# 1991 Family Physician of the Year

Lieutenant-Colonel D.W. Rae, CD (also known as Dr. Rae, family physician) has been awarded the "1991 Family Physician of the Year" by the College of Family Physicians of Canada (CFPC).

Lieutenant-Colonel Rae is the Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel of 26th Field Artillery Regiment RCA of Brandon, Manitoba. He has had an extensive career with the Canadian Forces Reserve which began in 1949 with HMCS CHIPPAWA in Winnipeg. Lieutenant-Colonel Rae has served within the Medical Branch since and has held positions such as Unit Medical Officer and Area Surgeon.

Lieutenant-Colonel Rae graduated from the University of Manitoba in 1957 and practised in prestigious award.

One of the original founding members of the run, Captain Brian Koshul, turned over the cheque to the cohost of the telethon, Murray Parker, on behalf of the district.





# History of lilitary Band

For hundreds of years, music has been a part of the military way of life. Drummers have been used throughout the centuries to lead soldiers into battle, while bugle calls were used to give orders in battle long before modern communications could assume these roles. In more recent times, military bands have been used in wartime (to entertain the troops) and in peacetime (for entertainment, recruiting and ceremonial occasions).

The history of military bands continues here in Winnipeg, in the Regimental Band of the

ROYAL WINNIPEG RIFLES. Western Canada's oldest military unit. In fact the band has been a part of the Rifles for the 101 years of its existence. Historically, the Rifles Band was a brass band. However, the band has evolved into an all-instruments concert band, including brass, woodwind and percussion. This larger instrumentation allows a greater musical repertoire which is beneficial: while marches are the bread and butter of a military band, they are by no means the only type of music played. Concert band music is now an important aspect of military bands.

### From 'Speak' to 'Blood' **Londonbeat Finally Clicks**

In the last few weeks the hypnotic beat and staccato rhythm of "I've Been Thinking About You" has not only captured the imagination of top-40 radio but has duplicated at rack and retail going straight to the top of the play and sales charts. The 'thinking' track is the lead-off song on the group's recently released "In The Blood" (Anxious/BMG).

Only now emerging as a musical force, the quartet known as Londonbeat (Jimmy Helms, lead vocals, trumpet, flugal horn; George Chandler & Jimmy Chambers, vocals; and Willy M, guitars, keyboards) have worked in a variety of musical areas. Helms, Chambers and Chandler performed on numerous sessions including Fine Young Cannibals and Tina Turner. Both Chandler and Helms were born in America

and met with Chambers, a native of Trinidad, in the '70s, Chambers, incidentally, had sung in various English bands including DaDad, with co-vocalists Robert Palmer and Elkie Brooks. After various solo projects the trio started working together and joined forces with Willy M.

The result of their initial work was "K.I.S.S." which was instrumental in landing them a recording contract with Dave Stewart (of Eurythmics fame) Anxious Records. Their next release, "9AM (The Comfort Zone)" became a major hit throughout Europe, leading to the album release of "Speak".

Their current "I've Been Thinking About You" topped the charts in a dozen countries and with the power ballad "A Better Love" streaking up the charts

and "In The Blood" on the threshold, Londonbeat are poised for a banner year. As George Chandler says "We've got a Trinidadian, an Englishman and two Americans in this group. Between us, we've got an incredible variety of styles and influences and all of that comes out in the

We have all heard of pollution, but how many of us associate our own home with causing serious environmental damage, and even hazardous waste. Aren't terms such as toxic and pollution reserved for industrial waste only? We (the public) are responsible for 65 to 75% of hazardous waste produced today. We know the profound impact our garbage will have on future generations to

The fact remains many domestic products contain hazardous substances, like paint-thinners, oil-based paint, disinfectants, polishes, glues, et cetera, are poured down the drain or tossed into garbage bags destined for burning, dumping or landfill sites. Consequently dangerous wastes are washing up on our beaches, contaminants are leaking from landfills into the water and soil, and emissions are spewing from incinerators into the air.

