

New Arctic Training Centre

Ottawa — The Canadian Forces will establish an Arctic Training Centre in Churchill, Man., this year, Defence Minister James Richardson announced today. The expanded training will mean expenditures of four million dollars over the next few years for construction and renovations of existing facilities in Churchill. Personnel to operate the New Arctic Training Centre will begin moving there in April.

Annual operating expenditures by the Department of National Defence will bring significant economic benefits to the Manitoba Seaport. In addition to capital expenditures, Department of National Defence funds for operations, maintenance and salaries of personnel living in Churchill, or taking training there, will amount to approximately a million dollars a year.

The new Arctic Training Centre will train more than 1500 men each year, groups of approximately 100 personnel will take part in winter-warfare training courses of three weeks duration. The Arctic Training Centre is also being established to conduct periodic major training exercises involving more than a 1,000 men at a time.

Mr. Richardson announced that defense research board arctic warfare tests and trials also will be conducted at the new Canadian Forces Station Churchill. The station will bring approximately 100 additional residents to the port, including 40 Canadian Forces personnel and their families. The new

station, under the authority of the Canadian Forces Mobile Command, will permit significant expansion of the new viking winter training exercises, which began in 1970. The Canadian Forces expansion will be within the framework of the Canada-Manitoba agreement on Churchill, signed March 30th 1972.

All permanent residences, as well as support facilities for the operational functions, will be located in, and derived from, the town of Churchill, as the joint Federal-Provincial construction program now underway in the town matures. Planning for additional living and working accommodation, as well as medical, dental and school facilities for families, will begin immediately.

R.C.A.F. ANNIVERSARY 1924-1974

OTTAWA—Armed forces airmen—past and present—will mark the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Royal Canadian Air Force at observances across the country this year.

Although no national ceremony as such is planned, events in the hundreds will be staged by bases, squadrons, units and veterans' organizations in Canada and overseas.

Although Canada's navy, army and air force ceased to exist as such with armed forces unification in 1968, large numbers of airmen in today's regular and reserve components served with the RCAF.

Official founding date of the RCAF was April 1, 1924, when it comprised a tiny force of 300 officers and men. However, about 22,000 Canadian airmen served with Britain's Royal Flying Corps, Royal Naval Air Service and Royal Air Force during the First World War.

In 1924 the fledgling Canadian Air Force was granted its "Royal" prefix, and shortly after its motto, "Per Ardua Ad Astra"—through adversity to the stars.

During the Second World War the RCAF numbered just under 250,000 men and women and formed 88 squadrons. Its fighter squadrons cut their teeth during the early part of the war in the Battle of Britain. Sixteen squadrons formed an entire bomber group of RAF Bomber Command, and Canadian squadrons flew as part of the RAF's Transport and Coastal

Commands.

In Canada, RCAF participation in the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan contributed to the scheme's success in training 131,533 Commonwealth aircrew. In addition, its maritime squadrons flew thousands of wearisome hours in support of the Battle of the Atlantic.

The armed forces air element today lives with a hefty slice of its history intact. Five of the RCAF's seven chiefs of air staff are still living and will attend a dinner at Ottawa's Rockcliffe base April 5. Among them is Air Marshal C. Royal Slemmon, who served since the inception of the

MID EAST ROTATION

OTTAWA—The first rotation of approximately 1,100 Canadians to and from duty with the United Nations Emergency Force in the Middle East began Tuesday, Feb. 12 with a flight of 62 men.

Weekly flights will airlift new

men to Egypt and bring back those who have been serving in the U.N. formation since it started last November.

Members of the Canadian Forces from various parts of Canada will concentrate at CFB Montreal for final documentation and briefings before departure for the Middle East. They will be processed through a documentation center there to provide approximately 60 men each week for flights to Egypt, via Germany and Cyprus, by Boeing 707 aircraft.

The first rotation will continue until the third week of June.

CYPRUS CHANGEOVER

OTTAWA—Members of the Canadian Airborne Regiment, based at Edmonton, will join the United Nations Force in Cyprus beginning April 2.

Elements of the regiment will replace the 2nd Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment of CFB Gagetown, N.B. which has been serving in Cyprus since last October.

More than 400 men under the command of Lt.-Col. Donald S. Manuel, 39 of London, Ont. will take part in the 21st rotation of Canadian troops to the island country since 1964.

