## AOC MAKES FINAL INSPECTION

Air Vice-Marshal H. M. Carscallen was born in Hamilton, Ontario, in November 1908, received his early education there and is a graduate of both the Royal Military College and Queen's University, Kingston, from which he obtained the degree of Bachelor of Science.

A veteran of 31 years' service with the RCAF, A/V/M Carscallen flew with a photographic detachment during the pre-war period and on operations both in Canada and overseas during the Second World War. As a pilot with the RCAF's wartime No. 5 Bomber Reconnaissance Squadron at Dartmouth, N.S., at the outbreak of war, he flew on the first anti-submarine patrols off Canada's east coast. After two years with various east coast squadrons, during which he commanded No. 5 and No. 10 (BR) Squadrons, he was transferred overseas where he formed No. 424 Heavy Bomber Squadron in the RCAF's No. 6 Bomber Group. In July 1943, he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for gallantry in action.

A/V/M Carscallen was returned to Canada in February 1944, and assigned command of RCAF Station Dartmouth, N.S. In 1945, he was attached as an observer to the XXIst Bomber Command, U.S. Army Air Corps at Guam in the Pacific, and while serving in this capacity, participated in the last bombing raid of the war, an attack of B-29s on Japan the morning of VJ-day.

Following the war's end, he served on the Canadian Joint Staff

in Washington, D.C. as Senior Air Staff Officer and later as Air Attache. In 1947, A/V/M Carscallen was appointed Director of Personnel Administration at Air Force Headquarters, later moving to Edmonton as Chief Staff Officer of Tactical Air Command.

In November 1950, A/V/M Carscallen was appointed Chief of Air Operations at AFHQ, and in 1953 was selected to attend the National Defence College at Kingston, Ontario. Upon completion of this course in July 1954, he was appointed Air Officer Commanding, Air Transport Command, with headquarters at Lachine, P.Q. He served in this capacity until named Chief of Staff, Headquarters 4th Allied Tactical Air Force, Trier, Germany, in July 1956.

A/V/M Carscallen returned to Canada to assume the appointment of Air Officer Commanding, Training Command, Winnipeg, with promotion to his present rank in December 1960.

PERSONALITY OF THE WEEK CORPORAL JOE PRICE



Corporal Price was employed by Western Steel Products in Winnipeg when he enlisted in the RCAF in 1941 and because of experience gained in his civilian trade, he has never attended a course in the airforce.

During wartime, he served as a metal technician at numerous training stations in Canada and with 6 Bomber Group in England. At the end of hostilities in Europe, he volunteered to serve in Southeast Asia but, before he finished packing his kit bags, the Japanese surrendered.

When he was released in 1945, he obtained employment with Canadian Pacific Airlines in Winnipeg, his home town. In 1946 he married Miss Mary MacDonald, also of Winnipeg.

Cpl. Price re-enlisted in 1952 and is now a metal technician, group 3. He says that his only beef with the RCAF is that members of his trade are not given a 3(A) grouping. He has been with the regular support unit for 402 (Aux.) Squadron in No. 4 hangar for five and one-half years. He has been PMC of the Corporals' Club for the past five months and is also the manager of the Corporals' Fastball Club—present city champions.

Cpl. and Mrs. Price and their six children live in Rental Units at 75 Bourkewood Place.

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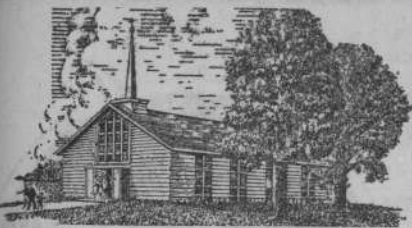

Lord Hailsham on Morality

MORALITY, RELIGION

Lord Hailsham (through Sir Cy-  
ril Black) said: "Both as a member  
of the Cabinet and as Minister of  
Science, I have long desired such  
an opportunity as this, in which I  
could give utterance about the re-  
lationship between public morality  
and public life — a relationship  
which is forgotten only to the peril  
of the fabric of society. Morality,  
religion and politics are all con-  
cerned with almost every human  
activity: there is constant debate  
between the three—with philoso-  
phy and science chiming in increas-  
ingly as the very stuff of which  
intellectual life is composed.

Personal morality is vital to the  
well-being of society, and without  
it nothing can save society or the  
state from ruination. If this be so,  
no statesman can be indifferent  
to his own. It is well-nigh impos-  
sible to construct a perfect code of  
laws or a perfect system of ethics.  
The first condition for a true code  
of law or ethics is that it be based  
on the original tradition of Chris-  
tian Culture."

