2 PPCLI IN CYPRUS 3 MONTHS IN REVIEW

As members of the Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry arrived in Cyprus on Sep 22, 1982 they were greeted with the Mediterranean sunshine and an altogether new mission for their mechanized infantry battalion.

The soldiers quickly established the routine on the line in the buffer zone and accustomed themselves to the different cultures and surroundings in Cyprus.

The traditional Remembrance Day service, observed at Wolseley Barracks, the headquarter for Sector Four in Nicosia recalled those soldiers of UNFICYP who had fallen in the service of peace.

The Christmas and New Year celebrations, even with the noticeable absence of snow, were enjoyed by all unit personnel. One of the highlights was the entertainment show from Canada which put on three performances. The traditional men's Christmas dinner was served by the officers and senior NCOs. The soldiers were afforded a brief respite from their normal Cyprus duties while the officers and senior NCOs assumed the line tasks and additional duties.

The first three months of the tour were extremely varied with unit teams participating in the UNFICYP military skills at arms competition, the hosting of several visitors from Canada (who were probably trying to escape the winter back home) and numerous functions which gave all ranks an exposure to the various contingents from the other countries in UNFICYP. The unit is very much looking forward to the visit of the Colonel-in-Chief, the Countess Mountbatten of Burma and the Colonel-of-the-Regiment, MGen G.G. Brown later in February. The highlight of this visit will be the presentation of the UN Cyprus medal to all ranks by the Colonel-in-Chief. This visit will also mark the last official visit of the Colonel-of-the-Regiment to the Second Battalion as he will be retiring in the summer of 1983.

The tour in Cyprus has been an extremely rewarding experience for all members of 2 PPCLI. The unit has accomplished its mission and contributed significantly to the overall operation of Sector Four. The soldiers have been excellent ambassadors for Canada and have brought credit to the Regiment and the CF. All members of 2 PPCLI are looking forward to returning to Winnipeg in March. Until then, Sector Four remains secure.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARDS

It's that time again — time to begin thinking about Community Service Awards. As many will recall, the award program was initiated last year as a means of recognizing outstanding voluntary service to the Winnipeg Military Community. The program has proven to be extremely popular. Last year 38 awards were presented to deserving personnel. This year's awards will be presented by the B Comd at a special ceremony in the WOs and Sgts Mess on 5 June 1983.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE

All members of the CFB Winnipeg Military Community are eligible to submit names of those they feel deserving of an award. Members of the Canadian Forces, DND civilians and their dependants are eligible for this award. Personnel may be appointed, elected or volunteered for the activity for which they are nominated, however, they should not have received any remuneration for performing that activity. Work performed must be totally voluntary and benevolent and outside the individual's normal work responsibility. Some suggested activities are scouts, guides, brownies, minor hockey, baseball, church activities, social clubs and family assistance groups, benevolent work for the community, etc. A person may receive more than one award during each tour at CFB Winnipeg. Groups may also be nominated for an award as well.

NOMINATION PROCEDURES

Eligible personnel will be nominated by the community at large through the completion of a nomination form. Nomination forms will be delivered to all MQs with the 9 Mar and 23 Mar edition of the Voxair. Forms will also be available through the Base Exchange outlets and Bldg 90 Recreation Centre. Simply complete the form and return it to the Chairman of the Selection Committee by the deadline date.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

The Chairman of the Selection Committee for this year will be Major B.D. Brennan, Base Personnel Administrative Officer. A representative from the two community councils and one from the recreation council will be on the Selection Committee. The remaining members of the Committee will be chosen by the Chairman and will be representative of the community at large.

NEW CDS ANNOUNCED BY PM

Ottawa — The Prime Minister announced recently that Lieutenant-General Gérard C.E. Thériault, CMM, CD, will be promoted to the rank of General and appointed Chief of the Defence Staff, effective July 1st, 1983.

An air force fighter pilot, Lt.-Gen Thériault is currently Vice-Chief of the Defence Staff. He will be the third airman to serve in the nation's highest military post since integration. He will replace General Ramsey M. Withers, who will have completed three years in office and whose next assignment will be announced later.

