USAF Commends 111KU

Reprinted below is a letter received from Major General Don R. Ostrander, USAF Commander of Aerospace Research, Washington, DC. He commends crews of 111 KU for the high calibre of professionalism they exhibited on two occasions last September while operating in support of the USAF's space probe mission at the Fort Churchill Research Range.

Dear Group Captain Willis:

Thank you for the outstanding support that your organization has contributed to the mission of the Fort Churchill Research Range on two occasions during the month of September.

The outstanding performance by two of your RCAF Search and Rescue air crews on 4 September enabled us to successfully recover our first rocket nose cone carrying vital data obtained during a space probe. Their professional approach to recovery operations was put to the "acid test" when a malfunction caused the rocket to miss the target point by forty miles. Your airmen, trained and disciplined to function effectively in unusual situations, responded with smooth team-work and located the nose cone within a few hours.

On 22 September 1963, one of our helicopters on an emergency rescue mission made a forced landing 160 miles north of Fort Churchill in severe arctic weather. This long distance made communication with any agency impossible. A search was requested when the helicopter became overdue. Again the timely and efficient response by your Albatross aircraft located the downed helicopter in the northern wilds within a few hours. The following morning, the Albatross crew air dropped the necessary parts to the downed helicopter crew enabling them to make the necessary repairs and return home.

The esprit de corps and professional skill of your aircrews reflect credit on your organization and the Royal Canadian Air Force. Please convey my appreciation to the members of your unit who took part in these missions for their outstanding contributions.

The first four teams in A Event were Sather, Cann, Lord and Barnett. Sather entered with his own team in the hope of obtaining some valuable practice for the forthcoming consols. On several occasions there was little doubt that he got what he wanted as several of his contests went to the wire. The B Event winners included Trimble's rink who broke a five-game losing streak to win the event, Thurmeier, Gribbling and McCarter. In C Event, Powell's rink forced the Middleton clan and skip Yoder to settle for second place, while Taylor and Common finished third and fourth. If there were any crowd favorites they would have to be, judging from the applause, Yoder's rink with the two Middleton children on the front end and the G/C playing third. The other sentimental favorite was the "old pros" Lorne Common and Bobby Ibson with their front end handled by Pete Saunders and Jean Common. . . . The prizes were presented by Club President Roy Mills. The highlight of the evening was the presentation to Lorne Common of an MCA scroll in commemoration of his Honourary Life Membership. Congratulations to all, and to Art Taylor I can only say, I saw the shot and I still don't believe it; but believe it or not, the rock did get through with a sixteenth of an inch on each side. My vote for the most exciting match of the finals has to go to the Sather vs. Cann game with Sather's team the victors in an extra end. The Cann rink had Munroe third, Al Taylor second and Ed Heid lead. Powell's strategy finally paid off this year. With the score 4 to 3 Powell over Yoder, Powell blanked the eighth and then scored a big three in the ninth to put the game away.

Zone 10 Consols Playdowns . . . Last Friday night we journeyed to the Maple Leaf CC for the match between Sather and Lerner.

On the adjoining ice the Granite's Gord Lowry was meeting West Kildonan's John David Lyon, while Barry Fry of Strathcona took on Victoria's Roy Hilton . . . Lyon set back Lowry 10 to 6 with the big end coming in the fourth when John D was narrow and raised a guard onto his opponent's shot rock, knocking it out and leaving the big fellow laying four. After that Lyon was only in trouble once, however he continued to make the



pressure shots he had been making all night to the applause of the spectators . . . The Victoria vs. Strathcona match was the game of the night. For ten ends (these were all twelve-end games) both teams battled expertly with a superb exhibition of curling, then in the eleventh end with the score 7 all, the Victoria skip stole two from Fry who came up with one of his few misses of the night. It looked like Victoria had it all wrapped up, but the never say die Strathcona team continued to put rocks in the house and when Hilton went to shoot his last rock Fry had two shot rocks partially hidden behind a guard. The Victoria skip attempted a freeze but was light stopping on the twelve foot for third shot. All Fry had to do was draw to the eight foot which was open on the right, however his rock curled into the third shot and he knocked it through, counting three to win the spectacular contest 10-9 . . .

The Lerner vs. Sather match featured some fine curling for the first half of the game. Sather's rink scored one in the first, and Lerner came right back with a two ender. Sather not to be outdone took two in the third and Lerner's single in the fourth made it a 3 all game. Lerner stole singles in the fifth and sixth and then came the explosive seventh. To this point the RCAF boys had drawn applause from the capacity crowd, but their fine curling skills deserted them in the seventh and five misses allowed Lerner to score a decisive three for an 8 to 3 lead. Lerner was then content to give up and take singles in the remaining ends to conclude the match 10 to 6 for the current "World TV Champions". Using the exclusive "Stephensen Method" of scoring, we concluded that Andy Anderson was the top curler between the two teams, followed closely by Lerner's lead and second who were one and three points behind respectively. It's not my intention to cry over spilled milk, nor am I the sole judge of the situation, but I do believe that a number of the rocks thrown by Lerner's second were illegal deliveries under the new sliding rule.

Also putting in a good show on behalf of the RCAF was Emily Barnett with third Doris Sharp, second Pearl MacPherson and lead Pat Samain. Their rink lasted through the first two days before being eliminated . . . To all the girls . . . nice going.

Sather RCAF versus Lowery Granite . . . Because of the inter-club matches being the same night I couldn't attend, however my source tells me that under difficult conditions (for both teams) the Sather team dropped the match 14 to 8.
