CFB Winnipeg's 1985 United Way Campaign has shattered the goal for the third straight year. Donors contributed a total of \$74,700 to assist an annual drive to support more than 65 worthwhile charitable agencies.

This amount sets a new high record for Base contributions and represents an achievement of which we can all be extremely proud.

The United Way of Winnipeg recognizes outstanding section achievements through a series of awards, and this year 36 will be presented.

Many thanks to the canvassers that have worked so hard during the campaign and to the donors that have been so generous. That notwithstanding, every Base section contributed

its share to achieving this year's record and all donations were greatly appreciated.

Special mention must be made of the Air Command Headquarters campaign, which raised \$24,470, almost a 15% increase over last year's level. To put this in perspective, it was only a few years ago that this amount represented the total CFB Winnipeg United Way contribution. Well done, Air Command Headquarters!

Now that the Base campaign is complete, many people wonder why nothing more will be heard about the United Way until the start of the next campaign. This is because the United Way is solely a fund-raiser for the 65 agencies that it represents. When

donations have been collected, the money is distributed to the agencies; thus, the United Way provides a valuable service to the agencies but doesn't receive the year-round publicity given to some of the agencies.

The Base United Way Committee extends thanks to all military and civilian members of CFB Winnipeg who contributed to this year's drive.

The Committee comprised Capt. M. Broscheit, Capt. J. Charbonneau Lt. P. Duff, Lt. C. Rochette, Ms. M. Armstrong and 2Lt B. Fenton.

408 Squadron desert-bound

Nine helicopters and 128 persons are slated to replace a combined unit from Australia and New Zealand with the Multi-national Force and Observer (MFO). To be located at El Gorah, approximately 40 kms east of El Arish, Egypt, 408 Squadron is to provide medium helicopter support to the force established in 1981 as a result of the Camp David accords.

Funded by the U.S., Egypt, and Israel, the MFO consists of three infantry battalions currently provided by Fiji, Columbia, and the U.S., with appropriate support elements. Lt-Gen Egit J. Ingebrigtsen of Denmark commands contingents from 11 nations totalling some 2,500 military and 60 civilians.

In the Sinai, 408 Squadron will transport personnel manning the observation posts between Egypt and Israel and keep them re-supplied. It will also deliver foot patrols and civilian observers to the site of alleged or potential incidents. One aircraft will be maintained on standby at

30-minutes notice to move at all times for search and rescue.

As well as the distinctive new white coloration, the helicopters will have modified engines for operating in hot climates and special protection for the leading edges of their rotary blades.

The contingent will include seven people who are to work at the Force's headquarters, as well as sufficient maintenance and support personnel to be make the unit as self-sufficient as possible. Women are eligible to serve in the Sinai and a number of them are being processed, including a pilot and a military policewoman.

All helicopters going to the Sinai are expected to be in Edmonton by Christmas. Move to the Sinai will be carried out in stages, with the helicopters slated to leave on 15 March and the main party on 30/31 March. Six months later, the Squadron is due to be replaced by 427 Squadron from Petawawa, Ont.

408 Squadron's flight of light observation helicopters will remain in Edmonton.

Officers earn distinction

Three officers currently serving with units in the CFB Winnipeg area have proven their professionalism and dedication to excellence by completing the Officer Professional Development Program with Distinction.

This achievement is possible only through a rigorous study program involving many hours of off-duty time and completion of at least four of the six subject exams, with honours passes.

Little Black Devils get new Honorary Colonel

Senator Gildas L. Molgat, C.D., who has had close to 40 years' service with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, was installed as the Regiment's Honorary Colonel at a 2:30 p.m. ceremony Sunday, November 10, at Minto Armoury.

He succeeds the late Brigadier R.S. Malone, O.B.E., E.D., C.D., who served as Honorary Colonel from November, 1971, until his death June 24 of this year.

Senator Molgat, 58, first joined the Regiment in early 1946, on completion of officers' training, and served with the unit's Militia Battalion as platoon commander, adjutant and company commander until April, 1966. At that time he was appointed Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel of the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, a position he will continue to hold until his November 10 installation as Honorary Colonel.

Senator Molgat has served as Chairman of the Royal Winnipeg Rifles Regimental Advisory Board since 1970. In his new capacity, Colonel Molgat will report to the Regiment's Colonel-in-Chief, HRH the Prince of Wales.