Dangerous substances aren't just bad for the environment but can pose serious health threats. Products we commonly use everyday, like oil-based paints, furniture polishes, oven cleaners, and degreasers contain "organic solvents" (organic solvents are designed to dissolve other substances). These solvents evaporate quickly and can be inhaled. Health hazards from these materials range from dizziness to coughing and even nausea. Surveys in the USA claim effects

from some solvents cause cancer, replaced by a natural alternative. birth-defects and genetic damage. Solvents can be easily absorbed through the skin into the bloodstream and cause a multitude of sicknesses.

Products designed to clean clothes, sanitize bathrooms, shine windows and polish furniture contain complex chemicals which, when combined, can increase health hazards significantly. Imagine the effect of household products, like aerosols during the winter months when windows are rarely opened. The pollutant to air ratio is much higher. Cleaners routinely cause allergic reactions and give off volatile fumes.

Aerosols containing C.F.C.s (chlorofluorocarbons) not only diminish the ozone layer but coat the nasal passages and deaden nerves in the nose indefinitely.

Cosmetics may actually harm us too. Often they contain dyes and fragrances combined with animal fats which are known causes of skin and eye irritation. Many companies test their cosmetics on animals, frequently killing them. Pesticides have been found in shampoos; and even baby powder frequently contains asbestos.

Simply because a product is on the store shelf doesn't mean it's risk free. Ask the company how they test their products; often cosmetics are tested on animals under deplorable conditions simply to save money on slightly more expensive laboratory tests. Manufacturers aren't required to list all chemicals in an immediate product if a substance appears to be in small quantities and considered not to be a health risk.

Even pesticides used to "fog" or spray Winnipeg can be A well known pharmacologist suggests mosquito repellents containing citronella or eucalyptus oil work well and are safe for people and the environment.

Here is a list of some suggestions for making your home safer:

#### Personal Best

- Choose a hand and body soap without artificial scent or colour.
- Replace shaving cream with a thin layer of plain soap, which works just as well. Shaving cream often contains ammonia and ethenol and it is better to minimize personal exposure to these chemicals.
- Try creating a non-toxic soap by mixing one cup of Castile Soap (made from olive oil and sodium hydroxide), one half cup of distilled or filtered water and one quarter cup of avocado oil.
- Use cornstarch (which is asbestos free) instead of baby powder.
- Try sesame seed oil as a sun tan lotion. It blocks out 30% or more of the sun's ultra-violet rays and contains Vitamin E which is a good skin moisturizer.

Vegetable oil instead of baby

#### Cleaners

- Soften paint brushes with hot vinegar.
- Scour with baking soda. For those tough stains mix equal parts baking soda and a nondetergent soap.
- Use products with biodegradable surfactants.

#### Other Ideas

Water based paint releases less harmful vapour than oil

paints. Always keep your windows open.

- Avoid "Pentachlorophenol" (Penta) and creosote based preservers when you put wood fence poles in the ground. "Penta" has been recognized as a carcinogenic chemical by the EPA. Stones and gravel instead work
- Castor oil or a mineral oil work
- well on hinges and door knobs. Avoid disposable batteries as they contain toxic heavy metals (lead, cadmium, mercury) which corrode in landfills and seep into water supplies. Use rechargeable

batteries; proper disposal methods do exist for used batteries. For information call us.

Try roach hotels instead of aerosol pest spray.

- Home-made fly paper; coat yellow paper with honey. The colour attracts them and the honey keeps them there.
- Do you have an ant problem? Boric acid (or Borax) is a safe alternative. Planting mint or onions around the house keeps them

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# HMCS HURON REDEPLOYMENT

OTTAWA — The Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Marcel Masse, announced today that HMCS HURON will depart the Persian Gulf at the end of June and is expected to arrive in her home port of Esquimalt, B.C., in early August.

HMCS HURON has been car-

HMCS HURON has been carrying out patrols in the Gulf since early May as part of the Multi-National Interdiction Force. The force, while imposing United Nation's sanctions against Iraq, has contributed to the process of restoring peace and security in the region.

"HMCS HURON has not only maintained a Canadian naval presence in the Gulf region since the end of hostilities but has also been a valuable asset in upholding the UN's resolutions against Iraq," said Mr. Masse.

