

The Base Chief Said...

SPORTS has become a dirty word for some. It's another area of our lives in the military which has suffered from the slashing and cutting which has taken place over the years. There was a time during my career when we had, what has to be considered, professional athletes. That is if a professional is a person who gets paid for what he does.

The period of my career that I recall best was in the late fifties, and early to mid sixties. Those had to be the hay days for sports. Now I don't want you to get the impression that I was a jock, I have never had that kind of talent, inter-section was about all I was capable of doing.

Back in 1959 we had a sports officer by the name of Major "Marvelous" Mary Thurgood. It was his opinion that a real man should either be able to administer or take a beating in the ring. My company was mustered one morning and we were asked two questions, age and weight. The purpose was soon clear, because within days, a two week boxing tournament was announced. My fight was scheduled for a Thursday night, against a rather flabby looking guy from Springhill, Nova Scotia. I figured I could take him, but no one bothered to tell me that this chap had worked in the coal mines prior to joining. I did not take me long to find out that under that flab was a well muscled young man.

My fight was about number seven on the card, and I was fighting out of the Blue corner. By the time my turn came, the score was Red corner six, Blue corner NIL. I knew that I was in trouble! I managed to stay in with the guy for two and half rounds, when he finally caught up with me. I was never a great runner either. So ended a not so bright career in the ring. It's kind of funny now, but in those days, I was not laughing, as a matter of fact, my body was sore and bruised for weeks.

Boxing was one of those sports that we did well by getting rid of. The Battalion boxing team on the whole were "punchy", and the majority were privates, and would remain so for a long as they served. They would qualify as machine gunners, one of the easiest support weapons trades, and then their careers would stagnate.

There is no way to describe the absolute delight we took in belonging to the battalion which had the best boxers in the Canadian Army. Nathan Paris, John MacNeil, Ray Downey, Nagey Harb, Rod Foster. All these men were first class boxers, and had they had the proper training, one can only speculate as to how far they might have gone on the outside.

Our hockey team in Germany was another professional group. No duties, come in to work at 1100 hrs for practice, and then play games in the evening, or on the weekends. It wasn't a bad go! There was only one string attached, and that was that they were expected to win. In those days we had a CO who's nickname was "Gold Finger", simply because, if there was a shiny trophy to be won, we were expected to win it. He was prepared to give our teams anything they wanted, as long as they brought home the gold. And you know, there wes no complaining on our part, because our accomplishments in sports, reflected in the way we did our jobs. We were winners, we knew it, and enjoyed

I had the opportunity of attending a graduation of a JLC in Penhold in February while the Prairie Regional Volleyball championships were on. I got the chance to go to two games. Both resulted in losses for Winnipeg's Mens and Ladies teams, but there was something which I was struck by, and that was that even though they were down, they never quit, always giving their best effort. I seen that same attitude in the base personnel who graduated from the JLC later that day. So there is a relationship between the way we play sports, and the way we work. By the way, CFB Winnipeg Mens'

team won the regionals, and the ladies finished third.

While serving in Germany in the 60's, it was traditional to have a Canada Day Track and Field Meet. These were most enjoyable, with keen competition, and a good time had by all.

As you might imagine, there were a few individuals in the Battalion who were all-round sportsmen. These people would play hockey in the winter, get ready for track and field, and then finish off the summer playing fastball. Quite a life! Certainly not good for a career in the forces, but a good life, none-the-less.

It is more difficult to get people interested today in representing a base/unit/section on the sports field. As mentioned before, this is as a result of fewer people to do the main jobs. There is one aspect that does bug me. There have


been a couple of cases where an individual has played for base representative team all year, then when it comes time for regional and national championships, the individual might screw up by arriving late to work, or some such thing. The solution to the problem is to deny him/ her permission to go with the team to those championships. The people with the power, are not hurting the individual, as much as they are hurting the team. There are other ways of dealing with people. Charges, counselling, Record Warnings, etc., etc., and that's how they should be dealt with.

ČFB Winnipeg has done well this year in regional and national competitions, and Quincy and I congratulate you all. As far as it goes, CFB Winnipeg does well at everything.



Overall it was a highly impressive showing by both the Base and the fighting men of the PPCLI who bolstered its teams. The future for CFB Winnipeg teams at both the Regional & National levels surely remains bright as this productive association remains, WELL DONE. VP





The preceding week to our semi-final was a very busy one indeed. The Prairie Region Baskethalf when our opponents took



Scott Lenahan — Canadian Wrestling Champion.

Scott Lenahan, 16 year old son of CP01 Chick Lenahan and Margaret, was successful in his quest for the gold medal at the Canadian Cadet Wrestling Championship held 4-6 May 89 at Sault St Marie, Ontario.

Scott, the Manitoba Cadet Champion in his weight class, captured the 70-kilogram title by defeating Rory Hildebrand of Alberta 6 to 1 in the final. The five other matches that led to his gold medal match were dominated by Lenahan who pinned four wrestlers in less than a minute and defeated Jamie McAllister of Oshawa, Ontario, 11 to 1. Scott qualified, through his victory, to represent Canada and compete at the world cadet championships August 8-14 in Liberty, Mo.

Scott's ultimate goal is to represent Canada at the '96 Olympics and he has come a long way in just four seasons of wrestling. In '87 he was the Canadian school boy champion; in '88 he was the only Grade 9 wrestler to advance to the medal round of the Canadian Cadet championship and earlier this year he was the silver medalist in one of Canada's toughest meets, the Martin Tournament in Regina, Saskatchewan, where he competed against 17 and 18 year olds.

Scott wrestles at the University of Manitoba and his coach, Bob Molle (who is also an offensive lineman for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers), attributes Scott's success to his desire, hard work and most of all his natural instinct of wanting to win at all costs. "He'll never give up," Molle said of his determined wrestler, "he just doesn't want to lose." Hard work for sure — Scott practices six days a week on the mats and also works out in the weight room for two hours each day.

Scott's training will intensify from now until the World's in August. He's very excited and looking forward to representing Canada — we wish him all the
