CANADIANS AROUND THE WORLD

PLAN FOR THE FUTURE AT HOME

Defence Minister Paul Hellyer anticipates that Canada's two Bomarc missile squadrons will be kept in operation for the next several years. And he says he may make a decision by next fall on the purchase of a United States tactical fighter which would be produced under contract in Canada. The Canadian minister, whose plan to unify the Canadian military forces has drawn the close attention of the Pentagon, will be a key figure in the first sweeping review in four years of Canada-U.S. defence arrangements.

FACE A TOUGH, TEDIOUS JOB IN GAZA

Defence Minister Hellyer's recent whirlwind tour of Canadian bases in the Gaza strip and Sinai peninsula should have given him evidence of the difficulties facing the type of United Nations operations carried out by 971 Canadian servicemen in Gaza.

Two difficulties seem paramount: the frequent failure of lower ranks to appreciate their role in the world situation; and their failure to appreciate living amid the customs of an utterly alien society. Lower ranks are mentioned because officers usually know precisely why they are there and because they have better amenities and social contacts with officers of the other six nations contributing to the United Nations Emergency Force and with the official class of Egyptians.

Mr. Hellyer toured bases there and in Cyprus, France and Germany not only to investigate conditions but to tell Canadian servicemen about his defence policy. He had much less difficulty than might have been expected in selling a unified service. Judging from reactions, the men have only the most minor qualms.

The UNEF has been in operation for seven-and-a-half years. The situation there is no longer an emergency. It is a standing situation and a seemingly hopeless one. There is not now, any more than in 1956, the slightest hope on the horizon of an Egyptian-Israeli political settlement that will allow withdrawal of United Nations troops in 1956, the slightest hope on the horizon of the return to Canada of the forces who patrol the Gaza strip.

WIN PROFESSIONAL RECOGNITION IN EUROPE

Six of Canada's eight CF-104 Starfighter squadrons in Europe, now fully operational in their nuclear strike role, have been awarded the highest ratings for operational readiness assigned in NATO. Canadian airmen, long recognized as the crack flying team within the alliance when flying CF-100 interceptors, regained their elite corps status when their Starfighter aircraft were equipped with nuclear weapons this spring.

MAKE FRIENDS WHILE SEPERATING ENEMIES IN CYPRUS

Canadian soldiers had little trouble winning the affections of the young in northern Cyprus where Greeks and Turks have been living together in relative calm. Their secret weapon was the children, who became fast friends of infantrymen of the Royal 22nd Regiment. At times, they were too friendly. "It got so bad," said Sgt. Normand Lacoste, "that the youngsters were an embarrassment to us on patrol... but how could we tell them to beat it?" The problem has been partly solved by the army's system of rotating troops among the various military posts in the area. The soldiers barely get to know the kids when they are moved along to another post.

TAKE GUARD DUTY IN THE UNITED STATES

A Royal Canadian Air Force fighter squadron has begun around-the-clock alert duty at Paine Field, Wash., an Air Defense Command base of the United States Air Force. It is the first time a Canadian unit has operated on a full-time basis from American soil since the formation of NORAD, the North American Air Defence Command that controls the air defence forces of both the U.S. and Canada, in 1957. Canadian CF-101 and American F-102 pilots will be "pulling alert" shoulder to shoulder this summer, an example of the close co-operation begun in 1957 when the two nations combined the control of their air defence systems. Eighteen aircraft and 200 personnel from the Comox base are at Paine to supplement the Canadian based forces on alert.

MEET INDECISION IN INDOCHINA

OTTAWA — External Affairs Minister Martin said Canada isn't anxious to continue its participation in the Indochina truce commissions if they are thought useless or to have served their purpose. He said in the Commons External Affairs Committee that if the 14 nations which established the commissions at Geneva in 1954 judge the truce teams in Laos, Viet Nam and Cambodia to be inefficient, "We certainly don't want to keep going."

RETURN FROM THE CONGO FOR A WELL EARNED REST

An RCAF Yukon aircraft from 437 Transport Squadron recently landed at RCAF Station Trenton with the last group of Canadian military men out of Leopoldville. First man off was Brig. Jacques A. Dextraze, 44, of Montreal, senior Canadian officer in the Congo and chief of staff at UN headquarters, Leopoldville. "I think the Canadians were very good ambassadors, whether in the army or air force," Brig. Dextraze said.

CLAIMS SECTION MOVES

On 1 July a revised procedure was introduced for the provisioning of Travel and Moving Claims. The authority to recommend Travel Claims for payment has been delegated to officers in the various sections. Claims will then be passed directly to the Accounts Claims Section (Room 40) for audit and payment instead of being initially processed by Station Orderly Room and then passed to the Accounts Section.

The purpose of this revised procedure is to speed up the processing and payment of claims. There will be some unavoidable delays at first owing to the large number of claims in the mill, however, it is hoped that these changes will reduce to a bare minimum the time required to process claims for payment. Personnel are requested to co-operate by submitting claims promptly on arrival at, or return from, temporary duty.

