## New Boss's Qualifications Include Anti Submarine Sqn

WINNIPEG — Simcoe native, Major-General Larry A. Ashley, was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-General August 1, 1986 and on the same date assumed command of Air Command during ceremonies held at the Command's headquarters in Winnipeg.

Air Command is the largest command in the Canadian Forces. Comprised of six functional air groups, the Command's 650 aircraft and 33,000 military and civilian personnel are located at 37 bases and stations across Canada.

Maj.-Gen. Ashley was born in Simcoe, Ont. October 2, 1937. After completing his secondary schooling in Simcoe, he attended the Royal Military College of Canada, Kingston, Ont. as a naval cadet graduating in 1959 with a Bachelor of Science degree. The following year he completed pilot training with the Royal Canadian Air Force and served with several naval air squadrons as a naval aviator. As well, he qualified as an aerospace engineer and served in a wide range of flight test and technical assignments.


During his career, Maj.-Gen. Ashley commanded both 406 Maritime Training Squadron and 423 Anti-Submarine Squadron. Both units were located at Canadian Forces Base Shearwater, N.S.

After a one-year tour as senior staff officer, maritime, at Air Command Headquarters in Winnipeg, Maj.-Gen. Ashley returned to CFB Shearwater as Base Commander in 1977. Two years later he was named Director of Air Requirements at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa, a position he held until 1981 when he was promoted to the rank of brigadier-general and posted to Brunssum, The Netherlands, where he served as Chief of Military Factors for the NATO Airborne Early Warning and Control program.

Upon his promotion to Maj.-Gen. in August 1983, he was named Chief of Air Doctrine and Operations, once again at National Defence Headquarters.

In November 1985, Maj.-Gen. Ashley was appointed to the Order of Military Merit in the Grade of Commander. The appointment was made in recognition of conspicuous merit and exceptional military service.

Maj. Gen. Ashley is married to Gail Berry of St. Thomas, Ont. They have

# CF 18's flypast mark arrival of new Commander of Air Command

WINNIPEG — Lieutenant-General Larry A. Ashley assumed command of Canada's air force on Friday, August 1, 1986 during a ceremony held at Canadian Forces Base Winnipeg.

LGen Ashley took over as Commander Air Command from LGen Donald McNaughton who left Winnipeg to become Deputy Commander-in-Chief, North American Aerospace Defence Command, at Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Among the dignitaries on hand to

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witness the ceremony were Manitoba's Lieutenant-Governor, The Honourable Pearl McGonigal and Canada's new Chief of the Defence Staff, General Paul D. Manson. The Central Band of the Canadian Forces performed during the ceremony and 80 personnel from CFBs Winnipeg and Portage la Prairie were on parade. A three-plane formation of CF-18s conducted a fly-past to mark the occasion.

Before being named to succeed

LGen McNaughton, LGen Ashley was Chief of Air Doctrine and Operations at National Defence Headquarters. A native of Simcoe, Ontario, LGen Ashley graduated from Royal Military College, Kingston, in 1959 and served with the naval air arm. He later served in a variety of appointments in Canada and overseas, including Base Commander of CFB Shearwater and Chief of the Military Factors Division in the NATO Airborne Early Warning and Control program at Brunssum, the

Netherlands. In 1985 he was made a Commander of the Order of Military Merit in recognition of his exceptional military service.

As Commander Air Command, LGen Ashley is responsible for over 33,000 military and civilian personnel at over 30 bases and stations across the country. Air Command, which was established in 1975 as a successor to the Royal Canadian Air Force, is largest command in the Canadian Forces.



## Some Scientists are old Crov

On 24 April 1986, the Association of Old Crows executive approved the formation of the Sir William S. Stephenson Chapter of the A.O.C.

The Association of Old Crows is a professional association comprised of individuals engaged in the science of electronic warfare and related disciplines. The membership is civilian in nature and includes scientists, engineers, managers, operators, educators and military personnel of all ranks

The AOC was organized in 1964 to provide a forum for the exchange of information on the technical and operational aspects of EW and related fields. Since its inception, the AOC has grown to over 87 chapters with more than 23,000 members in 48 countries.

The name Old Crow originated in WWII when some Allied bombing aircraft were equipped with radio and radar receivers to monitor the enemy. and transitters to jam enemy frequencies. The common codeword for this equipment was "Raven". Operators on these missions were called "Raven Operators". Common jargon later changed the term "Raven" to "Crow". The Association, like the Raven Operators, adopted the Crow with the electronic foot as its logo.

