# Peacekeepers Honoured in Winnipeg

On Thursday, September, 10, 1992, members of 2PPCLI participating in Operation HARMONY were honoured at the Winnipeg Convention Centre.

A "Farewell to our Soldiers" dinner was organized by the recently formed "Total Force Community Committee" and involved support from all levels of government and eight corporate sponsors. The event demonstrated to the

soldiers and their loved ones the community's recognition and support for the part they play in Canada's commitment to world peace. Attending the event were the Lieutenant Governor, the Honourable George Johnson, MD; the Honourable James Ernst, the Minister of Urban Affairs for the Province of Manitoba; His Worship, Mayor William Norrie; and representatives from the corporate sponsors.

Plaques were presented to the corporate sponsors by the Commanding Officer of the Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry on behalf of the soldiers as a token of their appreciation. Entertainment was provided by the Air Command Band, The Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada Pipe Band, and the 2701 PPCLI Cadet Corps Drum Line.

The soldiers will be going to Yugoslavia in October to participate in "Operation HARMONY". The Company consists of approximately 100 soldiers from 2PPCLI, with militia augmentation from the following Regiments: The Loyal Edmonton Regiment, Edmonton, AB; The Canadian Scottish Regiment, Victoria, BC; The Royal Westminister Regiment, New Westminister, BC; The Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada, Winnipeg, MB; The Royal Winnipeg Rifles, Winnipeg, MB; and The Lake Superior Scottish Regiment, Thunder Bay, ON. In all, 20 militia soldiers from the above mentioned Regiments will be participating in "Operation HARMONY".

### The Story of Fire Prevention Week

On a warm Sunday evening of October 1871, a thoughtless, careless act sparked a fire at a modest city home. It seemed small and easy to control. But it wasn't.

Thirty hours later 2,100 acres of Chicago were a blackened, smoldering waste. More than 200 of its citizens had perished, 100,000 were homeless, almost 17,500 buildings were in ruins. Direct losses were \$168,000,000, the indirect costs incalculable.

To mark the Chicago conflagration, Fire Prevention Week is observed annually during the week containing October 9, its anniversary date. Fire Prevention Week was first officially proclaimed in the United States and Canada in 1922.

It strongly reminds us that fires are not unavoidable accidents. They are always the result of some thoughtless act or neglect, and they can exact heavy penalties.

Don't gamble that you can escape the financial headaches or family heartbreaks that fire always brings. Is fire insurance coverage really required? The cost of fire insurance is indeed a small price to pay for the peace of mind that you will have knowing that in the event of a fire occurring at your residence that your property is protected. The cost of replacing your personal belongings could be in the range of \$30,000 to \$40,000, compared to perhaps a cost of \$200 deductible. The cost savings realized by not purchasing insurance will not cover the cost of replacing even a small portion of your belongings. Insurance coverage is available to members at various institutions throughout the city. This insurance coverage is very reasonably priced. Personnel may be held liable to reimburse the Crown for losses resulting from willful or negligent causes.

## Laying up of the Colours of 422 and 444 Squadron

Winnipeg — On the 26th June, MGen L.W.F. Cuppens, Deputy Commander of Air Command presided over the laying up of the Colours of 422 and 444 Squadron in the atrium of the Bishop Building. The ceremony was attended by the Lt Gov of Manitoba, the Honourable Dr. George Johnson, and several senior airforce officers.

422 Squadron was formed in April 1942 at Fermanagh, Northern Ireland, as a coastal patrol squadron, flying convoy escort and anti submarine patrols over the North Atlantic. It was disbanded in Sep 45, when the war ended. Reformed in Jan 1953 as a fighter squadron it served with distinction at home and in the Canadian Air Division in Europe until 1970. The squadron reformed in 1971 as a tactical helicopter unit until 1980 when it was disbanded and its Colours laid up at CFB Gagetown.

422 Squadron was originally formed as an observation unit in 1947 but was

disbanded only later. Reformed in 1952 as a fighter squadron, it became a part of the Canadian Air Division in Europe in 1953 until disbanded once again in 1967. In 1972, it was reformed as a tactical helicopter squadron at Lahr. 444 was disbanded

in 1991 at Lahr. When the decision was made to lay up 444 Sqn Colours at Air Command HQ Bldg it was decided to bring home 422 Sqn Colours at the same time to be displayed in the atrium of the Bishop Building.

