CF aircraft to be used in Ethiopia

Feeding the starving

CFB EDMONTON, ALTA — The Canadian Forces now have a two-aircraft and 56-person Air Command detachment in Ethiopia, consisting of aircrew, groundcrew and support personnel from transport squadrons based in Trenton, Winnipeg and Edmonton. They have been sent to help fly food to drought stricken Ethiopians. Because of the country's civil war, internal transportation within Ethiopia is best by air. Food supplies have been piling up at Ethiopia's chief ports and there are fears that unless it is moved much of it will spoil.

"This Canadian Forces operation in Ethiopia will make a substantial contribution to feeding three million people currently at risk," said the Honourable Perrin Beatty, minister of National Defence in an announcement last month. "We are indeed very proud to respond to this important humanitarian need."

The CF members join the crews of three United Nations chartered Hercules and a fleet of Soviet transport aircraft in trying to solve the food distribution crisis. The relief effort is headed by LCol Ray Brown, commanding officer of the Edmonton-based 435 Transport Squadron. LCol Brown and fellow Canadians have been told that the operation could continue to the end of August. Their mission is in response to an urgent appeal from the United Nations Disaster Relief Operations (UNDRO) and the recommendations of a Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) study team that recently returned from Ethiopia.


Avions des Forces Canadiennes en Éthiopie

OTTAWA — L'honorable Perrin Beatty, ministre de la Défense nationale, a annoncé aujourd'hui que des avions des Forces canadiennes seront utilisés pour une mission humanitaire en Éthiopie.

Du 1er juin jusque vers le 1er septembre, deux avions CC-130 Hercules, des équipages ainsi que du personnel au sol et de soutien des escadrons de transport de la base de Trenton (Ont.), Winnipeg et Edmonton seront affectés à cette mission.

"Les Forces canadiennes apporteront ainsi une importante contribution à une mission visant à nourrir trois millions de personnes qui sont actuellement dans une situation précaire", a déclaré M. Beatty. "Nous sommes fiers de participer à cette activité humanitaire."

L'utilisation des avions militaires a pour but de répondre à un appel urgent du Bureau des Nations Unies pour la coordination des secours en cas de catastrophes (UNDRO). La décision a été prise à la suite des observations recueillies, lors d'un récent voyage en Éthiopie, par les membres d'une mission parrainée conjointement par le ministère de la Défense nationale et l'Agence canadienne de développement international.

Base Hospital News

A Labrador manned by a rescue team from CFB Summerside made a rescue in a remote area of northwestern Ontario similar to those rescues that are usually reserved for the Maritimes. The helicopter was en route to CFB Summerside from CFB Comox when it was delayed at CFB Winnipeg for repairs, luckily for Clovis Jole Rae, 9, the young boy medi-evaced in this case.

A call was received at BOps, CFB Winnipeg from a nurse at the Sandy Lake Nursing Station, Ontario around 2230 hours on the 29th of May. She was requesting transport for an injured boy from a reserve at North Spirit Lake, Ont., 200 kilometres north of Kenora, to a hospital for treatment in Winnipeg. Usually this is done by a civilian plane but due to the lateness at night and the apparent severity of the injury, it was felt that the boy could not wait until morning. His father, David Rae, said that Clovis had

been playing on a swing with another child when he was accidentally struck in the eye. There was a fair amount of blood and it was feared that the eyeball may have been punctured.

Local residents had attached extension cords to a generator to illuminate a floating dock with lamps. As the 17 metre helicopter was too large to land in the town or on the floating dock, it hovered over the dock while Lt. Cynthia Hollett, a nurse with the Base Hospital, CFB Winnipeg, was lowered in a net to pick up the boy. The net was lowered a second time to pick up the boy's father.

"We used the same techniques as a sea rescue," said Capt Colin Goodman, pilot of the Lab that made the rescue. "We had to hover because we couldn't land. It was dark and there was no horizon."

