



# CFB Winnipeg Volunteers assist Manitoba Special Olympics

"Astounding", was the number of volunteers from CFB Wpg which for 3 fun-filled days and 2 sometimes long nights, staffed security at the Manitoba Special Olympics on the first weekend in June. 55 NCM's, 12 Medical and 6 Wpg ambulance attendants volunteered with the Variety Summer games, hosted at the University of Manitoba. Although wet conditions prevailed, the volunteers spirits were elevated watching the highly motivated athletes. Equipped with hand-held radios, flashlights and 2 DND vehicles, the security team handled various situations with professionalism and efficiency.

With such predicaments as an elevator stuck between the 9th and 10th floors, to, lost athletes, the damp weekend wasn't without a dull moment. This summer's games was the 9th year CFB Wpg has volunteered their assistance in this worthy cause improving the physical and emotional benefit of these privileged people.

The athletes ranged in age from 7-70 and participated from all over the province, in sports such as Bowling, Track, Swimming and Soccer. Approximately 460 athletes and 160 coaches were in attendance for the 10th anniversary of the games. 



# 10 Tips for Fire Safety

### 1. Stop, Drop, and Roll

If your clothes catch fire, do not run! Instead, stop where you are, drop to the ground, and roll over and over to smother the flames. Cover your face with your hands to protect your throat and lungs from burns.

### 2. Install and Maintain Smoke Detectors

Smoke detectors give you early warning in case of a fire, so you have time to escape safely. Install at least one smoke detector on every level of your home - and one outside each bedroom. Check the manufacturer's directions and test once a week. Replace any dead batteries immediately.

### 3. Practice E.D.I.T.H.

If fire breaks out in your home get out fast. Design an escape plan with your family. Be sure to include two ways out of every room in case one exit is blocked by flames or smoke. Select a meeting place outside where everyone will gather. Then, practice your plan with Exit Drills In The Home (E.D.I.T.H.). Remember, never go back into a burning building, no matter what! And, never use elevators to escape a fire - use the stairs.

### 4. Crawl Low in Smoke

If you get caught in smoke, get down on your hands and knees and crawl towards the nearest safe exit. Smoke and hot fumes rise, so the cleanest air is near the

### 5. Cool a Burn

If you or someone else gets burned, run cool water on the burned skin immediately. This will help to lessen the pain. If a blister or char forms, see a doctor right away.

### 6. Smokers Need watchers

Carelessly discarded cigarettes are the major cause of fatal home fires. Make sure smokers extinguish cigarettes in large, deep ashtrays. Fill ashtrays with water before putting in the trash can. Check under sofa and chair cushions for cigarette butts before going to bed. And, never ever smoke in bed!

### 7. Space Heaters Need Space

Place portable heaters at least 36 inches (3 feet) away from things that burn, such as paper, bedding, clothing, or curtains. Keep small children away from space heaters. And remember, always turn off the heaters when you go to bed or leave your home. Be sure your space heater is labelled by a recognized testing laboratory.

### 8. Be Careful Cooking

When you cooking at the stove, be alert. If grease catches fire, first place a lid over the pan to smother the flames, then turn off the burner. Do not throw water or anything else on a grease fire. Always keep pot handles turned in so they can't be accidentally knocked off the edge of the stove. And, while cooking, keep young children out of the way.

### 9. Practice Safety with Electricity

If an appliance gives off smoke or a burning odor, unplug it immediately and have it repaired. Check the cords on all lights and appliances; if they are frayed or broken, have them replaced. Do not overload extension cords and don't run them under rugs or other places where they can be stepped on and broken. If you replace a blown fuse, be sure the new fuse is the correct amperage.

### 10. A Match is a Tool - For Adults

A pack of matches or a lighter in the hands of a child can be instantly dangerous - causing death or injury quickly! Store matches and lighters up high where kids can't reach them. And, if they find matches or lighters, teach children to give them to adults.

### Remember ...

If there's a fire in your home, get out immediately and call the fire department from a neighbor's house or a phone booth. Do not go back into a burning building under any circumstances. If you think someone is trapped inside, tell the fire department. Ask members of your fire department for advice about keeping your home firesafe — they will be happy to help!




