1990 — A Year of Achievement

1990 has been a very eventful and successful year for CFB Winnipeg. For the most part, we met all our goals and objectives. We can take great pride in that fact and in the success of our efforts. A few examples of the many commitments that we met with distinction include the notable completion of the 2PPCLI peace-keeping mission in Cyprus, a very successful OPEVAL, multiple parades and honour guards and our significant, unselfish contributions to over 25 charities.

1990 was also a year of historic events. We commenced DASH-8 operations with 402 Sqn. Two Soviet fighters and their transport support aircraft made two visits to CFB Winnipeg. We witnessed the disbandment of 14 Trg Gp. In the fall, Canadian

Forces personnel, including eight from CFB Winnipeg, were committed to the Persian Gulf crisis. Additionally, one CFB Winnipeg C130 and 429 Sqn aircrews were used during the deployment phase. 429 Sqn personnel were also awarded the Mynarski Trophy for their outstanding performance during the forest fire evacuation of northern Manitoba in 1989. And finally, we introduced the King Air aircraft into the ICP School flying operation.

We can be justifiably proud of our accomplishments in 1990; it has been a memorable year and we can expect that 1991 will be equally challenging. I am confident that we will meet these challenges with the same dedication and enthusiasm that

prevailed at CFB Winnipeg during 1990.

The Christmas season is a very special time for our families and friends. It is a time to pause, reflect and to recharge our batteries. Yet, it is equally important that we also remember those who will be unable to share Christmas with their loved ones because of military commitments, especially those personnel from CFB Winnipeg. Also, for the first time since the Korean War, Canadian military personnel have been deployed to an area under the threat of war. We pray for their safe return from the Persian Gulf and a peaceful solution to the crisis.

To all the personnel of CFB Winnipeg, Jeannette and I extend our sincere best wishes for a safe and happy holiday.

La BFC Winnipeg a connu une année mouvementée qui a été couronnée de succès. Nous avons atteint la plupart de nos objectifs et nous pouvons être très fiers de nos réalisations. Parmi les nombreux engagements que nous avons respectés avec brio, mentionnons les opérations de maintien de la paix menées à Chypre par le 2 PPCLI, l'évaluation opérationnelle qui s'est avérée une réussite, ainsi que les nombreux défilés et gardes d'honneur. Il ne faut surtout pas oublier nos contributions généreuses à plus de vingt-cinq oeuvres de bienfaisance.

L'année 1990 a également été marquée par un grand nombre d'événements historiques. Le 402 E a commencé à mener des opérations sur les DASH-8. Deux chasseurs soviétiques et leurs avions de soutien ont rendu visite à la BFC Winnipeg à deux reprises. Nous avons assisté au démantèlement du 14 G Instr. À l'automne, des militaires des Forces canadiennes, dont huit de la BFC Winnipeg, ont été affectés dans le Golfe persique. De plus, des équipages du 429 E et un C130 de la BFC Winnipeg ont participé à l'étape de déploiement. Le personnel du 429 E s'est vu décerner le trophée Mynarski pour avoir offert des services exceptionnels dans le Nord du Manitoba en 1989 lors de l'évacuation rendue nécessaire par les

feux de forêt. Et finalement, nous avons introduit l'utilisation du King Air dans les opérations de vol de l'école (ICP).

Nous pouvons à juste titre être fiers de nos réalisations. L'année 1990 a été mémorable et nous nous attendons à ce que 1991 soit également pleine de défis. Je suis confiant que nous saurons relever ces défis avec le même enthousiasme et le même esprit de dévouement qui ont caractérisé le personnel de la BFC Winnipeg en 1990.

Le temps des fêtes est une période très spéciale pour nos familles et amis. C'est le moment de s'arrêter, de réfléchir et de refaire le plein d'énergie. fibre woven throughout the project.