This is the first time the Airborne Regiment has served in Cyprus since its formation.

The regiment was formed in 1968 to provide a quick-reaction force capable of deploying to a variety of locations, both at home and abroad. It has trained in areas ranging from the

Defense Department Announces Promotion

OTTAWA—Defence Minister James Richardson has announced the promotion of Colonel George S. Galley, 51, to the rank of Brigadier-General and his appointment as director general quartering with the assistant deputy minister (Material) branch of the defence department, effective Jan. 24 1974.

Brig-Gen. Galley, was born in Montreal on June 3, 1922. He enrolled in the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1942 and served in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nassau and India.

In 1947, he transferred to the RCAF supplementary reserves and studied at the University of Toronto, graduating as a bachelor of science (civil engineering).

In 1949 he re-enrolled into the RCAF and served in various staff and senior staff appointments with Air Force Headquarters in Ottawa, Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe, Lahr, Germany and Brussels, Belgium.


First-Captain T. A. Barnes, the Training Command Band



During the month of January, two senior officers from Training Command Headquarters received instruction at the Aeromedical Training Unit, CFB Winnipeg. Brigadier General K.C. Lett, Chief of staff, attended a pilot refresher course on 24 January, while Rear Admiral R. St. G. Stephens, Commander TCHQ, requalified on 28 January to fly as a passenger in Training Command jet aircraft. The training consists of lectures on the physiological effects of high altitude flight, the use of personal Life Support Equipment on both T-33 and

Tutor jet aircraft, and a flight in the decompression chamber, where an explosive decompression, simulating sudden loss of aircraft cabin pressure, is experienced.

At the completion of his training, RADM Stephens was presented with a mounted London Times article, dated 1805, documenting the final hours of Admiral Nelson at Trafalgar. The presentation was made by Captain R. B. Hannigar, Commanding Officer of the Aeromedical Training Unit, on behalf of the Base Commander, CFB Winnipeg.

CANADIANS TREAT INDONESIAN

CAIRO (CFB) - An Indonesian soldier with severe face and head injuries was air evacuated to Cyprus by a Canadian Forces Buffalo Aircraft serving with the United Nations Emergency Force in the Middle East.

The Indonesian, a Corporal with UNEF suffered severe facial and head injuries in a jeep-truck accident in the Ismailia area.

The man and an Indonesian officer, less seriously injured, were treated at the Canadian Contingents Field Hospital at Camp Chams, Cairo.

The Corporal after being given blood transfusions and oxygen was evacuated to Akrotiri, Cyprus.

The Buffalo Aircraft, returning from a mission to Beirut, Lebanon, was pressed into service for the medical evacuation. Capt. J. R. Caffrey, and Capt. J. C. Girard, both formerly of CFB Trenton, were assigned to the flight, with Sgt. Norman Westwill, Leduc, Alta., and formerly of CFB Petawawa, accompanying the injured man as medical assistant.

Pro utilitate hominum

For the Service of Mankind — by WO A. Golding

Beware! Have you taken any non-prescription drugs or medicine in the past year? Has your family?

The answer to both of these questions is probably YES. Over-the-counter drugs are helpful for short-term use and relief of symptoms. However, like prescription drugs, if used improperly or excessively, many of these medications can be harmful.

The following facts, figures, statistics, etc., come to you courtesy of the Health and Welfare Department of Canada.

In 1972, Canadians bought enough ASA (the most common ingredient in headache tablets) to supply each man, woman and child with 125 tablets. Cold and cough remedies, laxatives and vitamins are other big sellers. Most people don't realize that some of these drugs can be mentally or physically habit-forming — and that they may react violently when taken with other pills or alcohol.

The Government of Canada checks drug tablets to ensure that claims made by the manufacturer are true and that recommended doses of the product are safe. These instructions should be read carefully. You endanger your health by exceeding the dose indicated, thinking that it will be more effective.

When buying over-the-counter drugs, it's a good idea to ask your pharmacist's advice. If pain, dizziness and other symptoms persist, you should consult your doctor.

Pain-killers: ASA, the main ingredient in most non-prescription pain-killers, irritates the lining of the stomach and should not be taken for stomach pain or by people with ulcers.

Over-use of analgesics for a long period may produce kidney damage and blood disorders.