The DDH 280 Class, helicopter-carrying destroyer sailed from Esquimalt for Halifax on Jan. 4, where, on arrival, her weapons and sensor systems were upgraded. On Feb. 24, she sailed for the Mediterranean where she conducted readiness trials and training in the Gibraltar area. HMCS HURON arrived in Bahrain in late April.

HMCS HURON conducted her first patrol on May 9. Patrols involved surveillance and monitoring of shipping activities and the interception of suspect vessels in the Gulf. HMCS HURON will not be replaced by another Canadian ship.

REDÉPLOIMENT DU NCSM HURON DU GOLFE PERSIQUE

OTTAWA — Le ministre de la Défense nationale, l'honorable

Marcel Masse, a annoncé aujourd'hui que le NCSM Huron quittera le golfe Persique à la fin de juin et qu'il devrait arriver à son port d'attache, à Esquimalt (Colombie-Britannique), au début d'août.

Le NCSM Huron a effectué des patrouilles dans le Golfe depuis le début de mai, faisant partie de la Force d'interdiction multinationale. Cette force, tout en imposant les sanctions de l'ONU contre l'Iraq, a contribué au rétablissement de la paix et de la sécurité dans la région.

"Non seulement le NCSM Huron a assuré une présence navale canadienne dans la région du Golfe depuis la fin des hostilités, mais il a aussi joué un rôle important dans l'application des résolutions prises par les Nations Unies contre l'Iraq," a précisé M. Masse.

Le destroyer porte-hélicoptères de la classe DDH 280 a quitté Esquimalt le 4 janvier,

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mettant le cap sur Halifax, où ses armes et ses systèmes de détection ont été perfectionnés. Le 24 février, il s'est dirigé vers la Méditerranée où il a mis à l'épreuve son état de préparation et s'est soumis à des exercices d'entraînement dans la région de Gibraltar. Le bâtiment est arrivé à Bahreïn à la fin d'avril.

Le NCSM Huron a effectué sa première patrouille le 9 mai. Les patrouilles comprenaient la surveillance et le contrôle de la navigation ainsi que l'interception des navires suspects dans le Golfe. Le NCSM Huron ne sera pas remplacé par un autre navire canadien.

## Rifles Band To Grey Cup

The Royal Winnipeg Rifles Band has been invited to participate in this year's Grey Cup festivities and if you can toot a horn or play the drums or any of the other instruments that make up a marching band ... then they want you to come along for the fun and excitement.

Although the Grey Cup participation will be the highlight of this year's calendar, it's by no means the only activity the band members will be involved in.

The Royal Winnipeg Rifles Band also plays for various mess dinners, parades and special occasions such as Christmas concerts. Remembrance Day ceremonies and other functions.

The best part of the participa-tion with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles Band is that the musicians get paid for their time spent on band duties, be it for public appearances or for rehearsal.

The pay is on the same basis as other Reserve soldiers because indeed band members are soldiers first and go through the same basic military training program as do members of the infantry, medical company or other service support personnel.

The basic military training takes place at Minto Armoury for the most part, on Monday and Wednesday evenings and on alternate weekends over an eight-week period. The recruit will earn in the neighbourhood of \$680.00 during this eight-week

Upon graduation, all recruits are sent-off to their parent unit for more advanced and specialized occupational training. In the case of the band members, it's off to the rehearsal room to hone their musical skills.

Rehearsals are held at Minto Armoury on Tuesdays and Thursday evenings throughout the fall, winter and spring months. Continued involvements with high school bands and other musical groups is encouraged on the premise, the more work and practise the better.

During summer months band members may seek full-time employment. The Canadian Forces School of Music in Esquimalt, British Columbia, one of the finest musical schools in the country, offers musical advancement. courses and various advancement courses are held at other locations throughout the summer.

In addition, high calibre musicians may audition to play in the Ceremonial Guard Band which each summer assists the Changing of the Guard ceremony on



Parliament Hill in Ottawa throughout the summer.