A Flugplatz Soellingen reunion and close-out ceremonies weekend has been scheduled for 20 to 22 November 1992. The following general itinerary outlines the weekend's activities:

## Thursday, 19 November

Arrivals

## Friday, 20 November

Continued arrivals, open house throughout the Base and GRA, and evening beer calls in individual Messes, and in the Tiger Lair for ex-439 Squadron members

## Saturday, 21 November

Reunion brunch, family oriented activities, aircraft static displays, a possible bus tour of the local area, and a gala dinner and dance in the evening

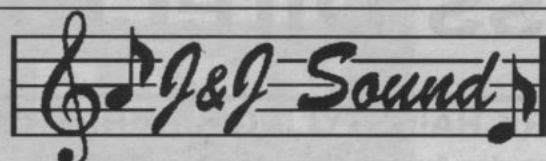

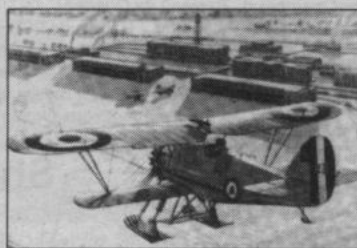

# Starwatch

Looking back at the last two articles which dealt with the Perseid Meteor Shower and with the planets Neptune and Uranus, I have to admit that neither lived up to the expectations the articles probably created. The Perseids were very disappointing and Uranus has been barely visible in binoculars from my location near Ottawa. I did succeed in seeing both Uranus and Neptune in my eight inch telescope but Neptune will have proven difficult through binoculars even in locations further from city lights. The sky has been unusually luminous this summer and I can only conclude that this is another effect of dust and vapour from the eruption of Mount Pinatubo. I believe that the dust particles and sulphuric acid droplets have been reflecting moonlight, refracted sunlight and ambient light, inhibiting our ability to view dimmer objects normally bright enough to be seen easily. To be on the safe side this month I have decided to write about something bright

enough to be seen without binoculars or telescopes.