Some of these preparations contain a narcotic, codeine and

may produce physical dependency.

Do not mix pain-killers containing codeine with alcohol, tranquilizers and other pills.

Headache tablets should not be used as tonics or sleeping aids — this may become a habit which is hard to break.

Coughs and Colds: Cough syrups and nose drops may become less effective with over or prolonged use and may actually make you feel worse.

Cold pills taken with tranquilizers, alcohol and similar drugs may dangerously increase their effect.

Laxatives: Used daily, these can interfere with normal bowel movements and may lead to chronic constipation.

Continued use of mineral oil laxatives may stop the body from absorbing essential vitamins.

Plenty of exercise and eating raw vegetables, bran cereal and fruit such as prunes help to prevent constipation.

Older people may want their doctor to recommend a mild laxative to be used occasionally.

Vitamins: Vitamin pills that contain much more than the daily recommended dose of vitamins in each pill can be a waste of money; most extra vitamins that are not needed by the body are eliminated.

A well-balanced diet consisting of a variety of foods such as meat or fish, vegetables, fruit, some bread or cereal, eggs, milk and cheese should supply all the necessary vitamins.

Boric Acid and Sodium Borate: Borax and honey and other teething preparations containing boric acid and sodium borate have been removed from sale in Canada. You should dispose of any such products that are in your possession.

Do not apply ointments, lotions or other items containing these ingredients to the skin of young children. Boric acid powder should not be used as a dusting powder.

Immunization: Immunization procedures are the most effective way to prevent many diseases, e.g. diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, polio and measles.

There are recent indications that many children, ages 1 to 4, have not been vaccinated against the crippling disease polio. Parents are urged to protect their children by having them vaccinated immediately. Vaccinations are free — contact your local health department or your doctor. Remember, polio can kill or cripple your child.

After a chilly sojourn in the area of snow-bound Fort Churchill, 2 PPCLI is back on the ground in not-so sunny Winnipeg. 

STUDENT SUMMER EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

OTTAWA (CFP) - The Department of National Defence will employ some 8,500 students this year across Canada as its part in the Federal Summer Employment Program. Total cost will be about 4.7 million, down from previous years. Called the Student Summer Employment and Activities Program (SSEAP), the DND commitment will be in three phases, similar to those run during the past four summers.

Program 1 is 650,000 dollars for the on-going Navy, Army and Air Cadet Summer Training Program which will permit an increase in the number of Cadets who attend summer camps. An estimated 3,700 will be involved. This program applies only to cadets who have been with a corps since Jan. 31. Program 2, the largest of the three, is the military training portion of the package, designed to employ about 4,300 students at a total cost of 3.8 millions. Eight weeks training is offered at 12 dollars a day on a seven-day basis

(although the training week is only five days). Program 3 is 300,000 dollars for Community assistance, to hire about 400 students in projects designed to improve community life, improving the ecology. Building and repairing parks and nature trails and setting up and running tourist attractions.

Reserve force training, program 2, covers general military training, bushcraft, weapons training, orienteering, and a heavy emphasis on sports and physical fitness. Employment is for eight weeks between June 15 and Sep. 15. Applicants who are not presently members of the Reserve Force can get further information of local recruiting dates from Canada Manpower Centres. Applicants must be 17 years-of-age before the start of the program.

Pay for the community assistance portion of the program, Program 3, is identical to the military portion - 12 dollars per day for seven days, although the work-week is five days, to a total of eight weeks between June 15 and Sep. 15. Applicants must be a minimum of 17 at the start of the program and not 25 by Dec. 31, 1974 as a maximum. There is no military training involved in this program.

Students interested in Program 2 and 3 should apply as early as possible through Canada Manpower Centres (who will refer to local reserve units) but no later than mid-June 1974.

Blood, it seems, scares more people than statistics do in England.


Confronted by the slashed, stitched, and discolored face of a real accident victim staring, as if from a nightmare, from a roadside billboard, drivers have had some of the hurry shocked out of their rush hour frustrations.

In Winnipeg just recently the CBC Television ran a one hour commentary on the accident situation in Manitoba. They also used the shock approach. Some of the shots they had taken of accidents, were quite dramatic to say the least. But just how many drivers took the film to heart?

