



From the Mailbag

In the last article, I talked on the size restrictions and a little on First and Fourth class parcels. Today, I'm going to talk on special services available to each of these classes. First, services available to First class mail are:

- (a) Registration
- (b) Insurance
- (c) Certified Mail
- (d) Cash On Delivery (C.O.D.)
- (e) Special Delivery

N.B. All fees for services are in addition to First class postage.

Registration is designed for one thing — security. The sender is given a receipt at the time of mailing, a record is kept of the item in the course of post and a signature obtained from the addressee or authorized representative upon delivery. A common myth with registration is speed. This could be quite to the contrary because every post office that register stops at has to be signed for and then despatched again.

At the present time, the fee is \$2.70. With this amount, is an indemnity (insurance) coverage of \$100.00. The maximum coverage is \$1000.00. The cost is \$.37 for each \$100.00 increment above the initial fee. For example, if you want coverage for \$250.00, your registration fee would be \$2.70 plus $$.74 (2 \times .37)$ for a total of \$3.44.

One customer said, "I would like this to go Double Registered". Well, after a lengthy "O" Group, it was finally figured out that what the customer wanted was an Acknowledgement of Receipt (AR) card. This is a pink card which is affixed to the register at the time of mailing or can be sent after the register has

gone. When the card arrives at the destination, the card is also signed for and then returned to sender. The cost is \$.62 at the time of mailing or \$1.03 if register has already left.

The next service is Insurance. Canada Post provides compensation for loss, rifling or damage. Items not acceptable for Insurance are:

- (a) Registered mail
- (b) C.O.D.
- (c) Money Packets
- (d) Postage stamps
- (e) Currency and negotiable premium coupons or trading stamps
- (f) Coins
- (g) Lottery tickets

N.B. Items of mail which are of a fragile or perishable nature cannot be insured for damage (loss only). This also applies to registration. If you have any receipts for the value of your item, keep them, as you may need them if you have to file a claim. If you do not have any receipts, Canada Post may estimate the value of your article. Canada Post also states that no liability is assumed by Canada Post for loss, rifling or damage caused by improper mail preparation. The fee is \$.37 for \$50.00 coverage, \$.43 for up to \$100.00 and \$.37 for each \$100.00 increment up to a maximum of \$1000.00. The sender is issued a receipt only. The other insurance has Proof of Delivery. When the item is delivered, the addressee or Authorized rep must also sign the form. The Post Office will keep a copy and the addressee will also receive a copy. The fee is \$.77 for the first \$100.00 and \$.37 for each \$100.00 up to \$1000.00 maximum.

With the next, service, it is either unknown or unpopular. If a customer is not worried about security, but would like to know if his or her parcel or letter was received, then Certified Mail is the answer. The service is cheaper as compared to registration (\$1.55 plus postage versus \$2.70 plus postage). Certified mail can also be used for Fourth class parcels which can be mailed even cheaper. When delivered, the addressee or Auth rep signs for it, a copy is then sent back to the sender and the Post Office also retains a copy. Certified Mail is only good in Canada and CFPO/FMO addresses. Registration and C.O.D. cannot be accepted for Certified Mail service.

Another myth that customers have is that they can send a parcel and have the other pay. This is true but there is a catch. By using Cash On Delivery (C.O.D.), you can have any costs reimbursed back to the sender. BUT! You still have to pay for that parcel to go to the destination and you have to pay the C.O.D. fee. The amount of

the C.O.D. can be determined by adding the following charges:

- (a) Value of the item
- (b) Service charges (repair)
- (c) Sales tax (d) Postage
- (e) C.O.D. fee

C.O.D.'s can only be mailed at an accounting Post Office (where money orders are sold) for delivery in Canada only.

Items not accepted for C.O.D.

- (a) Items not ordered or requested by addressee
- (b) Collections of old accounts

The fee is \$2.05 for the first \$100.00 and \$.37 for each additional \$100.00 up to the \$1000.00 maximum.

The last service is Special Delivery. Mail is handled and delivered on a priority basis by the most expeditious means available at all Post Offices.

N.B. Special Delivery service is not available to CFPO/FMO addresses. On the average, we have received Special deliveries in 1-3 days from Halifax, Toronto, Vancouver and Ottawa. The fees are:

- (a) \$1.83 for letter mail within Manitoba
- (b) \$2.63 for letter mail outside Manitoba
- (c) \$1.40 for First class parcels

The only services available to Fourth class parcel are:

- (a) Certified Mail
- (b) C.O.D. (c) Insurance

These services follow the same rules as for First class.