The Station Fire Committee and Fire Protection Flights selection of the outstanding section to be presented with the Fire Chief's Trophy in fire hazard control for the past quarter has not been an easy one to make. All sections have exhibited a keen desire to participate in this endeavour, and all have conducted excellent fire prevention campaigns.

Sections I would particularly like to congratulate are: Hangars 10, 11, 16, and 402 Squadrons and 111KU. Unfortunately there is but one trophy to award, and this went to F/L Walker of the MSE. This section's duties involve many hazardous operations and functions such as vehicles storage, maintenance operations including spray painting, battery charging and main repair work areas.

The fuel handling operation at RCAF Winnipeg is considerable, requiring two Refueling Tender Garages housing 13 tenders and one oiler. These tenders and their MSE operators effect the transfer of approximately 4,000,000 gallons of flammable liquid a year. This has been carried out without a single incident of note for years.

In his presentation address, the Commanding Officer, Group Captain D. A. Willis, congratulated F/L Walker and the MSE section and all those who received honorable mention. The Group Captain stated that this activity showed plain common sense, and it was gratifying to see that all personnel felt the same in this regard.

In closing let me add my personal thanks to all personnel of this unit for their co-operation in keeping RCAF Winnipeg FIRE FREE.



RECRUITING STILL ACTIVE

The last few months of governmental adjustment have resulted in considerable publicity and discussion about the Armed Forces; many people, both service and civilian, are not aware that RCAF Recruiting Units are still in existence and indeed functioning just as strongly as they were a year ago. Although there has been a cut-back in total strength, and some reduction in establishment, it is still necessary to maintain a flow of people through the training organizations of the Air Force to allow the career planning people to maintain an age spread in the various ranks. The maintenance of this flow of personnel into the basic training establishments is the major function of the Recruiting Units as controlled and directed by the Director of Personnel Manning in Air Force Headquarters.

The functional requirements of the Recruiting Unit in accomplishing its designed role can be discussed under three major categories.

First of all, so that the public will be aware of our existence, we must advertise. The recruiting units are responsible for most of the advertising done in their areas and this takes many forms; i.e., newspaper classified ads, pamphlet distribution to National Employment Service in the many larger population centres and poster placement in the small post offices. DPM, at AFHQ, controls all the advertising done in national periodicals and magazines. There is also an allotment of funds for advertising in High School annuals, but this is done on a tri-service basis and is aimed at ROTP recruitment.

Secondly, there is a large requirement for liaison visits so that personal contacts and interviews can be conducted throughout the RU area. These visits are conducted through mobile recruiting trips and school approach talks. The school talks are designed to encourage the students to get as much education as possible and to inform them of the career opportunities available in the RCAF. The Regular Officer Training Plan (ROTP) which is tri-service, is stressed more than any other available plan. The ROTP is a scholarship type of competition open to any male junior or senior matriculant (16-21 years of age) who is

medically fit and has the additional qualifications necessary for an ROTP applicant. This plan completely subsidizes a combination of military and academic education up to a full degree in Arts, Science or Engineering, at either a Canadian Services College or a Civilian University. All that is asked in return for this considerable expenditure of money is four years regular employment in the Service of their choice. Of course, this academic background also entitles the graduate to apply for a permanent commission in the Armed Forces and participate in the career opportunities available to the Permanent Commissioned officer.

Our third function is the control of the never ending flow of paper which is handled by a staff in the orderly room. They answer the routine telephone calls, mail out pamphlets and information to prospective applicants, type, check, file and distribute the various documents as required on our successful applicants. They interview prospective applicants who appear in person. The recruiting officers conduct counselling, supervise testing and do the final interviewing. They enroll University Graduates and skilled and unskilled ground-crew; they also document direct entry aircrew and ROTP candidates. In short, all the many recruiting operations in the province of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario are processed through the RU in Winnipeg.

The Recruiting Unit in Winnipeg is located on the second floor of the main Post Office Building at 266 Graham Ave., and is part of the tri-service, Canadian Armed Forces Recruiting Centre.



While on a shopping tour with my wife and son last week for two days in Grand Forks, North Dakota and East Grand Forks, Minnesota, we visited all of their banks requesting the new 1964 J. F. Kennedy 50c pieces. Not all the banks had them but we clicked at the First National Bank who gave us six for three U.S.A. dollar bills.

When we made a purchase in any of the stores, the change received consisted of Ben Franklin halves partly mixed with smaller change. Other times, the halves received were the Liberty walking type on the reverse with the big eagle on the obverse. This might possibly be an indication that the Kennedy halves are not in circulation yet at Grand Forks. The bank tellers informed us that the Kennedy halves on hand were in mint condition of limited amounts. Souvenir seekers and collectors were allowed to obtain only two of these new coins per person. If the bank teller had a good memory for faces, you could not get two more the next day.

I also purchased three souvenir brass commemoration half-dollar, North Dakota coins which are good for face value until December 31st, 1964. After that they are souvenirs and collectors' items. These are larger in diameter than the regular 50c pieces and are very attractive in appearance because they look gold-like.


