TORONTO, - "On Sunday, Sept. 23, thousands of people in Canada and around the world will gather at various starting lines for The Fourth Annual Terry Fox Run. They will eagerly anticipate the beginning of an event that has fostered a common bond of caring and hope. The Terry Fox Run has become a symbol of great pride and joy for many Canadians," said Linda Shier, National Run Coordinator, at a recent press conference to announce the date of the 1984 Run.

On that Sunday, people from all walks of life, from toddlers to the elderly, will run, walk or jog to raise money for cancer research. While many people will honor Terry by actively participating in the Run, others will give their time by organizing a Run site, helping on Run day, or sponsoring a participant.

or sponsoring a participant. Last year 225,867 people participated in The Terry Fox Run at 1,577 Run sites established in Canada and around the globe and raised \$3.19 million. This brings the total amount raised by the Marathon of Hope and the three annual Terry Fox Runs to over \$33.9 million for cancer research.

"Terry's determination to find a cure for cancer was unbending and he would be thrilled today to know that his Marathon of Hope is continuing through The Terry Fox Run," said Betty Fox, Honorary Co-chairman of the Run.

Sex and the CBC

Much has been written over the years on the subject of sex. It's probably one of the most fascinating topics known to mankind. As Will Rogers once said, "There may be some things better, and some things worse, but there's nothing else quite like it'

The CBC hasn't been around for as long as sex, but it was as I watched The National, one March night in 1977, that there came to me the idea of writing a study on the relationship - vague, ephemeral, and usually hilarious - between sex and the CBC.

Let me begin with the CBC. The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation has been on the scene since 1936 when it was called into being by an Act of Parliament. A brochure put out by the Corporation in 1976, reviewing the aims and objectives of the newly-formed medium, states: "For 1937 and 1938, the list of regular CBC productions included symphonic, chamber and choral music

. original plays and classics, with serial drama a particular favourite in the French service; talks, discussions, university debates; Canadian Press news bulletins; religious periods . . . " The list goes on and on. "In 1947, CBC Wednesday Night introduced a program concept that was new to North America - a full evening of ambitious and adult programming. Some new special services were introduced in these years such as fishermen's broadcasts and junior farm programs.'

Well, the CBC has always evoked varied emotions in the breasts of Canadians. I suppose the same might be said of sex. but it is not really my intention to take up woman's 20th Century burden, and write an analysis of physical passion. For those readers who are interested solely in that, I would refer them to Sappho, Ovid, the French Romantic poets, the German Romantic poets, and Miss Barbara Cartland.

Back to the CBC. That night on The National, in 1977, there was a news clip about the filming of the Harlequin Romance, The Leopard in the Snow. The announcer described the Harlequin Romance formula as virginal and nonadulterous. Then there were shown a few shots from the upcoming movie, which verified what the announcer had said it was passion with purity.

Now, to admit, even negatively, that perhaps such things as virginity and adultery existed in the bedrooms of the nation was a big step forward for the CBC, and one that left Fishermen's broadcasts an junior farm programs quite a ways behind.

But more startling was yet to come. I was listening to The Eric Friesen Show - one of those symphonic, chamber and chral music deals - one April morning in 1977, when what did my astonished ears hear but an analysis of the kiss. To be more precise, it was a review of a book by Hugh Morriss, entitled The Art of Kissing.

The reviewer was a Winnipegger named Leonard Marko, his review was in excellent taste, and the book was obviously well-written. But still, here was the CBC getting even more involved with sex and admitting that Canadians, among others, did more, upon occasion, than talk, discuss, and debate.

What was the CBC coming to, I wondered? The answer was perhaps three or four years in coming. I imagine the network was leading up to it gradually, getting ever more daring during those years, though nothing struck me so forcibly that I made a note of it.

But, in 1981, I was listening, innocently enough, to Ideas, which deals generally with philosophy, physics, and the Massey lectures. That night the subject was Canadian multiculturalism. Innocuous enough, you say. Good CBC fare. But wait. Halfway through a learned discussion of ethnic groups in Toronto - naturally - came the crunch. Gay Asians.