When the Winnipeg Chapter of the AOC was in its formative stage, a suitable name was sought to commemorate Canadian contributions to Electronic Warfare and its related disciplines. The foundation of good Electronic Warfare is good Intelligence and the organizing committee chose the name "Sir William S. Stephenson" codename Intrepid. Those who have read "A Man called Intrepid" will agree that Stephenson's contributions to the Allied cause, in WWII, in the field of intelligence and electronics is significant. Furthermore, Stephenson was born in the Winnipeg area.



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

LCol R.M. (Robin) Barnes was born and raised in Victoria BC. He is married to the former Margaret (Peg) Mitchell and they have two children, Ken 21 and Deana 19. Prior to joining the RCAF in 1962, he flew privately and commercially on the west coast between 1958 and 1962.

After training at Centralia, Penhold, Portage and Rivers, he was posted to Air Navigation Flight School Winnipeg for conversion to the Dakota aircraft. In the same year, 1963, he was posted to 111 KU (later 440 Sqn) Winnipeg for em ployment as a SAR pilot flying the Albatross, Dakota, Expeditor and T33 aircraft. 1966 found him posted to 103 RU Greenwood for further SAR duties on the Albatross which continued with the formation of 413 Sqn and a move to Summerside in 1967. Charleston South Carolina where he flew C141 aircraft and was the Tactics Officer for the 20th Sqn. On return from the USA in Jul 1982, LCol Barnes completed the continuous French language course followed by a tour at CFB Edmonton as the Base Operations Officer.

LCol Eric Carscadden was born in Russell Ont in May 1938. He is married to the former Elaine Morrow of Russel and they have two daughters.

LCol Carscadden enlisted in the RCAF in Sep 1956 and graduated from the Air Navigation School in Winnipeg as a Radio Officer in Jan 1957. He flew on the Neptune and Argus aircraft with 405 Sqn in Greenwood Nova Scotia until 1962 when he was posted to the Argus Trainer, where he instructed in maritime procedures for the next three years. Following a short tour with 405 Sqn he was posted to 437 Sqn in Trenton in 1965 where he flew on the Yukon until he commenced pilot training in Nov 1967.

Following pilot training at Gimli and Portage la Prairie Manitoba he was posted to 424 Sqn Trenton where he flew Dakota and Twin Otter aircraft in the Transport and Search and Rescue roles. In 1973 he moved to 436 Sqn Trenton where he flew CC130 aircraft in all its varied roles.

In 1977 he was promoted to Major and moved to the Directorate of Air Requirements in NDHQ Ottawa where he was responsible for the initial procurement and major modification of medium and heavy transport aircraft. In that capacity he acted as Program Director for the Dash 7 aircraft acquisition program and as Program Sponsor of the new CC140 Hercules Simulator.

In 1980 he returned to Trenton as Chief Pilot Instructor CC130 Hercules aircraft at 426 Sqn and a year later was appointed as Chief Flying Instructor for all transport aircraft. He attended the Armed Forces Staff College at Norfolk, Virginia from Jan to Jun 1983 after which he was posted to ATGHQ Trenton where he became Staff Officer Standards & Evaluation on the Hercules and Dash 7 aircraft. In Jan 1984 he was promoted to his present rank and appointed CO 429 Squadron.



# Canada is at the forefront of employment of women in CF

OTTAWA - The Honourable Perrin Beatty, Minister of National Defence, has announced that aircrew positions in the Canadian Armed Forces are now open to women. The Chief of the Defence Staff, General Gerard C.E. Thériault, in one of his last decisions before retiring last Friday as head of Canada's Armed Forces, ordered that women will now be eligible to fly as pilots, air navigators and flight engineers (officer and non-commissioned member) in a wide variety of aircraft, including the 170-passenger Bocing 707; the C-130 Hercules and other transport aircraft; the CH-113 Labrador and CH-135 Twin Huey helicopters used for search and rescue; the CT-114 Tutor jet used for pilot training and the T-33 Silver Star in the utility/communications relay role.

Beatty said that Canada is, with a handful of other nations, at the forefront of the employment of women in military service.

The number of women serving in the Canadian Forces has risen from a controlled ceiling of 1,,500 in 1971, to approximately 7,400 today, which represents 8.9 per cent of the Regular Force. Within NATO only the United States, with 9.5 per cent, has a higher percentage of women in the military. Of all the countries of the world fewer than five are known to have a higher percentage of women in their armed forces. Beatty added that the Canadian Armed Forces is fully committed to the government's policy concerning the charter of Rights and Freedoms while ensuring the provision of operationally effective forces in order to continue to provide peace and security at home and abroad.

