Canada's Top Aviation Awards

Gulf warriors, military airlifters and civilian air searchers and rescuers were honored recently by the Royal Canadian Air Force Association.

Lt.-Col. R.G. Hardy, CD, was named "Airman of the Year" in recognition of his leadership during Operation Friction when five Sea King helicopters deployed from CFB Shearwater to the Persian Gulf as part of the Canadian Task Group.

the RCAF Association's annual convention in Colorado Springs, Colo. last October, Lt.-Col. Hardy accepted it "on behalf of the noncommissioned members, servicemen and women who made the award possible."

Other Canadian aviators of the Gulf War to be honored were the "Desert Cats". The wartime squadron commander of the composite CF-18 squadron formed from 416

drons, Lt.-Col. Don Matthews, accepted the Air Marshal W.A. Bishop, V.C., Memorial Trophy.

Air Transport Group received the Gordon R. McGregor Memorial Trophy for its outstanding airlift accomplishments during the Gulf War and for the first time in its history, the RCAF Association's Mynarski Trophy went to a civilian organization. The 6,000-member Civil Air Search Rescue Association and When presented the award at (CASARA) was formed in 1986 and has, according to retired Lt.-Gen. Donald McNaughton, chairman of the air force association's honors and awards committee, "greatly enhanced search and rescue effectiveness and capabilities across Canada."

Le lieutenant-colonel R.G. Hardy a été déclaré "l'Aviateur de l'année" en reconnaissance du leadership qu'il a exercé dans le cadre de l'opération Friction. Il avait alors dirigé le déploiement de cinq hélicoptères Sea King depuis la base de Shearwater jusqu'au Golfe Persique, auprès du Groupe opérationel canadien.

Lorsqu'il a recue cet honneur. en octobre dernier, à l'occasion du congrès annuel de l'Association de l'ARC à Colorado Springs, au Colorado, le lieutenant-colonel Hardy a souligné la contribution de "tout le personnel non-officier sans qui il n'eut pas été possible de mériter cet éloge".

Up until several years ago the Ground Search Training Facility was located at SnowShoe Lake. The only access to the lake was by boat or air. For these reasons the facility was abandoned and unfortunately so was the associated garbage. Since the garbage was left by military personnel the cleanup had to be cleaned up by military personnel. One attempt was made to do a site cleanup two years ago but Mother Nature prevailed and the Team could not get past the numerous portages.


The task was assigned to the present Ground Search Team in Sep. 91. The plan was to take six members and canoe into ShowShoe Lake. Supplies that were required would be flown to the lake by a twin huey helicopter from 408 Squadron in Edmonton. Unfortunately due to a tragic accident the helicopter was unable to participate and last minute changes were implemented. This meant leaving behind the rations that were required and replacing them with "hard rations" and taking whatever else was required in

With the last minute assistance of CFS some of the smaller items were flown out on the Jet Ranger. On Oct 12 the Team of Capt Gerry Barron, Sgt Don Slobodzian, Sgt Brent Tibbel, MCpl Jeff Belisle, Cpl Kurt Trebels and Pte Cindy Martin departed for SnowShoe Lake. After arriving at Tulabi Lake the canoes were loaded and the Team shoved off into the cold icy waters and pondered what lay in store over the next two weeks. Would the portages prove to be too much as they did for the past attempt? What would the weather be like? (It was already cold at +4 and would not likely get warmer.) What would the water conditions be like for the next 35 kms. Would a wrong turn lead us away from the destination? It was too late to turn back now.

Ground Search Cleanup SnowShoe Lake

The first day went as scheduled and the first night was spent under facilities that were constructed from trees and plastic. This shelter proved to be very valuable because during the evening the whole area was covered with two inches of wet wnow. This type of weather would stay with us for most of the time.

