## CF Units to Relocate

Ottawa — Defence Minister Barney Danson announced the re-alignment of some military formations to achieve a more effective and efficient distribution of available land force resources, and steps to establish the best use of property in urban areas surplus to DND's requirement.

These decisions complement those reached a year ago at the conclusion of an extensive defence structure review and include:

- The closing of the Avenue Road site of CFB Toronto over the next two years;
- An assessment of what best use can be made for urban development of DND surplus land at Downsview, the main portion of CFB Toronto;
- The retention of CFB London;
- The reduction of Griesbach Barracks at Edmonton by moving the Canadian Airborne Regiment to CFB Petawawa.

Mr. Danson said that in reaching these decisions, the Government was particularly aware of the need to make better use of valuable land in urban areas. He said that he would be consulting with his colleague, the Minister of State for Urban Affairs, and in turn with Provincial and Municipal authorities and community

groups, to ascertain what best use can be made of land areas and facilities being declared surplus by the Department of National Defence in the Toronto area.

The major unit at the Avenue Road site in Toronto, the Canadian Forces Staff School, will be moved to existing facilities at CFB Kingston. Other smaller units at the Avenue Road site will be moved to facilities elsewhere in the Toronto area. Among the alternative uses that would be considered for the Avenue Road site are a senior citizen development or a special school for children with learning difficulties.

At Downsview, the department already has declared large tracts of land as surplus to its requirements. Mr. Danson said that while this surplus property was the immediate basis for considering proposals, he expected discussions with Provincial and Municipal authorities would include other portions of the Downsview site which could be made surplus.

Mr. Danson believes that the size of the Downsview property, the existing development in the area and the proximity of the subway, provides an excellent opportunity for Downsview to be used as a controlled urban development project.

With respect to CFB London, Mr. Danson stated that he had examined the closure of the base very carefully, and while it might save money and release some support personnel for operational activities, there were other factors affecting the deployment and effectiveness of the land forces which have caused the Government to retain CFB London, with the 1ST Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment, as at present.

In this regard Mr. Danson added that the closure would have completely eliminated the only



## Search And Rescue Aircraft Donning New Colours

OTTAWA—Bright yellow, visible in all seasons and in all weather, is the new dress for all Canadian Forces aircraft whose primary job is Search and Rescue (SAR).

The new yellow birds are designed to be more readily spotted in the various colors and weather conditions of Canada's four seasons. The colors were selected by experts in color

dynamics, after studies at DCIEM, (Defence and Civil Institute of Environmental Medicine) in Toronto.

Aircraft to be repainted include eight Twin Otters and six Buffalo fixed wing aircraft, and six Labrador and three Voyageur helicopters.

The repainting will be done during the normal schedule of


repair and overhaul, which includes a paint upkeep program, and will be completed over the next 2½ years.

At present, a variety of color schemes are used on search and rescue aircraft, including red, white and blue for some, and wartime camouflage designs for others.

Although the predominant color of the SAR aircraft will be yellow, the solid color is broken by a wide red band amidships, and black trim with the words RESCUE AND SAUVETAGE in large black letters on each side.

In addition to new paint, the helicopters are also being equipped with an ejectable ELT (electronic locator transmitter) and a powerful light called Nite Sun. The light, which has both a searchlight and floodlight capability, will give the helicopters the ability to search at night, a facility not now available.

The light has remote controls and may be rotated fore and aft, as well as sideways, to give maximum visibility.

## PAR Installed At CFB Winnipeg (continued from Page 1)

In the accompanying photograph, taken last Aug 13th, COL. M. D. Gates, Base Commander of CFB Winnipeg, is shown officially accepting the "new" Precision Approach Radar (PAR) from members of the AMDU team who installed it along with the assistance of our own radar technicians.

Did I say "new"? Someone once said, "there is nothing new under the sun..." or something like that. Such is the case with CFB Winnipeg's new PAR. In 1964 the D.N.D. decommissioned the Military PAR and the responsibility for final approach was given over to M.O.T. (Ministry of Transport). Then in 1973 MOT decided PAR was no longer required because of the reliability of the ILS (Instrument Landing System) and so it too phased out the PAR. (Imagine thinking electronics could replace a PAR controller). However not all aircraft are equipped with the necessary instrumentation to utilize the ILS. The prime example being Canada's relatively recent acquisition, the F5; hence the renewed requirement for a PAR facility in Winnipeg.

It was decided last February to go ahead with the installation and a target date of mid Aug was projected for completion. Many hours of overtime by AMDU personnel from Trenton, our own radar technicians, and unexpectedly good weather kept work on schedule and the radar was accepted Aug 13th - two whole days "Ahead" of schedule (eat your heart out Jean Drapeau).