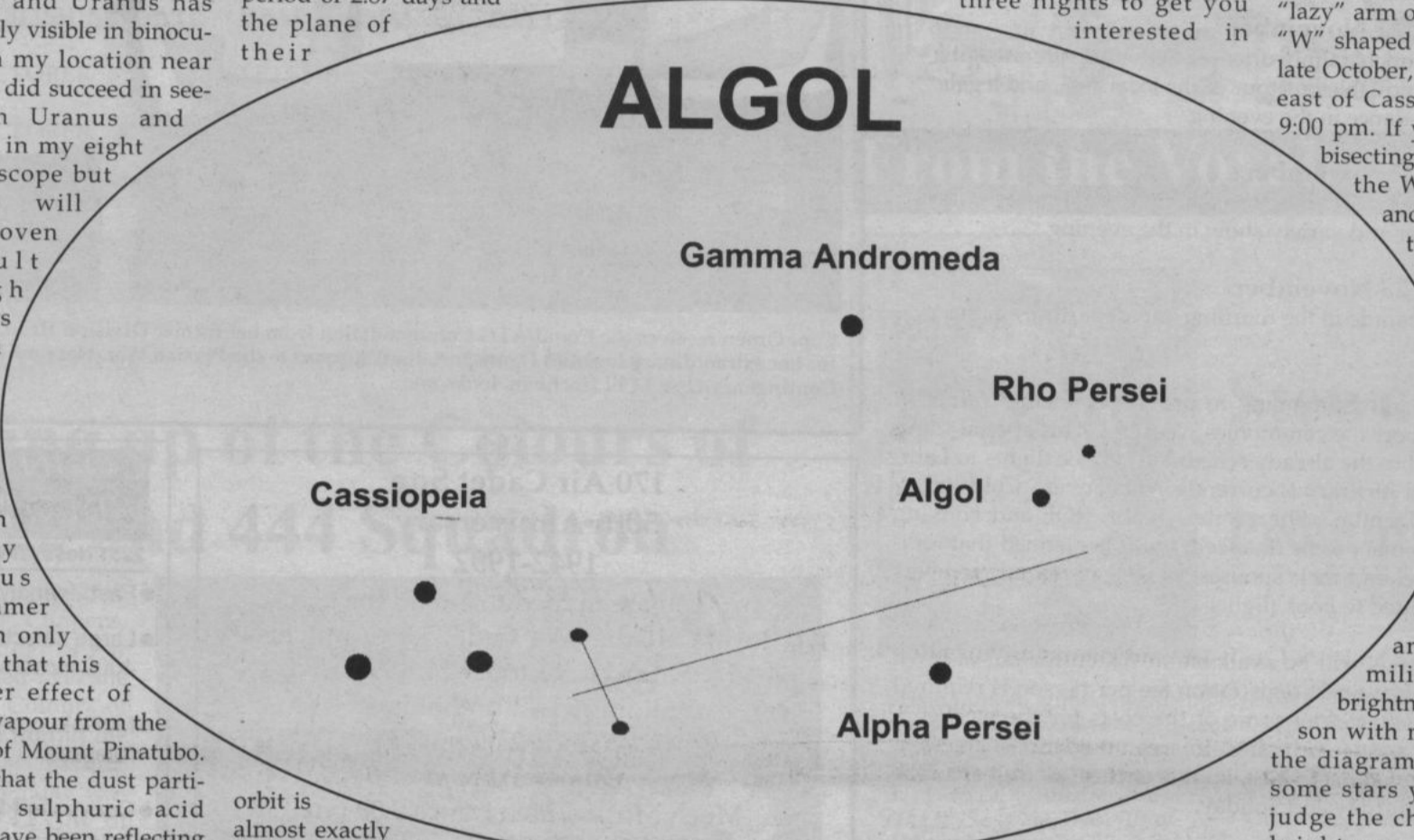
## Algol

Beta Persei, the second brightest star in the constellation of Perseus, is a binary star in which one component is bright and the other, faint. The two orbit each other in a period of 2.87 days and the plane of their

orbit is almost exactly edge on to viewers on Earth. This causes the bright star to be eclipsed by the dim one at intervals of 69 hours. The rise and fall in brightness are quite dramatic. In a four and one half hour period Algol loses two thirds of its

brightness. It remains at this level for nineteen minutes then in the next four and one half hours it returns to its "normal" level. Obviously, there are occasions when the bright component eclipses the dimmer one but the effect is too slight to be detected without sensitive instruments. The companion star is far too dim to be seen from Earth and its eclipse does not perceptibly affect the total amount of light we see. Algol's variability was almost certainly known to

the Arabian astronomers in the ninth century. Algol is an Arabic name meaning "demon" and it must have puzzled them greatly to see the regular variations in brightness.

## How to find Algol

If you don't own a star chart, go to the library and browse through the Astronomy section till you find one. Look for the constellation Perseus and note where it lies with respect to the left, or "lazy" arm of Cassiopeia, the "W" shaped constellation. In late October, Perseus lies due east of Cassiopeia at about 9:00 pm. If you draw a line bisecting the lazy arm of the W, Alpha Persei and Algol lie on either side of the bisector a wide hands pan along it.

Don't wait until the end of October to start watching. Start early in the month to look for Algol in the sky and become familiar with its brightness in comparison with nearby stars. In the diagram I have shown some stars you can use to judge the changes. At full brightness Algol is as bright as Gamma Andromeda and very nearly as bright as Alpha Persei. At its dimmest, it only shines with the same brightness as Rho Persia; a truly amazing change.

variable star observing.

Remember that we fall back to Standard Time on 25 October.

an entertaining summer so far!

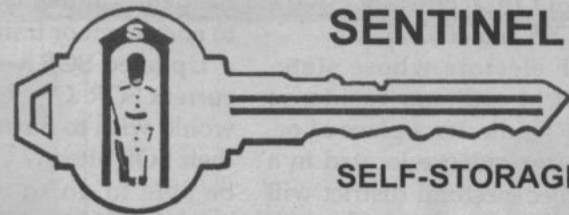

Base Operations hopes everyone has had a safe APS and that winter will be warmer than our past summer.