Since March, 1986 when the Chief of the Defence Staff established the Charter Task Force, approximately 3,500 additional positions in the Canadian Armed Forces have been designated as mixed-gender positions. The Charter Task Force was formed following the Government's response to the Equality Rights sub-committee which tabled its report in Parliament March 4, 1986. It will submit its final report on 1 October 1986. So far, as a result of Charter Task Force recommendations, twelve military occupations such as intelligence operator and search and rescue technician have been designated mixed-gender. The naval architecture specialty has become a mixed-gender sub-occupation in the maritime engineering field. Additional recommendations by the task force are expected to be made prior to the completion of the final report. Presently, 73 per cent (approximately 35,500) of the military occupations in the Canadian Armed Forces are now open to mixed-gender employment.

# MP talk Some basic security principles include cancelling all mail

With the coming of spring and summer each year, an increase in crimes against property is readily discernible. CFB Winnipeg (North) is within the jurisdictional area of Winnipeg Police Department, District No. 2. Of six districts in Winnipeg, District No. 2 has the lowest crime rate, however, the 1984 Statistical Report shows that 4760 crimes were committed against property. CFB Winnipeg (South) is within the jurisdictional area of Winnipeg Police Department, District No. 6. The same statistical report shows that there were 9502 crimes committed against property.

There are not enough policemen to assign one to each home! Therefore, crime prevention is up to everyone. You must watch each other's homes and be security conscious of your surroundings. Apply some basic home security principles: Lock your garage doors, record the make, model and serial numbers of the items in the garage, secure all doors and windows. arrange for someone to maintain your lawns when you are on vacation (uncut lawns and neglected gardens are invitations to house breakers), leave some inside lights on or set automatic timers for dusk, cancel all mail and paper deliveries, inform the Military Police that your home is unoccupied, and most important, arrange for a neighbour to pick up your mail.

Neighbourhood Watch Works. Neighourhood Watch is simply a program of neighbours watching other's property during times when burgaries are likely to occur. A police officer patrolling your community may not recognize a stranger in your yard, but your neighbours would. For the program to be totally effective, each resident must get involved in both security improvement and observation. Write down the description of any suspicious persons, get the make, model, colour and licence number of strange vehicles and then inform the police and other members of the Neighbourhood Watch. Keep an eye on strangers and unauthorized solicitors.

Join Operation Identification. Sign out an engraver from the Military Police and permanently mark all your easily stolen valuables with an electric engraving pencil so they can be identified. Use your Social Insurance or Driver's Licence number which are strictly your own. Advertise what you have done by displaying Operation Identification stickers where burglars can see them.

This is your neighbourhood, your homes and your valuables. Get involved and make this area a safe place to live. If you see vandalism taking place, tell the vandals to stop and advise the police. Vandals, like burglars, prefer to commit their crimes where they are unlikely to be seen. Remember — Crime Prevention is up to you.

Why more joy for all? Because the results of being arrested for impaired driving or of being involved in an accident while impaired are unpleasant and unhappy for those involved. The causing of injury or death ensures unpleasant memories, not only for the family and friends of the injured or deceased but for the impaired driver who must carry that memory forever.

Should you be involved in a drinking/driving/stopped by police situation you will never forget the procedures followed to process you through the initial arrest to final sentencing of fine/loss of license or jail and the stigma of having the title "DRUNK DRIVER". That's without an accident!

What happens when you are stopped by the police and suspected of being impaired? The arresting police officer will do the following: he will; confirm your identity, advise you that you are under arrest for impaired driving, search and handcuff you if necessary, read you the breathalyzer demand, advise you of the right to retain and instruct counsel, read you your Caution, ensure you are aware of where you are being taken to be tested by a breathalyzer technician and finally, will read to you the Breathalyzer Refusal Demand.

The biggest hassle of your life has just begun. Assuming the breathalyzer indicates impairment (otherwise this article doesn't have a leg to stand on), you will be issued a court appearance notice and charged for the offence committed. If convicted, Section 239 of the Criminal Code of Canada dictates the following penalties:

- 1. 1st offence minimum fine \$300.00
- 2. 2nd offence not less than 14 days imprisonment
- 3. maximum penalty \$2000.00 4. each subsequent offence — not less
- than 90 days imprisonment with a maximum penalty of 5 years.

Should it be proven that your impaired driving caused bodily harm or death, the penalties imposed may be to a maximum of 10 or 14 years respectively. That is one long haul and does not exclude your memories or your own family's sufferings.