The most visible part of our new equipment is the orange and white styrofoam igloo (pictured behind COL. Gates and all in the photo) which houses the radars antennae protecting both the equipment and the technicians from the elements while still allowing the radar signals to pass through uninterrupted.


The working end for the controllers (that is the scope you saw in Airport) is remoted into the Administrative Bldg at the Int'l Airport where we work alongside with MOT's Area Control Centre and Terminal Control Unit.

Whether the equipment was technically "new" or not was of little concern to us as Air Traffic Controllers. We were all more than anxious to get back to our fundamental job of controlling. However more work was required. Types of approaches, missed approach procedures, letters of agreement with MOT etc. had to be worked out. Last but certainly not least we had to have qualified controllers. We practised with VFR (Visual Flight Rules) traffic until everyone was "back in the groove" or "competent" as we are rated and on 1 Oct 76 became fully operational operating from 0700 - 2300 hrs 7 days a week, and on one hour call the rest of the time.

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


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
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# 429 SQDN BISON BREW

## Fuel Savings

ALERT, N.W.T.—Thousands of gallons of diesel fuel, aviation gas and aircraft flying hours will be saved by new construction and installations at Canadian Forces Station Alert, the most northerly permanently inhabited spot in the world, 450 miles south of the North Pole.

Designed under the supervision of A. F. MacRury, of Trenton, project manager for Trelar (Alert Reconstruction), and built by the Canadian Forces Construction Engineering Unit, Winnipeg, it includes new barrack blocks and installation of a new building for the transmitter site at the station.

A new heating-cooling system in the transmitter building will save 18,730 gallons of diesel fuel annually.

Gordon MacDonald, base utilities officer at CFB Trenton, who designed the system, said that it will save many Hercules flights toting fuel, as well as a great saving in aviation fuel, because it takes one gallon of "avgas" to transport two gallons of fuel to Alert.

The low temperature of the outside air is used to provide cooling, Mr. MacDonald explained.

This method eliminates the requirement for refrigeration compressors, resulting in a saving of over 30 electrical horsepower, and up to 70 gallons of fuel a day during peak periods.

Heat recovery coils provide a means of heating incoming Arctic air with the warm exhaust air from the system.

This not only represents a fuel saving, but also provides insurance against snow blockage of fresh air dampers.

The new barrack blocks — one completed and occupied, and the other expected to be ready for occupancy by mid-November — will provide even greater savings.

Mr. MacDonald explained that the new blocks use maximum insulation and efficient heating systems, so that the daily consumption of fuel will be only 70 gallons.

This compares with one GP (General Purpose) hut using 50 gallons a day and housing one-fifth of the personnel.

One barrack block houses the equivalent of five GP huts, and the daily saving is 180 gallons, for an annual saving of 69,350 gallons.

The total saving in Hercules flights "will be amazing," says officials. The thrice-yearly resupply flights — one of which takes place in November — now carry up to 400,000 gallons of oil. This requires over 100 Hercules flights from Thule, in Greenland, to Alert.

## Air Command R.C. Chaplains Conference

On the 23rd and 24th of November, R.C. Chaplains from Air Command met and successfully concluded a two-day Seminar. The theme of the Seminar was "The Sacrament of Marriage in Contemporary Society."

The speaker and catalyst at the Seminar was Father Steve Dunn, O.P., a professor from the School of Theology in Toronto. His views regarding marriage were very future-oriented. In his view, Vatican II got rid of much triumphalism as well as much legalism within the Roman Catholic Church. There has been a switch in emphasis from things to persons and the sacredness of persons. Today, priority is on persons and values rather than things and laws.

Father Dunn spent much time discussing the difference between sense of duty and the ethics of responsibility. He contended that contemporary society is moving from a morality of duty to a morality of responsibility. According to him,

the sense of responsibility is open to all values and so is not as clear-cut as the morality prompted by a sense of duty. It would appear that the approach coming from a sense of responsibility is a more mature and adult approach.

As contemporary society shifts in emphasis, so too must all members of that society. The Chaplain must recognize what is happening and make the transition in his own thinking if he hopes to be relevant to present needs. This means adaptation on the part of Chaplains.

If Chaplains are to be leaders within their community, they must be relevant to present-day situations and not be answering questions that are no longer being asked. From this point of view, the recent Conference was of supreme benefit to the Chaplains attending.

Congratulations must be offered to Father Bussey and Crew for engineering the procedures of this past week.

WINS AIR COMMAND 100 HOUR SWIM**


CFS Holberg will be awarded the Air Command Champion Trophy for their first place performance in the Annual Air Command 100 Hour Swim. Not unlike most of the small stations who enter the competition, CFS Holberg developed a carnival atmosphere around this event. They opened the pool twenty-four hours per day over the one hundred hour period, maintained a skeleton operational station staff to permit maximum military participation and solicited a great number of dependants to count laps, serve hot drinks and to assist in the general administration of the swim.





