



Their solution impressed me. "But what about the furniture?" I asked



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Brigade in Battle

Brig. Christopher Hammerbeck. Commander of the 4th (United Kingdom) Armoured Brigade located in Munster, West Germany, visited Land Force Western Area Headquarters on Fri Oct. 8, 1991. He spoke to the officers and senior noncommissioned officers from the headquarters on his experience as the 4th Armoured Brigade Commander during the Gulf

Brig. Hammerbeck's afternoon presentation was not a typical account of the war as depicted by CSN. Brig. Hammerbeck made clear from the beginning that his "story is one about some very human people and their view of something that none of us ever expected. None of us had ever fought before", Brig. Hammerbeck told the audience, "We were young and very frightened and none of us knew what battle would be like."

Due to the uncertainty of war. they trained day and night. The air war started on Jan. 17, 1991 and the brigade, under the leadership of Brig. Hammerbeck prepared for the ensuing ground war during this time. Their operation was not expected to be an easy one by any measure and if they hoped to achieve their aim of ejecting the Iraqi army from Kuwait, they would have to train and reherse like they had never done before. And that is exactly what happened under the constant, and at times, deafening sound of aircraft flying missions overhead.

Brig. Hammerbeck believes that "the training an army does in peacetime does not harden or weather individuals for operations of war." The 4th Armoured Brigade carried out "hard, demanding training to challenge people's fears, to challenge their courage and to challenge their professional skills." When the ground war began, the brigade was as prepared as time and extensive training would allow.

It was not only the training which Brig. Hammerbeck felt was important. It was also dealing with the fears of his soldiers. "I went around and discussed what facing battle was like, to talk to them (the soldiers) about what their fears were, to tell them to get it out in the open and not to keep it bottled up.'

They also talked about a need for belief. Brig. Hammerbeck believes, "modern democratic society has been downplaying belief. I wanted my men to believe in something. I didn't care if it was a belief in getting back to the pub at the end of the war or if it was a genuine religious belief or somewhere in the middle. We can do nothing without belief."

It was not only the beliefs shared by the soldiers but the support and belief coming from the homefront that got the men through each day. Many letters came from home and Brig. Hammerbeck ensured that he wrote back to let the wives and their family members know that they were fighting for a worthwhile cause and that their continued support lightened the loads of the soldiers of the 4th Armoured Brigade.

The ground war may have seemed short to some watching it through the television or the radio and perhaps in a historical perspective it was, but the 4th Armoured Brigade fought long and hard and learned about the reality of war through losing their friends during battle. Brig. Hammerbeck remembers "sitting in the middle of the desert in isolation believing they had quite a real enemy."

Brig. Hammerbeck had one very important point in telling his



story to the staff of Land Force Western Area Headquarters. He wanted everyone gathered to take something of what he said away with them. His story is, undeniably, a valuable one because of what we can all learn from it.

Brig. Hammerbeck believes there are six main lessons resulting from the Guld War. They are best summarized as the need for;

- 1. properly trained leaders with the confidence to lead:
- 2. professional regular soldiers; 3. effective equipment in working
- 4. logistics "He who masters the logistics battle, masters the battle":
- 5. public support from the home front: and

6. morality and belief.

For those who believe the war is long over and should be left in the past, need to reflect on the words of Brig. Hammerbeck. His story is an interesting one and the lessons are valuable. History does indeed repeat itself and it is the lessons we learn from the past which will guide us in the future. "Brigade in Battle" -Brig. Christopher Hammerbeck's never-ending story.



Humility With A Righteous Doctrine

How often have you been made to feel that the humility expected of Christians is at odds with the righteousness of Christianity? To those who know Christ, humility before a richteous God makes sense. When we wake up to sunshine in the morning, when we read our Bibles, and when we get on our knees and pray we cannot help but feel humble and thankful that our God never fails to show himself righteous.

Through my own experience as an unbeliever, I have learned that Christianity is not always considered to have a very humble doctrine by those who do not have a personal relationship with Christ. To those people, Christianity is just another philosophy whose adherants are narrowBecause Jesus Christ is not alive in their hearts, they cannot imagine how He could live in the hearts of others, instead they think the deity of Christ is a myth created by and for Christians to the exclusion of others. The exclusive nature of the Christian "philosophy", as they see it, is at odds with their understanding of humility. What we must understand is that from their perspective, they are correct. If Christianity is just a philosophy, its proponents are, in fact, self-righteous.