It seems that in our modern society we should change the script of "Who's to Blame" to "Who Cares". Millions of dollars are spent every year in Canada on Accident Prevention, and still the death toll on our highways mounts dramatically.

"Do I Care?" Ask yourself that question the next time you get behind the wheel of your car and reach for the ignition, without fastening your safety belt or harness. Do you care enough about your family, to remind them to buckle up?

The Transportation Vehicle Safety Section sometimes wonders when they write an article for Voxair, whether it is read by the subscribers, or is it just a space filler?



We once again put it up to you. "Do you care enough about vehicle safety or accident prevention to take a few minutes and write us giving your views or rebuttals, or just plain beefs on this subject?" We are approachable.

"WHO CARES"? "DO YOU"?
A recent survey made in Toronto by the Canada Safety Council produced some frightening statistics.

Drinking and Driving
83% of people killed were tested and 65% were found to

have been drinking and of these, 81% were over the .08 mg legal limit.

Young Drivers and Alcohol
Age 15 - 19 - 13 drivers were killed and 11% were over the .08 limit.

Age 20 - 24 - 11 drivers were killed and 10 were over the .08 limit.

Since the passage of Legislation permitting 18 year olds to drink, accidents in the 18 - 20 age group are up 400%.

Alcoholics
35 - 40% charged with drunken driving have a serious drinking problem.

Alcohol and Drug and Driving
30% of impaired drivers were given urine and blood test and 72% of these were found to be on drugs, hard or prescription.

...from the diary of a modern housewife

"THE WOMEN WILL HAVE TEA"

One evening we were dining out with friends, a couple we had known for years, although we did not go out to eat with them often.

The food was good, and everything went well. When all four of us had finished eating, the waiter asked if there would be anything else. Mr. C. turned to my husband and said: "How about a nice cognac?"

"That sounds good," answered my husband, "and, turning to me, asked: "What about you?"

Before I could formulate an appropriate, well-chosen reply, Mr. C. stated, for everyone to hear: "The women will have tea!"

I closed my mouth and looked at Mrs. C. for some reaction. I just couldn't believe this. She, however, only shrugged her shoulders. So, after my initial incredulity, I decided to see the rich humour of it. As a story, it would be good for a laugh at the office coffee break, I thought, and it was...

Yes, the men had their cognac, and we women actually did have tea...

Masculine Style. In one of my reference books at the office I found the following prose: "...how much more MASCULINE, vivid and clear the style becomes when the concrete is chosen." The author (presumably male) obviously meant this as an admirable quality for style to possess, while the choice of the abstract would, no doubt, produce an undesirable, or FEMININE effect.

Definitions. First furious, then curious, I checked some dictionaries. I found that masculine is defined (among other, sex-and gender-related things) - as 'strong, vigorous', while feminine is defined as 'gentle...not suited to a man'. Under FEMALE, I found these interesting entries (again, after the biological and grammatical items): 'except when used in science or statistics, expresses an attitude of contempt...', and '...has a contemptuous or patronizing suggestion.' But the implications do not stop with generalities. They are, apparently, deeply rooted in language and cultural heritage: A feminine rhyme, for example, is a... 'rhyme of two syllables, of which the second is unstressed (as in motion, ocean)...' and, in music, feminine means 'having

the final chord occurring on a weak beat,' while a masculine rhyme is 'a rhyme in which the final syllables are stressed (as in disdain, complain)', and, again, in music, masculine is (what else?) 'having the final chord occurring on a strong beat.'

'Woman's' Job. And to think there are still people around who don't believe that there is discrimination against women! Worse — there are those who think that that is the way it should be. The most objectionable of the latter group are its female members. They assure every male in sight that they will have nothing to do with 'Women's Lib', and they proclaim that women who believe in the humane and social aspects of the Liberation movement lose their 'femininity', their sweet, gentle, ever-agreeing ways. They are the ones who willingly wash all the men's cups after coffee break, because they think this is a 'woman's job'. Many men, of course, agree with them. Women like that deserve the treatment they get from the 'strong sex': When was the last time a man has given them his seat in a crowded bus? There the men feel that they are just as tired as a woman coming home from work, and I don't blame them.

But this equality thing has to work both ways. I have found that most intelligent men see it that way. They would be embarrassed to have a co-worker wash their coffee cup, be it man or woman.