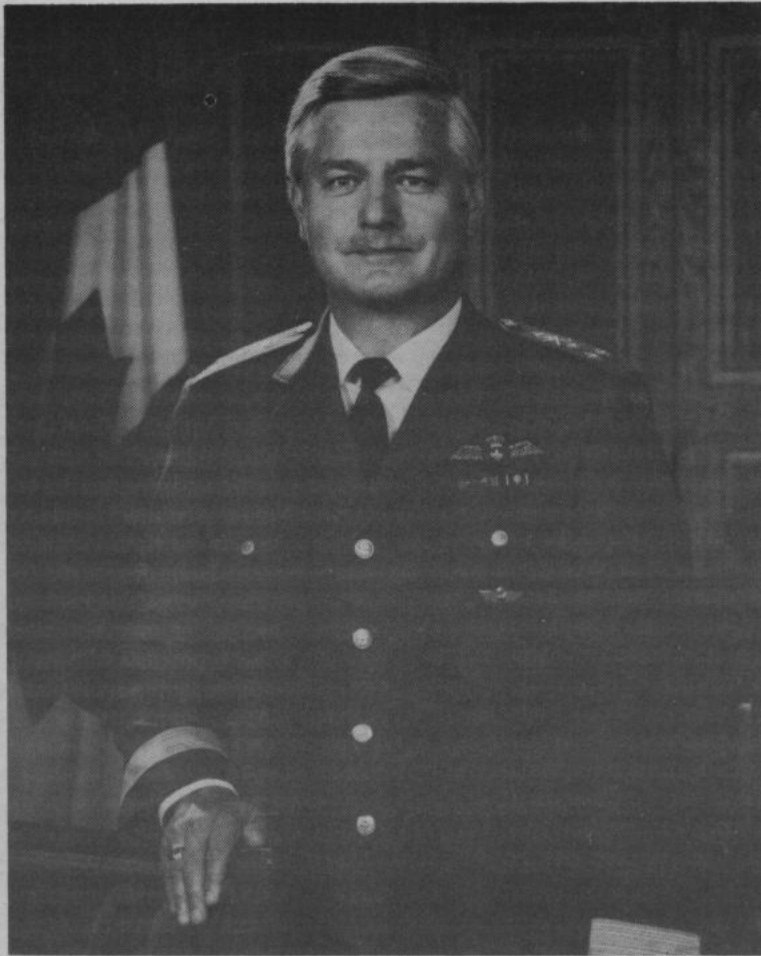

This incident could have been prevented if the owner had used a spare set of keys and locked the vehicle while waiting for his vehicle to warm up (LOCK and WATCH).

received and answered by the MPS. The answer will not be legal advice but may help you better understand your questions and concerns.

Q: I got a speeding ticket in front of base HQ last week. What I want to know is, why is it not the same as the provincial speeding tickets?

A: CFB Winnipeg is situated on Federal property and as such is in Federal jurisdiction. Provincial speeding tickets are issued under the Manitoba Highway Traffic Act while

speeding "TICKETS" (on Base) are given under the Authority of Government Property Trespassing Regulation pursuant to the Manitoba Highway Traffic Act (MHTA). This means that if you get a moving violation, i.e., speeding or failing to stop at a stop sign, the fine will be levied under the MHTA.

The "Bare Facts" about Canex

"How do you buy shares in CANEX?" "We heard that CANEX is owned by a group of retired officers in Ottawa — is that true?" "What happens to the money that CANEX earns?" These are just a few of the questions that editors of Base newspapers and military magazines across the country receive from time to time. Here, at last, are the *FACTS*.

CANEX is a unit of the Canadian Forces, and has no outside owners or shareholders. It is overseen by a Board of Directors, which is comprised of a majority of military members representing each of the Commands, plus a few civilian members who have extensive experience in retailing, finance and business management. Not even the directors own any shares — CANEX is owned by the Canadian Forces and is an important part of the CF Personnel Support Programme.

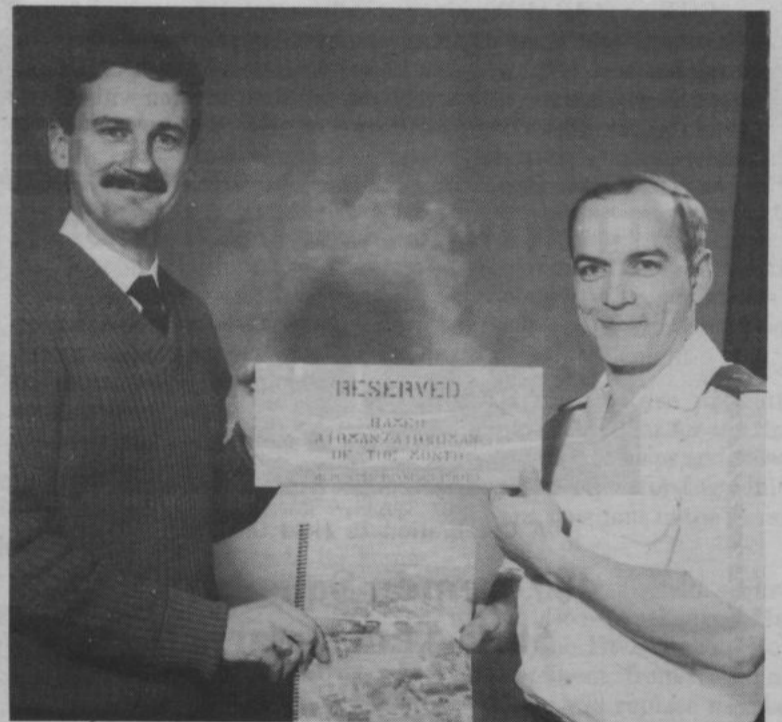
CANEX is managed by a combination of military and civilian personnel, and operates through 13 Regional Managers — who are strategically located across the country from Esquimalt to Goose Bay. This allows the organization to respond quickly to any local needs, and ensures that a close working relationship is maintained between CANEX and its customers.