# in vino veritas

## CHRISTMAS CHEER AND CHRISTMAS SPIRIT

It is an enjoyable custom to visit relatives and friends during the holiday season and exchange not only gifts, but also hospitality. On these occasions, especially with larger gatherings, a punch or 'cup' can be served instead of hard liquor and mixes (A 'cup' is a punch with added carbonated water, like club soda). It is a pleasant change and quite easy to prepare. Keep it fairly simple, however: don't be tempted to throw in everything you have around the house in the way of left-overs. This may work for soup, but a punch that consists of odd amounts of Harvey's Bristol Cream, Johnny Walker and Calona Royal Red will do nothing for you or your guests but give everybody a headache.

### May Wine Bowle

A wine that is perfect for a traditional punch — or Bowle, as the Germans call it — is May Wine, available in some liquor stores (the one on Portage and Ainslie has it). It contains the herb woodruff, which gives the wine a delightful fresh flavour. All you need to do is pour this wine over a block of ice in a punch bowl, four bottles for about 12 people, and add one or two sliced oranges, to be floated in each glass. Then, according to taste, add a large bottle of soda or sparkling wine. Some will enjoy it just like that. If you like a little more kick, add a cup or two of brandy.

Here are some more recipes for assorted holiday drinks. Cheers, Prosit, and a votre sante!

### GLUHWEIN (MULLED WINE)

The traditional après-ski warm-up. Makes you glow on any cold winter night.

- 1 cup water
- ½ stick cinnamon\*
- 4 whole cloves\*
- lemon peel\*
- ½ cup sugar
- 4 cups red wine
- lemon slices

Tie spices\* in a square of cheese cloth and simmer in water for 5 minutes. Then add and dissolve sugar. Add wine and heat, being careful not to reach the boiling point. (All the goodness will go out if it boils). Remove spices and serve wine with a slice of lemon. (If you don't like watering your wine, just heat spices with wine and forget the water).

\*Some fancy-food and gourmet shops sell the spices 'ready-made' in little sacks like tea bags.

### FRUIT PUNCH BOWL

1 lb. fresh, frozen, or canned fruit (strawberries, peaches, or pineapple) cut into slices or bite-sized pieces (strain if canned)  
 4 to 6 tablespoons white sugar  
 2 bottles white wine  
 1 or 2 bottles sparkling wine (white or rosé)  
 Place sliced fruit into large bowl (a big soup tureen will do), alternating with the sugar. Pour half a bottle of wine over this, cover and refrigerate one or two hours. Just before serving, add the rest of the wine and sparkling wine (or soda). Serve cold.

### ICE RING FOR PUNCH BOWL

½ lemon, sliced thin  
 ½ small orange, sliced thin  
 maraschino cherries or strawberries  
 1 - 28-oz. bottle lemon-lime carbonated beverage  
 In 6 to 6½-cup ring mold, arrange lemon and orange slices and maraschino cherries or strawberries in attractive design. Pour carbonated beverage (or water, instead, if desired) into mold to partially cover fruit. Freeze. When frozen, add liquid to fill mold ¾ full. Freeze. To unmold, place ring mold in a pan of warm water for a few minutes. Float fruit side up in a punch bowl. (Punch recipe can also be frozen into an ice ring not to dilute punch).

### EGG BRANDY

Although nothing to do with wine, here is a recipe that is quick and easy and very good to serve to people who drop in for a short visit. One caution, however: this drink looks deceptively like an innocent egg nog. Like the well-known headache remedy, it is definitely NOT recommended for children.

Brandy gives this liqueur a particularly exquisite flavour, but vodka or another favourite liquor can be substituted if need be.

- 6 egg yolks
- 6 tablespoons white sugar
- 1 small bottle (12-oz. brandy)
- few drops vanilla extract (optional)

In a blender or with a rotary beater beat egg yolks and sugar (with vanilla) until sugar is dissolved. Gradually add brandy (slow setting on blender). Fill into bottle or decanter. It will look like a lot at first, but will diminish in volume once it settles. Give it a little time to blend and mellow, if possible.

regular force present in that part of Canada, and moreover, one of the important roles of the military in urban areas is support of the militia and reserve components of the Canadian Forces. Urban centres are the recruiting base for these components, and to be effective, Militia and Reserve units must be given an adequate level of support.

CFB London at present provides support to some 15 Militia and Reserve units in Southwestern Ontario.

Mr. Danson also pointed out that while he would not compromise military efficiency for the sake of tradition, one had to recognize the historic association of the RCR with the London area, and particularly with Wolseley Barracks.

