W/C Green To Direct Air Policy

Air Force Headquarters has announced the appointment of Wing Commander Arthur F. Green, formerly of Alberton, Prince Edward Island, as Director of Air Policy at AFHQ in Ottawa, with simultaneous promotion to the acting rank of Group Captain.

Commissioned as a pilot in 1942, Wing Commander Green was

awarded the Air Force Cross and the Distinguished Flying Cross for service during the Second World War.

During his post-war career, he served as a flying instructor at Trenton, as Adjutant of the National Defence College in Kingston, and on exchange duties in Britain as a member of the directing staff of the RAF Staff College.

Now serving as secretary of the Chiefs of Staff Committee at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa, he will assume his new duties later this month.

Wing Commander Arthur F. Green was born on 21 October 1917 in Alberton, Prince Edward Island, and completed his formal education in 1937, graduating from Prince of Wales College in P.E.I. with a First Class Teacher's Certificate.

After three and a half years as a high school teacher and principal, he joined the RCAF in March 1941 for aircrew training. Commissioned as a pilot in January 1942, he was transferred to duty overseas, and was awarded an Air Force Cross for his service on flying instruction duties in Scotland. Later, W/C Green was engaged

on bombing operations with 576 and 582 RAF Squadrons, for which he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

On repatriation in 1945, he served as a flying instructor at Central Flying School, Trenton, Ont., until March 1946, when he was assigned to 7 Photo Wing, Rockcliffe, Ont. In 1947, he attended a two-year course of instruction in Photographic Technology at the Rochester Institute of Technology in New York, after which he returned to Rockcliffe.

In 1951, W/C Green attended the RCAF Staff College Course in Toronto, following which he was assigned to instructional duties at the Reserve Officers' School, and in November 1952, he was named Adjutant of the National Defence College, Kingston, Ont.

Appointed Chief Administrative Officer of Station Goose Bay, Labrador, in November 1955, he remained there until selected to attend the USAF Air War College at Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala., in August 1958. On completing this course, he was assigned to exchange duty in Britain as a member of the directing staff of the RAF Staff College, Bracknell.

Returning to Canada in August 1962, W/C Green became Secretary of the Chiefs of Staff Committee at National Defence HQ in Ottawa. In August 1963 he assumed the appointment of Director of Air Policy at Air Force Headquarters.

New Badge For Flight Surgeons

A new flying badge has been authorized for RCAF medical officers qualified in the highly specialized field of Aviation Medicine.

Air Commodore G. D. Caldbick, Deputy Surgeon in charge of military medicine, was the first of 67 eligible medical officers to officially receive the new badge. The presentation was made by Air Vice-Marshal W. A. Orr, Air Member for Personnel, at Air Force Headquarters in Ottawa.

ARGUS



The Canadair-built Argus entered service with the RCAF's Maritime Air Command in 1958 to fill a requirement for a long-range anti-submarine aircraft, and is now serving with three maritime patrol squadrons.

Equipped with modern, highly sophisticated detection and armament systems, this four-engine giant can carry an 8,000-pound weapons load to a patrol area 1,000 miles at sea, search an area of 50,000 square miles and return to base with sufficient fuel remaining for diversion to an airfield as far as 500 miles away. The versatile Argus can also perform minelaying, long-range convoy escort, blockade enforcement, maritime search and rescue and emergency transport duties.

Because of the long duration of its patrols, the Argus requires a crew of 15—three pilots, three navigators, two flight engineers and seven electronic equipment operators. Crew facilities include a soundproof rest and sleeping area and a fully-equipped galley.

noon series—Careers for Older Women.

One of Winnipeg's foremost women volunteers will share the techniques and skills which have given her the confidence to chair

several major community organizations. Included in her program—On Being a Leader—will be the rules of order, pre-preparation, program planning, purposeful discussion and how to help groups reach objectives.

Careers for Older Women will explore the kinds of work which are available to the older woman who may have no job training or experience. Talks and discussions about job opportunities, training needs, how to make the most of personal assets and how to apply for a job will be led by personal directors from local business firms and employment offices.

Some of the activities open to men as well as women this winter will include bridge instruction, a formal conversational French, modern and Latin dance classes at the new VIP Night (varied interest program).