CANEX earnings are designed to provide Bases/Stations with funds which they would not otherwise have, to support welfare and recreational programmes. Many of the recreational facilities being provided at CF Bases/Stations were paid for out of revenues generated by CANEX. Every time a CF member or dependant shops at CANEX, they are indirectly helping to improve their leisure environment. In the last fiscal year, CANEX contributed over four million dollars to Base/Station Funds, and indications are that this amount will be even greater during the current year.

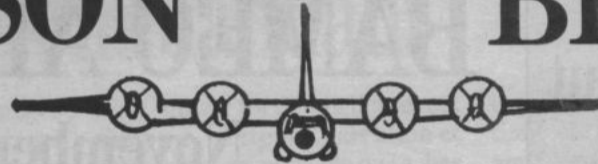
The stork has been kept busy lately delivering little bundles of joy in time for parents to receive a 1990 tax break. Capt and Mrs.

429 Sqn Receives Mynarski Trophy

On 11th Oct, Capt Ares and crew flew on a navigator trainer to Moncton to receive the Mynarski trophy. Racing against the clock, the crew rushed off to the hotel and quickly changed into their mess kit and scrambled off to the banquet.

The Royal Canadian Air Force Association was holding its annual convention and awards presentation.

After dinner, MGen O'Donnell addressed the audience. The following is an extract of his presentation.

"On the night of 21 July 1989, 429 SQN was alerted by Air Command to be prepared for a full scale, emergency evacuation of a large number of citizens from remote areas of northern Manitoba. The fire situation had reached a crisis stage and a major disaster was possible unless the northern population was airlifted to a safe area. On the 22nd of July, the situation rapidly deteriorated and a full scale evacuation was ordered. Within an hour, two 429 SQN C130 Hercules aircraft were airborne. At the same time the SQN was tasked to form an

Airlift Control Element to coordinate all military air transport assigned to the rescue operation.

Over the next six days, 429 SQN became fully committed with crews flying "round the clock" to expedite the evacuation. Innovative planning, outstanding crew cooperation, courage, and a determination to complete the evacuation safely, were key factors in the successful execution of the operation by 429 SQN crews. The SQN flew more than 70 flying hours over a six day period and airlifted 2065 people from the fire threatened area. Hazardous conditions involving takeoffs and landing into semi prepared, short airstrips, reduced visibility in dense smoke, high temperature, and severe turbulence added to the tension and challenged the capabilities of the aircrew to the limit.

The outstanding efforts of both air and ground crews of 429 SQN played a major role in the success of the Ontario and Manitoba Fire Emergency Evacuation. The professionalism under adverse conditions in a life-threatening, emergency situation was in the highest tradition of the Air Force and exemplifies the skill, courage and ideals upon which the award of the Mynarski Trophy is based."

The criteria used in considering a unit/SQN for this award are: effectiveness of search and rescue (SAR), as well as, intensity; heroics of crew/unit; unit's performance of SAR; and level of activity of SAR.

This award to 429 SQN is unique, in that it is usually awarded to a search and rescue squadron. 429 SQN is located in Winnipeg to support the Canadian Forces Air Navigation School; and Air Transport Group when required.

On behalf of 429 SQN we would like to wish you all a safe and Merry Christmas.

CFB Portage la Prairie: Site for Privatized Pilot Training

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE — The Honourable Charles Mayer, Minister of Western Economic Diversification, announced November 29th on behalf of the Honourable Bill McKnight, Minister of National Defence, that CFB Portage la Prairie will remain the site for flight training when some elements of Canadian Forces pilot training are privatized.

CFB Portage la Prairie has been targeted for closure as a result of the 1989-90 Defence Budget cuts amounting to \$3.4 billion. Today's decision will

revitalize Portage la Prairie as an operational civil aerodrome.

"CFB Portage la Prairie is an ideal site," said Mr. Mayer, "offering extensive training and runway facilities, accommodation, recreation facilities, an abundance of non-commercial air space and excellent flying weather."

Mr. Mayer further added that "the efforts by the Portage la Prairie community to ensure a future for CFB Portage cannot be emphasized enough. The community has been working diligently towards marketing the many

advantages of the base and the area."