The rest of the crew included Co-pilot Lt. Mike Mayhew and flight engineer MCpl Ken Brodhaggen, all of CFB Summerside.

The Labrador arrived back in CFB Winnipeg at 0605 hours and the child was immediately transferred to the Emergency section of the Children's Wing at the Health Sciences Complex. He was treated there and later released.

Cooking fires have continued to cause the majority of our fires at CFB Winnipeg. In one fire incident involving "deep fat frying" there was a loss of over \$20,000. This high dollar loss was incurred even though the occupant was present in the kitchen when the cooking oil ignited. This fire like most cooking fires spread rapidly and totally engulfed the entire kitchen in minutes. This rapid spread occured due to the presence of flammable vapours created when cooking grease and oil was overheated beyond its normal cooking temperature. To avoid the possibility of having a cooking fire in your home you should adhere to the following safe cooking rules:

- · never overheat oil or grease; · never leave cooking fats on a hot burner unattended;
- · never place combustable objects on a stove;
- · always ensure the element or burner has been turned fully off (ensure element indicator light is out. Gas stove - ensure flame has extinguished);
- · always keep a tight fitting lid near by in case a fire ignites:
- always use a splash screen to prevent grease from splashing onto the hot burner; and
- it is strongly recommended

that an approved electrical deep fat frying utensil be used for all deep fat cooking.

If a cooking fire should occur, you should:

- a. Stove Top Fire:
- (1) cover the cooking utensil with a lid, and
- (2) turn the burner off:
- b. Oven Fire:
- (1) close oven door, and (2) turn off the heat:
- c. Microwave Oven: (1) keep door closed, and (2) turn unit off.

For any of the above, if the fire continues to burn or threatens to spread, ensure everyone is out or is leaving the house and extinguish the flames with a portable fire extinguisher or:

a. get everyone out of the house; b. close kitchen doors; and

c. call the fire department (911).

NOTE: Never throw water on a grease or oil fire and never risk carrying a burning pot.

Permanent Married Quarters (PMQ) occupants are reminded that they are liable for any fire damage to the PMQ which results from occupant negligence or other occupant related causes. All occupants are advised to ensure adequate home fire insur-

You can help us eliminate kitchen and other home fires by keeping your home as fire safe as possible and by practising good fire safety habits year round.

ance is obtained. Occupants are also reminded that every home should have at least one portable fire extinguisher. During the past three years CFB Winnipeg has had 10 PMQ fires with thousands of dollars worth of property lost. In each of these fire incidents the occupants were present and could have greatly reduced the fire loss if they would have had a fire extinguisher. If you don't have a fire extinguisher, you should purchase a ULC approved, multi purpose extinguisher with an ABC rating. An ABC rated extinguisher can be used on most combustible material, flammable liquid and electric

If you own a fire extinguisher and you are not sure of its condition, bring it to the Fire Prevention Bureau in Building 100 for a free inspection.

Other home fire safety points

- a. ensure your smoke detector is in good working condition by checking it at least monthly;
- b. have a home fire escape plan for your family and practise it regularly; and
- c. always keep your home as fire safe as possible by practising good fire safety habits year

Spring is here and things disappear!!

Spring is officially upon us and with it comes warmer temperatures, barbecues and bicycle rides in the evening. Warm weather also seems to bring out thieves.

Barbecues and bicycles are portable. It takes but a few seconds to pick up a \$300. Mountain Bike or even a Grillmaster Barbecue. With the price of things escalating all the time, a rather wise investment might be a padlock for the storage shed or a heavy chain and lock to secure the bicycles to a tree in the backyard. However, the best defence is to keep these things out of sight. After all, "Out of Sight, Out of Mind". Of course, this is not always possible or practical, a padlock and chain is a relatively inexpensive alternative.

Golf Club News

With the arrival of the sum- ous hazards. The club has made mer months and opening day rapidly approaching at the CFB Winnipeg Golf Course, your Committee would like to tell you more about the course.