Vive la Différence. No thinking woman (or man) maintains that women are like men in every respect: no two women are alike either, nor are all men the same. So let's acknowledge and appreciate the differences, but let's liberate ourselves from stereotyped roles.

And let's be careful not to be forced into the opposite kind of role, that of militant 'libbers' (how I detest that word) battling the male chauvinist contingent 24 hours a day. Billie Jean King did that for everybody by beating Bobby Riggs. That score settled, all of us — women and men — can begin to adopt a sensible, realistic, intelligent approach to equality and feminism. The definition of feminism, by the way, is, according to one dictionary: *the theory of the political, economic and social equality of the sexes.*

I'll drink to that. Only this time, let's make it champagne.

FROM THE GROOVES

For sometime now we have been used to a very bubble-gummy Osmond Family; now it seems that they have grown up as "the PLAN" signifies with some very deep questions and answers. This singing family very delicately presents, (What is known in their religion as) "the Plan of Life and Exaltation." This piece asks no less than four questions that every man asks himself at least once in his lifetime, and yet is content to not have an answer. "It's Alright" is the answer to "Are You Up There?". Yes there is a personal God and revelation today, as the song clearly states, in many forms. "Where There Is No Vision (revelation) The People Perish" (Proverbs 29:28). "Mirror, Mirror", appears to be a person reflecting on his past, (a Dr. Jeckyl and Mr. Hyde affect) and not really liking the things they see they have done. "Darlin", - when you read between the lines of this song, teaches the Osmond (Mormon) Doctrine of Eternal Marriage and not just till this life is over. The Mormon Church is the only one that teaches this doctrine of family unity in the life to come, and Eternal Marriage for all time. "The Last Days" is very explanatory in its message, "There Shall Be Wars and Rumors Of Wars, Pestilence, and Plaques". "And this, with the sword and by bloodshed the inhabitants of the earth shall mourn; and with famine and plague" ... Side two deals with the more involved, lengthy works so commonly a part of every bands concert repertoire. Haydn's delightful "Orlando Paladrino" is the first selection followed by Sgt. Greenwood's arrangement of "Peanut Vendor" so reflective of the Big Band Jazz or the early '50's complete with some unusual harmonic surprises! Capt. Ron Milne is represented by his arrangements of "Canadian Sunset" and the ever popular "Après de ma Blonde". The "Farandole" from Bizet's "L'Ar! èsienne" is next with its rather unusual and humorous "American Weekend" rounding out the second side. A varied format of military and concert works that should sate the appetite of even the most discerning band buff.



Man Requests. The recipe for ROULADEN, which follows, was requested by one of our male readers. While stationed overseas, he had learned to like these delicious meat rolls. He says, however, that you may have a problem finding a butcher to cut the meat properly for this. Some supermarkets may have a butcher who knows how, and the German meat markets, of course, sell the meat already cut — all you have to do is ask for *Rouladen*.

ROULADEN

4 slices of round steak (1 per person), about ¼ to ½ inch thick, each weighing from 4 to 8 ounces
 1 tablespoon prepared mustard
 1 medium onion, chopped
 2 slices bacon, cut in inch-long, thin strips
 salt and pepper
 nutmeg
 1 teaspoon capers or chopped dill pickles
 1 tablespoon cooking fat or oil
 ½ to 1 cup bouillon or water
 flour and water for gravy
 1 teaspoon lemon juice
 ¼ cup dry, white table wine
 Pound meat flat and spread each piece with mustard. Distribute onion and bacon over each, leaving an uncovered space of about an inch at one end. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and, if you like, with a grating of nutmeg. Place capers* or chopped pickles on the narrow end of meat and roll up from there. Tie rouladen up with string(thread) or fasten with toothpicks or metal meat fasteners. (These are like bent skewers, sharply pointed at both ends — very handy to have around for all sorts of dishes). Place side by side in hot fat in skillet and brown on all sides;

then add a little bouillon or water, cover and braise for about an hour or 1½ hours — until done (it depends how thick your rolls are). This can be cooked like pot roast — either on top of the stove or in the oven (at 325°F). Watch the liquid in the pot: add a little when it gets too low.

When meat is done, make gravy of flour mixed with water, correct seasoning and add lemon juice and wine to taste.

*Instead of putting the capers right into the rouladen, you can flavour the gravy with them.