"The decision to maintain elements of CF primary flight training at CFB Portage la Prairie after the base closes as a military facility will allow us to meet our operational requirements without significant disruption," said Mr. McKnight.

Requests for Proposal are being prepared for submission to industry in the near future. Some 30 potential contractors ranging from flying clubs to large Canadian and international corporations are expected to submit bids.

Change of Canadian Fighter Squadrons in Qatar

OTTAWA — The Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Bill McKnight, announced November 30th that 439 Tactical Fighter Squadron from Canadian Forces Base Baden-Soellingen and approximately one hundred and fifty personnel from CFB Cold Lake, Alta. will replace 409 Tactical Fighter Squadron in Qatar.

409 Squadron has been in the Gulf since early October and is expected to return to its home base at CFB Baden-Soellingen before Christmas.

LCol Ed Campbell, Commanding Officer of 409 Squadron, will transfer control of CF-18 squadron operations to LCol Don Matthews, Commanding Officer of 439 Squadron.

"Canadian Forces members in Qatar have done an outstanding job of building a base camp for their operations and meeting rigorous flying schedules in difficult and trying conditions," stated Mr. McKnight.

The CF-18s are providing defensive air cover for the three Canadian naval ships and those of allied navies enforcing United Nations sanctions in the Persian Gulf.

The Qatar airfield security force is also being changed. Members of the 1st Battalion, Royal 22e Regiment, from CFB Lahr, Germany will replace members from the 3rd Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment, based in CFB Baden-Soellingen.

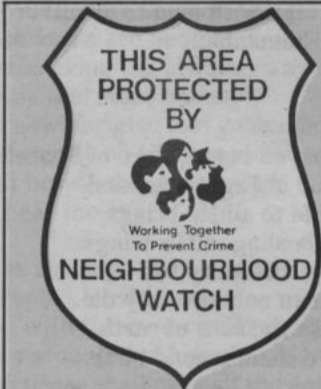

Award of Merit Won by Member of Manitoba Militia District

Twenty-two year old Lt Dan Blanc, currently working for Garrison Training Company, Manitoba/NW Ontario Militia District, excelled this past summer and brought home The Canadian Infantry Association Sword. The sword was awarded to Lt Blanc for being the Infantry Reserve Entry Scheme graduate judged to have been the best in the Third Phase of Training. The sword was presented on Graduation Parade by LCol D. Boiteau, CD, (retired).

Lt Blanc spent 11 weeks in CFB Gagetown on the third phase of Reserve Entry Scheme Officer (RESO). For the greater portion of Phase Three, the Infantry candidates are taught platoon tactics. All members of RESO are university students and have to undergo Four Phases. Each phase averages eleven weeks of training.

Phase One candidates receive training in general military skills, as well as an introduction to their particular combat arm. Phase Two candidates receive training in basic skills applicable to their corp (in Lt Blanc's case it was infantry). Phase Three develops advanced platoon tactics. When the candidates reach Phase Four they undergo mechanized platoon and combat team training. During all phases there is a strong emphasis placed on their leadership abilities.

Lt Blanc has been an officer with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles for the past three years. He is attending the University of Manitoba and is currently completing a degree in Criminology.

Dan plans to complete his officer's infanteer training in the summer of '91 and eventually transfer to the regular Armed Forces.

Commander of FMC Visits Manitoba/NW Ontario Militia District

Local Army Reserve Unit Captures National Title

At a national conference held Sept 19-23, in CFB Petawawa, Ontario it was announced that northwestern Ontario's 116 independent field battery has garnered the Murray Challenge Cup, as Canada's top reserve artillery battery, for the third time in four years. This cup, competed for annually by units across Canada from Yarmouth, Nova Scotia to Victoria, B.C., symbolizes supremacy in exercise "Shellburst Valley". This national exer-

cise is designed to assess artillery units in all aspects of artillery training, from gun drill, local defence, command post procedures and reconnaissance to observation post procedures and communications.

For 116 independent field battery, which is based in Kenora, but draws its people from throughout the small towns and rural areas of northwestern Ontario, to have taken this championship from units in centres with

10-100 times the population on a repeated basis speaks very well for the dedication and skills of the men and women of northwestern Ontario's militia unit.

Rather than resting on their laurels, however, the militia soldiers of 116 independent field battery will once again be taking time from their civilian lives to participate in another year's training, and operations including preparing to defend their title as the top militia battery in Canada.

What "Dying without a will" really means

The Provincial Legislature passed a new act, The Intestate Succession and Consequential Amendments Act, on March 15, 1990. The new legislation is now in effect and applies to any persons who now die without a will. I will be referring to a person who dies without a will as an intestate person.

