Battle of Britain Lace Tapestry

INTRODUCTION

The Battle of Britain Commemorative Lace Tapestry was created between the years 1942 and 1946 by the Nottingham firm of Dobsons and M. Browne and Co. Ltd., the largest lace producer in Europe at that time. The tapestry is a lace panel measuring 180 inches in height by 65 inches wide and depicts exact reproductions of scenes witnessed during the bombing of London. Also illustrated are the various aircraft in the battle, the badges of the Allied Air Forces involved and the names of the principal craftsmen who worked on this masterpiece. Noted authority Jack Richards in his book "The Lace Heritage" states that this artefact is "probably the most remarkable piece of lace in existence." It is considered to be the largest and most intricate example of the lace maker's art in the world.

ACQUISITION OF THE AIR COMMAND LACE

In 1975, the Canadian War Museum (CWM), at the request of some senior officials who had seen copies of the lace in England, attempted to find Canada's Battle of Britain Lace Tapestry. It was on record that one had been presented to the Government of Canada and a second was "on loan in Canada" but neither of these were able to be located after an exhaustive search. An appeal was even sent in 1980 to all recipients of pension cheques, some 310,000 people, to no avail. The manufacturer, Dobsons and Browne, had long since been bought out by Filigree Textiles Ltd. and key files had been lost or destroyed. Efforts were then commenced to obtain a lace from another source, however only twelve were known to be still in existence. In September 1983, with great good fortune, one was placed on the block at Sotheby's Auction House and the CWM was the succesful bidder. Canada once again possessed a Battle of Britain Lace Tapestry. Unfortunately at that time no appropriate display venue for this national treasure could be found and it remained in storage for the next five years. In 1988 the CWM

The RCAFA, who covered the cost of restoring the Lace, was represented by Air Vice-Marshal Gordon Ockenden (Retd), National

President, and Major-General William Paisley (Retd).

The Wartime Pilots' & Observers' Association was represented as was the Canadian War Museum. The Canadian War Museum owned the Lace but had acquiesced to a request by Air Command to put it on permanent display at Air Command Headquarters.

responded favourably to the Air Command Heritage Committee's proposal to exhibit the Lace at the Bishop Building in a manner which would reflect its true grandeur.

RESTORATION

This lace tapestry had been in storage for almost 40 years and was seriously discoloured and had somewhat deteriorated over the years. The Royal Canadian Air Force Association graciously initiated a fund-raising campaign to cover the costly process of restoration and the lace was returned to its original pristine condition. It is now housed in a

hand-crafted environmentally secure oak case which will preserve and protect the Lace for posterity.

DEDICATION

The Battle of Britain Lace seen here was unveiled and dedicated on March 22, 1989 by Lieutenant-General Larry A. Ashley, CMM, CD, the Commander of Air Command. In attendance were all members of the Air General Officers' Symposium, the Air Force Personnel Advisory Committee, representatives from the Canadian War Museum, the Wartime Pilots and Observers Association, the RCAF Association

and Air Command Headquarters for the loan of this priceless work personnel. In the words of LGen Ashley: "For out of the evil of destruction has been woven a masterpiece of incredible beauty."

Normally when I get worked up about something, I just stew about it for a few days, and the feeling of frustration goes away. For the past year or so, I've been getting frustrated with the Warrant Officers' and Sergeants' Mess, and it's reached a point now where I have to say something about it, because the feeling of frustration won't go away.

Maybe there are things about the operation of the Mess that I don't understand that causes me all this pain. There is one thing I know, and that it is time for us to have a good look at these institutions and the way they are operated. Maybe this could be a subject for some future CWOs course to study.

First of all, people tell me that the Mess, whether it's the WOs' & Sgts' Mess, or the Junior Ranks' Mess, belong to the membership, and that we run it. I can only say that that is a lot of crap! We have people who volunteer or are elected to the executive of the Messes, but they sure as hell don't run it. We are operated and driven by any number of faceless people, and regulations which are choking us to death.

Every Mess has its own unique needs, based on where that mess is located. For example the WOs' & Sgts' Messes in Moose Jaw, or Penhold are different from our Mess in Winnipeg. That difference is as a result of the number of members, where those members live in relation to the Mess-

However, I can't talk about Moose Jaw or Penhold, because I only visit those places occasionally. Therefore, I must restrict my comments to our Messes in Winnipeg.

I would like to suggest that if we were a private club downtown, and trying to operate under the rules that have been established for us, we would have gone under a long time ago.

When I think of the Carleton Club, in Winnipeg, or the Glencoe Club in Calgary, both of which are private and exclusive clubs, I cannot help but wonder why we too couldn't operate our Messes like that. Just think, a Mess which is truly owned and operated by the membership. A Mess which would be capable of making decisions based on the good of made in Ottawa. I think that if we were deregulated, and given our heads, we could make a go of it. Our Messes have character, and are in demand when it comes to holding events. Should messes be accountable to the BComd/CO or to the membership?

Of course one of the problems facing messes is an attitude of some members, which is still reflected in their 18th century thinking. They have not yet come through the Khyber Pass.