The early arrival of the white stuff did not dampen the enthusiasm of the team and after crossing Elbow Lake, McGregor Lake and finally SnowShoe Lake (all 12 kms of it) we finally reached our destination. As approached, the resort cabin built by Mr. Walsten had not been able to install the stoves in the cabin and the temperature was now well below 0. The only heat available was a small stove situated in a small storage shed. This shed would prove to be a gathering point throughout the cleanup.

Departure from SnowShoe was on Oct. 23. At 1700 the wet snow began to fall and it was time to search for a place to take cover

Each day began at 0630 when Capt Barron would light the stove and put the water on to heat up. Once everyone was up and fed the work began. There were two areas to clean up. The main cabin area and an island 500 meters from shore where the garbage had been stored over the years. The island cleanup took four days and the cabin area cleanup took three days. At 1430 the work ended and the personnel were free to do as they wished. This time was usually spent by practicing on weapons, hunting, fishing or compass work in the woods. Thanks to the work of Don, Brent, Jeff and Kurt, Mr. Walsten's Quad ATV was repaired and provided necessary transportation around the site area. The day ended by crawling into the sleeping bags with the mperature hovering around -5.

During our stay at the site the ice on the lake built to approx 1 1/2" thick. If the weather did not very necessary supplies. The team thanks CFS and the pilots for all the assistance they provided.




The Change of Command Parade was more colourful than most. The units "Skirmishers", clad in 1885 period uniforms and armed with the Martini-Henry Rifle of that era, appeared on the parade square before the Regiment formed-up and "Secured the Ground", going through drills replicating the actions they would have taken more than a hundred years ago when advancing into unfamiliar and possibly enemyheld territory. The Skirmishers always preceded the main body of troops to ensure they weren't marching into harms way. Once the Skirmishers job was completed, with the accompanyment of the noise, sparks and smoke that

resulted from the firing of their black-powder rifles, the Company's guides were positioned and then the Regiment moved onto the "ground" and formed up.

The Skirmishers took "center stage" again later in the ceremonies when they lined up for the "Feu De Joie", translated as "The Fire of Joy" a seemingly wild, undisciplined and uncoordinated firing into the air of volley after volley by the soldiers, to celebrate their elation at a great occasion.

Once the smoke cleared, the soldiers of the Regiment gave a lusty "Three Cheers" for their former C.O. and the Change of Command Parade concluded The Royal Winnipeg Rifles Band, under the direction of Lieutenant S.J. McPherson, provided the music for the Parade and entertained the assembly afterward.

he Canadian Memorial Fund

al and The Yorkshire Air Museum were founded in 1982 to preserve part of a typical wartime in World War II. The museum and memorial are located at the former RAF Elvington airfield in North York. The site was chosen as it was one of the few remaining World War II stations with original buildings still standing. Yorkshire was also the home of 6 (RCAF) Group Bomber Command

Restoration of selected buildings began immediately, and continues to this day; however, the museum lacked a bomber aircraft display to serve as the focal point of its exhibits. An early decision was made to attempt to rebuild a Handley Page Halifax. One huge obstacle lay in the way of the groups plans — of the 6178 Halifax bombers produced the only one remaining was W1084 a MKII. Recovered from a fiord in Norway and now resting in an unrestored state at the RAF members of the museum refused to abandon their plans. What fol-


lowed next was worthy of the plot of a detective novel. "The Halifax File" published by Bristol Aerospace restored the

The Allied Air Forces Memori- Air - Britain and the British Aviation Archaeological Council contained the following entry -Halifax "HR 792 58 Sqn. Raised undercarriage too soon after take off. Belly-landed Stornoway 13/1-45". The aircraft was struck off charge and sold for scrap. Nearly forty years later Mr. Alan Poole and Mr. Mark Lewis of the Yorkshire Aircraft Recovery Group informed the museum that the centre section of the fuselage still existed on the island of Lewis in the Outer Hebrides. The fuselage had been purchased by Mr. Robert McKenzie for use as a home for his chickens! Mr. McKenzie donated his unusual chicken-coop to the museum. An RAF Chinook slung the fuselage to the mainland from where it was trucked to Elvington. The core of the restoration project was now present, yet much work remained to be done.