Lieutenant-General Thériault was born in Gaspé, Que. and raised in Stanstead and Rivière-du-Loup, Que. He attended Sir George Williams University, Montreal, where he obtained a bachelor of arts degree in economics.

He began his military career enrolling in the Royal Canadian Air Force as a pilot in November, 1951. Following an assignment with 430 (Fighter) Squadron at Grostenquin, France and the Flying Instructors course at RCAF Station Trenton, Ont., he became a flying instructor at 2 Advanced Flying School at Portage la Prairie, Man. In 1963, he became deputy commander of 431 Strike and Attack Squadron at Grostenquin, and in 1966, commanding officer of 444 Strike Attack Squadron, Baden-Soellingen, Federal Republic of Germany.

HOUSE OF COMMONS DEBATES

FEB 14, 1983

Mr. David Kilgour (Edmonton-Strathcona): Madam Speaker, my question is for the Minister responsible for the status of women. Following the questions from the Member for Yukon and the Member for Calgary West, will the Minister tell us what she thinks of the idea of having a standing committee dealing with problems of women, particularly single mothers?

Hon. Judy Erola (Minister of State (Mines)): Frankly, Madam Speaker, I am very amused to hear that the Opposition is finally interested in the status of women.

He attended the United States Armed Forces Staff College in Norfolk, Virginia, and in 1967 he became vice-commandant of Collège militaire royal at St. Jean, Que. In June, 1970 he was promoted Colonel and named commandant of the Collège. In August, 1971 he was appointed commander of CFB Bagotville, Que.

Promoted Brigadier-General in 1973 he took command of 1 Canadian Air Group in Lahr, Federal Republic of Germany. Two years later he became, chief of staff operations at Air Command Headquarters, Winnipeg. Following assignments as a Maj.-Gen., as deputy commander at Air Command and chief of air doctrine and operations at NDHQ he was promoted Lt.-Gen. and appointed deputy chief of defence staff in August, 1978.

On May 31, 1980, he became Vice-Chief of the Defence Staff.

In December, 1972 Lt.-Gen. Thériault was appointed to the Order of Military Merit in the grade of Officer and in June, 1979 in the grade of Commander.

He is married to Betty Catherine Syron of Auckland, New Zealand, and has two sons, Dwight and Pierre.

Ottawa — Le premier ministre a annoncé récemment la promotion du lieutenant-général Gérard C.E. Thériault, CCM, CD, au grade de général et sa nomination comme chef de l'état-major de la Défense, à compter du 1er juillet.

Le lieutenant-général Thériault est né à Gaspé (Qué.). Il a passé son enfance à Stanstead et à Rivière-du-Loup (Qué.), puis étudié à l'Université Sir George Williams, à Montréal, où il a obtenu un baccalauréat en économie.

Il s'enrôle comme pilote dans l'Aviation royale du Canada (ARC) en novembre 1951. Après avoir été affecté au 430e Escadron de chasse à Grostenquin, France, et avoir suivi un cours d'instructeur de pilotage à la station de l'ARC de Trenton (Ont.), il devient pilote-instructeur à la 2e Ecole de perfectionnement des pilotes, à Portage-la-Prairie (Man.). En 1966, il fut stagiaire au United States Armed Forces Staff College à Norfolk (Virginie) et en 1967, il devient vice-commandant du Collège militaire royal de Saint-Jean (Québec). En juin 1970, il est promu colonel et nommé commandant du collège. Puis en août 1971, il devient commandant de la base de Bagotville (Qué.).

Promu brigadier-général en 1973, il commande d'abord le 1er Groupe aérien du Canada à Lahr (République fédérale d'Allemagne) — puis deux ans plus tard est nommé chef d'état-major (opérations), au quartier général du Commandement aérien, à Winnipeg. Après avoir occupé comme major-général, les postes de commandant adjoint au quartier général du Commandant aérien et chef de la doctrine et opérations aériennes au Quartier général de la Défense nationale, il est promu lieutenant-général et nommé sous-chef de l'état-major de la Défense en août 1978.