Colonel Molgat's first brush with military operations occurred on

September 3, 1939, the day World War Two broke out, when, as a 12-year-old boy, he was aboard the Athenia when it was torpedoed by a German submarine. He, his father and two brothers were among those rescued the following day and taken ashore at Galway, Ireland.

The Royal Winnipeg Rifles — also known as the Little Black Devils, an officially-gazetted name — is Western Canada's oldest infantry regiment. It celebrated its 100th birthday in 1983. The Regiment served in Egypt in 1884, the Northwest Rebellion in 1885, South Africa in 1899-1901, World War One (1914-18), World War Two (1939-45), including the D-Day assault landings in Normandy, and sent companies to 27th NATO brigade in Germany in the post-war period.

At the same ceremony, Mrs. Malone was presented with her late husband's centennial sword that has been held by the Regiment, and Dr. Paul Deprez, Belgian Consul, presented the Regiment with a carved box containing soil from various Belgian battlefields where members of the Regiment lost their lives. It will be placed in the Regimental Museum.

Scan Corner

Resume — Make it a 36-22-33

The resume is the accepted document used by government and industry in screening candidates for job openings. You can think of it as a calling card providing an outline of your training and experience.

Service people will find that, once preparations are started for moving into the outside world, a resume is essential.

One advertisement placed in a city newspaper will average 400 replies, of which possibly only ten are selected for interview. The aim is to end up on the right pile, and to do this a mental picture must be created that makes you stand out from all other applicants.

When you say a woman is beautiful, everyone gets a vague mental picture. However, if you say she is blonde, five feet six inches tall, measures thirty-

six, twenty-two, thirty-three, the picture is much better.

What does the employer want to find in a resume? The emphasis should be on what you can do for them. Talk the civilians' own language and avoid military jargon. Keep it terse, using active words and avoiding vague generalizations. Use concrete examples with emphasis on efficiency and competence. State a clear employment objective.

A common mistake is to spread oneself so thin describing qualifications for several jobs that the resume loses bite and impact. Remember that the resume does not get jobs, but it helps to get the interviews; therefore, you can be selective in what you say.

Remember to stress your accomplishments, not your responsibilities and duties.

On behalf of the councillors of the Westwin Community Council, I would like to take this opportunity to welcome all the new personnel posted into CFB Winnipeg during the summer and hope you enjoy your stay here.

The Westwin MQ area is broken into 10 wards, each with its own councillors. The functions of the council are:

- to identify and study community needs, and coordinate and plan programs and projects to meet these needs;
- to sponsor and promote new committees, clubs and interest groups as the need arises;
- recruit volunteers, leaders and workers as required for the various community activities and services;
- develop plans and co-ordinate projects for the beautification and enhancement of the community; and,
- provide a channel of communication and liaison between the community and the Base Commander, CFB Winnipeg.



Drug Awareness week is Nov 17-23

The discovery of various drugs during the last century certainly has changed our lives in a positive way. For one thing we tend to live longer, healthier lives due to the advancement of medicine. But, unfortunately, as we all know, drugs may be misused or misunderstood.

Understanding your medication and why you are taking it is important to your recovery. If you have any concerns, you should ask your doctor or pharmacist.

Take your medication exactly as prescribed by your doctor. Don't double the dose just to speed your recovery: this won't work and can be dangerous. Also, especially in the case of antibiotics, finish all your medication unless advised by your doctor. Stopping your medication too soon, even if you feel better, may cause the infection to re-occur.

Don't mix prescriptions and over-the-counter medications without checking with your doctor or pharmacist. Your pharmacist is always available to answer any questions and recommend over-the-counter medications.

Don't stockpile old medications in

your medicine cupboard. Periodically, go through it and destroy any medications you are no longer using. Serious injury can result if someone takes a drug which was not prescribed for them. Also, all drugs have expiry dates and should be destroyed when these have passed.

Keep all medications out of the reach of children, even those in child-resistant containers. Many children suffer needlessly each year due to poisoning. Drugs are especially dangerous because their bright colors and unusual shapes attract young children. Parents of small children should keep the number of the poison control centre in the area handy. In the area of Winnipeg, the Poison Control Centre is located at the Health Sciences Centre and the number is 787-2591.

I know this is a very brief overview of drug awareness. However, by following the basic rules we can prevent injury to ourselves and our families.

If you have any concerns about medications you or your family are taking, feel free to ask your pharmacist; that's why we're here.