Not only was the CBC once more dealing with sex, it had so far departed from the "straight and narrow path between right and wrong" as to admit that not all sex was heterosexual!


It was consenting adults with a vengeance. But, I wonder. Asians, though numerous in Canada, do not make up the bulk of the country's population. Nor do homosexuals. Does being a gay Asian give one superior status as a member of a double minority? As we all know, only to the CBC would it occur to ask.

I do not know where this new-found liberation will lead our venerable network. But it would not surprise me to see the CBC plunge deeper and deeper into this heady stuff. Once the shackles of its puritan youth have been thrown off, there's no telling what the CBC might not do. There may yet come the night when The National will be the newsbreak on an uncensored showing of The Tin Drum.

Tents

Camping in a tent is a great way to enjoy the pleasures of summer. But every year an average of three cam-pers die in tent fires and many more are injured or scarred for life. If you are planning to go camping, remember these safety tips:

- Do not use candles or matches or open flames of any kind in or near a tent.

Never cook inside the tent.

Discourage smoking in tents. - Build Camp fires downwind of and at a considerable distance from the tent. Always be sure to fully ex-

tinguish camp fires before leaving camp or before retiring for the night. Practice extreme caution when

using fuel powered lanterns and heaters inside tents and use battery powered equipment whenever possible. Never refuel lamps or heaters inside a tent.

- Extinguish or turn off all lanterns and heaters before going to bed.

Keep all flammable liquids such as gasoline or kerosene in tightly capped safety cans stored out of the reach of children, in the shade, and well away from the tent.

Develop an escape plan for getting out of the tent quickly in case of emergency. Keep a knife handy to cut an escape hole in the tent should the exit become blocked.


- If your children wish to use play tents or camp out in the yard, make sure that they are closely supervised since young children have died from fires in tents used for this purpose.



RNAF BASE GILZE-RIJEN, THE NETHERLANDS - A team of five CF-104 Starfighters from CFB Baden-Soellingen descended on the Royal Netherlands Airforce Base Gilze-Rijen, 22 June, to participate in an Allied Tactical Air Meet - TAM-84.

For the next 12 days, this normally quiet one-squadron airfield, located approximately 100 kms south of Amsterdam, resounded with the roar of low flving fighter aircraft.

Approximately 800 officers and airmen from the six NATO nations which make up Allied Airforces Central Europe (AAFCE) - Belgium, Canada, West Germany, the Netherlands, who are hosting the meet, the U.K. and the U.S.A. - took part in this biennial exercise. French Airforce squadrons were also participating as invited guests.

A total of 64 Starfighters, F-4 Phantoms, F-15 Eagles, Mirage IIIs, Alpha Jets, A-10s, Jaguars and F-16s participated in TAM-84.

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The primary purpose of TAM was to practice combined tactical air operations in a realistic environment which had both "hostile" and "friendly"

"We have conducted the exercise within the Integrated Air Defence System of NATO using such elements as an airborne Early Warning aircraft (NAEW) from NATO Base Geilenkirchen, surface-to-air (SAM) missiles and short-range-air-defence systems (SHORAD), "said exercise director, Lieutenant-Colonel Frans Hartgers (Neth.).

For the pilots, as Canadian team leader, Major George Adamson explained, "our objective has been to see the tactics of other nations and to develop the co-operation we need to operate in a real combat situation."

Each day during the exercise, combined national teams of up to 19 aircraft were given targets to strike, made up of "enemy" aircraft, infantry concentrations, industrial centres or a fleet, provided by the Royal Netherlands Navy.

Various forms of electronic warfare were employed such as communications jammers, and aircraft employed self-protective electronic control measures. All flying activities at the targets were recorded on video and the tapes were

examined daily by directing staff and the teams to analyze achievements and mistakes

The I Canadian Air Group (ICAG) team included a total of 23 pilots and ground crew from 421, 439 and 441 Tactical Fighter Squadrons and from Air Maintenance Squadron, based in Baden.