The Minister said that Edmonton, unlike London, has a large number of military units, and the move of the Canadian Airborne Regiment to another location would still leave a major military presence in Edmonton, while providing for a better deployment of the land forces more in accordance with national population distribution, as well as enabling the majority of the headquarters staff of the Canadian Airborne Regiment to be reallocated to operational tasks.

Edmonton will remain as the western terminus of the Air transport/Group of the Canadian Forces and will continue to have the only Supply Depot in Western Canada, which is the second largest in the Canadian Forces. In addition, it will be the location for the Western Canada NORAD Regional Operational Control Centre.

The move also will result in a reduction in the size of Griesbach

Barracks site of CFB Edmonton and could allow civic development of the area now located within the urban limits. Mr. Danson said that the Government was looking forward to discussions with Alberta and Edmonton authorities as to possible urban uses for the Griesbach site.


The move of the Canadian Airborne Regiment to Ontario, planned for the summer of 1977, will give the military a better posture in relation to the many tasks assigned to its land forces. The Army will now consist of a Combat Group with Headquarters in Calgary. Another Combat Group located at Valcartier, near Quebec City. A Regimental Combat Group with Headquarters at CFB Petawawa, and a training centre at CFB Gagetown, NB.

The Department of National Defence will make a maximum effort to obtain alternative employment for the civilian employees whose positions will become redundant as a result of changes in the re-alignment of the forces.

Mr. Danson concluded that while some economies will be achieved as a result of these decisions, two other important aims will also be attained. They are a better posture for Canada's Land Forces, and the releasing of valuable government property for urban development where it is needed, the latter in keeping with government decentralization policy.

He added that ... "We will continue to look at areas where modification to military facilities could be mutually beneficial to the Department of National Defence and other Federal, Provincial and Municipal authorities, and the communities affected."

Weapons Technologies, and arms control measures. Also discussed were new technologies which could contribute towards sustaining a defence posture capable of maintaining deterrence and safeguarding the integrity of NATO territory.

Eight Defence Ministers in Britain, Canada, Greece, Italy, The Netherlands, Norway, United States and West Germany — met to review NATO nuclear strategy. It was their twentieth half-yearly conference.

Their next meeting will be in Canada next Spring.

Before returning to Canada on 20 Nov., Mr. Danson visited Canadian Military units in Germany at Lahr and Baden-Soellingen.

## MND Urges Strong Conventional Forces

OTTAWA (CFP) — The importance of maintaining strong conventional military forces in the nuclear age was emphasized by Defence Minister Barney Danson at a meeting of NATO Nuclear Planning Group in London.

The groups discussion focussed on the need to maintain an adequate defence and deterrent capability in the light of recent developments and deployments

over the full spectrum of Soviet Forces.

Also stressed was the importance of maintaining the essential linkage between the three elements of the NATO Triad-Strategic Nuclear, Theatre Nuclear and Strong Conventional Forces.

They drew attention to interdependencies between developments in the threat, New

# Voxair Variety

If I were to come out with the flat statement that an unknown Canadian girl can write better plays than can an established American dramatist, you probably (to use a meteorological word) would not believe me. Thus I urge people to go down to the Warehouse Theatre, located on Rupert Avenue, behind the Concert Hall, and see for themselves. Compare the two one-act plays by Joanna Glass, native of Saskatoon, with the MTC Main Stage play by Pulitzer prize winning Edward Albee, native of Washington, D.C., and see if you agree that Canadians do it better.

Covering two very diverse topics, the plays *Canadian Gothic* and *American Modern*, share common casts, and both are directed by Eric Steiner. The first is a tragedy of life on the prairies, where the people tend to be as bleak as the scenery, the second a comedy of life in the American suburbs, where day-to-day existence literally drives people nuts.

Irena Mayeska and Neil Vipond, who performed with great professional skill in both plays, were given very fine support by Janet Barkhouse and Tim Sileya in *Canadian Gothic*. All in all, it is an evening of fine theatre. The plays run until the end of the week, and the tickets are well worth the \$4.00 charge.

On the other hand, MTC's deathwatch play, *All Over*, now on the Main Stage, is certainly not everyone's cup of hemlock. While sitting through it, I was reminded of a movie line spoken years ago by that late great Canadian actor, Ned Sparks, "She probably talked him to death". The cast was given a huge glob of not-too-earth-shaking dialogue, and possibly the best lines of all were reserved for the central character, who was hidden behind a screen and never seen, who had nothing to say.

There was some fine acting, particularly by the two leading ladies, Anne Shropshire and Myra Carter, but dull material does not make for lively theatre. Author Edward Albee is remembered for *A Delicate Balance* and *Virginia Woolf*, but he probably will not be immortalized for this one.