Help was on its way. The Twickenham branch of the RAFA museum Hendon. Undaunted, the raised the money for the purchase of a set of Hastings wings (the civilian version of the Halifax). The French Air Force donated four Bristol Hercules engines.

fuselage and a mid-upper turret. The RAF donated the undercarriage, wheels and tires. Mr. Bernard Jefferson spent 1,000 hours restoring a rear gunners' turret. Many hundreds of hours of work remains to be done before this, the most widely used bomber to serve in the RCAF, is completely restored. Nose and tail assemblies have to be located or scratch built (perhaps the rusting of the Iron Curtain will allow these parts to be recovered from the Soviet Union — the remains of a Hampden were recently repatriated). Regardless, the most pressing need remains that of shelterng the aircraft. To this end the Canadian Memorial Hangar Fund was formed to construct a home for the Halifax aircraft.

Canadian servicemen can help to honour those who served, fought, and died so far from home by giving generously to the Canadian Memorial Hangar Fund. Major-General T.F. (Tom) De Faye, OMM, CD Commander-Land Force Western Area

Major-General de Faye was born in Brixworth, England on 9 November 1942.

In 1961, Major-General de Faye enrolled in the Canadian Army (Regular) and on completion of his training as an infantry officer, he was commisioned into the Royal Canadian Regiment, first serving in Fort York, Federal Republic of Germany with 1 Royal Canadian Regiment. He served with this unit from 1962 to 1969 in the positions of Rifle Platoon Commander, Mortar Officer, Assistant Adjutant, the position of Administration Officer in Cyprus, Company Second-in-Command and Recce Platoon Officer. In July 1969, he was posted to Canadian Forces Headquarters, Ottawa, as the Military Secretary to the Director General Organization, Manpower and Management in the Comptroller General Branch.

In 1969, Major-General de Faye was a member of the Canadian Forces Rifle Team from 3 R22eR and Captain of the 1 Royal Canadian Regiment Rifle Team in 1970 which represented Canada at the Service Rifle Competitions at Bisley, England. In 1971, he attended the Australian Army Staff College and returned to Canada as Adjutant of the Combat Arms School in early 1972.

In 1973, Major-General de Faye returned to Canadian Forces Europe as a Company Commander in 3 Canadian Mechanized Commando at Baden-Soellingen followed by appointments as Officer Commanding Headquarters Company and Deputy Commanding Officer. After a short tour at the Combat Training Centre as a Tactics Instructor, he returned to Baden to assume command of 3 Royal Canadian Regiment in 1977 followed by two years as Senior Staff Officer Operations, 4 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Groupe.

Major-General de Faye returned to Canada in 1981 and, after language training, served as Deputy Chief of Staff for Combat Development at Mobile Command Headquarters. He subsequently served for two years as the Executive Assistant to the Chief of the Defence Staff at National Defence Headquarters, Ottawa. On 15 September 1987, Major-General de Faye assumed command of 4 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group in Lahr, Federal Republic of Germany.

He was the Commandant of the Canadian Land Forces Command and Staff College in Kingston, Ontario from April 1989 to July 1991. He was promoted to Major-General and assumed the function of Commander Land Force Western Area in July 1991.

Major-General de Faye is married to Barbara Rolfe of Tamworth, Australia.

CFB Dog Obedience Club News

This club is designed for the military family with cross-breed and pure-breed dogs of all sizes including the toy breeds. Dogs have to learn how to live with their human family members. A class (or two) will teach You how to train our canine companion to be a comfortable family member. If your canine companion has any behavioural problems, these problems can be reversed and are usually attributed to a relationship problem between you and your canine companion.