The ground crew chief who ensured that the CF-104s were the best performers in TAM-84 was Warrant Officer Ivan Branscombe, from 1 Air Maintenance Squadron based in Baden-Soellingen, together with Sergeants Reg Clemens and Bob Belanger and other crew like Airframe Tech Master Corporal Dana Martin of 1 AM Squadron and Master Corporal Mike Dunham of 421 Squadron, they formed the backbone of the 1CAG team.

TAM-84 is described as a small scale live flying exercise. The first TAM was held in 1978 and has subsequently been held every second year. Prior to 1978, tactical weapons meets were held, though not in the same format as TAM.

"We've had a great exercise," commented WO Branscombe. "Apart from a few minor snags each day, mostly worn tires which had a rough ride on the anti-skid runway surface, we've maintained 100% serviceability.

Pilot, Captain Wally Neimi, summerized everyone's thoughts at the end of TAM-84 by saying, "the best aspect of the meet for all of us has been working with our allies and sharing their experiences and procedures.

TAM-84 has made a great contribution to maintaining the high level of cooperation and readiness that are required of NATO's airforces in the event of any emergency.





Who Said Pigs Can't Fly

For the past 7 1/2 years, Dakota A/C 12907 has not left the ground, (except when it was put on jacks). But now, through the dedicated, hard work of D.R.T., Miss Piggy is about to once again join her sister A/C on the flight line.

Miss Piggy, as 907 is affectionately known, entered service with the R.C.A.F. on 2 August, 1957. We, at Winnipeg received her on 21 June, 1972. Except for a 2 year tour at Cold Lake, Miss Piggy flew from Winnipeg's 429 and 402 Squadrons until 23 October, 1976. At that time 907 was assigned to a ground training role and given the designation, A754.

As A754, Miss Piggy took on the job of training aid for many different technicians, in various jobs. While this was going on, the other Daks were piling up the hours in flight time.

Because of the toll that time took on our Daks, various parts were robbed from Miss Piggy, to keep the rest of the fleet alive. This slowly led to Miss Piggy becoming out of sorts.

About a year ago, someone took pity on the old girl, and decided that she needed a major facelift. BAMEO's Douglas Racing Team was tasked to bring Miss Piggy up to fleet standard. Upon initial inspection, we knew that we had our work cut out for us. A great number of items were in need of replacement or modification.

Firstly, the engines were fired up and after that hurdle was cleared, the Douglas Racers began to inspect her, using what time could be spared, between scheduled inspections on the fleet.

Workshops and Refinishing Sections started to refurbish the interior and the Riggers set about rebuilding the flaps and undercarriage, while the Fitters removed the two engines. Slowly, Miss Piggy began the transformation back to becoming better than she once was.

Then... in May of this year the ARO, MWO Taylor brought the news that Miss Piggy would undergo a MAJOR inspection, for the purpose of re-activation to operational flying status. The inspection was to include X-ray of the wings, new engines, and a vast array of special inspections and modifications.

With a definite goal in mind, DRT set out on this job with all the professionalism that they could muster up. Within the first 3 days, the wings and the landing gear were removed, and ready for the NDT people from Moose Jaw. Once NDT was carried out, and we knew the wings and gear were serviceable, we set about putting the A/C back together. This included 2 shiney new power plants.

All this time, Avionics were being added, or modified, and the Safety Systems, Refinishers, and Metal Techs were refurbishing the interior and exterior sections.

Throughout the entire inspection, Supply Section was kept on it's toes with a constant barrage of demands for parts. They performed extremely well under the added workload.

After about a month of long days Miss Piggy is now ready for the Aircrew to take her up for a long deserved test flight. Upon completion of this, the new 907 will be flown to AMDU in Trenton, for a DLIR before entering active service again. Written by: Cpl Jeorge Jamieson & Cpl Bill Huffman

Army Cadet Rifle Course Miss Piggy Flies

The 1984 session of the Prairie Army Cadet Rifle Course, CFB Winnipeg, officially opened on July 7 with the arrival of 52 cadets.