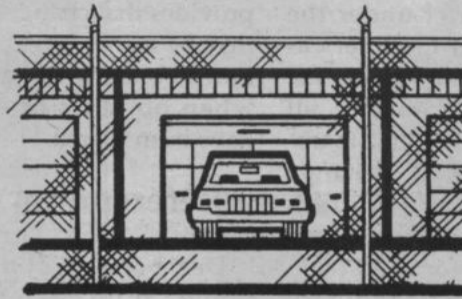

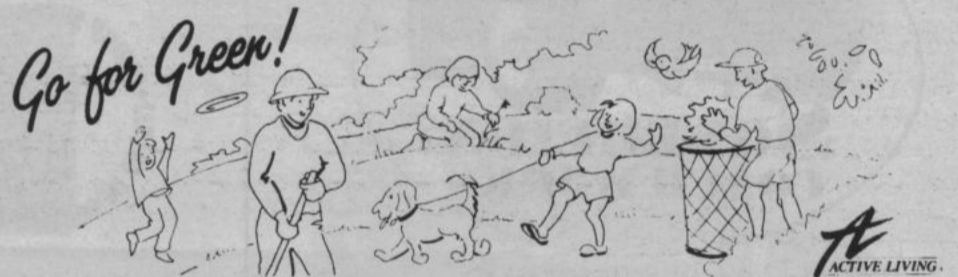

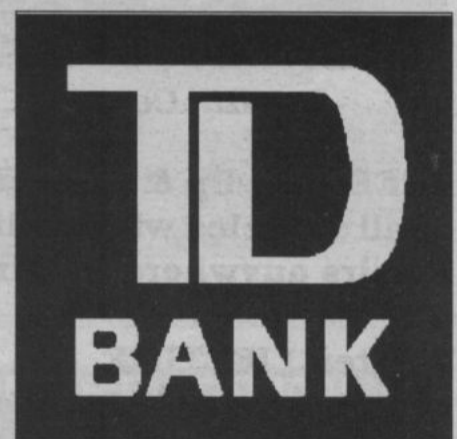

# Referendum - 1992

(Excerpt from NDHQ msg)

Writs ordering a federal referendum in the 220 electoral districts located in Canadian provinces and territories other than the province of Quebec were issued on 17 Sep 92 with civilian polling day on Monday 26 Oct 92. A special procedure for taking votes of CF electors in or outside Canada and public service electors residing outside Canada including dependants residing with such electors outside Canada, is contained in the special voting rules (SVR) at Annex A in CFP 237. All refs in msg, except where otherwise indicated, are to arts in CFP 237. Period for voting by CF electors is **Monday 12 Oct 92 until Saturday 17 Oct 92**, both inclusive. Actual days

and hours of service voting in a unit are to be prescribed by CO in accordance with arts 205 and 403.1.B.

CF electors whose statement of ordinary residence (SOR) indicates a place of ordinary residence located in a Quebec electoral district will not be able to vote in such electoral district under the SVR. The Chief Electoral Officer has directed that at the time of voting however, all CF electors will be able to update their SOR and change their place of ordinary residence to a place located in a different electoral district. The new place of ordinary residence chosen shall be a place in which is situated:

A. The residence of a person who is the spouse, dependant, relative or next of kin of the member;

B. The place where the member is residing by reason of the services performed by him in the CF; or

C. The place of his ordinary residence immediately prior to enrolment or transfer.

Updated SOR will replace current SOR. CF electors who would wish to further update their SOR after 17 Oct 92 will be able to do so under the Canada Elections Act which provides that changes to SOR may be made during January and February of each year when no writs of election have been issued.

## Référendum - 1992

Des brefs ordonnant la tenue d'un référendum fédéral dans les 220 circonscriptions situées dans les provinces et territoires canadiens autres que la province de Québec ont été émis le 17 sep 92 et le jour de la votation civile a été fixé au lundi le 26 oct 92. Une procédure spéciale concernant la votation des électeurs des forces canadiennes au Canada ou à

l'étranger ainsi que les électeurs de la fonction publique demeurant à l'étranger y compris les personnes à leur charge demeurant avec eux à l'étranger, est contenue dans les règles électorales spéciales (RES) à l'annexe A de la PFC 237. Tous les renvois contenus dans le présent message, à moins d'avis contraire, se rapportent aux articles de la PFC 237. La période de vote pour les électeurs des FC s'étend du lundi 12 oct 92 au samedi 17 oct 92 inclusivement. Les jours et les heures du scrutin militaire dans les unités sont ceux que déterminent les commandants, conformément aux art 203 et 403.1.B.