Also listed is the 1988 Christmas Mailing Deadline Dates.

One of the biggest problems we experience each year is the complaints from customers on the amount of postage they have to pay for Christmas parcels. Please do not wait til the last minute as this can be very expensive. For example, a 1.5 kg parcel to West Germany is \$16.90 and a 1.5 kg to U.S.A. is \$8.25 AIR MAIL.

In the course of a recent Condition of Service staff visit to CFB Winnipeg, a number of questions were asked by CF members which no one on the visiting team was able to answer at the time. The questions have been researched and the answers are provided below.

Question:

If a single parent can be sent to Alert or on a six-month UN tour, why can't he/she be posted to Europe?

Answer:

CFE is an accompanied tour to an operational theatre in which a requirement exists for a nonmilitary parent to be available and responsible for dependant children in the event of a military emergency.

service couple) elected to leave a dependant child/ren in Canada with relatives/friends or undertook to bring (or employ while there) a full-time nanny/housekeeper if posted to CFE, would a posting then be possible?

Only the parent is legally responsible for the care of the dependants. Therefore, where children are left in Canada, there is a high potential for personal disruptions and consequently detractions from operational effectiveness if problems occur (for example illness or injury, change in circumstances regarding child care) that would require the parent to be unexpectedly repatriated to Canada to be with the child. Alternately, if a nanny was either brought to Europe, or employed

from the local population, there is If a single mother (or married no guarantee that the nanny would want to continue the child care relationship during the entire time the member remained in Europe. Further, a nanny or housekeeper will not have a parental bond with dependants and could behave unpredictably in times of tension. It is recognized that similar circumstances to those described can and do arise in the case of married couples who decide to separate. However, legal responsibility for the dependants almost always is placed with the spouse who returns to Canada. Where this is not the case, the single parent member is repatriated at the earliest opportunity.

Question:

I am a supply tech who wears the air force DEU. I would like a posting to the parachute maintenance depot but have been told for the following reasons: that I am wearing the wrong colour of uniform for this. What is the policy?

Answer:

The policy is to accept all volunteers regardless of environment. As of March 1988, there were two air element parachute riggers (sup techs) employed at Canadian Forces Parachute Maintenance Depot.

Question:

Why do new officers receive second language training (SLT) before they complete their occupational training? Would it not be better to conduct the training in reverse order & themeby reduce the resources wasted on those who fail their occupational training?

The decision was made to provide SLT before MOC training

a) In the case of francophones, MOC training is generally given in English only, therefore, it is necessary to provide SLT before MOC training;

- b) Commands indicated that they preferred personnel who had just completed the MOC training because these personnel were ready and eager to put into practice without delay what they had learned;
- c) In the majority of cases, personnel who complete MOC training move immediately from the Base Training List (BTL) to the Advanced Training List (ATL). The cost in providing SLT for ATL personnel is much larger than for BTL personnel. Therefore considering all circumstances. it is much more efficient to provide SLT before MOC training.

Latchkey children by Dr. Derevensky

Eleven year old Susan, arrives home from school at 3:30, searches for her key, lets herself into the house and secures the door behind her. She calls her mother to tell her she has arrived safely, has a snack, begins her homework and watches some television. It will be several hours before either parent returns home from work.

Billy, age 13, will get up at 7:00, makes breakfast for his brother age 10, and they will leave for school together at 8:00, locking the door behind them. Billy's father will call to make certain they leave on time. Both parents left for work two hours earlier.

Billy and Susan are part of an ever growing group of children commonly referred to as LATCHKEY KIDS. The term originated with youngsters who traditionally wore house keys around their neck and returned from school to an unsupervised home. Estimates are that approximately 6-8 million children in Canada and the U.S. are unsupervised and are responsible for substantial self care.

The traditional stereotype of children eating cold meals, being deprived, neglected and insecure no longer fits. These youngsters are generally physically and psychologically healthy and are a phenomenon of family life in the

While there appears to be a genuine lack of sound empirical research on these children several MYTHS seem to perpetuate. They have been portrayed as being more fearful, apprehensive and insecure. They have been reported to perform poorly in school and their development to be delayed. Others suggest that they have a greater number of social problems and may be "hurried children". Current research has failed to support these beliefs.