To assist in keeping you off the road should you have had a "few" drinks, the CFB Winnipeg Military Police are now equipped with an "Alcohol Level Evaluation Roadside Tester", com-monly referred to as "ALERT". This device is an on-the-spot tester which has three lights (green, amber and red) to indicate your degree of sobriety. A Green ng not under any alcoholic influence and are therefore capable of continuing on your way. An "Amber" light indicates you are near the .08 limit and will have a measurable reduction in your driving reflexes. On the activation of an amber light, your driver's license will be suspended for 6 hours. Should the "red" or "fail" light be activated, your license will be suspended immediately for 12 hours and at the same time you will be processed in the manner described earlier in this article. A refusal to take the "Alert" test is a chargeable offense.

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
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# Mainstream Canada Age should be no barrier

Retirement, it seems to me, is probably one of those thingslike summer vacation-where the anticipation outshines the reality.

Vacation dreams don't include mosquitos on the dock, or lost luggage, or line-ups at the best tourist spots.

Nor do retirement fantasies ever spend much time on health concerns, the shrinking value of the fixed income or the difficulty of shifting gears from a busy schedule to planning for an endless string of Saturdays.

There are many who would say stop right there, you're all wet. "I've worked hard and deserve a break from the workaday world."

Fair enough, but we've all heard enough stories about, or perhaps experienced close-up, retirements that didn't go as planned, to say the least.

All of which is to raise the question of mandatory retirement. Why should anyone be forced to retire at 65, or at any age for that matter, if you want to get down to the principle involved?

The federal government has moved recently to scrap mandatory retirement for public servants, a move which is expected to influence the provinces and their bureaucrats.

At the same time, though, the forced gold watch syndrome is becoming more common because most anti-discrimination rules do not extend past age 65. As well, private pension plans usually contain a clause that requires employees to retire by a fixed age, commonly 65, which is also the normal time people begin to collect government pensions. There are good arguments in favor of forcing older employees to step down. Such workers tend to cost more in terms of salary and benefits, so employers could cut costs by putting the seniors out to pasture.

With rapid advances in technology, old jobs become obsolete, requiring workers to retrain continually. And that's easier and probably more efficient for young people to do.


Speaking of young people, if the codgers linger on the job, where will the job openings be down the road?

Opponents of mandatory retirement counter that most new jobs will come from small business, especially from firms which don't even exist today. Thus most new jobs won't be as dependent on worker turnover as much as on a healthy small business sector.

In addition, they say, forcing a man or woman out of the job means wasting years of experience and skills and sacrificing more years of potential high productivity. And mandatory retirement will put extra, unneeded pressure on already expensive pension programs, especially in view of the fact that the birth rate is declining and the population as a whole is getting older.

But surely the crux of this whole issue is freedom of choice. People should be free to decide when they wish to hang it up and go fishing, or whatever.

For many that would mean taking early retirement. But the betting here is that more would keep working for the satisfaction, for the feeling of participation and self-worth that a

# **M.E.L. have Challenger Project**

OTTAWA — M.E.L. 





# Canadian Forces carry arehouse of food to Caribb

TORONTO, Ont. - A Canadian Forces Hercules transport aircraft flew more than five tons of foodstuffs to Jamaica on Sunday, July 20 to aid persons still suffering from the ravages of flooding on that Caribbean island in June. The food, consisting maily of canned meats, rice and other staple foods, was provided through the Ontario government which has been steadily collecting contributions from private companies and individuals during the six weeks since the island was struck by severe flooding.

'We've got a large part of a warehouse full of foodstuffs collected," said Mr Bill Magill, Provincial Coordinator for Caribbean Aid.

"We talked to the Canadian Forces and they provided a Hercules to carry some of the supplies to Jamaica," he said.

Base at Trenton, Ontario, where Canadian Forces personnel loaded it on the large four-engined transport. The plane left Trenton at 2:30 pm on Sunday and delivered its load to the waiting authorities in Jamaica that evening.

Mr Magill has had previous experience with Canadian Forces emergency aid flights. In early June, when the flood struck in Jamaica, the Canadian Forces provided an aircraft immediately to carry blankets from Department of National Defence stocks and food from Mr Magill's warehouse to Jamaica

Mr Magill also recounts the occasion when the Canadian Forces provided air transport for Ontario government ambulances and school desks for needy areas in the Caribbean.

The Canadian Forces have scheduled two more such supply flights to Caribbean later thi






