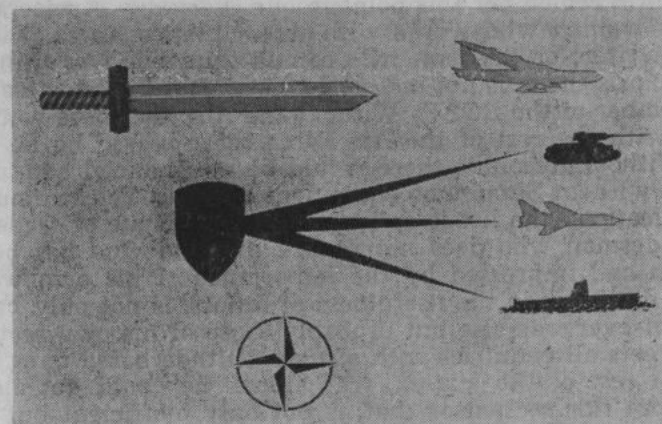
The Forces Behind The Sword and the Shield

SHAPE is responsible for the Shield Forces, but before discussing their functions and character, certain significant features of the Sword forces should be noted.

First, these forces differ from the Shield Forces not only in their character (being long-range, heavy strategic, strike forces) but also in their command relations within NATO. Although the various ground, air and naval units of assigned Shield Forces operate under national command and control during peace time, in the event of war they come immediately and completely under the command and control of SACEUR and their respective allied commanders. The elements of the Sword forces also operate under national command and control in peacetime but would continue to so operate in event of war. However, their planning is closely coordin-

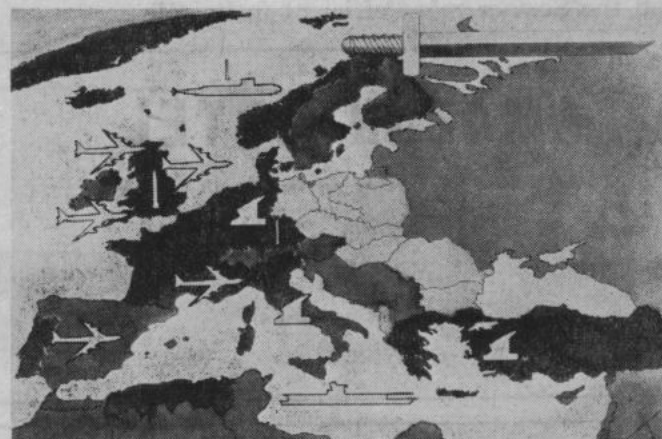

In sum total this constitutes a powerful deterrent to any would be aggressor who might consider military action against NATO.

SHAPE, as stated earlier, is concerned with NATO's Shield forces. These are ground, air and naval forces that comprise Allied Command Europe and man NATO's forward line from Norway right on

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EDITORIAL CORNER

Service To Each Other

One aspect of our Service does not get too much publicity. It is Service within the Service—Service to each other.

The Air Force is a modern fighting machine. It is a functional structure, and no trade, section, or unit has been added simply for decorative purposes. Every part of the organization is not only useful but also necessary for the proper functioning of the rest.

It is well to remember this point in our every-day service activities. The man or woman who works with wrench, stake-truck, adding-machine, type-writer; or the man who counts things, moves things, build things, or guards them, is not merely looking after his business but that of every member of the RCAF. Without the Aircrew there would be no Air Force, with the rest of the Air Force there would be no need for Aircrew. Without Accounts there would be no financial administration for anyone—without Supply, no equipment; without Telecommunication, no communication—the list is as long as the catalogue of trades.

The tradesman who does not realize this and who has become so immersed in and impressed by the importance of his own work, that he tends to down-grade the usefulness of others, is not only hampering the efforts of everyone else but probably those of his own section. The man who greets all enquiries with a surly attitude based on a lofty disdain for the rest of the station, who thinks he could get along very nicely without this section or that, is not only inefficient but obsolete. However, there is nothing wrong with "Section Spirit" as such. If it means pride in one's work and co-operativeness on the job it is a welcome lubricant in the Service machinery. But if it means a separation from the rest of the Service or an unwillingness to co-operate, there is no place for it in our modern fighting force.

'Service to each other', a courteous and cheerful willingness to assist the Joes down the hall, a knowledge that we are all necessary cogs in the gears of the Service, will do much to make life more pleasant for everyone, and the Service more efficient in its role.

