Two British Empire Medals For Gallantry

Corporal George W. Snider, 43, an Operator Mobile Support Equipment at RCAF Station Namao, Alta., has been awarded the British Empire Medal for Gallantry.

The award was made to Corporal Snider for his action in rescuing a fellow airman trapped under a heavy entrance door at RCAF Station Namao, Ontario on May 16, 1963.

The British Empire Medal is the third highest peacetime award for gallantry, ranking behind the George Cross and the George Medal.

Corporal Snider is the son of Mrs. J. H. Snider of RR 3 Richmond, Ont., and is married to the former Alice M. Rich of 112 Waverley St., Toronto.

He enlisted in the RCAF in August, 1942 and since then has served several stations across Canada, including 13 Supply Depot Angus, Ont., 19 Repair Depot, Calgary, Alta., RCAF Station Rockcliffe, Ont., and RCAF Station Gose Bay, Labrador.

In April, 1955 he was transferred overseas to 30 Air Materiel Base, Langar, England and served until July, 1958. On his return to Canada he was transferred to 10 Repair Depot, Calgary and remained there until April, 1963 when he was transferred to RCAF Station Pagwa, Ont.

In April, 1964 Corporal Snider was transferred to his present position in the Mobile Equipment Section of RCAF Station Namao.

CITATION

On 16 May 1963 Corporal Snider, a member of the RCAF detachment with the 913th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron (ACWS) at Pagwa, Ontario, was working with several other RCAF personnel in the Motor Vehicle Building. A retaining chain on one of the entrance doors, which weighed approximately one thousand pounds, broke, allowing the door to fall on one of the airmen across his shoulders and pin him to the ground in a squatting position. On seeing the door fall and hearing the other airman's cries for help, Corporal Snider, without regard for his own safety, crawled beneath the door on his hands and knees, lifted and held it off the injured airman who then fell forward and was pulled clear of the door by others present. Unable to support the weight of the door, Corporal Snider attempted to extricate himself but the door fell further, crushing his legs. A front-end loader operating nearby was used then by the others present to lift the door and free Corporal Snider who had suffered painful injuries to his legs. The other airman sustained a severe fracture and compression of a vertebra of the lower back. Corporal Snider's quick, decisive and prodigious rescue action was performed in the face of a grave threat to his own well-being. In fact, resulted in severe injuries to him. There is no doubt that his heroic act saved a fellow airman from extreme injuries, and possibly, if not death.

Leading Aircraftman Henry F. Schulz, 22, a safety equipment technician at RCAF Station Bagotville, Ont., has been awarded the British Empire Medal for Gallantry.

The award was made to LAC Schulz for his action in saving the life of a member of the crew of an Argus aircraft who was partially sucked out of the plane while attempting to secure a main cargo door.

The British Empire Medal is the third highest peacetime award for gallantry, ranking behind the George Cross and the George Medal.

The incident occurred on October 31, 1963 while LAC Schulz was travelling as a passenger in an Argus aircraft enroute from Trenton, Ont., to Greenwood, N.S.

LAC Schulz, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest F. Schulz, Box 602, Leduc, Alta., is the youngest of eight members of the RCAF to receive the British Empire Medal since the Second World War.

He enlisted in the RCAF in August, 1959 in Edmonton, Alta., as a safety equipment technician and since that time was stationed at RCAF Station Aylmer, Ont., and Greenwood, N.S., prior to his transfer to RCAF Station Bagotville, Que., in July, 1963.

Educated at Leduc High School at Leduc, Alta., he is married to the former Vivian E. Whitman of Middleton, N.S. They have a daughter, Francine Lee, aged two months.

CITATION

"During the approach to Greenwood, at an altitude of 1,500 feet, a warning light cautioned the pilot that the main cargo door had become insecure. A crew member, Flying Officer R. J. Rowe, was ordered to check the door fastenings and, whilst he was doing so, the door opened completely and he was sucked partially out of the aircraft by the slipstream. LAC Schulz, who was standing nearby, quickly grasped the officer's arm with one hand and, holding on to an upright support in the aircraft with the other hand, pulled him to safety. LAC Schulz's great presence of mind, instant reaction, and utter disregard for his own safety unquestionably saved F/O Rowe's life."

DRAGOONS NEW BATTLE HONORS

Canada's oldest armored regiment—The Royal Canadian Dragoons—received its newest symbol of battle honors at Camp Gagetown in a colorful ceremony. Governor-General Georges P. Vanier, wearing the uniform of a full general in the Canadian army, presented the new "guidon" to the commanding officer of the Dragoons, in sunny, humid weather. The guidon, on which is embroidered the names of various battles in which the regiment participated to the end of the Second World War, is the third such battle symbol to be presented to the regiment. It now contains 18 battle honors.

IF YOU WANT TO HAVE A GOOD TIME JOIN THE CAVALRY

Some years ago the newspapers reported on a banquet at which Sir Winston Churchill was the guest speaker. The topic of the great man's talk was St. George and the Dragon. He pointed out that although rescuing the fair lady was a brave deed, how free from complication it had been. When word came down from operations, the rest of the duty crew were playing bridge and said "let George do it." So George nipped over to SHQ, signed out in the TD register, said prayers in the garrison chapel (see CAP 79, page 35) and rode out the Sally Port whistling "The Wedding at Kerrymuir." The actual combat was going badly for George until he recalled some lessons drummed into him by the Brigade WO back at riding school. From then on it was all his fight and it ended with the fair lady delivered safe home and George back in the Mess in time for tea.

If the incident had happened under the rules of our affluent society there would have been a sharp exchange of diplomatic notes, followed by a complete breakdown of diplomatic relations. Then trade restrictions and embargos would be set up against the dragon in hopes that hunger would force him to

release the maiden. The dragon would continue to eat well but he would put the maiden on starvation. During this period George would be on continuous stand-by and his confidential file closely viewed for any indication that he might not bring the lass straight home; there would be letters to the editor from retired soldiers saying that horse and rider should be integrated and called centaurs as in the ancient days of Greece. They would have no specific say on how it was to be done and one would ask why they had been kept on this when they were in the service. Finally the matter would be placed before the United Nations.

Age having cooled the dragon's fires, the maiden has grown weaker and sere, and old George is retired to a cottage in Cornwall where he does a bit of poaching and smuggling to add to his pension. No one has gotten hurt except the fair lady, and other dragons in other places are flexing their muscles and leering at other ladies.

Sir Winston was telling the world that it had gotten too complicated for its own good. For us the main issue is in the encounter between George and the Dragon and underline the old adage "If all else fails—follow instructions." In April there were a further three injuries to technicians' hands, severe enough to require medical attention, and one more lad banged his head on a stationary propellor and had to report to the sickery. Like George, you must REMEMBER and PRACTISE our basic training or the use of CAP 79 will be of little avail.

Probably, in spite of all the cajolery, there will continue to be hand injuries so this little Ironism is offered "Tis a good thing to learn to cut your fingernails with your left hand—for you never know when you might lose your right hand in an accident."

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

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

VOODOOS MOTHBALLED

OTTAWA—The Defence Department has reduced RCAF fighter strength to fewer than 50 jet planes in Canada and has virtually abandoned Arctic reconnaissance. The Air Force acquired 66 American Voodoo Jet Interceptors in 1961 and has lost two in crashes. Sixteen of the remaining 64 have been moth-balled at a saving of \$2,400,000. This has left 48 operational planes, only 16 of which are on standby alert at any one time.


