Fascinating is the word for the collection of coins. Besides coin collectors, there are all kinds of collectors. Some people collect stamps or works of art. Others find stones, ship models, clocks, dolls, or old maps irresistible. Some are greatly absorbed in buttons, pencils; others treasure old-time phonograph recordings, while quite a few cherish snakes.

We may raise our eyebrows at the man who gives all his spare time to collecting beetles; but we may be sure that he prizes his treasures just as keenly as we prize our coins. Yet, of all the different kinds of collecting hobbies, coin collecting has a special attraction of its own. Coins are miniature works of art. They are beautiful to look at and many a collector has given a lifetime to repeatedly studying his favourite coins.

There is an added pleasure, of course, in possessing coins that are hard to get. These are not always necessarily expensive, for they sometimes turn up by chance in the most unexpected places — in the proverbial attic or occasionally in an otherwise almost worthless heap of ordinary coins. And, sur-

prising as it may seem, quite valuable coins are found in ordinary change.

The next meeting of our Astra Numismatic Society, the Station's Coin Club, is to be held on Tuesday, 25th of June at 2000 hours in the GIS theatre of ANS. It would be a good idea to attend this meeting next Tuesday because there will be no meetings during July and August. This was voted upon at our last general meeting.

So if you have two hours to spare during the evening next Tuesday we'd like to see you all there.

MANITOBA OUTDOOR BRIEFS

This year many anglers are dreaming about the Province of Manitoba because of an eight-page folder called "Manitoba Master Angler Awards" — the latest thing in do-it-yourself "fish finders".

The little brochure contains no pictures and no high-powered promotion copy — just a list of 500-odd names of fishermen, the fish they landed, what they weighed and, most important, where they were caught.

To qualify for this award list an angler must land fish equaling or exceeding certain minimum weights such as 20 pounds for lake trout, 18 pounds for northern pike and four pounds for brook (speckled) trout.

The 1962 list pegs Reed Lake, in Grass River Provincial Park, as top spot for big northerns in quantity with Kississing and Gods Lakes close competitors. All are in the northern area.

Famed Gods Lake produced most of the year's big lake trout including the largest, 49 lbs. 8 ozs. Gods River completely dominated the brook trout division with the biggest fish of this species weighing 7 lbs. 6 ozs.

Star-gazers and fly fishermen would appear to have little in common. Yet, in Northern Manitoba this July, the star-gazers may be fly fishing and the fly fishermen may be star gazing.

The event that will fuse their respective pursuits is a total eclipse of the sun at 3.40 p.m. (C.S.T.) July 20. By coincidence the prime North American spot to observe this cosmic oddity is Mile 304 on the famed Hudson Bay Railway, one of Manitoba's better brook trout fishing areas.

Astronomers from all over the world will be at Mile 304 with telescopes and cameras poised for the eclipse. At the same time many will likely have fishing gear in readiness to try out nearby Kettle River and other streams along the H.B.R. line.

For this occasion the railway's "Muskeg Special" becomes the "Eclipse Special" transporting astronomer-fishermen from Winnipeg 800 miles north to beyond the 56th parallel. This American-plan mobile "hotel" will be parked

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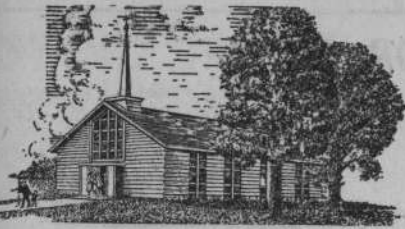

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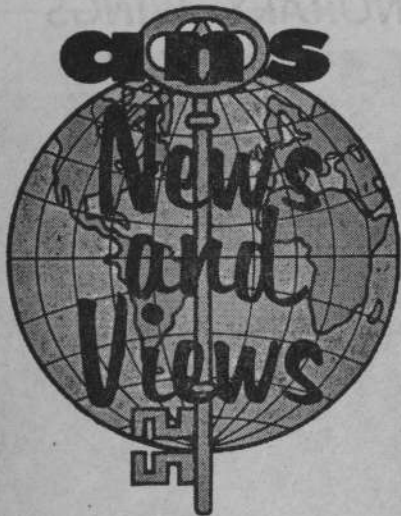