Les électeurs des FC dont la déclaration de résidence ordinaire (DRO) indique un lieu de résidence ordinaire situé dans une circonscription du Québec ne pourront pas voter dans ces circonscriptions en vertu des RES. Le directeur général des élections a décrété qu'au moment du vote, il sera permis à tous les électeurs des FC de mettre

leur DRO à jour et de changer le lieu de résidence ordinaire pour un lieu situé dans une circonscription différente. Le nouveau lieu de résidence ordinaire choisi devra être un lieu où se trouve:

A. Soit la résidence d'une personne qui est le conjoint, une personne à charge, un parent ou une personne désignée comme plus proche parent du membre,

B. Soit le lieu où le membre réside à cause du service qu'il accomplit dans les forces canadiennes,

C. Soit le lieu de sa résidence ordinaire immédiatement avant son enrôlement ou son transfert.

Les DRO mises à jour remplaceront les DRO actuelles. Les électeurs des FC qui voudront mettre à jour leur DRO après le 17 oct 92 pourront le faire en vertu de la loi électorale du Canada qui prévoit que ces changements peuvent être effectués en janvier et février de chaque année excepté pendant la période ou des brefs d'élection sont émis.

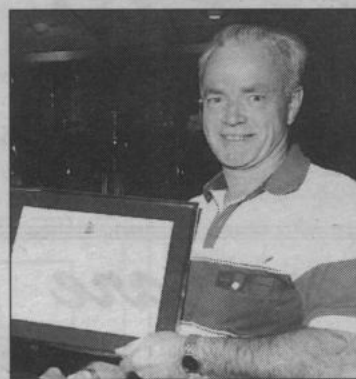
After the presentations and speeches were completed, guests and visitors were treated to snacks, drinks and friendly camaraderie in the new lounge and games room.

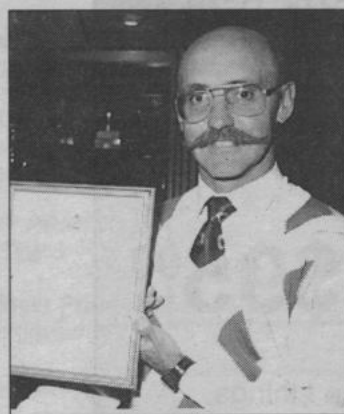

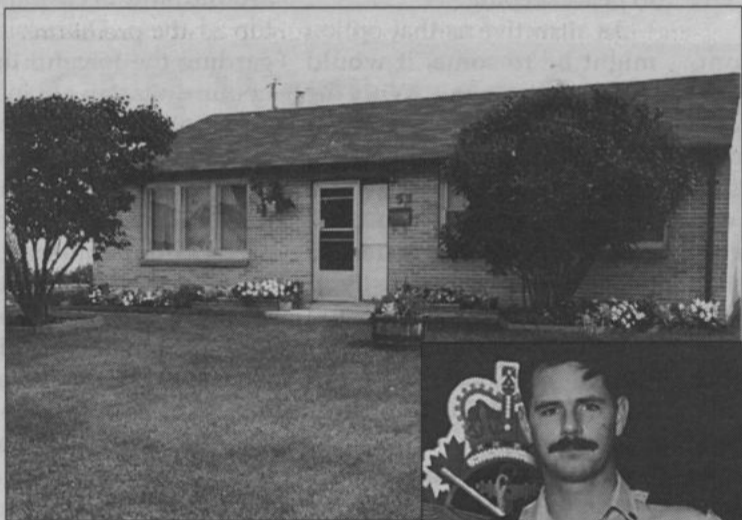

# Keeping the Peace

At 5:43 a.m. Bosnian time on Aug. 1, I shook the hands of the last Canadian Soldiers to leave Sarajevo Airport on their way back to Croatia, thereby fulfilling my promise I had made to myself a month earlier.

It was, without a doubt, one of the most emotional moments of my life. Not because I was sorry to see the Canadians leave but rather because they were all leaving alive — as simple as that. The 800-strong Canadian Infantry Battle Group was built on the First Battalion of the Royal 22nd Regiment and included a large company of more than 250 from the Royal Canadian Regiment. It had survived exactly 30 days in one of the most dangerous locations in the world.

It had been shelled with artillery, mortars and rocket grenades.

These soldiers were sniped at, their vehicle routes and accommodation areas had

been mined and probably most dangerous of all, 800 Canadians had been told to drive as fast as possible between locations in Sarajevo and to ignore any traffic lights that still might be working — all in the interests of avoiding sniper fire. A soldier's dream come true and a military policeman's worst nightmare.

When 800 soldiers deploy to a training area in Canada for a 30-day peacetime exercise, safety is an extremely high priority in the mind of their commander.