All uniforms and equipment are supplied. The band provides most instruments such as tubas, euphoniums, trombones, French horns, saxophones and percussions. Arrangements can be made to supply other instruments such as clarinets, flutes, piccolos and trumpets. When members are away on duty, accommodations, meals and transportation are provided.

When enrolled, members are paid the rate established for length of service, level of musicianship (and courses taken with the Reserves). Members are paid for attendance at all functions and rehearsals.

Some members of the Band have chosen not to enroll in the Forces and therefore play with the band as associate, volunteer members.

# ADJUSTMENTS TO NATIONAL DEFENCE MATERIAL ACQUISITION PROGRAM

OTTAWA - Against the background of a \$4.2 billion materiel acquisition program for the Canadian Forces and the Department of National Defence for 1991-92, the Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Marcel Masse, announced today that some defence acquisitions will be scaled down and others cancelled to meet fundamental changes in geopolitical circumstances and fiscal realities.

The defence materiel acquisition program will, however, include a number of new activities, will provide significant employment and defence spending to all regions across the country, and will continue to enhance the high technology industrial base in Canada.

The dismantling of the Berlin Wall and the gradual withdrawal of Soviet forces from Central Europe have signalled the end of the Cold War. Canadians are conscious of the rapid and startling changes that have occurred on the international scene," said Mr. Masse. "And as is the case for all countries, we have had to take into account the combination of these changes and rigorous financial constraints imposed on all government departments.

"Therefore, while the Department's 1991 program will con-

tinue to provide significant economic activity, we have made several important adjustments, including the cancellation or reduction of certain projects," he continued.

The Minister recalled that the budget cuts of April 89 and 90 have led directly to such adjustments and to a decision by the Department to reduce its personnel. Nearly 1,000 positions at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa will be eliminated in this fiscal year.

The following capital projects will be cancelled: the Northern Terrain Vehicle and the second

phases of both the Small Arms Replacement Project and the TOW Under Armour Project.

"In addition, in keeping with the Auditor General of Canada's recommendation, DND will be reducing its excess ammunition stock holdings. The current international climate and reductions in training activity eliminate the requirement to maintain our current levels of ammunition stocks," said Mr. Masse.

The Industrial Adjustment Service program and the Canadian Jobs Strategy program will be available to assist defence industries and their workers to adjust to DND's reduced requirements.

"Canada needs a strong and competitive industrial base to support our defence requirements," said Mr. Masse. "The \$4.2 billion materiel acquisition program, and related initiatives, will continue to make a valuable contribution in this regard."

Mr. Masse said that he will be announcing a number of new projects and contracts in the near future.





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# Revised Pri 5 Leave Travel Procedures

BACKGROUND

As of 3 Jun 91, the military scheduled service air system will change substantially. The service provided by the Boeing 707s is being replaced by a charter service. The domestic service has been awarded to Air Canada for three years while Nationair will operate the international legs. The introduction of this new air charter service for DND personnel travel will require several changes to booking procedures and passenger handling. Most details of the domestic flights are contained at AIG 1721/638, AIG 1707/198 101315Z May 91.

#### **AUTOMATIC** CONFIRMATION

Flights YF300, YF301, YF765 and YF766 only will be put in check-in status automatically at night-up approximately 48 hours prior to flight departure. This new computerized system will electronically calculate open seats, confirm Priority 5 applicants three days (2359 GMT of the third day) prior to flight departure and generate a list of confirmed Priority 5 passengers. Allocation of Priority 5 seats and check-in on other scheduled military aircraft flights and special military flights will remain unchanged and actioned in accordance with current procedures at A-LM-101-000/FP-000 Chapter

Once confirmation of Priority 5 passengers is completed flight check-in markers will be removed at which time any remaining seats will be made available for Priority 1, 2, 2 Blue Bark

and Priority 3 Compassionate bookings up to three (3) hours prior to flight departure. Units trying to BKF an itinerary while the flight is in check-in status will receive the following message "Unable — Flight In Check-In".