The 40 males and 12 females participating in the six-week course staged on the St. Charles Rifle Range, Winnipeg, represent Army Cadet Corps from across Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario.

Under the command of LCol R.S. Abbott, CD, the staff consists of regular force and CIL personnel plus experienced civilian instructors from across Western Canada.

This course introduces the Cadets to the art of full-bore shooting and provides an excellent opportunity to improve on their skills and practice safety precautions emphasized at all times. The course also prepares the cadets to step-into coaching positions upon returning to their home units. In addition, it also prepares the cadets for National Competition and presents the opportunity to earn a place on the Army Cadet Bisley Team in 1985.

Four weeks into their training the cadets have the opportunity to compete against civilian shooters during the annual Manitoba Provincial Rifle Association (MPRA) meet on the first weekend in August. The combined results of this meet and their own 3-day matches determines the 20 place Ottawa team.

In Ottawa, the team competes with the Cadet teams from the other four rifle courses across Canada in the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association (DCRA) National Matches. The top 25 shooters from the five courses combined will meet in Victoria in the spring of '85 for the shoot-off. The top 18 will travel to Bisley, England for the International Matches in the summer of the same year.



CDT McLean, S., CDT Brugger, M. and CDT Barlow, J. all from Winnipeg, Manitoba will be escorting the flag. And CDT Lowe, A. from Calgary, Alberta will be right marker. Platoon Commanders are CDT Schultz E. and CDT Spaven R. both of Winnipeg, Man.

The cadets who do not travel to Ottawa remain in Winnipeg to improve their coaching abilities and participate in other activities.

The return of the team in Mid-August marks the end of the course and everyone is caught up in "Operation Homeward Bound," and farewell to CFB Winnipeg until PRACRC 1985.

OTTAWA - Two Canadian Forces medical officers involved in a daring and difficult rescue attempt have been awarded commendations by the Chief of the Defence Staff, General G.C.E. Thériault.

On Oct. 25, 1983, Majors Barry Armstrong and Charles Buckley from the National Defence Medical Centre came to the aid of Steven Gerald Bednas, 19, of Ottawa who was caught in a cardboard shredder.


The victim was in shock and had lost a considerable quantity of blood. Realizing that it was imperative to get him to a hospital immediately, the two officers, assisted by Dr. Justin Maloney of the Ottawa General Hospital, had to amputate the patient's legs at the knee.

Afterwards, the victim's chest had to be opened in order to reactivate his heart. As the scalpel from the energency supplies he was carrying had been dulled, Dr. Armstrong resorted to a borrowed pen-knife.

The patient was then stabilized and taken to hospital. Because of the trauma he had suffered however, he was in a coma and, regrettably, never recovered.

Nevertheless, Majors Armstrong and Buckley responded to the emergency in a timely, aggressive and thoroughly professional manner. Their quick thinking and resourcefullness helped to preserve the victim's life and to stabilize his vital signs.

MOVE IN CLOSE

One of the main causes of disappointing summer pictures is the photographer's failure to get close enough to the subject. A shot taken from a distance with several different points of interest is not as effective as one that fills the frame with the most important subject. Moving in close will help you focus only on the essential elements of the subject, creating greater impact and interest for viewers.

You can physically move yourself and the camera closer to the subject to eliminate busy, unattractive backgrounds. With some cameras you can switch lenses to ones that will magnify

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the subject. There are also gadgets you can attach to your lens that will let you get closer than normal to your subject.



Keep your eye on the viewfinder to determine how close is enough.

Many cameras can focus as close as ten inches to the subject and have through-the-lens viewing. You see exactly what the camera will photograph and this is useful in composing your pictures as tightly as possible.

By filling the entire frame with your subject, the viewer has no difficulty in understanding what you wish to show with your photograph!



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