It takes years to develop a challenging golf course, but those who believe in the viability of such a facility on base hope that the course in 1988 will attract beginners (club rental available) as well as intermediate and expert golfers interested in a good practice round on our Par 3's and 4's at noon or just before or after working hours (if mother won't let you stay out late to travel to and play other courses). Its proximity to PMQs and very reasonable family membership rates also make it ideal for dependants during the daytime or for dad (or mom) to prepare his children for the PGA or LPGA.

During the 1987 season, pioneers with a vision laid out the course and built up greens with sweat, a mixture of topsoil and sand and tempermental seeds. The 1988 crew took over this spring and is happy to report the following progress: 2 or 3 inches of topsoil was added to the greens and good quality sod (5 grades above Aircom HQ's front lawn) was purchased and laid on by the sponsors on 7 May. Full time help is rolling the greens and watering and encouraging every blade of grass to grow. The staff has relieved sponsors of most of the daily chores so they can concentrate on filling the seams with topsoil (soon to be seeded) and putting on their thinking caps to modify the course with treacherits home in Bldg 31 which is ready to receive the course maintenance equipment: push and motorized greens and fairway mowers as well as the trailer mounted water tank and farm tractor donated by Mike Doyle. Club assets also include flags, a hole cutter and cups, a park bench (CWO Smith may need a rest before attacking the Wartime Pilot and Observers Association's hole #6) and a fridge (again donated by Mike Doyle - his kitchen sink is next).

The Committee is just getting in gear and plans for the immediate future include putting the final touch on the Tee Boxes and, given \$3,000 or 30 more regular memberships for 1988, the installation of a much needed deep well between #4 and #7 greens. Tender loving care will be given to bring the greens and fairways to the desired standard and course improvements, such as the installation of culverts, are

also short term goals. A few words about the Committee members. Our Head Greens Keepers, CWO Keith Swift and Mr Mike Doyle, have been key players and have planned and coordinated all the work completed to date in 1988. Capt J.P. Charbonneau is standing by his phone at Local 5145 to receive applications for Chartered Membership (\$250.00 for 1988 and 1989 and guaranteed right to a membership anytime in the future, \$125.00 for a 1988 family membership and \$100.00 for a 1988 membership). Capt Cliff Beattie is restraining the other Committee members from

spending more dollars than are available. He loves money and will also accept membership applications at Local 5823. WO Leo Fraser is responsible for Clubhouse operations. In 1988, a paid membership will ensure you access to the course 7 days a week or you can drop your \$3.00 for 9 holes or \$5.00 for all day in an envelope at the Club house. Sgt Doug Galusha is busy getting the equipment ready for the season. Major Cyril McFate, in addition to his duties as Tournament Chairman, this year again the Early Bird outing will be at the Wasagaming Golf Course on 4-5 Jun 88, has been our very active publicity representative. His job of promoting the course would be much easier if the course was fully developed, but membership dollars are required to bring it up to the required standard.

Revised Dependants / Regime de sains dentaires Dental Personnes à charge

Improvements to the existing Canadian Forces Dependants Dental Care Plan have been authorized by Treasury Board, effective 1 June 1988. This follows approval by Treasury Board of similar revisions to the Public Service Dental Care Plan.

Highlights of the new improved plan are as follows:

- Members premium contributions will cease with the May payment and the full cost for coverage beginning 1 June 1988 will be paid by the employer. Cancellation of pay allotments of members in the CF plan will be actioned by Director Pay Services, NDHQ.
- · All eligible spouses and children will be covered including those of members who were not enrolled in the present plan.
- Coverage will be extended to age 25 for dependant children attending an educational institution full-time.
- · Orthodontics treatment for your children in progress when you joined the plan is now covered, retroactive to the date their coverage became effective. Orthodontic treatment which began before you joined the plan and continued after you joined is covered even though treatment may now be finished.
- · Fee schedules used to pay claims will be updated regularly, beginning with the use of the schedules in effect on 1 July,

1987 for expenses incurred on or after 1 April 1988.