Despite all the precautions that are taken, the inherent danger associated with our business usually results in a few serious accidents each exercise. How then did we survive Sarajevo without anyone being killed?

The most popular opinion is that we were lucky and while I certainly accept that luck had something to do with it the question is — how

much? Let me cite an example to demonstrate how good training produces its own "luck."

In the early hours of July 22, more than 300 soldiers located in Beaver Barracks, which housed two companies of the Canadian Battle group were shelled by mortars.

The kitchen, eating area, store room accommodation and even a 5,000-litre fuel tank were hit. During the afternoon of the previous day several alert Canadian soldiers had noticed that one of the sides in the conflict had set up two mortars on each side of Beaver Camp just outside the wire fence.

This action contravened the accepted international practice not to seek protection by setting up weapons in the shadow of hospitals, schools, orphanages or UN peacekeeping locations.

Regrettably such action merely causes the other side to fire back and endanger the hospital, school or UN peacekeepers.

Negotiations were commenced to get the mortars removed, but such a process usually takes days so as night fell July 21 the mortars were still there and the word was passed throughout Beaver Camp to be alert for possible retaliatory fire during the night if the two mortars in question fired at the other side.

At this point, to the casual observer, luck becomes confused with good training.

There was a good deal of shelling and firing in and around Sarajevo that night; however, as usual, everyone in Beaver Camp that could was getting a few hours sleep — until those two next-door

mortars fired. About 200 soldiers sat up in their cots and knew immediately what to do.

Minutes later they were crowded into a series of excellent underground bunkers that had been constructed in record time by the combat engineer and infantry within days of their arrival at the camp. As predicted, the other side fired their mortars in retaliation and 12 rounds hit the Canadian barracks causing no injury.

Luck? Yes, undoubtedly some but in the final analysis it was good combat training and excellent leadership at the junior level that saved many Canadian lives that early morning in July.

With the increasing profile of peacekeeping in the world, and Canada's well-earned reputation as loyal and effective members of the peacekeeping community, there are those who suggest that we should stop training for combat and limit our training to peacekeeping.

As attractive as that option might be to some, it would destroy our army. With the deterioration of our combat skills over time our effectiveness as peacekeepers would also self-destruct. You can't deal with warning factors in peacekeeping unless you have combat credibility, and equally important, without those skills you will not survive to complete your mission.

Canada has a unique position in the world — we arrive as peacekeepers in many areas of conflict without territorial ambition and with a reputation for impartiality and military competence.

There are those that postulate that you can recruit

someone off the street, put a blue beret on them, give them a few weeks "peacekeeping" training and send them into the world with a rifle and 20 rounds of ammunition to be a peacekeeper.

Sorry, it wouldn't work and it would be extremely irresponsible to do so. Soldiers trained for combat have the best "peacekeeping" training there is. There is no need to spend a lot of time, effort and resources seeking another solution to a relatively simple problem.

To reinforce the point it should be recognized that peacekeeping appears to be evolving rather quickly into the grey areas between Chapter 6 of the UN Charter (peacekeeping) and Chapter 7 (peace imposition — Korea and the Persian Gulf). Sarajevo was certainly not conventional peacekeeping.

There was no ceasefire and the Canadians had to undertake humanitarian tasks while the war continued around and occasionally on top of them. Discussions regarding the forceful delivery of humanitarian aid in Bosnia and Somalia suggest that Canada could well get involved in the application of force to carry out humanitarian missions in areas of the world where the population is suffering and political negotiations have failed to achieve a lasting truce. Only trained combat soldiers should venture into such surroundings.

Canadians have every right to be proud of their peacekeeping tradition.

Everyone knows the concept was the brainchild of Prime Minister Lester Pearson and that Canada is the only nation in the world that has participated in every peacekeeping mission since their inception in 1947. There is, however, no free lunch.

If we intend to continue to contribute to international peace and stability by supporting peacekeeping missions around the world there is only one category of Canadian citizen trained to do so: the combat-ready soldier, sailor and airman. They, with their well honed skills will make their own "luck".