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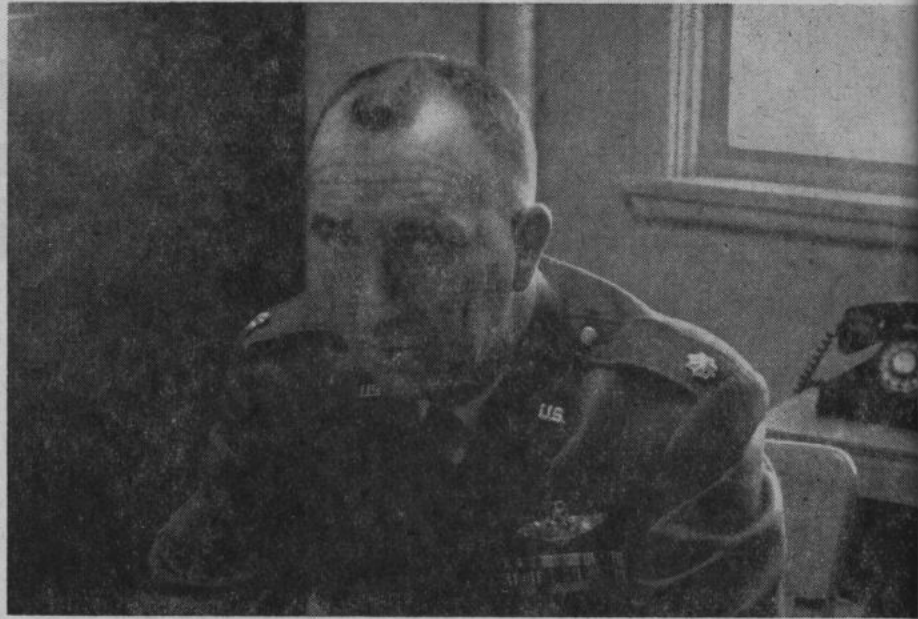
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PERSONALITY OF THE WEEK



MAJOR H. H. POWERS, U.S.A.F.

Among the better known and more colorful occupants of the staid confines of Mawdesley Hall is this week's personality, Major Harry H. Powers, Chief Navigation Instructor at ANS.

Major Powers arrived in Winnipeg in July 1961 on completion of the Armed Forces Staff College course at Norfolk, Va. As his tour of exchange duties ends this summer he is eagerly awaiting, with some trepidation, word on his next assignment.

The decorations worn by Major Powers attest to his distinguished service career. He joined what was then the U.S. Army Air Corps in May, 1942 and after training proceeded to England where he completed 35 Operational sorties as a navigator in B-24 "Liberator" aircraft of the famed 8th Air Force. On his return he flew for a time with the USAF Ferry Command until the cessation of hostilities when he returned to civilian life. For a while he operated his own business and later became a deputy sheriff in his home state of California.

The outbreak of war in Korea saw the Major back in harness again; this time assigned to the Strategic Air Command where he spent the bulk of the intervening years. His professional competence was recognized by the award of a "spot" promotion to Lt. Col. and further attested to by his position as "Chief of Bomb Nav" for B-47 Wing prior to his assignment to Staff College.

A measure of Major Powers' adaptability is the aplomb with which he adjusted from an operational to a training environment. This move, coupled with a change in climate from sub-tropical to sub-arctic would drive a normal person to a psychiatrist's couch.

One of Major Powers' diminutive but more visible attributes is his charming and vivacious wife "Patty" who, along with three daughters Pat, Lesley, and Hele, Mary accompanied him to Winnipeg. A son, Harry is at present serving with the U.S. Army in Germany.

1. The satisfaction and sense of achievement of a job well done, may be yours, if as a volunteer, you do your best. What more can you ask than to see the pride of

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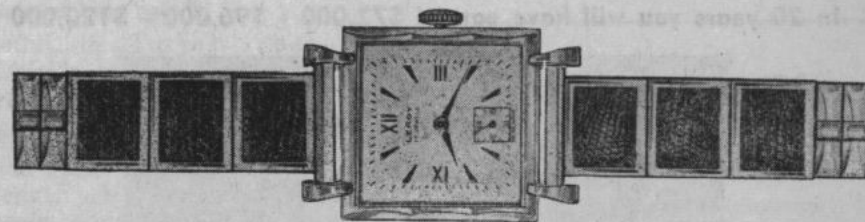

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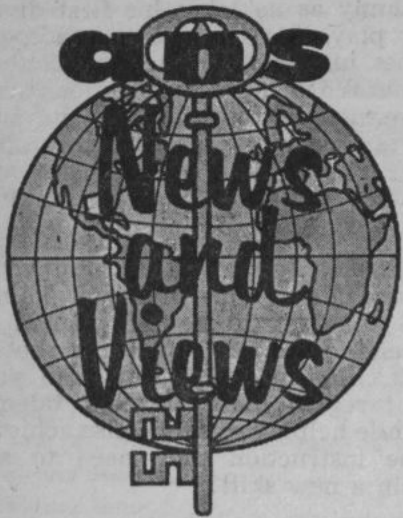