- · The lifetime limit for orthodontic expenses rises from 1 000 dollars to 1 500 dollars per covered child on 1 June 1988 and to 2 000 dollars on 1 June 1989.
- Benefits reimbursed at 80 per cent will be reimbursed at 90 per cent beginning 1 June 1990.
- All Regular Force members, and members of the Reserve Forces on Class 'C' service, with dependants, will atuomatically be covered effective 1 June 1988. No enrolment is required. It is emphasized that members must ensure that changes in marital or dependant status are reported to their unit record service (URS) as quickly as possible since Director Personnel Information Systems, NDHQ, will provide dependant enrolment information to Great-West Life based on URS input.
- · Members who enrol in the Canadian Forces on or after 1 June 1988 are not eligible for coverage in the new plan until after completion of three months service.

New information booklets will be printed and distributed as soon as possible. Members should continue to use existing claim forms until advised otherwise.

Le Conseil du Trésor a approuvé plusieurs modifications intéressantes au Régime de soins dentaires pour les personnes à charge des militaires des FC. La plupart de ces changements sont entrés en vigueur le 1er juin. Ces modifications correspondent à celles apportées au Régime dentaire de la Fonction publique fédérale.

Voici les points saillants du régime amélioré:

- · Les militaires ont cessé de contribuer au régime après le paiement de mai et l'employeur a assumé tous les coûts de couverture à compter du 1er juin 1988. L'annulation des délégations de solde des militaires qui appartiennent au régime des FC est effectuée par le QGDN/DS solde.
- Tous les époux/épouses et les enfants admissibles sont couverts, même ceux des militaires qui n'appartenaient pas au régime actuel;
- Les enfants à charge sont couvents jusq'à l'âge de 25 ans s'ils étudient à plein temps dans une maison d'enseignement.
- · Les soins orthodontiques pour vos enfants avant débuté avant votre adhésion au régime sont maintenant couverts rétroactivement à partir de la date d'entrée en vigueur de leur couverture. Les soins orthodontiques qui ont débuté avant votre adhésion au régime de soins dentaires pour se poursuivre après celle-ci sont couverts par le régime, même si les traitesont maintenant ments terminés.
- Les guides de tarifs utilisés pour payer les réclamations seront révisés régulièrement; ceux en vigueur au 1er juillet 1987 seront appliqués pour rembourser les dépenses encourues à compter du 1er avril 1988.
- La limite à vie des frais d'orthodontie remboursables a été portée de \$1 000 à \$1 500 par enfant assuré au 1er juin 1988 et sera portée à \$2000 le 1er juin 1989.
- Les services remboursés à 80 p. cent sont remboursés à 90 p. cent depuis le 1er juin 1990.
- Tous les militaires des forces régulières et des forces de réserve en service de classe C qui ont des personnes à charge sont automatiquement couverts depuis le 1er juin 1988. Il n'y a pas d'enrôlement requis. Nous voulons souligner le fait que les militaires doivent être avisés de s'assurer que tout changement au niveau de leur état civil ou de leurs personnes à charge doit être rapporté à leur unité de soutien pour la tenue des dossiers (USTD) dès que possible puisque les entrées d'USTD qui sont soumises au QGDN/ DSIP seront utiliséss pour mettre à jour l'information d'enrôlement détenue par la Compagnie d'assurance-vie Great West.
- · Les militaires qui se sont enrôles dans les FC le ou après le 1er juin 1988 ne sont pas éligibles à la couverture du nouveau régime avant d'avoir complété trois mois de service.
- De nouveaux livrets d'information seront imprimés et distribués dès que possible. Les militaires devraient continuer d'utiliser les formulaires de réclamation qui sont présentement en vigueur jusqu'à avis du contraire.