To counter their arguement we can try to explain that regardless of their own beliefs, the deity of Jesus Christ in the minds of Christians is not a philosophical creation, but rather an undeniable historical, biblical and perminded and self-righteous. sonal truth. It is not we Christians who are righteous, but the Lord — the one we face everyday on our knees, the one we have given our lives to, the one who forgives us, disciplines us, and empowers us to become more and more like Him. Any good that others may see in us comes from Christ through our faith in Him and not from ourselves.

We can share with those who doubt how Christians take refuge in Psalm 23, which reads "He lets me rest in the meadow grass and leads me beside quiet streams. He gives me new strength. He helps me to do what honours him the most." Furthermore in Romans 1:17; "The Good News tells us that God makes us ready for heaven - makes us right in God's sight - when we put our faith and trust in Christ to save

Ultimately, however, our actions must show that humility is not the product of an open mind but of an open heart and that unconditional love is easier to express when Christ makes us aware of our own sinful nature. The Lord certainly helps us to see our unworthiness, "For the more we know God's laws, the clearer it becomes that we aren't obeying them" (Romans 3:20).

As we look to our dear Lord, Jesus Christ, it is clear that He knew Christians would be criticized for being self-righteous. He reminded us many times to be humble: "Therefore anyone who humbles himself as this little

child, is the greatest in the Kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 18:4) "For everhyone who tries to honor himself will be humbled and he who humbles himself shall be honoured." (Luke 14:11)

But Christ, as we may forget, does not just ask us to be humble before God, but shows us the importance of humbling ourselves before our brothers and sisters, our neighbours and enemies; "And He humbled himself even further, going so far as to die a criminal's death on a cross.' (Phillipians 2:8) Christ humbled himself for man, never once compromising his righteousness, and we must do the same.

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
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

What do the Winnipeg Jets of the National Hockey League and Base Supply at CFB Winnipeg have in common? Well, for one thing their location, but another is some of their employees.

Eight military Supply Techs, three civilian Base Supply personnel, a Safety Systems Tech and an Admin Clerk report to work at the Winnipeg Arena each time the Jets play at home, trading the uniform of the CF for that of the Jets organization.

It all began with CWO (ret'd) Bruce Barton, a former Supply Tech. Mr. Barton, now the Chief Statistician and supervisor of office officials for the Winnipeg Jets, was one of many military personnel who volunteered to perform time-keeping and announcing duties for Manitoba Junior Hockey in 1970.

When the World Hockey Association (WHA) came to Winnipeg in 1972, he was asked to perform the same function for the Jets. He, along with several other military personnel, volunteered their time four or five evenings each week working with both the WHA franchise and junior

Following a five-year posting in Ottawa, Mr. Barton returned to Winnipeg where he continued to keep the stats in the press box at Jets games. In 1986 when he retired from the military, he became employed full-time with the Jets as Chief Statistician. It was then that he began recruiting other base personnel to work at the games.

There are a myriad of tasks which must be accomplished in support of an NHL hockey game. Everything from keeping the time, compiling stats on every aspect of play and acting as a runner, to tending the bar in the press gallery. Many of these tasks are performed by personnel whom Mr. Barton has personally recruited. He has always drawn on the manpower of other service persons when employment of a part-time nature became

"I stick with them because of their loyalties, traits that they learn in the military," explains Mr. Barton. "They are always on time, dependable and reliable. When I ask something of them, I know it will be done.'

Volkssports or volksmarching stopping at designated "control is a world wide, organized, family sport that is an integral part of an international volkssport movement devoted to physical fitness. There are four volkssports: walking, bicycling, swimming and cross country skiing of which the most popular is volksmarching (walking). Its aim is to get people of all ages out-of-doors to exercise non-competitively in an event where everyone who completes the event is declared a

'Volksmarch" is a German word which literally translated means "people's walk." Infants can be pushed in strollers, youngsters walk the short distances, and senior citizens participate regularly.

points" for a "control stamp", refreshments or rest.

Each walk event is usually 10 km (6.2 miles) and/or 20 km (12.5 miles). You may start anytime between the designated times in the brochure (usually 8 am til 2 pm), and you must finish by the close (usually 5 pm). Plenty of time for sightseeing (events sometimes held in historic or interesting locales) or stopping for a picnic.

One of the bonuses of volksmarching is that each participant who completes the trail may also purchase an attractive award. In

addition to collecting commemorative medals, participants may enroll in the IVV awards program by purchasing an IVV event or distance book or both. The books cost usually between \$3 to \$4 dollars each and entitle the owner to a certificate, hat pin and patch upon completion of the milestones.



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


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