Here are some of the things that frustrate me. The NPF folks have come up with something called misappropriation of funds. How does this affect us? Well, the Shriners use our mess for functions on a couple of occasions a year. I would suggest that they drop a few thousand dollars over our bar during the course of the year. In addition, we have developed a good rapport with the fine gentlemen. Last year, it was moved by one of our members that we should donate \$25.00 to the Shriners in support of their drive for funds. It was seconded, and carried. However, when our minutes went through the rounds, we were told that we could not do it. Some more misappropriation of funds. Our hospitalized members normally are sent a fruit basket, or provided with some other form of comfort. I've been told that this too was considered to be misappropriation of mess funds.

When people like the Commander Air Command, the Base Commander, and the Command the Mess, and not some rule, Chief retire, or leave after a tour of duty, it is customary to provide these gentlemen with a special gift from the Mess. As you might suspect, we are not permitted to do anything of this nature because of the same theory or logic. I suspect that the membership is being protected from a Mess Committee out of control.

We are told who may join our Mess, who can visit our Mess, and when these visits may take place. We are told that we cannot do certain things because it creates work for our NPF people. We have to pay NPF anywhere from \$400.00 to \$500.00 per month for accounting services, and we have no choice in this matter. Where does this money

There is no one that I'm aware of in the system who can tell me, what belongs to the Crown, and what is NPF. We have two Distribution Accounts, one for NPF and one for Her Majesty.

We are in desperate need of air conditioning, and have made arrangements to buy the unit ourselves by securing a loan. Again, the paper work has been delayed because people in the system could not agree if it's a Crown responsibility, or NPF. This item has been going on for at least two years, and we are facing another hot summer with no air conditioning. There is no doubt in my mind that NPF will warn us at some time during the summer that our profits are down. Is it any wonder? Number 4 Legion is air conditioned.

As I understand it, if we want to rent some portable air conditioners we have to have NDHQ approval to stick them in our windows.

If we want to make some improvements in the mess we have to contend with NPFAO, BPSvcsO, BAdmO, CE, Fire Marshals, and a whole list of "experts" who all have a kit bag full of regulations which must be followed. I am not suggesting that these rules are bad, I'm just saying that they frustrate those who would like to get things done.

I would like to suggest that the traditional way the messes are operated are long gone, and if we don't get ourselves into the twenty-first century with the way our messes are operated, then like the Dodo bird, they will

I remember the difficulty the Junior Ranks Mess had in trying to get some renovations done in the bar area of their Mess. It went on and on for years, until one of the members from CE bid on the contract, took leave and did the work for them.

The Officers' Mess do not/cannot provide a meal to an officer's wife who is visiting him on TD. There's something wrong!

That's enough rambling on about that subject. See, I feel better already. And the last thing in the world I would want is anyone in the system to take my comments personally. Like the majority of us, they're just doing

We get letters... and suggestions

I noticed in the VOXAIR that the Base Chief was having difficulty with the new New Government Security Policy. I apologize that the 22 page letter I sent out is so confusing and I'll try to make it simple here:

What used to be Restricted before we had Protected (Unclassified for Electrical Transmission) is now Protected A unless it's Nato Restricted, in which case it's Confidential which is higher than Protected A and Protected B, but not Protected C. Paragraphs which we once marked C and P are now PA, PB, PC, C, S, TS, or U. SIN numbers, which were Unclassified, became Protected but then were un-protected for a few months, are now Protected A. Protected Messages are marked GGGG, KKKK and VVVV and not UUUU, CCCC and SSSS unless they are classified, or going to a ship at sea. To have access to Protected A, Protected B and Protected C, you need an enhanced Reliability Check which doesn't exist yet so instead you need a level one clearance (which used to be Confidential). You must lock your Protected A in a cabinet unless it's in a Security Zone or a High Security Zone, or in a Type D room (which remains undefined). If a document is Protected A it must be marked Protected A at the top and bottom, but if it has both Protected C and Confidential, it is marked Protected C - Confidential and paragraphs marked PC-C and it must be destroyed by burning and must be transmitted by authorized messenger with a 728 and a DND 679 and needs a 799 after it is burned.

I hope that helps with the confusion. However...if you've read the book, seen the review but missed the movie, you can still catch the touring live show! For Base Security Officer

That way you can give your boss a song and dance without that squishy sound normally associated with soggy socks.





Deer-saving mission successful

has resulted from the several years of mild winters, combined with the very heavy snowfall this year, created a crisis for the Province's white-tailed deer. The Manitoba Wildlife Federation and its affiliates had agreed to monitor the situation in the local areas and to coordinate an emergency feeding program if necessary.

In January it became apparent that the deer wintering in St. Charles Range were in danger of starving. Deer were beginning to feed in the manure piles at Assiniboia Downs, were crossing surrounding roads into farms in large numbers seeking food, and as a result many were being

The high deer population that killed by vehicles and dogs. Younger ones were succumbing to starvation.