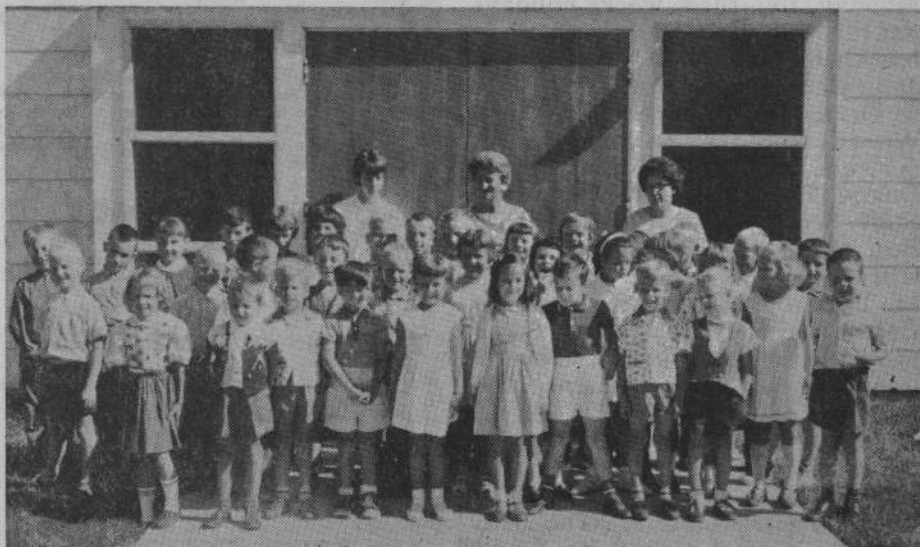
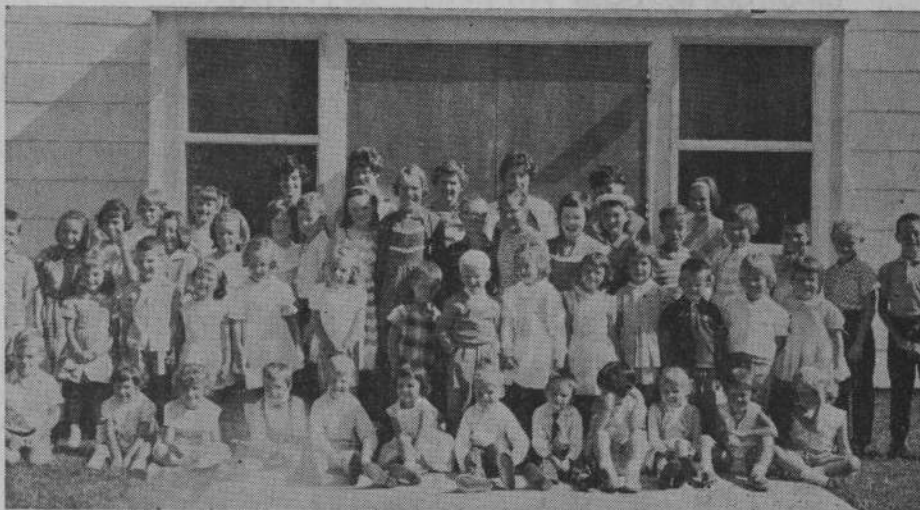
"Integrity and honesty are not

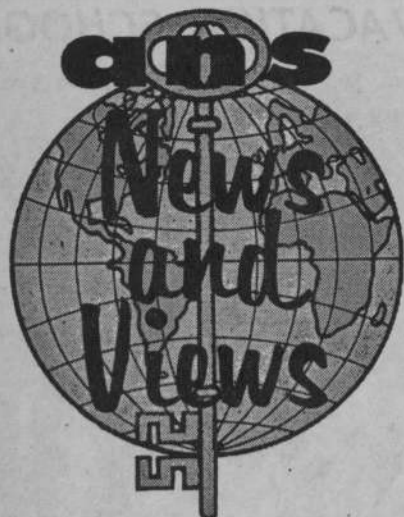

## GALLANTRY THEIR DUTY

For men and women of the Rescue teams — FM RCC Vancouver to Can Air Pac . . . advised of Cessna with one person on board missing Flt. Castlegar to Victoria PD. . . Dr. Coleman requested AIREVAC for baby FM Duncan to Vancouver . . . Comox radio reported vessel burning off Cape MJ DGE PD . . . Mr. Johnstone of Bedwell River advised RCC that a man had fallen down a 250 foot shaft in critical condition . . . Air Defence Radar reported mid-air explosion . . . so the signals read. Cryptic to the layman. But they call for swift action. Sometimes it looks like a nine to five outfit, everyone married and heading for the barn at sundown, the pilots either too young or too old. But not when Search and Rescue Squadrons swing into action. Fast and fearless, the combination of tri-tribious aircraft, vertol helicopters and para-rescue teams make up the spirit of the new Air Force doing a thrilling job in peacetime. Heart of the operation is the Rescue Co-ordination Centres at Halifax, Trenton, Winnipeg and Vancouver. And backing this is police, a vast network of agencies, volunteer clubs and individuals, with RCAF Search and Rescue Squadrons as the spearhead. This streamlined service with modern air training equipment is one of the few in Canada standing watch 24 hours a day, 365 days a year from coast to coast, protecting the individual from all emergencies not covered by organized communities.

At 1655 hours, 15 July, RCC at Winnipeg was notified by W/C C. Lee, OC AFS, Station Portage that Officer Cadets R. J. Urusky RCAF and O. G. Moeller, Royal Danish Air Force had failed to return from a weekend fishing trip thought to be in the Gypsumville area. RCMP and AFP at Gypsumville conducted a physical road check with no results.

