

BASE PASSES OP-EVAL

CFB READY FOR ANYTHING!

Op Eval 82 is now history and the initial indications are that we did reasonably well — with observations naturally.

The preparations for and the execution of this event touched every section. In some cases the touch was extensive enough to be almost crippling as personnel and resources were withdrawn from Section Heads to fill the ranks of the Base Defence Force, the Nuclear Accident Support Team, the Accident Response Team and other related taskings.

The BDF, although hard pressed to achieve more than the minimum training, did a superb job in carrying out their initial security role. Favourable comments were received from all quarters concerning every aspect of their operation whether it involved the lonely guard post, the mounted and foot patrols or the riot squad.

The force was tested several times during the daylight hours but when night fell the game really got interesting. It seemed to the HQ staff that all positions were being infiltrated at once which severely tested the SAT teams ability to collect the detainees and cart them off to the guard house.

On the south site the radio transmission from the force appeared to be very calm compared to those originating on the North Side, and it was only afterward that it was learned that the PL Comd, CAPT King and the BMLO had broken out the starlight kits depriving the infiltrators of any chance whatsoever.

To our knowledge, not one infiltration got through which is certainly a tribute to the men and women who comprise this force. And, furthermore, the force was highly successful in cleaning up the expired I Card population found lurking in our fringes.

The Nuclear Accident Support Team deployed during this period, and although not as large as the BDF, it certainly contributed to Section Head's zero manning objectives and the BTNOs empty garage concept.

The task of this group which comprises experts in the field of radiation, explosives, security, medical and engineering is to respond to any accident involving radioactive material. They affect life-saving measures, prevent further property damage and prevent the spread of any contamination.

Radiation cannot, of course, be seen and therefore the associated hazards tend to concern the population more

than say a hazard which is visible. This team of thirty to fifty people is trained to detect and deal with any hazard safety, and more important, is trained to ensure the safety of the general public until such time as the hazard is eliminated.

The procedures used by the Team are too extensive to describe in detail but the following may provide some insight into their tasks.

Once alerted, security is implemented around the perimeter of the site to establish a cordon over half a mile in diameter. A check with instruments is made to ensure no hazards exist at the perimeter and that no material has been spread by the wind. During this phase, Medical and Rescue personnel are probably working at the heart of the site, and once finished, will pull back to the security line where they and their equipment will be thoroughly checked and decontaminated before being allowed to exit the cordon area. Even the injured on stretchers are bagged in plastic (with O₂ of course) as they cross the physical boundary into waiting clean ambulance.

With rescue complete the Radiation Monitors dressed in yellow suits, boots and masks will accurately plot

the extent of the hazard after which clean up can begin.

The response of this team may appear somewhat slower than that expected of a conventional response team because of stringent safety demands placed on each member. The responsibility to protect the public and our community, not to mention themselves, is a responsibility which each member takes very seriously and which makes them a pleasure to work with.

The Shelter Staff, whom most base personnel had an opportunity to meet this week are really the NAST Team minus their yellow disguises. In this role these cross trained individuals are responsible for our welfare at any time the shelter posture is required.

Most of you will never see evidence of the extensive training they have but I can assure you that within that group lies the administrative and technical knowledge to feed, house and even entertain all of us for an extended period under less than ideal conditions.

As I said at the beginning Op Eval 82 is now history, and from where I sat our performance was terrific, but then it always is! Thanks!

DND CONTRACTS TO MANITOBA

WINNIPEG — Contracts totalling almost one and a half million dollars (\$1.5 M) were awarded to Winnipeg and Brandon companies during September by Defence Construction (1951) Limited (DCL).

On this month's shopping list were aluminium windows, natural gas furnaces, re-roofing of buildings and renovations to single personnel quarters at Canadian Forces Bases Winnipeg and Shilo, Man., and at the Kenora Armouries, Kenora, Ont.

Cornell Brothers (1971) Ltd. of Brandon were awarded a contract to install new natural gas furnaces in 345 married quarters at CFB Shilo.

The Kenora Armouries will receive new aluminium windows as a result of a contract awarded to Derksen Industries Ltd. of Winnipeg.

At CFB Winnipeg, a warehouse will be re-roofed by Aetna Roofing (1975) Ltd. of Winnipeg, the recreation centre will have a portion of its roof redone by Midway Sales (1979) Ltd. and some of the base's single quarters will be renovated by Con-Pro Industries Ltd., also of Winnipeg.

DCL, a Crown Corporation, is the contracting and construction supervisory agency for the major construction and maintenance projects of the Department of National Defence. Its principal functions are to obtain tenders, make recommendations on proposed awards, and award, administer and supervise construction and maintenance contracts.

The company's head office is in Ottawa and branch offices are situated in Victoria, B.C., Winnipeg, Toronto, Montreal, Halifax and Lahr, Federal Republic of Germany.



HOW'S YOUR CREDIT RATING?

Have you been extending your credit to make ends meet? Most often, people think of their credit rating when they are having credit problems, says Allan Parker, author of *Credit, Debt, and Bankruptcy*. Collection agents will tell you your credit rating will be lost if a bill is not paid immediately. You may worry that getting behind on a loan means you will never be able to get another one and your credit rating will be ruined. None of these things will necessarily happen.

A good credit rating can be over-rated! It may simply mean that you have not missed a credit payment; but you could still be deeply in debt. A good credit rating may mean little if you do not need or want credit.

A poor credit rating is assessed by each individual creditor. Even if you have had trouble paying bills elsewhere and feel you are a poor risk, some merchants may still extend credit to you. Having a poor credit rating may help over-indebted consumers see that they should get help with their debt problems.

You should understand that there is not one big credit rating number in the sky for each person. Lenders may have their own information known only to themselves. Some lenders are not as concerned about a bad debt that shows up in the credit bureau files as they are about your job, residential stability, and current income. The best credit record you can have with each of your creditors is that you make your own payments as required.



all belong to the race of mankind, that's fact not sexist.



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