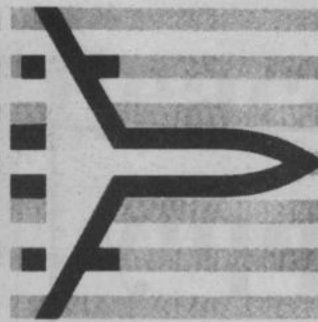

0730, July 3, 92. "Morning Lin, hope you got your moving clothes on. They've found some space for us in eleven hangar at the Armed Forces Base and we have to be out of here by Midnight tonight." 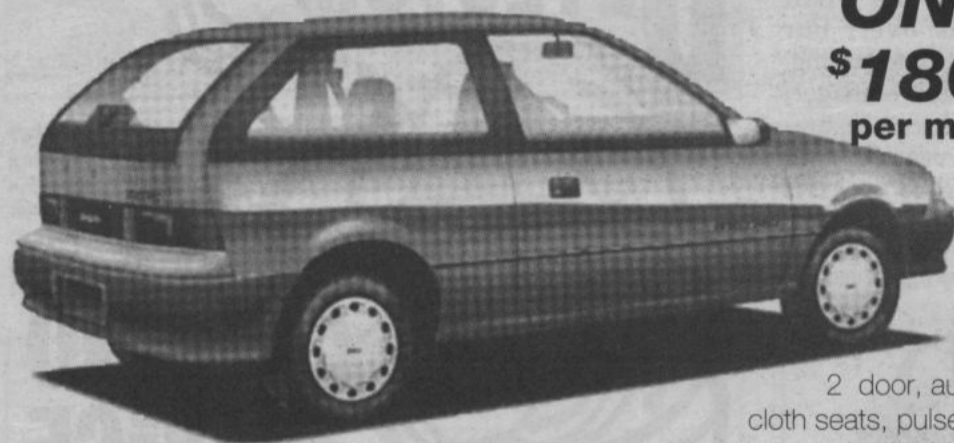

## Financial Subsidy - Do you Qualify?

Each year hundreds of parents enrol their children in child care programs. Many parents shy away from licensed regulated child care because they feel they cannot afford the cost. The Family Support Centre has a Community Children's Coordinator on staff that will locate affordable care in licensed homes or child care facilities for you.

The Provincial Child Day Care Office offers subsidy for children in licensed child care spaces up to the age of 12 years to parents who qualify.

Many single parents or lower income dual-employed parents may be eligible for partial or full subsidy. The first step in applying for a day care subsidy is to ask whether the home or centre your child is in is eligible to offer subsidy.

The centre or home (if licensed) may have forms for

you to fill out, or if you are part of the Satellite Community Based Child Care Program we will provide you with an application.

To be eligible, parents must show a reason for needing day care services. They may be employed, in training, attending school or university, or have a medical or social need. The actual amount of day care subsidy is determined by a formula which examines the total family income, allowable deductions, number of children in day care, and the number of days of care required per week. You will be notified by the Child Day Care Office of the amount of subsidy provided on your behalf. The subsidy is paid directly to your caregiver. ### Three R's not most important educational goals

Try to explain to foreigners studying English that the three R's stand for reading, writing and arithmetic and they'll better understand our spelling problems. One out of three correct spellings may not be laudable, but it does

give me permission to suggest three equally important educational goals - none starting with R - which are considered by parents when they send children off to school. These are 1: that children learn to feel good about themselves; 2: that they learn to make good decisions; and 3: that they learn to deal with peer pressures. Recognizing these goals as the underpinning to a satisfying life, teachers teach toward them, but parents often see them as detracting from the basics, ie. reading, writing, arithmetic, history and science. I suspect, in fact, that most parents would rather have children with good grades than good self-esteem. Perhaps the reason lies in the reality that reading, writing and arithmetic can be evaluated and graded while self-esteem, decision-making and dealing with peer pressure cannot.

Yet, as a culture, we spend more time on therapists'

couches and more money on compensating for the omission of my three R's than on Adults who can't read, write or subtract. Literacy education for Adults is a snap compared to the massive rehabilitation programs needed in North America. I'd rather have children who feel good about themselves than children who are the top readers in their classes. I would rather have children who make good decisions than those who make good Test Scores. I would rather have children who can say "no" to peer pressures than those who lose themselves in pleasing everyone around them to get ahead. In our frenzy to rear achieving children, we often forget that pressure to get them to the top academically can diminish their self-esteem for a lifetime. They never feel quite good enough or lovable enough to accept their human limitations or to accept

that others can love them in spite of those limitations. They strive constantly for perfection and, because they'll never feel perfect, consider themselves failures because they aren't on top of the heap. Studies indicate that when self-esteem is low, hostility and competition are high. Adults with low self-esteem exhibit their insecurity by behaving and competing aggressively. It's as if they are saying, "I'll prove to you my importance even if I don't feel it."