New Flaw Sleuth — An advanced X-ray scanner that lets factory inspectors look inside aircraft engine turbine blades, just as a medical scanner lets doctors look inside the human body, has been built by a team from General Electric's Research and Development Center in Schenectady, N.Y., and its Aircraft Engine Business Group (AEBG), headquartered in Evendale, Ohio, under U.S. Air Force Manufacturing Technology (ManTech) program. It allows inspectors to readily detect internal casting flaws and manufacturing errors, such as misdrilled cooling passages. The GE development team now is working on a next-generation X-ray inspection module, equipped with intelligence that will enable the computer to "recognize" flaws — thus taking over the decision-making task. A prototype intelligent system now is in the final stages of development.



The Block Parent

It's a concept that's very simple, very efficient and very essential to the welfare of every neighbourhood.

In the most fundamental terms, a block parent is any responsible adult who cares enough about the well being of children and other persons to volunteer his or her home as a safe refuge when a need arises. A sign in the window lets children in distress know that a block parent is home to provide a haven.

And even when there is no cause for concern, the sign can act as a deterrent to potential offenders who can quickly conclude that the neighbourhood has its own safety support system.

That's why it's afe to say about every block parent that even when they're not busy, they're working.

Legal Status

Block Parents have no legal status except their natural status as private citizens. They are simply volunteers who have agreed to act as sensible, responsible adults in an emergency situation in the community.

Why is the Block Parent Program Needed?

- To provide the community with an organized method of protecting its children and adults.
- To aid in the prompt reporting of emergency problems to the Police Department.
- The Block Parent Program requires total community involvement which includes: — Police Department/ — Municipal Government/ — Board of Education/ — It is endorsed by the Canadian Assoc. of Chiefs of Police.

Who May be a Block Parent?

- Any responsible citizen, aged 16 years and over who
- cares about the well being of everyone, especially children.
- has been screened by the Police Department.
- is willing to provide help at any time.

GUIDE LINES TO PROTECT YOUR CHILDREN:

- Develop an identification file on each of your children.
- Establish strict procedures regarding who will pick up the children from school, etc. and be meticulously consistent. Use a secret "code word."
- Explain to your children about possible abduction lures: "Help me find my puppy," "your mommy was in an accident," "I'll give you some candy or a cabbage patch doll." Abductors may show a badge.
- Teach your children their full names, your full name, address, and phone number.
- Define a stranger. A person seen everyday may still be a stranger to the child; eg: delivery person, jogger, grocer, neighbor, etc.
- Never leave your children unattended in a car, supermarket or at home. It takes only 30 seconds to unlock a car and abduct a child.
- Teach your child that it is best to travel in groups and to stay away from isolated places. Know your child's route to school.
- Explain how to use the telephone; include area codes, collect calls, pay phones, and emergency numbers such as 911 and 0.
- Avoid dressing your children in clothes imprinted with their names.
- Instruct your children to scream, shout, yell, kick and fight if they are threatened by a stranger.

But is it really necessary?

The worst situation most Block Parents will ever have to contend with is a frightened child. If it was your child, wouldn't you say that was reason enough?

Please do your part by explaining the Block Parent Program to your children, by instructing them to respect the privilege and not abuse it and by teaching them to hold these Block Parents in high regard.

Each neighbour can effectively watch those homes to each side, the front, and the back of his own home.

How to develop the program

To develop a Neighbourhood Watch program in your neighbourhood, contact your police. They will assist in developing a community plan. For the program to be totally effective, each resident must take an active role in both security and improvement and observation.



Danger That "stuff is on the way!"

Snow removal crews soon will be out clearing snow on Base roads, parking lots and PMQ area. In order to safely and efficiently carry out these operations, Snow and Ice Control teams will require your co-operation. Here is a list of "Do's and Don'ts" that everyone should follow:

1. Do not leave vehicles on parking lots for extended periods of time. Parking lots are posted 24 hrs prior to being cleared, providing you with sufficient time to remove your vehicle.
2. Do not park privately-owned motor vehicles (POMVs) on streets and laneways during the period 1 Nov to 30 Apr, if at all possible. This will assist snow-clearing crews in providing the best possible service.
3. Do check on the location of your children when you hear equipment operating in your PMQ area and ensure that they keep well clear of the equipment.
4. Do obey the "Stay Back" sign on equipment; a minimum of 15 meters (50 feet) is required in order for the operators to see you at all times.
5. Do exercise extreme caution when passing snow removal equipment.
6. Do have patience, because it is very difficult for snow removal equipment operators not to fill sidewalks and driveways with snow, although they will do their utmost to avoid such situations.