#### REGIONAL OPIS

Changes of departure points to commercial terminals have resulted in extensive revisions to the Priority 5 leave travel program which has in turn made it necessary to designate the following units as OPIs for each geographical area of flight opera-

- a. Halifax:
- AMS Shearwater YAWTRYF
- b. Ottawa: 3 AMU Ottawa - YOWTRYF
- c. Toronto:
- 2 AMU Trenton YTRTRYF
- d. Winnipeg:
- AMS Winnipeg YWGTRYF e. Edmonton:
- 1 AMU Edmonton YEDTRYF f. Vancouver:
- CFB Chilliwack - YCWTRYF g. Lahr:
- 5 AMU Lahr - QLRTRYF

Each OPI will be responsible for instituting a recorded telephone service with which to inform successful Priority 5 applicants of their confirmation. The list of the confirmed Priority 5 passengers mentioned at paragraph 7 is generated automatically 48 hours prior to flight departure to the printers at each TTY address above via PMS. From this list the OPI will make a telephone recording with the surname and locator number of each confirmed passenger.



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This telephone service is to be available to Priority 5 applicants as soon after receipt of the automatic list of confirmed passengers as possible. A dedicated telephone line must be made available 24 hours a day for which the number will be given as wide a distribution as possible. Each unit will also be responsible for procurement of telephone answering equipment and additional telephone lines for this service if required.

This change in earlier confirmation of Priority 5 passengers will require that some segments still in RR status after the automatic confirmation may need to be cancelled otherwise, they too could be confirmed as the date approaches. It will be the OPIs responsibility to pull the PNRs on the automated confirmed list from queue SP03 and cancel any segment in RR status such as alternate requests or connecting flights that passengers will not be able to meet. Only after the automatic generation of the confirmed Priority 5 list, will the OPIs request the TPF which will list only those Priority 5 applicants still in RR status. PNRs remaining on the TPF will be recalled and any applicable segments left in RR status will be cancelled.

#### \*\*\*

#### PASSENGER ADVICE

It will be the bookings agent's responsibility to ensure that all Priority 5 applicants are advised of the ways they can get information concerning their confirmation: the recorded telephone service already discussed, by calling their local traffic section or by calling any ASTRA equipped office with their locator number. Passengers will be able to obtain this information approximately 36 hours prior to flight departure.

Passengers should also be advised that their booking will be cancelled if space is not confirmed on the primary and alternate outbound request. Passengers must reapply for another flight if still required. Passengers should be counselled to have their locator number available at all times and not to proceed to the airport without confirmation of space on the flight as only confirmed passengers will be boarded.

CANCELLATIONS/ NO SHOWS

It cannot be stressed enough how important it is that passengers cancel bookings if a change in plans occurs. Unlike the previous system, Priority 5 applicants will be confirmed only once - at night-up 48 hours prior to flight departure. After this point only duty Priority 1, 2, 2 Blue Bark and 3 Compassionate passengers can be booked on empty seats.

It is therefore very important that if Priority 5 passengers change their travel plans, they cancel their bookings at least 48 hours in advance of flight departure so that this seat is available to other Priority 5 applicants. Cancellations can still be made within the 48 hour period, however only duty Priority 1, 2, 2 Blue Bark and 3 Compassionate personnel can be booked at this time. All cancellations must be made no later than three (3) hours prior to flight departure otherwise a no-show report will be generated.

#### CHECK-IN

Unlike ASTRA, Air Canada check-in procedures will be fully

automated. A passenger name check-in record is created for each YF flight in Reservec. When a booking is made in ASTRA on any of the chartered flights, it also affects Reservec and is filed in both systems. This check-in file will contain "mini" PNRs made up of Name fields, I fields and the applicable S fields and is automatically generated at night-up approximately 48 hours prior to flight departure. Passengers are checked in by Air Canada using

The XNS transaction has been modified and will now include all status codes presently used by DND (HK, HL and RR). The Air Canada transaction XNS cancels only those fields in HK status. This change was necessary primarily due to the new Priority 5 system — so that subsequent legs would not be confirmed should a confirmed Priority 5 passenger not show up at flight departure.

