2 PPCLI to celebrate Kapyong Day

WINNIPEG - A unique Canadian military regiment, privately raised and equipped in 1914 for battle in the First World War, will be celebrating its 75th anniversary this year. The city of Winnipeg will be the site of some of those celebrations.

The Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry was officially chartered on 10 August, 1914, having the rare distinction of being privately assembled and equipped by Boer War veteran and Montreal businessman. Andrew Hamilton Gault. The name he chose honours the daughter of Canada's Governor-General of the day, His Royal Highness The Duke of Connaught. The second battalion of this distinguished regiment is stationed at Kapyong Barracks in Winnipeg.

The Commanding Officer, 2 PPCLI, Lieutenant-Colonel William G.S. Sutherland, CD, announced his unit's plans to mark this anniversary.

"Aside from the battalion's participation in the regiment's national ceremonies in Calgary and Ottawa, we also have planned some events for Winnipeg because it is our home base. The regiment has been in this city for 69 years in one form or another so we have a lot of history here. We also have veterans from our regiment here and we would like the people of Winnipeg to help us celebrate, just as they would with other long standing members of the community," he said in an interview.

To do that, the battalion has planned events for 22 April and 24-25 June, 1989.

"We will be celebrating Kapyong Day on the afternoon of 22

April with a parade at Kapyong Barracks (corner of Grant and Kenaston) that will be open to the general public," he said. "This particular day is important to this battalion as it marks a Korean War battle for which this unit received the American Presidential Citation," he explained. "This is the only Canadian unit to hold this type of honour."

In June the unit will officially mark its anniversary by exercising its right to march through

Winnipeg with "bayonets fixed. drums beating and colours flying," an honour granted the unit when it was given the Freedom of the City of Winnipeg on 15 June, 1972.

"That will be on the morning of 24 June," said LCol Sutherland. "In the afternoon we will be performing a military ceremony called a Feu de Joie which is really quite impressive. That will be done at the Winnipeg football

stadium. On 25 June we will also participate in the Red River Exhibition parade."

The local PPCLI Association of regimental veterans will also be participating in the ceremonies. "One of the reasons for the celebration of a 75th anniversary is the veterans," said the com-manding officer. "We still have some First World War vets around but they probably won't be for a 100-year celebration. We

want them to see what they started, as it is now, a regiment that stands for Canadian peace and security - the same peace and security they volunteered to fight for in Europe in 1914."

Details of each event will be made available to the general public about a week before each event so that they may attend and see a unique unit that has distinguished itself around the world and as part of the Winnipeg community.

PPCLI will conduct its annual Kapyong Day celebrations. These will be marked by a historical presentation on the battle itself, the unveiling of a Kapyong memorial, a parade at Kapyong Barracks, and respective Officer/NCO mess dinners. For the uninitiated, Kapyong was the scene of the Second Battalion's heroic defense which earned the unit the blue U.S. Presidential citation which you see on the shoulders of our CF uniforms. In order to better understand the significance of the occasion, a brief synopsis of the battle is offered:

By the end of March 1951 the 27th Commonwealth Brigade, which 2 PPCLI had joined in February, had reached the head of the Chojang Valley and then began to advance up the Kapyong Valley. By mid-April it became apparent that the communists were planning a counterand central sectors of the UN lines. While the 1st and the 9th US Corps were ordered to withdraw, the 27th Commonwealth Brigade was moved to establish a defensive position in the Kapyong Valley.


The Kapyong Valley leads to the larger Puchan Valley and was dominated by the high ground of Hill 677 and Hill 504. These two hills were designated as blocking positions for 2 PPCLI and 3 Royal Australian Regiment (RAR) respectively. 2 PPCLI, under command of LCol J.R. Stone, DSO, MC, occupied Hill 677 with its companies in a triangle and B Coy on the lower ground to the southeast. The Australians occupied Hill 504 but by 24 April were forced to withdraw due to heavy action.

All day on the 24th the enemy On Saturday, 22 April, 2 offensive. On the night of 23/24 tried to infiltrate the position April, the Chinese and the North while moving for the upcoming Koreans struck at the western assault on Hill 677. By 2200 hrs. mortar rounds began falling on the position and the first of many waves of enemy soldiers attacked the hill.

The first attack was broken up and repulsed by B Coy. After numerous attacks on B Coy (and especially 6 PI), 6 PI ran dangerously low on ammunition and was forced to withdraw. Throughout the night, waves of enemy tried unsuccessfully to dislodge B Cov from its position.

Shortly after midnight it became apparent that the earlier attacks on B Coy were just diversionary. The main result was to occur on D Coy's position. D Coy spotted the enemy grouped for an assault on 10 Platoon's position and called down DF fire on them. This assault failed but the enemy




continued to build up the pressure on the Coy position with extensive use of grenades, small arms and artillery. The Coy was able to hold off the attackers.

Later that evening it became apparent that D Coy had been completely surrounded and 10 PI was isolated. The Coy commander, Capt. Mills, seeing that the situation was becoming desperate, called artillery down upon his own position. For two hours the mortar and artillery fire rained down on the position and finally drove the enemy off the hill.

For the rest of the night the Chinese continued to mount strong probing attacks on the battalion position trying to find a weak spot. None were found. By 0300 hrs the position had become desperate as the battalion was short on ammunition and completely surrounded. LCol Stone sent an urgent request to brigade for an emergency air drop.

The battalion morale was high and received another boost at 1100 hrs on the 25th when an air drop of ammunition was made. By 1400 hrs that day, the lines of communication were established with the brigade and supplies were able to flow again. That night the battalion prepared to meet a renewed onslaught by the Chinese. It did not materialize. The Chinese did not try again. Its forces, at least two regiments strong, had suffered hundreds of casualties, a high price to pay for what were very minor casualties to the Canadians.