Articles have appeared in this column in the past referring to the Devolution of Estates Act,

and that act will only be relevant for those estates where the deceased died without a will, prior to the proclamation date of the Intestate Succession Act.

The act is based upon the government's attempt to predict what the deceased person would have wanted to happen to his or her estate. Obviously, rules which will apply to all estates where there is no will cannot be flexible and cannot exactly reflect the wishes of the deceased. There are strong reasons to make a will, so that your particular assets, and your particular family situation, and wishes with respect to non-family members or charities can be fulfilled.

Under the new act, an intestate person who leaves a surviving spouse and no children, will leave their whole estate to the surviving spouse. The exception to this rule would be the case of spouses who were separated at the time of death and either had applied for a Divorce or a division of assets under the Marital Property Act, or had divided their property in a manner that was intended by them, or appears to have been intended by them to separate and finalize their affairs. In that situation, the estate would be treated as if the

surviving spouse had predeceased the intestate.

An intestate who leaves a surviving spouse (and for this purpose, spouse will mean a spouse to whom the above exception does not apply, in other words, a spouse who had not separated and divided marital property), and surviving issue, meaning children or grandchildren or other direct descendants, will also leave the whole estate to the surviving spouse, and none to the issue, unless any one or more of the issue are issue of the deceased but not of the survivor.

For instance, if Joe Smith died leaving his wife Mary and their daughter Jane, Mary would receive everything. If Joe had another child, Sam, from his previous marriage, (i.e., Sam's mother is not Mary), then the estate may go partly to both Sam and Jane, with the bulk of the estate still going to Mary. The formula involves the surviving spouse receiving the first \$50,000, or the first half of the estate, whichever is larger, and the balance of the estate is divided half to the surviving spouse and half amongst the children. Therefore, in smaller estates, the surviving spouse would still receive everything, and in larger estates,

the children would benefit too. Remember, this benefit to the children only applies if at least one child is a child of the deceased and not of the surviving spouse. Also, in calculating the division, jointly held property is not included as it would go automatically to the surviving joint owner.

If an intestate leaves only children or other issue and no spouse, the estate is divided amongst the issue. If an intestate person's children are all alive at the time of his death, they would share equally in the estate, and no grandchildren or other issue would share. If any of the children have predeceased and left issue, the issue would receive a portion of the estate. The calculation is based on a system of division per capita at each generation. If you are interested in a particular example, it would be best to consult a lawyer, as it is too complex to go into the details here. Suffice it to say that each generation would receive only if their parent, grandparent and so on, up to the intestate, were not alive. Any people in each generation who are to receive will receive the same amount as others in their generation who receive.

If there are no issue and there

is no spouse, the next level is parents of the intestate, who will receive the estate, if alive. If parents are both deceased, then the sharing is amongst issue of the parents, in other words, brothers and sisters of the deceased, and the issue of such brothers and sisters, again on a "per capita at each generation" basis.

Another interesting point is that in any of the above situations, an entitled person must survive the deceased by at least 15 days in order to collect.

The main thrust of this article is that, although some of the rules of division of an intestacy have changed, the rules themselves are no more flexible than before, and the only way to properly arrange for benefits in different proportions than prescribed by the Act, or to arrange for benefits to people not included in the provisions of the Act (for instance, friends, common law "spouses", in-laws, or charities) is to make a will. The preparation of a will now will allow for your estate to be dealt with as you wish, and not by rules which may not properly reflect your wishes.

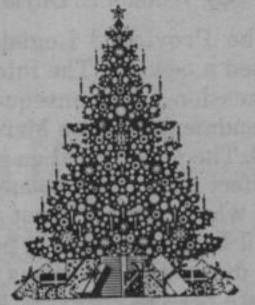

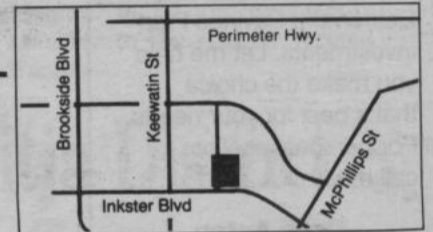

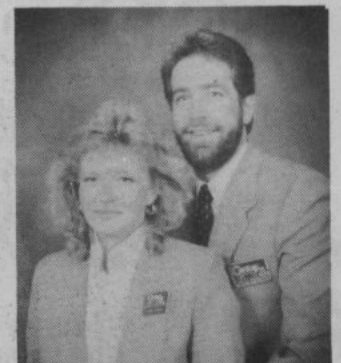