Effective parents and educators look to good self-esteem in children before they look to achievement. They teach children to accept themselves as lovable even if they aren't in the top 10 of everything. They affirm children's unique strengths, especially those that don't appear on report cards or in sports columns. They state realistic expectations and when they do, children

realize that they don't have to achieve to be loved. When children like themselves, they already have a leg up on making good decisions and dealing with peer pressures. They won't make decisions based on being accepted or winning popularity because they already accept and value themselves. And they know they don't have to turn their wills over to peers with questionable values to be accepted by their parents or others for being who they are. Lucky the children beginning a new school year who have parents and educators who prize them more for who they are than for what they achieve, for they will receive the best education we can offer. They may not be able to read as fast, write as legibly or balance their chequebook as perfectly in later life as the top achievers, but they will have something infinitely more valuable - a balanced life.

## La Prière est-elle indispensable?

La plupart des chrétiens et des chrétiennes nous diront qu'ils prient régulièrement et ce de manière spontanée. Et c'est vrai. Qui d'entre-nous ne prie pas au plus profond de son coeur devant la souffrance d'un ami? "Comment faire?" On prend du temps pour son sport préféré, on en consacre pour "avoir une peau qui a l'air en santé"... Mais les quinze ou vingt minutes par jour que nous réclamons nous semblent bien longues. Pourtant, elles sont, elles aussi, essentielles à notre bien-être,

à notre épanouissement. "Toi, pour prier, retire-toi dans ta chambre, ferme ta porte et prie ton Père qui est là dans le secret; et ton Père qui voit dans le secret te le rendra." (Mt 6,8)

Jésus lui-même l'a fait et il nous invite à le faire aussi. Cette prière secrète et silencieuse est d'autant plus nécessaire si nos activités sont multiples et absorbantes. Et le temps que nous prenons à prier n'est pas volé à nos bonnes oeuvres! Bien sûr, nous devons aimer Dieu à travers les personnes qui nous entourent, en consacrant du temps à leur

service. Mais pour cela, il est de notre devoir de puiser à la source de l'amour. Et la prière est le moyen par lequel nous y arrivons! Dieu ne veut pas que nous l'aimions seulement "de toutes nos forces" aux heures de travail professionnel ou apostolique, mais que nous l'aimions aussi et d'abord "de tout notre coeur" dans l'intimité et le gratuit d'un rendez-vous d'amour. Il nous faut être conscients que le temps que nous prenons à prier n'est pas perdu. C'est probablement parce qu'on sait s'arrêter qu'il est plus facile d'être efficaces quand recommence le travail. Et si vous persistez à penser qu'il s'agit d'une perte de temps, je n'ai rien contre. Il n'y a peut-être pas plus belle preuve d'amour que d'accepter de perdre du temps avec la personne aimée. Vous l'avez expérimenté dans vos amours humains. Il en est de même pour notre amour de Dieu.

Pour vous qui croyez qu'il est trop difficile de s'arrêter pour prier, je dirai que les choses difficiles sont souvent celles qui en valent la peine. Il n'est pas facile de maîtriser un instrument de musique, de bien éduquer un enfant...ou d'aimer son conjoint. Tout ce qui est magnifique suppose un long apprentissage. Laissez-vous le temps de vous améliorer, d'apprendre. Et puis, donnez-vous les moyens... Quels sont les lieux ou les

moments plus propices? Vous connaissez quelqu'un qui prie et qui médite? Demandez-lui de vous aider. Et puis, il faut le dire, s'il est bon de prier "à partir de la vie", il est aussi merveilleux de prier "à partir de la Parole de Dieu". Votre prière doit vous initier au silence. Laissez Dieu vous parler. Et le moyen privilégié qu'il nous donne pour cela, c'est la Bible. Profitez-en! Et donnez-vous la chance, dans votre prière, non pas uniquement de tendre vers un Dieu que vous aimez, mais surtout de vous reposer en un Dieu qui vous aime. On peut simplement lui dire: "Tu es là, Seigneur, moi aussi." Il fera le reste si nous allons à lui avec la simplicité et la confiance des enfants.

Inévitablement, vous retirerez une grande joie de ces moments intimes avec Dieu. "Dieu qui voit dans le secret te le rendra".