However, this is not the first time that the Air Navigation School has taken part in a large Air Search; nor is it likely to be the last. Prior to moving to Winnipeg the Radio Officer segment of ANS was based at Clinton and Centralia. The "AROS" were called in on most large searches in the Ontario-Quebec area. In fact the School took part in so many searches that we had a definite routine worked out. The Senior Course and the Air Instructors automatically were called into action. I remember on one of the large searches we operated out of the USAF Base at Kinross, Michigan for a period of ten days. This extra flying time enabled the student to gain added experience in the air. The staff instructor usually had three to five student RO's in each aircraft. Instead of working on synthetic exercises with the RCAF ground training stations, the Student contacted Department of Transport, Lands and Forests and any other Radio facilities in the search area. The student piled up lots of flying time on the searches and it was rare that a student Radio Officer failed his final air exams.

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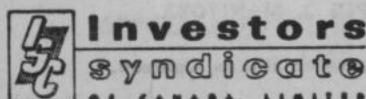

around to Turkey. They serve SHAPE's strategy in three very useful ways.

First, as stated before, their combined air, ground and naval strength, both conventional and atomic, considerably complements the total retaliatory power of the Alliance.

Second, they provide the classical function of close defence for their geographically assigned areas of responsibility.

Third, and what is critically important, they provide a high degree of flexibility and validity to the whole concept of a Deterrent Strategy.

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NUCLEAR DEFENCE

Know Emergency Cleanliness —

Your limited supply of water must be rationed and used only for essential purposes. If you have enough warning time, fill your bath-tub, buckets, and pans with water. Cover them so that they will not be exposed to fallout. And remember, there is an emergency supply in your water tank. Don't forget this source if your water supply has been temporarily disrupted.

The problem of garbage and human waste disposal can be solved even if fallout keeps you in your shelter. Put all your garbage in tightly covered garbage pails. Human waste should be tied securely in water-proof plastic bags and then stored in the garbage pail. You must have a two-week supply of plastic bags.

After the second day in your shelter, there is no risk in leaving it for a few seconds for essential tasks in the basement. Therefore, when your garbage container is filled, move it out of the shelter and into the basement.

Keep a soft broom in the shelter to keep it tidy.

Remember personal cleanliness in crowded shelter conditions is important to you and your family.

If your area is free of fallout but is without water and sewage service, bury the garbage and waste in the ground. Dig the pit deep enough so that the waste will be covered by at least two feet of earth.

3 CU NEWS

A hearty welcome to Mrs. Jean Cowie, Miss Gladys Lacey and Miss Sheila Grimes who have recently begun employment in 3CU as teletype operators.

We bid farewell to Sgt. "Jack" Shuman and LAC "Neville" Gage, who have both served long terms at the unit and their absence will not go unnoticed. Jack is on his way to Clinton to add to the host of knowledge that accumulates among the instructing staff at 1 R&S. Neville is proceeding overseas where he will be among his own kin in England. He had served in the RAF prior to entering the present phase of his career with the RCAF.

F/O Lince, W. O. Prill and F. S. Fournier have just left after a visit of one week at the Unit where they conducted a technical audit. The

purpose of this audit is to ensure that all of the units within the MCRN maintain the highest calibre of efficiency and that all technical equipment is maintained in top notch condition. F/O Lince is officer i/c of the party which came directly from our headquarters at CCHQ (Communications Control Headquarters) in Ottawa.

Due to transportation difficulties CCHQ has informed us that there will be no inter-unit curling bonspiel this year. However, 3CU is prepared to enter an inter-section bonspiel and we are looking forward to some exciting rink entries from within the unit.

VIP FLEET

Two of 111 Composite Unit's aircraft, Dakota 10913 and Cosmopolitan 11162, make up the unit's VIP fleet. These aircraft are established to transport the AOC and other Senior Officers of TCHQ and are occasionally called upon to transport Senior Officers from AFHQ, other RCAF commands, The Army, or the Navy. Prominent people that have been carried include the President of Iceland, the Minister of National Defence, and the Chief of the Air Staff.