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# Air Canada Military Service Flights

ing for has finally arrived! Following a bidding process, Air Canada has been awarded a three-year contract to run a scheduled charter service within Canada. They will operate a Boeing 727 configuration with 136 seats, of which nine are VIP class seats and 127 economy class.

The charter will begin to operate on 3 June 1991 with the westbound flight, flying through commercial airport terminals only. These airports are:

A. Halifax International Airport; B. Ottawa International Airport;

C. Lester B. Pearson International Airport, Terminal 2, Toronto:

D. Winnipeg International Airport:

E. Edmonton International Airport; and

F. Vancouver International Airport.

It should be noted that all policy and procedures detailed in CFAO 20-20 apply to the chartered service flights unless specifically addressed in this article.

Travel priorities will remain. However, some procedures have been modified to accommodate commercial facilities. The uncertainty related to passenger travel has been eliminated as much as possible. Consequently, no bumping of passengers will occur.

Duty travel will now be accepted 90 days (versus 60 days) in advance of first flight date and

may be confirmed up to three any Air Canada counter two days prior to the flight departure. Flights will be temporarily closed 48 hours prior to departure so as to process priority five applications. Flights will be re-opened approximately 36 hours prior to departure to allow additional duty passengers (including priority two "Blue Bark" and priority three compassionate) bookings only. If space is still available, or if space is not available, they will be registered in the Astra system on a waitlist. Waitlisted passengers will become confirmed if there is a cancellation. If not, they will be able to report to the airport and check-in as standby passengers. In any case, it is imperative that duty passengers (including priority two "Blue Bark" and priority three compassionate) are registered in the Astra system. These passengers reporting to the airport on a standby basis will only be boarded if they are registered in the Astra system and space becomes available as a result of no-show passengers.

The most significant change will be that priority five passengers will have their travel confirmed approximately two days prior to the scheduled flight departure. Following confirmation, priority five passengers will be treated in exactly the same manner as duty passengers. Members may apply for priority five travel no earlier than 21 days and not later than three days prior to the flight departure time. It will be the member's responsibility to verify with a transportation office if he/she is confirmed. Priority five applicants shall advise their transportation office a minimum of three days before flight departure if they cannot travel, in order that space may be allocated to another applicant. Opportunity travel is not applicable for these two flights. Procedures for priority four leave, priority two "Blue Bark" and priority three compassionate (except as detailed above) are unchanged.

Reservations will not be accepted for unaccompanied children under 16 years of age.

Passengers may check-in at

hours prior to departure. The executive class counter should be used by priority one coded VIP's. All passengers are to advise Air Canada agents that they are checking in for flight YF300 if travelling eastbound or YF301 for westbound. Cut-off time is 30 minutes prior to scheduled depar-

Priority one coded passengers (includes accompanying spouse and aide if applicable) will be able to check-in at the Air Canada Executive Class counter where they will be issued a DND VIP boarding pass. Upon presentation of this VIP boarding pass, passengers will be admitted to the Maple Leaf Lounge. Business Class seats in the first two rows at the front of the aircraft will be allocated to priority one pas-

Travel documentation described in CFAO 20-20 is still required. DND ID cards for all CF members and DND civilian employees, and commercially acceptable positive identification for all other passengers will be requested. All passengers should be in possession of the Astra locator number obtained at time of booking for quick reference in the event that their name is not on the list.

Following verification of identification, a boarding pass will be issued by the agent to all passengers. This boarding pass will be the only document required to transit airport security and board the aircraft (i.e. no ticket will be

designators, not Air Canada. Boarding announcements will refer to "DND Charter Flight YF 300 or YF 301".

Members shall wear uniform as detailed at CFAO 20-20.

Carrier will accept up to 23 kg (50 lbs) of baggage limited to two pieces of checked baggage per passenger; one of which must not exceed 158 cm (62 inches) and the other must not exceed 140 cm (55 inches). No single piece may exceed 203 cm (80 inches) overall. This limit may be increased by an additional 23 kg (50 lbs) total, consisting of a maximum of two additional pieces, if excess baggage has been authorized and approved in accordance with CFAO 20-15. Members authorized excess baggage will inform the Air

Canada agent at check-in of their entitlement and mention their locator number. One piece of cabin baggage per passenger may be carried provided its dimensions do not exceed  $23 \times 41 \times 51$  cm  $(9 \times 16 \times 20$  inches).