VIP Night will begin at 7:00 pm Thursdays with a for-women-only program of ceramics, dressmaking, judo and keep fit, followed by a swim. At 9:00 o'clock, co-ed activities begin and will include badminton, bridge, drama and folk singing. Everyone will gather in the lounge at 10:30 for coffee and conversation, and once a month there will be a dance.

In addition to the programs listed above, a variety of creative arts and crafts classes will include weaving, sewing, ceramics, furniture refinishing and many others.

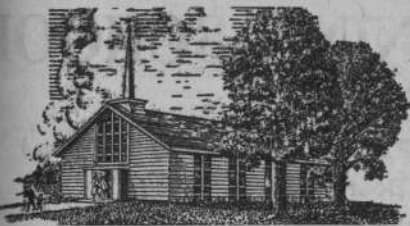

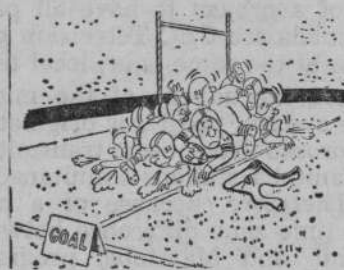

P.S.—Some parental help may be required.

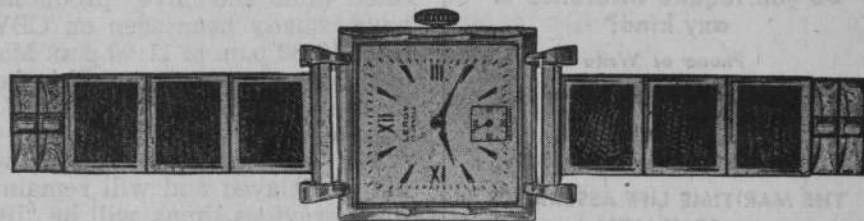

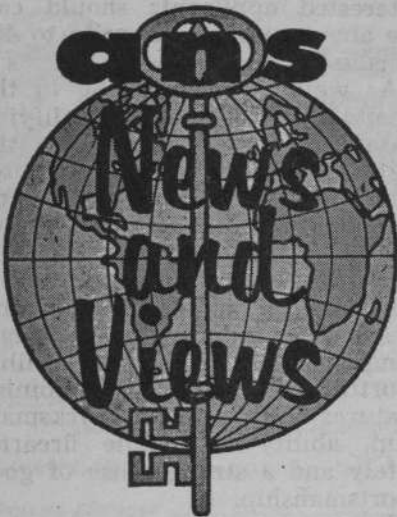

CBC-TV TO STANDARDIZE PROGRAM SCHEDULING

Beginning September 8th, CBC-TV viewers in Manitoba will see all network programs one hour later than they previously had seen them. That date will mark completion of a project to have all parts of Canada see CBC Television programs at the same hour, local time.

Since the advent of the microwave system, programs originating in Toronto have been transmitted to Manitoba stations simultaneously. Therefore, because of a one-hour time zone difference between Toronto and Manitoba, programs seen in Toronto at 8:00 p.m. were seen in Manitoba at 7:00 p.m. on the clock.

In order that programs will be seen by the audiences for which they are intended, it is important that they be shown at the same hour on the clock in all localities. Other parts of Western Canada have been receiving Toronto programs on a delayed basis — they have been recorded on video tape in Calgary and relayed to the stations at a later hour. Until now, it had not been possible for Manitoba stations to make use of this system.

Video tape machines are being installed in Winnipeg to record the network programs for Manitoba. Until the machines are operational in October, the video tape centre in Calgary will record the programs for Manitoba.

Now, network programs will run each weekday evening from 8:00 p.m. to 11:20 p.m. rather than 7:00 p.m. to 10:20 p.m., as in the past. The daily CBC TELEVISION NEWS, formerly scheduled at 10:00 p.m. in Manitoba, will be seen at 11:00 p.m. In general, viewers should expect to see all network programs one hour later than previously.

Local programs — that is, programs produced in Winnipeg and Brandon, or syndicated films carried only on these stations — will also be affected, since there will be different time periods available to them. For example: local syndicated films and "live" productions have usually been seen on CBWT from 10:30 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. Many of these programs now will be seen in the weekday period from 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

The only programs which will not be delayed and will remain at their previous times, will be "live" sports events and news and public affairs actualities.
