"Co-operation" St. James - RCAF

The Commanding Officer, G/C D. A. Willis, and F/L Jack Girard, President of the Curling Rink, were on hand to welcome the visitors to the club. Before the competition got under way, a pleasant half hour in the lounge served to get acquainted with the visitors, and to see the opening of the final game of the Stanley Cup.

His Worship Mayor Hanks in presenting the trophy to the Commanding Officer congratulated him not only on the fine sportsmanship of the players, but also on his fine

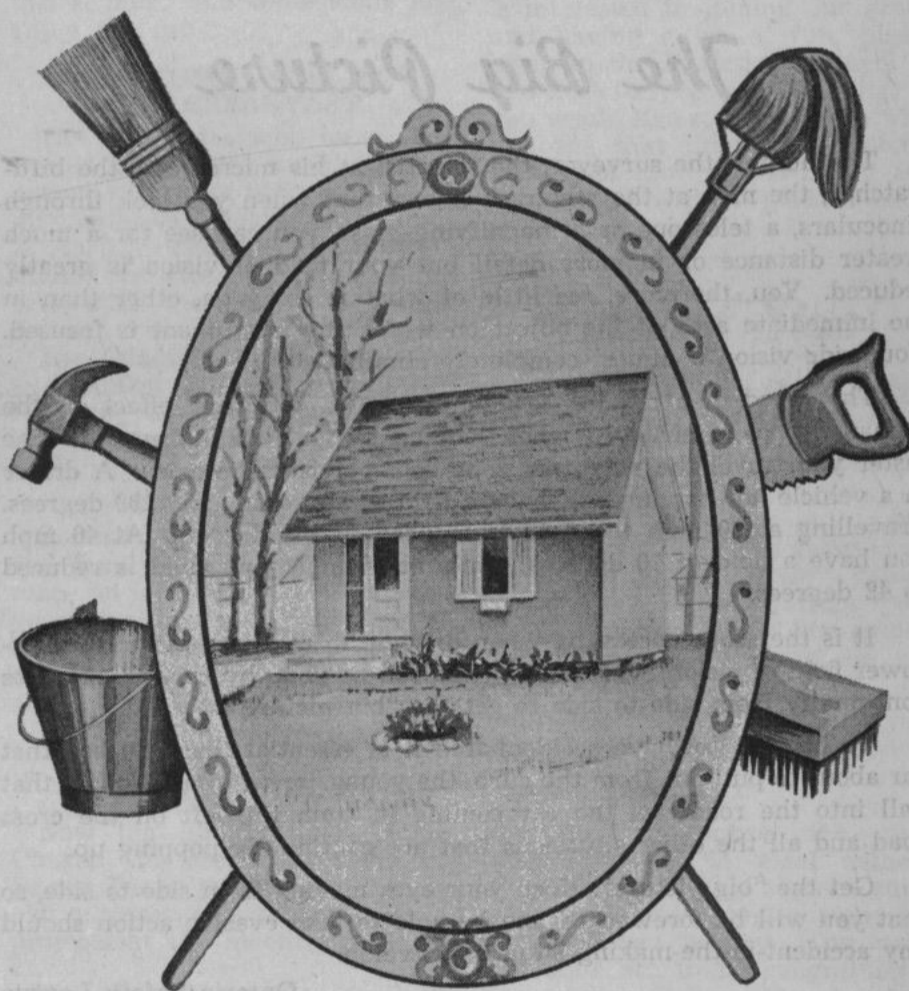

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EDITORIAL CORNER

The Big Picture

The hunter, the surveyor, the scientist at his microscope, the bird-watcher, the man at the racetrack knows that when you look through binoculars, a telescope or a magnifying glass, you can see for a much greater distance or in more detail but your field of vision is greatly reduced. You, therefore, see little of what is going on, other than in the immediate area of the object on which the instrument is focused. Your side vision is almost completely eliminated.

The speed of a moving vehicle has much the same effect on the human eye as is achieved when looking through an instrument. The faster you travel the narrower your field of vision becomes. A driver in a vehicle not moving will have a field of approximately 200 degrees. Travelling at 20 mph the field is reduced to 104 degrees. At 40 mph you have a field of 70 degrees, while at 60 mph your field is reduced to 42 degrees.

It is therefore necessary, when driving, to compensate for the narrower field of vision. Fortunately this can be done by moving the eyes continually from side to side to get the "big picture".

To be able to drive accident-free it is essential that you see that car about to pull out from the curb, the youngster who may follow that ball into the roadway, the car coming in from the left on the cross road and all the other situations that are continually popping up.

Get the "big picture". Keep your eyes moving from side to side, so that you will be forewarned and be able to take evasive action should any accident-in-the-making situation develop.

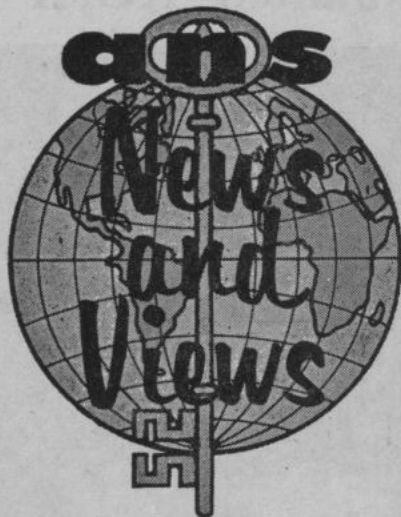
DINING-IN NIGHT

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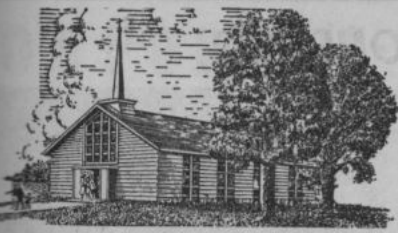

MASSSES

Sunday — 9 and 11 a.m. Weekdays — 4.30 and 5.05 p.m. Saturday — 11 a.m. and 4.30 p.m.