En mai 1980, il est nommé vice-chef de l'état-major de la Défense.

En décembre 1972, il a été nommé à l'Ordre du Mérite militaire, au grade d'officier, puis en juin 1979, au grade de commandeur.

Il est marié à Betty Catherine Syron, d'Auckland, en Nouvelle-Zélande et ils ont deux fils, Dwight et Pierre.

THE COUNTESS OF MOUNTBATTEN OF BURMA VISITS 2 PPCLI IN CYPRUS

The Countess Mountbatten of Burma, CD, JP, DL visited the Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in Cyprus from 6 to 10 February 1983 in the capacity of Colonel-in-Chief of the regiment. The battalion is currently serving a six month tour as part of UNFICYP and the visit was the first by the Colonel in Chief to her Second Battalion in Cyprus. — Commodore Hugh M.D. MacNeil will assume the appointment of director general personnel careers other tanks, at NDHQ.


— BGen Walter G. Doupe will be appointed as assistant chief of staff, personnel and administration at Allied Forces Central Europe, Brunssum, Holland.

FIRE PREVENTION NEWS

FIRE IN PMQ

Recently, there was a minor fire in a PMQ right here in Winnipeg caused by children playing with a cigarette lighter left within their reach. Although the fire was of a minor nature, the possible consequences could easily have been catastrophic.

This incident clearly identifies the need for parents and guardians to increase their vigilance, particularly where young children are involved.

The following checklist is provided to ensure your home is fire safe and that good fire prevention practices are maintained.

1. Never leave matches and cigarette lighters within reach of children.
2. Never leave children unattended or unsupervised.
3. Never leave home with your oven or other heat producing appliances operating or plugged in.
4. Never hang towels or clothing in, on, or around the stove or oven to dry.
5. Never dump contents of ashtrays directly into garbage. Leave them in the kitchen sink until morning, then they may be safely disposed of.
6. Never overload electrical circuits in your home.
7. Never use the wrong type or size of fuse in your fuse panels, or substitute fuses with coins or other metallic devices.
8. Never run extension cords under carpeting or use them for other than their intended use: ie. indoor extension cords outdoor.
9. Never allow lint to accumulate in a clothes dryer. Ensure lint traps are emptied after each use.

Remember, should you have a fire, report it by contacting the City of Winnipeg Emergency Services 911. Immediately afterwards contact the Base Fire Operator at 832-1131 who will notify the Base Fire Chief and military police.

ANY AGE CAN LEARN

Here's a very unusual story that goes to show how many different roads lead to fitness.

One day, a woman in her forties heard the smoke alarm go off in her house. She raced into the kitchen — right into the black, greasy smoke from a frying pan she had forgotten on the stove.

Now, here comes the crucial part. Even though she turned off the stove and removed the pan immediately, she nonetheless panicked — and ran upstairs to the smoke alarm, hypnotized by the device's noisy shriek, even though she knew the fire was not there!

Of course, smoke rises. So, the woman ascended into a thick, suffocating cloud that rendered her semi-conscious.

Miraculously, she was able to make her way back downstairs and into the fresh air, coughing and terrified.

And she was so alarmed by the fact she had panicked — panicked! — she decided to learn from the experience. She determined right then to deal with the other situations in her life in which she thought she might panic — including being in the water. You see — she didn't know how to swim. And she decided she never wanted to drown — like she almost died of smoke inhalation.

Imagine her, then, the next week, a mother of two teenaged sons, standing up to her waist in the community pool with a class comprised otherwise entirely of nine-year-olds.

There she was, going for her "Blue Badge" in the new Water Safety Program conducted by the Canadian Red Cross.

"All I had ever done before was get wet and hang around the edge of the pool," she admitted. "I was always afraid to swim because I would get tense and couldn't breathe."

But in the Water Safety Course — five three-quarter hour sessions per week for three weeks — she learned to relax in the water, learned to breathe properly when swimming — and overcame her panic in the pool!

She can now do the Front Crawl, the Back Crawl, tread water and dive.

What is more, she even acquired certain life-saving skills in case others panic around her.