Because of their role, the two aircraft differ considerably from the rest of the aircraft at 111KU or at ANS. Dakota 10913 is divided into two passenger compartments, the forward containing a couch and two airline type seats, while the rear contains six airline type seats. The aircraft has a large coat and baggage rack at the rear and a very compact galley forward between the passenger compartment and the flight deck. The upholstery, walls, and carpets are in blue and light grey with curtains of Air Force tartan. This aircraft is now used primarily for commitments into the smaller airfields which are inaccessible to the Cosmopolitan due to their short runways, and as a back-up in event of the Cosmopolitan being committed or unserviceable. Incidentally, 913 has been with 111KU for quite some time and was previously a search aircraft until being converted to a VIP transport about 1956.

The Cosmopolitan 540 is a rather unique machine. Only two aircraft in this configuration were produced (the sister ship is based at St. Hubert with 104KU) and this aircraft is the only turboprop at Stn. Winnipeg. It is a large aircraft capable of carrying up to forty-eight passengers at a speed of 260 nautical miles per hour at altitudes

up to 23,000 feet. Its range is 1,500 miles in still air. The passenger compartment is arranged for standard airline seating with twin seats mounted on both sides of the fuselage and a centre aisle. The aircraft has a large baggage hold and coat rack at the front with a galley and large cargo hold at the rear. The upholstery walls and carpet are in matching shades of brown with gold curtains.

The normal crew for both VIP aircraft consists of two pilots, a flight technician or crewman, and a steward. A Radio Officer is also carried on the Dakota. As a majority of VIP trips are flown airways, a navigator is seldom carried. 111KU have four pilots and three flight technician/crewmen whose primary duty is to fly these two aircraft.

Stn. Winnipeg has two steward available when their services are required. Similar to other flights one carrying VIP's begins well in advance of the departure time. However there are details which are found only on this type of work. Some of these are: confirming the number of people to be carried so that the steward may plan his meals, checking the cleanliness of the aircraft, availability of aircraft rank plaques for service personnel or a suitable ensign for civilian dignitaries. Another important consideration is the time and type of arrival at destination. If a guard of honour or other ceremony is planned then every effort is made to make good a ramp time. The maximum deviation aimed at, is 1 minute early or 3 minutes late. This means having the aircraft on the ramp in the proper position. When there are no ceremonies planned then a five minute variation either way is the limit aimed at.

This brief description of 111KU VIP aircraft and operations, while no means complete, should give an insight into this phase of the unit operations.

on these accounts, this adds up to a very attractive rate of return. The board also reported the 5¼% deposit account rate was well accepted. The introduction of deposit accounts provided for greater accessibility to funds without loss of interest and within 5 days of introduction, over \$50,000.00 was deposited by new members.

Astra is incorporated through Provincial Charter the basis of local autonomy. This local autonomy through elected volunteers provides a maximum amount of democratic control by these volunteers and maintains the democratic character of Astra (1 member, 1 vote). The application of sound business practices by intelligent local autonomy is evident upon examination of local policy and has proven to be a vitally significant factor in obtaining maximum success.

The local executive, with the help of all members is constantly striving for better service. The president's report lauded the efforts of all members and committees for a job well done during 1962. Additionally, President Waroway outlined a number of new services which are under consideration at this time.

Unlike the expression of a well noted Canadian Senator and financier, not every organization measures its success by the figure that appears in the far right hand corner of the balance sheet. Astra's success is mainly attributed to the service it has and will continue to provide. To provide good service at cost, which includes a fair and equitable distribution of profit to members, is far more rewarding to the general membership than any number of "motifs" expounded by most privately owned financial concerns.

The greater the participation in your Credit Union, the more economically it can operate, consequently providing services at less cost. President Waroway in his report urged all present members to personally "carry the message" to their fellow workers during 1963.

selection of the final winner factors such as the following were considered pertinent:

(a) Organization to care for the recreation needs of children and youth:

(i) form of organization and executive direction, e.g. standing committee of Community Council;

(ii) stated aims and reference to constitutional provisions; and

(iii) special organizational features to accommodate particular circumstances.

(b) Leadership:

(i) activity supervisors and instructors (general and special use of volunteer and paid workers);

(ii) specific use made of Rec/Staff or other specialist leadership; and

(iii) leadership training (provision for selection and training of workers both volunteer and paid).

(c) Facilities:

(i) new additions or developments provided through community effort; and

(ii) use made of available facilities in view of location, size, resources, etc. of unit.

(d) Program:

(i) principles observed;

(ii) casual and instructional;

(iii) supervision provided;

(iv) participation; and

(v) special considerations (ingenuity in use of standard features rather than dependence on special advantages).

(e) Finance:

Community out of pocket expenditure per capita for all recreation activities.