111 KU was called upon to carry out a night search in the Gypsumville area but could not complete the search due to severe thunder activity.

The cadets were driving a red Volkswagen with a green canoe on the roof of the car. Local radio stations were asked to broadcast a description of the car and canoe. Mr. Herb Kruger, of Winnipeg heard the broadcast and advised RCC that he had seen a red Volkswagen at Bird Lake.

About this time, Station Portage informed Winnipeg RCC that the two cadets were inquiring about road maps for the east shore of Lake Winnipeg. Another call was received from a Mr. Hall, Winnipeg, stating that he had talked with two young men and they had inquired about directions to Snow Shoe Lake.

The Station Winnipeg Land Search Team with Corporal Jake Dyck, NCO in charge, was flown into Snow Shoe Lake by 111 KU Albatross to search the Snow Shoe Lake and Bird River areas. The Land Search Party located the canoe on Snow Shoe Lake, complete with paddles, life jackets and a pair of running shoes. The canoe appeared to have gone adrift, leaving the two cadets stranded.

Further searching produced a roughly-made raft and a camp site on the south shore of Snow Shoe Lake. Some time later, their original camp was found on a small island in Snow Shoe Lake. 111 KU Albatross and two Dakotas searched the area by day Tuesday and Wednesday. An Otter from 402 Squadron also participated. Flying Officer Don Anderson's course at ANS were enlisted as spotters.

At 2200 hours 16 July an Expeditor from Portage flown by Wing Commander Lee sighted the campfire and SOS. As the lake was not suitable for landing an Albatross, an RCMP Beaver aircraft made the pickup of the two cadets while a 111 KU Albatross circled overhead. The cadets were in good physical condition when they arrived at their home station.

Flight Lieutenant J. E. Errington was Aircraft and Land Search Co-ordinator for 111 KU participation in the operation.

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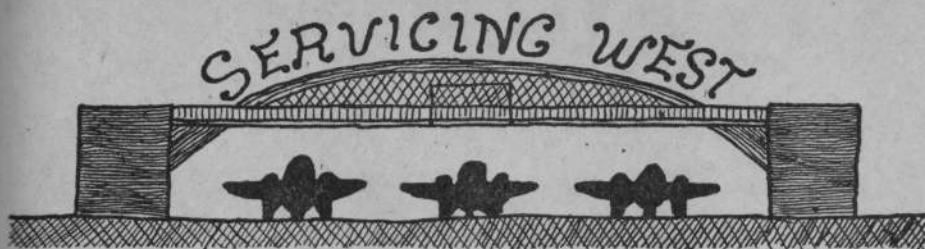

**CRIPPLED CHILDREN GO TO CAMP**

"Ellen, Ellen! A fish fly's crawling down my neck. I can't throw the ball!"

Already Ellen, a junior counselor at the camp for crippled children, was sprinting to the aid of Ruth, a doll-sized mite in a wheel chair, a rubber ball clutched in her upraised hand.

"It won't hurt you, honey," Ellen assured her, holding the fish fly with her thumb and forefinger for Ruth to see before she puffed it into the breeze blowing in from Lake Winnipeg. "Now. Throw your ball."

Ruth tossed the ball, laughed delightedly when it bounced over three of the four benches in front of her wheel chair.

Ruth is one of the 45 small boys and girls, 7 to 10 years old, a holiday by the lake, July 2 to 12, under the auspices of the Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Manitoba. A group of older children, 11 to 14, will take over the camp from July 11 to 26. Holiday site is Lakeside Fresh Air Camp near Gimli. Facilities of the camp have been made available to the Society each summer for the last 10 years through the co-operation of the Lakeside Fresh Air Camp.

Tuesday of last week was field day at the younger children's camp and they were about their games early in the afternoon.

The games were planned for the pleasure of children. There was ball throwing, discus throwing, croquet and a clothes pin contest, of course. But there was one ingenious game called chicken feed that called for picking up three navy beans with a drinking straw and depositing them on a paper plate—all in a given time.

"I'd have trouble doing it myself," admitted a junior attendant after watching four children place beans on the plate well within the allotted time.

When the program finished with a wheel chair race, the odor of frying hamburgers was drifting from the kitchen and young women were arranging yellow mugs beside the plates on the long dining tables, preparatory for supper. Vases of tiger lilies centred the tables.

The program varies throughout the holidays to include volley ball, baseball, handicraft classes, sing-songs, a wiener roast on the beach. Red letter day is a visit to Gimli Air Force Station when members of the RCAF are hosts.

Kenneth Wilson of Hodgson, Manitoba, is camp director with Miss Faye Griffith as assistant director. Camp staff includes a nurse, four senior counsellors, eight junior counsellors, five junior attendants and a bus driver. John Pegg is camp manager and Mrs. Pegg is

matron for the Lakeside Fresh Air Camp.

Contributions to the Easter Seal Fund help pay the \$70 it costs to keep a child at camp two weeks.