Just about everybody fishes in Manitoba. A three-year record of non-resident angling license sales shows residents of 48 states and the District of Columbia have come to this Canadian province to seek the big ones. Greatest fans of Manitoba fishing are anglers from North Dakota, Minnesota, Illinois, Iowa and Wisconsin, in that order. The two "hold-out" states are Delaware and Alaska. In 1962 there was one lone fisherman from the State of Maine.

game fish. This time it's the kokanee, little brother of the famous sockeye salmon. Over 200,000 kokanee fry were stocked in eight Manitoba lakes and streams last year after the hatching of eggs received from the state of Washington. A native of Idaho, Oregon and Alaska, the kokanee is a landlocked salmon that grows to about one pound and is excellent eating.

Acquisition of wetlands for waterfowl in Manitoba will be getting a boost from federal funds in future. An agreement recently signed by the province and the dominion pledges federal assistance for setting aside low-grade lands, unsuited to agriculture because of wetness, flood danger, poor soil or rough topography, as waterfowl habitat or for other wildlife purposes.

A provision of the new Wildlife Act just enacted makes it unlawful to shoot a bear except to protect life or property. So, "Yogi" figures he'll be safe as long as he doesn't pinch the picnic baskets. However, his elation may be short-lived. The new act also provides for declaration of a bear shooting season in future.

For the first time in its history Manitoba may shortly allow operation of commercial shooting preserves. Under new legislation, owners of private land could be permitted to raise wild birds and charge a fee to hunters who wish to shoot them. However, the birds will have to be non-native species such as pheasant, quail or chukar partridge. Hunters will be required to hold a valid license to shoot on the preserves.

PMC SAFETY LANE

The Safety Lane check was completed 31 May 63. There were 165 rejects out of 1,585 cars processed. 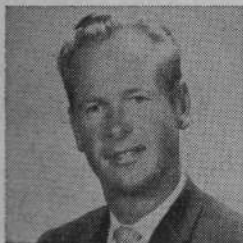

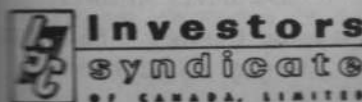

For the past two years 111 KU has been operating a flying boat which was designed for use as a search and rescue aircraft. The Albatross, CSR 110 built by Grumann, replaced the aged WW 11 Canso as a primary search aircraft but most SAR units still operate venerable Dakotas.

The configuration of the CSR 110 makes it ideal as a search vehicle. It is triphibious in that it can operate from land, water or snow and ice with no major modifications. The normal cruising speed is 160 knots (177 wph) (mach 0.24); the maximum endurance is over 16 hours and the maximum range is 1700 nautical miles.

A normal crew consists of two pilots, navigator, radio officer, two para-rescue personnel and a crewman. The crew has it "real soft" in accommodations. The seats are padded and there are no sharp corners to raise bumps. A galley, complete with oven, hot plates and hot cups, gives a big boost to morale on a long trip and the hot meals provided beat box lunches every time.

The pilots have two 1500 BHP Pratt and Whitney engines plus 4-1000 lb. thrust JATO bottles to boost the CSR 110 into the air and reversible propellers to cut the landing roll to a minimum. There are the normal flight instruments, ILS etc., but soon "the front office" will have TACAN to supplement the dual radio compasses. The pilots have both UHF and VHF search/homing equipment and a radio/radar altimeter to assist in water landings.

The radio officer is rather cramped for working space but is compensated by having a seat up front with a beautiful view (a great improvement over the claustrophobic hole in the Dakota). The communication equipment that he works with is above average, two HF sets (ARC 38 and 10 channel crystal controlled CMA 101/201), a multi-channel UHF and similar VHF radios. The RO also has the SARAH set for search and homing.

