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## The Last Starfighter Party


As you know, the "104 Closing" is in Baden on the March 1st weekend. Many of us will not be able to attend either for job or pocketbook reasons.


### FOOTNOTE

## Winnipeg families sought for foreign student exchange

International Student Exchange Programs (ASSE) is seeking Winnipeg families to host 15 Scandinavian, French, Spanish, German, Dutch, Swiss, and American girls and boys, 16 to 18 years of age, coming to this area for the upcoming high school year.

These personable and academically select European and American teens are bright, curious and anxious to learn about this country through living as part of a family, attending high school and sharing their own culture and language with their newly adopted Canadian family.

The students are fluent in English and are sponsored by ASSE, a non-profit, public benefit organization, affiliated with the Swedish and Finnish Ministries of Education and cooperating with the Canadian Provincial Ministries of Education.

The exchange students arrive from their home country shortly before school begins in late August and return at the end of the school year in June. Each ASSE student is fully insured, brings his or her own personal spending money and expects to bear his or her share of household responsibilities, as well as being included in normal family activities and lifestyle.

Students are well screened and qualified by ASSE. Families may select the youngster of their choice from extensive student applications, family photos and biographical essays. Students and families are encouraged to begin corresponding prior to the student's arrival.

ASSE is also seeking local high school students to become ASSE exchange students abroad. Students should be between 15 and 18 years old and interested in living with a European or American family, attending school and learning about the lands and people of Scandinavia, France, Spain, Germany, Holland, Switzerland, Britain, and the United States.

Students should have a good academic record and desire to experience a European or American culture and language through living with a warm and giving volunteer family. Academic year and shorter term summer vacation programs are available.



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Where am I?

Signals from space help you know your place

A hiker temporarily lost in the wilderness pulls a small box out of his backpack, presses a few buttons, then learns his or her exact location. A long-haul trucker in midst of an urban sprawl looks at a small dashboard display for guidance to the next destination. A family visiting a friend's new home hundreds of miles away drives unerringly to the doorstep, directed by dashboard electronics.

All are guided by a constellation of navigation satellites circling the earth. And all this can be happening very soon. In fact, some of us are already benefitting from earlier satellites, used for communications that link our phones and TV sets to a larger world.

The navigation satellites composing the Global Positioning System (GPS) already are seeing some military and commercial use, even before the system becomes fully operational in 1989. The full constellation will consist of 18 satellites, forming a "bird cage" around the earth at an altitude of 20,200 kilometers. Each satellite broadcasts precise time and location information.

Get a ground-based GPS receiver, and you're in the loop. The receiver tells you of your exact latitude, longitude, and elevation — continuously and anywhere in the world. Still sound like a dream? Well, several companies are already working to make it a reality.

A manpack made for the U.S. military was formerly the most compact unit, about the size of a portable

typewriter. The Magnavox Mini-GPS will be shirt-pocket-sized, dubbed "Virginia Slims." It measures 2" x 4" x 3/4" like the U.S. cigarette pack.

The dramatic size reductions are the result of two rather exotic technologies — Gallium Arsenide (GaAs) to shrink the size of the radio frequency receiver, and Surface Acoustic Wave (SAW) to reduce the microwave oscillator; further, these technologies are better suited to automated production, promising new economy for GPS receivers.

In spite of its compact size, the Magnavox Mini-GPS has the same broad capabilities and high accuracy as larger units. Its accuracy will be the same or better than the 10-35 meters quoted for current generation of receivers.

The compact size and potential for cost reduction with Magnavox Mini-GPS could well inspire broad use in both the public and private sectors. Projected applications on the civil side include police and fire departments, aircraft, trains, taxi cabs, hikers — virtually anything that moves over or has a place on the earth. By the year 2000, possibly sooner, we could be seeing many thousands of people enjoying the benefits of GPS.

Whether a geophysicist in an exotic clime, a farmer on the back forty, or a family on vacation — GPS could have a profound impact on the way we work, play, even view our environment. Being lost may ultimately come to mean "I left my GPS at home!" — and perhaps, not all that far in the future.

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

## Tour extended for RC Chaplaincy Colonel — Commandant

OTTAWA — General Gérard C.E. Thériault, Chief of the Defence Staff, has extended the appointment of His Excellency, Archbishop Joseph L. Wilhelm MC, CD, DD, as Colonel Commandant, Canadian Forces Chaplaincy (RC) Branch to December 31, 1986. A native of Walkerton, Ont., he was appointed Colonel Commandant January 1, 1982.

Archbishop Wilhelm began his military career in 1927 with the Bruce Regiment (Militia) in Walkerton. He served until 1933, leaving with the rank of sergeant, to devote himself to church duties. He re-joined the Canadian Army in 1940 as a chaplain with the rank of captain.

Between August, 1941, and November, 1945, he served in the United Kingdom, Italy and Northwest Europe. His wartime decorations include the Military Cross for action at Agria Crossroad, Sicily in 1943; the 1939-45 Star, Italy Star, France and Germany Star, Defence Medal, War Medal 1939-45 and Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with clasp.

From 1948 to 1963 he served as chaplain to the Headquarters, 3rd Infantry Brigade (Militia), in Hamilton, Ont., after which he transferred to the Supplementary Reserve.

Archbishop Wilhelm retired from active church duties in March, 1982, after more than 48 years of dedicated service.

Wilhelm MC, CD, DD, en tant que colonel commandant du Service de l'aumônerie (CR) des Forces canadiennes jusqu'au 31 décembre 1986. Ce natif de Walkerton (Ont.) a été nommé colonel commandant le 1er janvier 1982.

L'archevêque Wilhelm débute sa carrière militaire en 1927 avec le Bruce Regiment (Milice) à Walkerton. Il y devient sergent et quitte le service en 1933 afin de se dévouer à temps plein aux devoirs ecclésiastiques. Puis il s'enrôle au sein de l'Armée canadienne en 1940 au grade de capitaine en tant qu'aumônier.



EXAMPLES OF WHERE YOUR SUPPORT IS GOING

**LIONS EYE BANK** — The Eye Bank acts as the confidential liaison between those in need of corneal transplants, the corneal surgeon, and donors of corneal tissue. More than 90 people are presently waiting for a donor so they may receive the Gift of Sight. With increased funding for equipment and promotional material, the Eye Bank's goal is to reduce the present one-year waiting period to three months.

**MANITOBA LEARNING CENTRE** — Recognizing and successfully correcting learning problems is the role of the Manitoba Learning Centre. Following diagnosis and assessment, teachers plan effective teaching strategies around each student's learning strengths and weaknesses to help restore the glimmer of understanding.

**SPECIAL MEDICAL TREATMENT FUNDS** — Education treatment to enable a multiple handicapped child to attend school. Travel and accommodation costs for a person requiring major surgery or consultation with a specialist. These are examples of assistance given to Manitobans for special medical treatments or needs not normally provided through standard medical plans.