"At first, my classmates thought I was some kind of adult spy. But as it turned out, it was a good way to learn because we all overcame our little fears together."

Proud of herself as she is for having acquired a considerable skill, she also learned the value of physical fitness.

"I had never been very active before," she confesses. "But now I feel much better physically as well as mentally."

"I would ride my son's bicycle over to the pool and that would help me warm up for swimming. And, as everybody knows, swimming itself is one of the best exercises you can do for overall conditioning!"

"I began to see how gratifying it was to get a little bit better every day. I don't think I'll ever swim Lake Ontario, mind you, but I have achieved my goal."

Well, what does that old kid's game say: "Water conquers Fire"? I guess, in this case, fitness helped conquer the fear of both!

MEN & WOMEN HOW DIFFERENT

Continued from previous issue.

(Final Points)

4. CARDIOVASCULAR SYSTEM & ENDURANCE

Women have slightly smaller hearts and lungs (relative to height and weight) than men, and this fact, combined with a lower hemoglobin level (the oxygen-carrying component of the blood), means that our endurance capacity is slightly less.

If you run at a moderate pace with a male partner, you will not notice a significant difference. However, if you're both running at your maximum effort, the man may endure longer and at a faster pace. But you may find it frustrating that some men seem to be able to get into good shape quite quickly while you plod along for months with apparently small improvements. Sometimes, this is because the man may have had a more athletic background, which his body can more likely "recall" when he decides to get into shape.

If you work out regularly, you should be able to run quite comfortably with a man. There are now a number of women runners who are competitive with all but the very top male racers, so our concept of the true differences in endurance activity between men and women is rapidly changing.

5. JOINT & MUSCLE FLEXIBILITY

Women definitely have greater joint mobility (range of natural movement) and muscle flexibility. Not only does this provide natural protection against injury but it also gives women a distinct advantage in such sports as gymnastics.

Although pre-exercise stretching is recommended for everyone, it is absolutely essential for men if tight or stiff muscles or joints are to be avoided. The knee is the only joint that is as mobile in men as women.

6. BODY TEMPERATURE

Because of the higher percentage of body fat, women adapt better to exercise in cold weather. The reverse may be true in hot weather, although the evidence is confusing. If you work out in warm conditions, your body temperature is often higher than that of a man working at the same level in comparable conditions.

7. ENERGY CONSUMPTION

In terms of regular energy consumption, men tend to have somewhat higher basal metabolic rate (BMR), which simply means that they burn more calories in normal daily activity. One of the advantages of regular exercise is that the BMR remains

elevated for anywhere up to six hours after exercise, and the continued above-normal use of calories after exercise can lead to a significant weight loss. Therefore, regular exercise should be an integral part of a woman's weight-loss strategy.

8. HORMONAL CHANGES

The hormonal and physical changes women go through have long been considered to have negative consequences on physical performance. But while some women experience varying degrees of premenstrual discomfort, many women athletes find that menstrual cycle, pregnancy and childbirth have no negative effect on physical activity.

However, we do know that hormonal changes in postmenopausal woman may lead to osteoporosis (brittle bones), and because exercise stimulates the production of calcium, exercise is particularly important for the older woman.

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



The first night audience broke into applause at times throughout the play, which indicated that they enjoyed it more than did some of the local critics.

The swashbuckling fight scenes are done in the best Errol Flynn tradition, with sparks and bodies flying all over the stage. There is no question as to determining who are the good guys and the bad guys/gals, as the heros are pure and the baddies real villains. There may not be too much acting in the play, but there is plenty of action, and this keeps the entertainment at a high level.

This Arthur Miller story of the Salem witchcraft trails was aimed at McCarthy commie hunting in the 1950s, but it stands as an indictment of any repression of freedom.

An added feature of this production was the use of a chorus of 18, in addition to the 22 members of the cast. This was an effective way of making full use of all the drama students and contributing to the action on stage.

Next the U of Winnipeg will offer *Lulu Street*, by local playwright Ann Henry, from March 11 to 19th. This tells of the general strike that was part of Winnipeg's recent history, and should be well worth seeing.

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
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