Passengers on the charter flights will be covered under the same terms as any other Air Canada passenger. Claims are to be submitted directly to Air Canada and must include the boarding pass and baggage tag receipts. Insurance coverage for all persons travelling on YF 300 and YF 301 either on duty or on leave will be 500 thousand dollars.

Boarding fees for lease travel will no longer be assessed on any charter or CF flights. Boarding agencies will cease collecting fees effective 3 June 1991.

Hospitality class meals/snacks and beverage service (nonalcoholic) will be provided during designated meal periods. If required, special meals can be requested in advance at the transportation office through Astra.

Connection boarding passes with Air Canada and its connectors (Air BC, Air Alliance, Air Ontario, Air Nova, Air Toronto and Northwest Territorial) will be provided to DND passengers travelling on a chartered YF flight, provided they are in possession of a ticket for the connecting flight.

Smoking is not permitted.

In the event of flight delays in excess of three hours, cancellations or diversions, the following will occur:

1. Enroute or through passengers, regardless of priority, will be protected on the next Air Canada or other commercial flight;

2. If the alternate flight is not scheduled to depart within three hours, enroute passengers may elect to accept either the alternate flight or vouchers issued by Air Canada to cover expenses incurred as a result of the interruption;

3. If no alternate flight is available or if a passenger elects to accept vouchers; accommodation, transport to/from airports and meals will be offered as per Air Canada Standards;

4. Regardless of whether passengers are at point of origin or enroute, Air Canada will provide for the soonest possible alternate air transportation; and

5. Connections beyond the passenger's YF destination will be rebooked by Air Canada.

This new commercial service flight will provide a more efficient and convenient service to all members and their dependants. It will provide dependable guaranteed travel. Take advantage of it!

#### NATIONAIR INTER MILITARY FLIGHTS

Following a bidding process, Nationair has been awarded a three-year contract to run a scheduled charter service between Canada and Germany. Nationair will operate a DC8-62 configured with 170 seats; i.e. 10 Business Class and 160 Economy Class seats. This service will begin operations on 5 June 1991 from Ottawa to Lahr. It will operate from the Ottawa International Airport, and Lahr will continue to be the base of operation in Germany.

The flight will operate in accordance with the following schedule (all times local):

a. departs from Ottawa on Sundays and Wednesdays at 2015 hrs. Arrives in Lahr at 0930 hrs on Mondays and Thursdays; and

b. departs from 5 AMU Lahr on Mondays and Thursdays at 1230 hrs. Arrives in Ottawa at 1445 hrs on the same days.

All regulations and procedures will remain as detailed in CFAO 20-20 and the preceding article (Air Canada Scheduled Domestic Commercial Charter Service) with the following exceptions:

1. For service flight 766 (YF766) from Lahr to Canada only, it will be possible for personnel eligible for nonduty travel who have not registered for priority five travel to have their name placed on a leave standby list at 5 AMU on a first-comefirst-served basis, commencing two days prior to flight departure. For purposes of YF766 only, the leave standby list will be added at the end of the Priority five standby passenger list who were unsuccessful in obtaining Priority five confirmed seats. To simplify this, see chart.

2. Check-in for service flight 766 (YF766) will be at 5 AMU (CFB Lahr) and will proceed in accordance with CFAO 20-20.

3. Travel documentation for the international flights will include a valid passport, or for CF members on duty, a NATO travel order is acceptable in lieu of a passport.

4. Passengers on international

flights will be covered under the same terms as any other Nationair passenger with respect to insurance liability for lost or damaged baggage. Claims are to be submitted directly to Nationair and must include the boarding pass and baggage tag receipts.

5. Cargo and mail will be shipped through CFB Ottawa CMTT, who will be responsible to deliver cargo to the Air Canada Cargo operation in Ottawa. Present procedures in Lahr will be maintained.