Do you recognize any of these problems?:

- House training problems
- Digging
- Barking - Chewing
- Ignores you when you call
- Chases vehicles
- Tends to stray
- Aggressive towards people
- Dog's separation anxiety when left alone

If your dog has any one or more of these problems or one not listed, then dog obedience classes and expert advice from the instructors will rectify any problems. Just like any other family member, you and your canine companion should go

to "school" as well. Don't let your canine companion end up at the pound or the humane society. Like children, dogs can have some difficulty growing up. Our kindergarten classes help puppies twofour months old to mature easier. This class socializes the pups with other pups that have been removed from the brood bitch and its littermates. It also teaches some manners and some household obedience.



The next class that follows kindergarten is beginners. Beginners teaches all household obedience. If you want more advanced classes to have better control over your canine companion or you want to compete in obedience at dog shows, the novice, graduate novice, and open class levels are listed in proper ascending order. Also there is a conformation class for persons who are showing their pure-breed canine companions at dog shows.

Registration for the next session of classes is 19 Jan. 92 at 1900 hrs.

Please do not bring your dog as this is paperwork and payment only. Bring Proof of Vaccination

Classes start 26 Jan. 92 and run for eight weeks. Every Sunday evening in building 21.

Cost is \$32.50 for the military and their dependents. 1/2 price for second and third dogs. \$38.00 for civilians. G.S.T. included. (\$20.00 for kindergarten classes.)



May you, along with your loved ones, have a blessed Christmas and may he reveal his Love to you throughout the New Year.

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
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


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

Once again the Flyers are representing CFB Winnipeg in the city super no-contact league. This ice time and keen competition has allowed the team to get in shape.





Base Training recently hosted an "Education Afternoon" which included speakers from Sturgeon Creek High School, the Canadian Forces Community College Program, and the Canadian Forces University Program. Although attendance was limited due to a scheduling conflict with the Base Exercise, the afternoon provided much discussion and many followup inquiries.

The first guest speaker was Mr. Norm Blain, Business Education Department Head at Sturgeon Creek. Mr. Blain spoke of two areas in which CF members, their dependants and civilians working at CFB Winnipeg can make use of the facilities at Sturgeon Creek:

1. Upgrading Classes are available through normal registration procedures, allowing students to work towards a high school graduation certificate or to just "upgrade" themselves. A choiice of classes are available at 0800 and 1330 hrs. therefore substantial support from the unit is required.

2. Computer courses are available through the B Trg Office, running twice a year (Sept-Dec and Feb-May). Courses available in the upcoming session include: Processing a. Intro to Data Lotus 1-2-3 C. WordPerfect 5.1 (intro and advanced)

The second speaker, Mr. Mark Titterson from CFCCP, discussed the following programs which are available to CF members and dependants, as well as to Reserve "Class C", retired CF members and to civilians working at CF bases:

- 1. Business
- 2. Travel & Tourism

Costs include a one-time \$35 membership fee, tuition of \$108/ textbooks course and (\$30-\$120/subject). Some considerations can be given for military rank and experience towards advanced standing. What makes this program unique is its 25% residency requirement. This allows students to obtain 75% of their courses through local resources, and 25% through Seneca College, usually by correspondence.

6. Management Development

The third speaker was a familiar one at CFB Winnipeg -Mr. Mike Piercy, our ULO. He discussed the University Program, which is available to all serving members, their dependants, spouses, and to retired members. The main points of discussion were as follows: a. Mature Student Status (21

yrs or older, not a high school grad)

b. Costs (\$25 registration, \$389/full course)

c. Correspondence (1 1/2 times the workload of a regular course)

d. Teleconferencing (offered through Sturgeon Creek High School)

e. Portability (after initial enrolment at U of M, can take rest of program from any other location)

f. Grades (2/3 of our candidates earn a 'B' or higher)

g. Mostly Other Ranks (45% or. 35% Officer, 20% spouses) h. Credit (up to one full year for