The CSR 110 is one of the best navigation equipped aircraft in the RCAF. The navigator has a roomy working area though it is a little noisy from the position between the engines. His navigation gear makes up for any discomfort he may experience. He has a TAS meter, APS 31 radar, Doppler N1 and C2 compass system, high speed API, APN 70 Loran, dual radio compass and soon he will have

TACAN and a ground position indicator hook-up from the API and Doppler.

In the rear there is provision for stretchers for mercy missions and air evacuations, but the normal search setup consists of two heat blisters and two "picture windows". The passengers or spotters can sit in comfort whether spotting or relaxing.

The Albatross is definitely a first search and rescue aircraft and the only comment to be heard from the crews is, "Let's have a few more."

as a result of A/V/M Carscallen's

In his address to the graduates,

flying boats which had five hours
fuel and now had a second pilot
who was also the navigator. Winds
were obtained by back bearings on
smoke floats by day and flame
floats by night. A transmitter and
a receiver were now carried, plus
a couple of pigeons in the event
our equipment failed. By 1941 we
had professional navigators and
radio officers, but our instruments
were still very primitive as com-
pared to present day equipment.
How times have changed! With
today's equipments and techniques
our 200-mile patrols of those early
days seem very insignificant in-
deed.

"You are now Aircrew Officers
of the Royal Canadian Air Force,
and more than ever before, you
will be called upon to uphold its
highest standards of integrity, loy-
alty and self-discipline. But most
important, is the responsibility
which you inherit as Officers. I
know that each of you will fulfill
your responsibilities in a manner
of which the RCAF and the citi-
zens of Canada can be justly proud.

"I am pleased indeed to see such
a fine attendance of parents, fam-

FIRE PRE

A recent fire in a Station PMQ
was caused by children playing
with flammable liquids. The serious
danger of this cannot be stressed
too strongly, and all parents are
to ensure flammable liquids are
placed out of reach of children.
Following is an excerpt from EC
125-100AA-2 Part 8 para 4, Hand-
book of Fire Prevention Regula-
tions, relating to the storage of
flammable liquids in PMQ's.

MARRIED QUARTERS

With the increased use of power
mowers, outboard motors, cam-
stoves, etc., the occupants of mar-
ried quarters often require quan-
ties of flammable liquid fuels. In
addition, the "do it yourself" hob-
byists, utilizing areas for various
hobbies entailing the use of paint
and thinners, is quite prevalent. It
is not the intention of this EO to
ban these liquids, but rather to
limit them to safe maximum quan-
tities, and control the type of con-
tainer to ensure maximum safety,
by preventing accidental spillage
leaking containers, etc.

- (a) The quantity of flammable li-
quid that may be kept in mar-
ried quarters areas shall not
exceed the following limits for
each dwelling unit, including
other outbuildings such as
garages:

A normal crew consists of two pilots, navigator, radio officer, two para-rescue personnel and a crewman. The crew has it "real soft" in accommodations. The seats are padded and there are no sharp corners to raise bumps. A galley, complete with oven, hot plates and hot cups, gives a big boost to morale on a long trip and the hot meals provided beat box lunches every time.

The pilots have two 1500 BHP Pratt and Whitney engines plus 4-1000 lb. thrust JATO bottles to boost the CSR 110 into the air and reversible propellers to cut the landing roll to a minimum. There are the normal flight instruments, ILS etc., but soon "the front office" will have TACAN to supplement the dual radio compasses. The pilots have both UHF and VHF search/homing equipment and a radio/radar altimeter to assist in water landings.

The radio officer is rather cramped for working space but is compensated for having a seat up front with a beautiful view (a great improvement over the claustrophobic hole in the Dakota). The communication equipment that he works with is above average, two HF sets (ARC 38 and 10 channel crystal controlled CMA 101/201), a multi-channel UHF and similar VHF radios. The RO also has the SARAH set for search and homing.

The CSR 110 is one of the best navigation equipped aircraft in the RCAF. The navigator has a roomy working area though it is a little noisy from the position between the engines. His navigation gear makes up for any discomfort he may experience. He has a TAS meter, APS 31 radar, Doppler N1 and C2 compass system, high speed API, APN 70 Loran, dual radio compass and soon he will have