6. In the event of flight delays over six hours in Ottawa or 24 hours in Lahr, Nationair will arrange at its expense for industry standard accommodation (including transportation to/from the airport) and meals for the passengers, until an aircraft or alternative transportation is available. In the event of flight suspension or diversion, the carrier will arrange for the passengers, baggage, mail, and cargo to be transported as expeditiously as possible to their destination by other appropriate means.

7. The aircraft provided by Nationair will be equipped with new seats and allow for sufficient leg room. An audiovisual system will be installed by December 1991.

# SERVICE COMMERCIAL PAR NATIONAIR

A la suite d'un processus de compétition, un contrat de trois ans a été octroyé à Nationair pour l'opération d'un service régulier entre le Canada et l'Allemagne. Nationair opérera un DC8-62 ayant une configuration de 170 passagers; dont 10 sièges sont dédiés à la classe affaire pour les VIP's et 160 sièges à la classe économique. Ce service débutera le 5 juin 1991 d'Ottawa vers Lahr. Le service opérera de l'aéroport international d'Ottawa, et Lahr continuera d'être la base d'opération en Allemagne.

Ces vols réguliers opéreront selon l'horaire suivant (toutes les heures sont locales):

 a. départ d'Ottawa le dimanche et mercredi à 20h15. L'arrivé à Lahr est à 09h30 le lundi et jeudi, et

b. départ de la 5e unité de

mouvements aérien (5 UMA) Lahr le lundi et jeudi à 12h30. L'arrivé à Ottawa est à 14h45 les mêmes jours.

Tous les règlements et procédures demeuront en vigueur comme détaillés à l'OAFC 20-20 et dans l'article qui précède (service commercial régulier domestique par Air Canada), apart les points suivants:

1. Pour le vol militaire 766 (YF766), de Lahr vers le Canada seulement, il sera aussi possible pour le personnel qui rencontrent les critères stipulés à l'OAFC 20-20 concernant les voyages en congé, et qui ne sont pas enregistrés pour voyage en priorité cinq, de faire inscrire leur nom sur la liste d'attente pour voyages de congé à la 5 UMA sur une base de premier-arrivé-premier-servi, au plus tôt deux jours avant la date

d'envolée. Comme procédure s'appliquant uniquement au vol YF766, la liste d'attente pour voyages en congé sera ajouté à la suite de la liste d'attente des passagers voyageant en priorité cinq qui n'ont pas eu de succès à obtenir une confirmation de voyage en priorité cinq. Pour simplification, voir le tableau.

2. L'enregistrement pour le vol 766 se fera à la 5 UMA (BFC Lahr) et procédera comme détaillé à l'OAFC 20-20.

3. Les documents nécessaires pour le vol international doivent inclure un passeport valide, ou si le passager est en service commandé, un ordre de mission de l'OTAN au lieu d'un passeport.

4. Les passagers sur le vol international seront couverts par la même assurance s'appliquant déjà à tous les autres passagers de Nationair. Les réclamations doivent être soumises directement à Nationair et doivent inclure la carte d'embarquement ainsi que les étiquettes de bagages. 5. Le cargo et le courrier seront expédiés par CPDM Ottawa qui sera responsable d'effectuer la livraison à "Air Canada Cargo Operation" à Ottawa. Les procédures en place à Lahr demeurent les mêmes.

6. Dans le cas d'un retard de plus de six heures à Ottawa ou 24 heures à Lahr, Nationair arrangera, à ses frais, pour l'obtention d'accommodation aux standards de l'industrie (incluant le transport à/de l'aéroport), ainsi que les repas pour les passagers jusqu'à ce qu'un avion, ou du transport alternatif, soit disponible. Dans le cas d'une suspension ou d'un détournement, Nationair arrangera pour que les passagers, bagages, cargo, et courrier soient transportés aussi rapidement que possible à la destination par autres moyens.

7. L'avion utilisé sera équipé de nouveaux sièges et permettra amplement d'espace pour les jambes. Un système audio-visuel sera installé d'ici au mois de décembre 1991.