CONFESSIONS

Monday-Friday — Before every Mass. Saturday—1900-2000 hours. Sunday — Before and during both Masses.

Other times—by appointment. NOTE: If there is no priest in the Confessional, ring "Confession Bell." Parents are asked to remind their children to come to Confession after school on Friday afternoon, that is, from 1600 to 1630 hours.

NURSERY SERVICE

During 1100 hours Mass young children of parents who attend this Mass, will be cared for by nursery service in the Chaplains' quarters.

BAPTISM

Usually on Sunday afternoon. If this is inconvenient another day of the week may be chosen. Telephone the Chaplains' secretary during working hours to arrange the date and the hour. This will make it possible for the papers and certificates to be filled in beforehand.

MARRIAGE

Contact the Chaplain or his secretary at least one month beforehand if both parties are Catholics. In the case of a prospective mixed marriage, notice should be given at least two months in advance in order to give time for the couple to follow the instructions required by Church Law.

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT . . .

These are some passages of the Pope John XXIII's encyclical: "Peace on Earth." "People live in

constant fear, lest the storm that every moment threatens should break upon them with dreadful violence . . . Even though it is difficult to believe that anyone would deliberately take the responsibility for the appalling destruction and sorrow that war would bring in its train. It cannot be denied that the conflagration may be set off by some uncontrollable and unexpected chance . . . Justice, then, right, reason, and humanity urgently demand that arms race should cease; that the stockpiles which exist in various countries should be reduced equally and simultaneously by the parties concerned; that nuclear weapons should be banned; and that a general agreement should eventually be reached about progressive disarmament and an effective method of control."

COEXISTENCE

"The doctrinal principles provide Catholics, therefore, with a vast field in which they can meet and come to an understanding both with Christians separated from this Apostolic See, and also with human beings who are not enlightened by faith in Jesus Christ. One must never confuse error and the person who errs . . . the person who errs is always and above a human being, and he retains in every case his dignity as human person . . . it must be borne in mind, furthermore, that neither can false philosophical teachings regarding the nature, origin, and destiny of the universe and of man be identified with historical movements that have economic, social, cultural, or political ends . . . because the teachings, once they are drawn up and defined remain always the same, while the movements . . . cannot avoid being subject to changes, even of a profound nature."

S/L W. H. Fader presents the certificate of award to WO2 O. W. Scheuneman.

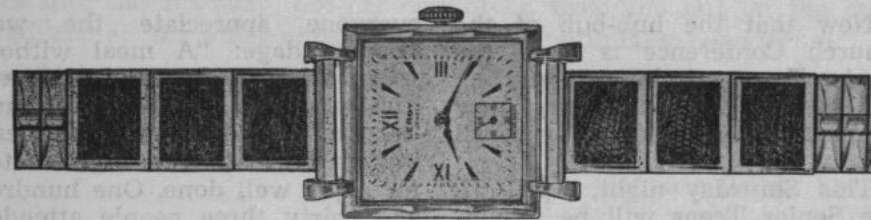

In the wee hours of early morning 18 Apr., The standby search aircraft, captained by F/L Wally Kostiuk, was scrambled to Fort St. John to seek a missing civilian aircraft. The aircraft was a Piper 15 with two persons aboard on a 200 mile flight from Fort St. John to Fort Nelson, B.C.

The pilot's Flight Plan estimated 2:10 hrs enroute and 4½ hours fuel. After being airborne for four hours, the pilot contacted Fort Nelson, advised he was lost, and was about to land in a small clearing near a wide twisting river. Unfortunately, there are many rivers in their area and all meet this description. Nothing further was heard from this aircraft.

The following morning a civilian plane from Ft. Nelson located his missing counterpart 85 miles off track to the east of his destination. The 111 Dakota, which was in the vicinity, proceeded to the area, dropped a portable radio, and ascertained that the two occupants were uninjured. A helicopter was chartered and the two men were taken to Ft. Nelson, none the worse for wear.

While the above was taking place, the RCC was alerted that an aircraft was two days overdue on a flight to Kenora from a fishing lodge 90 miles north. The pilot had not filed a Flight Notification and only because relatives became concerned was search action initiated.

Albatross 9310, captained by F/L Jack Glazner with F/L Bill Graham as searchmaster, left Winnipeg in the afternoon and located the missing aircraft at dusk. The downed pilot was "on the ball" and had a large signal fire burning as the Albatross approached.

While this search was in progress, the RCMP phoned RCC ad-

vising that Indians had located an aircraft, intact, in the bush near Neepawa. The mystery deepened when ATC advised that no aircraft was overdue. Using large scale aerial maps, and even a road map, the area was narrowed down considerably. RCC was then able to deduce that the wreckage was likely a Mosquito that had crashed in the vicinity in 1947. A ground search party, organized by the RCMP, located the aircraft some time later and established that it was, in fact, this Mosquito which had crashed some years ago.

Thus, 18 Apr 63 had indeed been a busy and satisfying day for RCC and 111KU. Three SAR incidents were born and concluded successfully in a single day.
