in. Three air crews for the C-47's flew more than forty hours during the week, and were backed up by six technicians.

Airfields capable of taking jet fighters are scarce in the arctic islands. Rankin Inlet, Resolute Bay, and Frobisher Bay are among the few and, south of the Hudson's Straits, Fort Chimo is an alternate. Once airborne the CF-18's stay aloft with aerial tanker service. Daylight operations are no problem, since the exercise was conducted when Frobisher had 21 hours of sunshine and three hours of

dusk and twilight. The fighters winged north over the Penny Icefields and Pangnirtung into the zone of day-long daylight.

The residents of Frobisher Bay expressed interest in the CF-18's. (The Daks and Hercs were old hat.) They also expressed concern that sonic booms could spook the wildlife. They were relieved to hear that such deployments are spread over different bases to give experience in different parts of the north and, they concluded, an occasional sonic boom is not a high price for national defence.