> Once this was reported by the AWA members, the response at all levels was outstanding. The AWA voted funds to build feeders and purchase deer pellets. The Provincial biologists conducted an aerial survey which showed that over 100 deer were wintering in bush at the range and confirmed the seriousness of the local situation. Captain Coull, Base Defence Planning Officer, arranged for access to the range, and then played a vital role by collecting \$687.00 in donations from Base personnel to help purchase feed.

In total, 9,900 lbs of pellets of the AWA volunteers. were consumed by the deer in February and March. This cost \$900.00. During the last weeks of March, 1,650 lbs were required each week, all of which was

The end result was that the deer herd came through the winter in excellent condition. No deaths due to starvation occurred after the feeding started, and dog and traffic deaths virtually

Everyone who contributed or was otherwise involved should feel well satisfied. Base personnel, in particular, showed a great deal of heart.

Peacekeepers — Namibia — Maintien de la Paix

OTTAWA - The first group of a total of 203 Canadian peacekeepers arrived at J.G. Strijdom Airport in Windhoek, the capital of Namibia, today aboard a Canadian Forces Boeing 707. The remainder of the force is expected to arrive tomorrow aboard a C-130 Hercules. Both the Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Bill McKnight, and the Associate Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Mary Collins, bade farewell to the peacekeepers before their departure from Canada.

The Canadian Forces members constitute the Canadian Contingent United Nations Transition Assistance Group (CCUNTAG) with the largest element being the 89 Canadian Logistics Unit (89 CLU). Specially organized for a logistics support

role, 89 CLU will provide transportation, maintenance, and supply platoons to the United Nations' 1,700-member logistics support group. The Canadians will assist in the support of the 4,700-member UNTAG force.

The Canadian Contingent Headquarters is located in Windhoek with a detachment in Keetmanshoop in southern Namibia. An advance party of sixty-eight Canadians arrived in Namibia at the end of March to prepare for today's arrival of the main party. The contingent consists of representatives from across the Canadian Forces and includes 31 women and 19 reservists. Most will be rotated back to Canada and replaced by other Canadians after six months service. The Canadian Contingent commander is Colonel Michael Jeffery.







Greetings from the Chapels

God's healing powers helping the sick



"The Father remembered, then, that it was at that very hour when Jesus had told him, "Your son will live". So he and all his family believed. John 4:53 (Good News For Modern Man)

How many times have we prayed for a sick loved one or friend? Has there been something special for which you have prayed or possibly you are still praying for? How many times have your prayers or heart felt wishes been answered?

Robert Schuller suggested to someone that each time he prayed or wished for something he should write it down and the date when he did so. Then when that prayer or wish was answered, he should note the date as he checked or ticked off that wish or prayer from his list.

If each one of us took that advice seriously, how long would our list of requests be? At the end of each week, month and that year would we be very surprised

at the many prayers and wishes that had been answered? Those requests that had not been answered may, over the years, have led to our gaining new or other types of experiences and knowledge which we would not otherwise have had if things had gone the way we had hoped or intended. Sometimes we may find ourselves giving thanks that such a wish or prayer had not been answered. At such times we find ourselves acknowledging the words of the scriptures. "All things God works for good with those who love him, those whom he has called to his purpose." Romans 8:28.

Recently I was passing a group of servicemen standing together and one whom I had not seen for a few weeks told me he was being posted and wanted to say thanks for all the help he had received. I told him that I thanked God for answering our prayers because whenever I remember him I give thanks for all the miracles God wrought in his life; that gives me strength and courage to continue especially in times of feeling weary or tired or dealing with some difficult problem.

This young serviceman knew what it was like to be very sick and pass through the "valley of the shadow of death" which the 23rd Psalm speaks about. The loving attention of his young wife, relatives, fellow-workers, padres and friends from far and near kept him holding on to life with God's help and with the guidance

and loving care of the doctors and nurses at the hospital. Now he is back to work and on his feet again - Thank God.

Our prayers for our loved ones. friends or co-workers can keep us all in physical, mental and spiritual health. Over the centuries there have been Christians and people of other faiths who believe in God's healing power. Last month I was invited to celebrate the Holy Communion for a group of Christians belonging to the order of St. Luke. This is a special monthly service when people gather to pray for those who are sick or to give thanks for healing which has occurred and prayers which have been answered.

That Sunday evening as I prepared for the service, I thought of a little friend of mine whose parents were recently posted. Since their arrival here she has had sleepless nights and been sick with an upset stomach. I tried three or four times to telephone the hotel where they were staying to invite her mother to take her to the healing service. For some reason, the hotel desk clerk could get no reply from their

After phoning a member of our chapel and still not being able to find them, the thought crossed my mind that God knew this little girl's needs and she did not have to be present at the service to be

The next day, her mother told me the good news. Her daughter was feeling better in the late afternoon around 5:30 p.m. and was able, for the first time that week, to eat something and go to sleep. I realized that God had heard my heartfelt wish and prayer and healed my little friend even while I was trying to contact the

mother on the phone. This reminded me of Jesus healing the son of the government official from Capernaum. He was begging Jesus to come before his son died and Jesus just said to him "Go; your son will live!" The man believed Jesus' words and went.

On his way home, his servants met him with the news: "Your boy is going to live!" He asked them what time it was when his son got better, and they said, "It