In recognition of their heroic stand, which prevented the Chinese from cutting off the withdrawing Korean and American forces, 2 PPCLI was awarded the United States Presidential Citation, the only Canadian unit ever to have been so honoured. To all members of the Second Battalion. both former and present, Happy Kapyong Day.

Community Service Award

It's that time again — time to begin thinking about Community Service Awards. As many may recall, the award program was initiated in early 1982 as a means of recognizing outstanding voluntary service to the Winnipeg Military Community. The program has proven to be extremely popular. Over the past four years some 175 awards have been presented to deserving personnel. This year's awards will be presented by the B Comd at a special ceremony in the WOs' and Sgts' Mess in May.

Who is Eligible

All members of the CFB Winnipeg Military Community are eligible to submit names of those they feel deserving of an award. Members of the Canadian Forces, DND civilians and their dependants are eligible for this award. Personnel may be appointed,

elected or volunteered for the activity for which they are nominated, however, they should not have received any remuneration for performing that activity. Work performed must be totally voluntary and benevolent and outside the individuals' normal work responsibility. Some suggested activities are scouts, guides, brownies, minor hockey, baseball, church activities, social clubs and family assistance groups, benevolent work for the community, etc. A person may receive more than one award during each tour at CFB Winnipeg. Groups may also be nominated for an award as well.

Nomination Procedures

Eligible personnel will be nominated by the community at large through the completion of a nomination form. Nomination forms appear again in the next edition. Forms will also be available through the Base Exchange outlets and Bldg 90 Recreation Centre. Simply complete the form and return it to the Chairman of the Selection Committee by 28 April 1989.

Selection Committee

The Chairman of the Selection Committee this year will be Lt J.M. Morneau, Base Coordinator Official Languages. A representative from the two community councils and one from the recreation council will be on the Selection Committee. The remaining members of the Committee will be chosen by the chairman and will be representative of the community at large.

Base Hospital hosts BTLS Course

During Mar 3rd to 5th inclusive the base hospital was filled with a flurry of activity as medical personnel, both regular force and reserves participated in a Basic Trauma Life Support -Pre Hospital Care Course given by Paul Roberts and Bill Sommers of Criticare. Nurses, Med A's, an MAO and an MO attended from C.F.B. Shilo, C.F.B. Portage La Prairie, R.S.S. Prairie Region, 402 Squadron and our own base hospital.

A faculty of approximately 24 staff, ranging from doctors, Winnipeg ambulance EMT's and actors gave lectures, manned skill static . played trauma victims and evaluated student performances.

Skill stations included decompress of a tension pneumothorax (removing air from the pleural space to relieve a collapsed lung), helmet removal (without moving the head, neck or spine) and an IV technique new to most of us called intraosseous infusion (IV fluid infused directly to the bone).

To receive certification, each student had to pass a written exam and two testing stations. These testing stations consisted of 1 trauma patient (fully made up), 2 faculty evaluators and various pieces of medical equipment. The student being evaluated had to correctly examine the victim, make a quick diagnosis, initiate the critical intervention or interventions and ensure his or her medical treatment was appropriate for the type of injuries involved.

For most of us that participated, we came away at the end of the weekend feeling the BTLS course was one of the best

courses we had taken - civilian or military, medical or non medical. This course is beneficial for any medical personnel, especially those members most likely to be in a trauma situation (the field for example).

It is the general consensus of our group that the BTLS was very worthwhile and our thanks are extended to Bill and Paul for all their efforts.

Base personnel who can't be forgotten for their support include the M.P.'s (for assisting the civilian faculty members on base), B Foods personnel (who provided the box lunches), B Accommodations (for quarters on such short notice) and the B ADM O branch for enabling us to participate. Without these support services, hosting this course would have been far more complicated. Again many thanks.







2) I'm venturing out from under the protective wing of one of the finest Chaplains in the Canadian Forces, (Padre Bob Baker);

After her discourse with the angels inside the tomb, Mary turns and asks the supposed gardener if he knows where they have taken her master, and when Jesus replies, "Mary!" "Ahaaa!" Mary understands...

Later, on the road to Emmaus, two weary travellers offer a night's lodgings and a shared meal to a fellow traveller, and when He breaks the bread"Ahaaa!"....

Still later on when Thomas says he will not believe unless he sees with his own eyes and puts his fingers in the wounds,

(1) $(a + b) \times (a + b) = a^2 + ab + b^2$, without any of this beyond a simple invitation to do so, ..."Ahaaa!"....

> Then much later, on a hot, dusty road which leads through Damascus Syria, an egotistical young tentmaker named Saul of Tarsus receives an opportunity while recuperating, to give some thought to his personal ... "Ahaaa!... experience.

We have all had moments when for a brief idyllic moment, we see the pure, unadulterated glory of God and it changes our lives, sometimes for the better, and sometimes unfortunately not so, but that's another sermon! You have had it (whether you recognized it or not is something else), I have had it, Paul had it, the disciples had it, Thomas had it, Cleopas and his friend had it, Mary had it, John had it, the list is endless.....

Whether or not we've had it is a moot point, what is important is are we or were we, open to recognize and accept it ("it" being a change, a new way of understanding our own limitations); can we accept it in our family, can we accept it in our friends, can we accept it in our faith? I hope and pray that this was and is so. As I leave the Chaplaincy team here at C.F.B. Winnipeg, may I take this opportunity to wish you and your loved ones God's blessing, here in His country and as you speculate forth on your next C.F. adventure. May His grace keep you safe in work and play; may His power keep you strong in mind and body; may His forgiveness keep you pure in heart and action; and, may His love keep you honest in all things. God