For the parent, a major consideration is at what age are children responsible enough to leave unsupervised? Rather than merely designating a particular age it is more appropriate to determine the child's intellectual and social maturity. Is he self disciplined? How responsible is he? Some are capable of caring for themselves at 10 and 11 years of age while others must wait until 13 or 14.

Self care is often the last choice selected by parents. Yet, what appears to be important is the type of preparation these children have for spending time alone. In The Handbook for Latchkey Children and Their Parents, Lynette Long has suggested a "survival skills" training program which should be taught to all children by their parents. The primary aim of this program is to enhance self care skills and to enable youngsters to deal with

unexpected emergencies. The following topics should be covered in the educational process: (1) safe keeping of the house key; (2) travelling safely to and from school; (3) household emergencies such as power failures, fires, personal injuries; (6) knowing basic first aid in case of accidents; (7) appropriate eating habits; (8) reducing and effective handling of such fears as noises, darkness, etc; and (9) methods of reducing boredom.

Having children "check-in" periodically and knowing that they can reach a parent, relative or friend in case of an emergency will often reduce both the parents' and children's anxieties.

In addition to ensuring our children's safety and emotional and psychological well being, social service and educational agencies should also become more responsive to the needs of the two parent and single parent working family. Schools should be encouraged to extend the use of their buildings both before and after school hours. While I am not advocating leaving young children in self care situations for prolonged periods and believe that good adult supervision is essential, helping children through direct teaching and training programs can help minimize potential problems.



"There is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother." (Proverbs 18:24)

As girls growing up, our parents were very particular about the friends we, their daughters, chose to have very close to us. Parents and teachers were hammering the same lessons into our heads. Often we were told pithy sayings like:

"Show me your friends and I will tell you who you are"

Birds of a feather flock together'

With no brothers of our own, we became even more conscious of the type of behaviour exhibited by the brothers of our girlfriends and as teenagers my sisters and I began to see the meaning behind many of the proverbs, verses and sayings we were taught.

Last week as I was mowing the grass around the PMQ, I found myself automatically lining up each row of grass being cut with the straight line of the con-

crete pathway. There were times when there was a slant to the concrete and I realized that I preferred to keep the straight row I was finding some delight in making, even though it took more effort to keep to the "straight and

Then I found myself reflecting on this article I had already started to ponder in my mind. "Truly", I thought, "these rows represent the friends we keep and what we use to guide us." If our friends or those guiding us keep to the straight and narrow pathway of Christ, then what a beautiful pattern our lives can make, for Jesus said,

This was what Jesus' friends, his disciples, experienced as they walked with Jesus. We too can be friends to Jesus and have him as our friend as we share his love with all whom we meet.

Tipping The Scales in Your Favour

Canadians have an energy problem. Too many of us take more energy into our bodies than we put out. As a result, more than half our adult population needs to slim down.

That means we don't look as attractive or feel as good as we'd like to. Just as important, we're not always able to perform to the peak of our abilities.

The solution isn't a new diet. A diet reduces your measurements quickly, but only at some expense to your overall health. Chances are it isn't something you could stick with for a long time. You may revert to your old habits and the dial on the scales will slowly creep up again.

The key to being slim is not dieting, but changing your

lifestyle habits as they relate to food and physical activity. Changing them not drastically, but gradually. Changing them not for a few weeks or months, but forever.

Lower your energy intake (the amount you eat) and increase your energy output (your physical activity). Use up more energy than you consume until you reach the body mass (weight) you should be. Then, get the input and output in balance so you maintain yourself at that level.

For example, to lose 1 pound, you need to consume 3,500 calories less than you use in activity or conversely, use up 3,500 calories more than you eat. That means lowering the quantity of food you eat somewhat.

However, the quality of your food shouldn't suffer; in fact, the opposite is true. You need wholesome, basic food from each of the four food groups: milk and milk products, meat, fish, poultry and alternates, fruits and vegetables, breads and cereals.

Exercise, by itself, is a slow way to lose mass. For example, you would have to walk or run 2 km to burn off the energy in two cookies. However, in combination with improved eating habits, exercise is a highly effective way to get trim and stay there.

Before starting any diet and exercise program, see your doctor. If you have any questions after that, ask your neighbourhood pharmacist for advice. He or she has the knowledge and experience to help you help yourself.


