Air Reserve Group Change of Command, 13 May 1990



Brigadier-General E.W. Linden, CD, of Winnipeg assumed command of Air Reserve Group during a colourful Change of Command ceremony in 10 Hangar, Sunday afternoon.

He replaces the retiring commander Brigadier-General P.A. Hayes, OMM, CD, of Toronto.

The Pipes & Drums of the 402 "City of Winnipeg" Squadron paraded in review, after 100 Air Force personnel from 402 Squadron and Air Reserve Group Headquarters.

Participating in the official signing of the Change of Command documents was Lieutenant-General F.R. Sutherland, CMM, CD, commander of Air Command.

In a symbolic gesture, Brigadier-General Hayes was presented with the Air Reserve Group Commander's Pennant.

Brigadier-General Linden then took command of the parade and led the Air Reservists in a march past.

Canada's Air Reserve consists of 2 tactical aviation wings, six flying squadrons, and 20 Air Reserve Augmentation Flights located across Canada and at two Canadian military bases in Europe.

In civilian life, Brigadier-General Linden is a Professor of Sociology at the University of Manitoba, the Director of the Criminology Research Center and the current editor of the Canadian Journal of Criminology.

Serving with Canada's air force for the past 28 years, BGen Linden started his aviation career as an aircraft technician

with 406 Squadron, Royal Canadian Air Force Auxiliary based at Saskatoon in 1962.

He was promoted Flight Cadet and took initial flying training at Centralia, Ontario in 1963. On receiving his "wings" at Portage La Prairie, Manitoba in 1964, he joined 418 "City of Edmonton" Squadron flying C-45 Expeditor aircraft.

While serving with the RCAF Auxiliary in Edmonton, BGen Linden completed his B.A. and M.A. in sociology at the University of Alberta.

In 1969 BGen Linden transferred to the Supplementary Reserve allowing him to complete his Ph.D. at the University of Washington, in Seattle.

His love of flying brought him back to the Air Reserve in 1972, when he joined 402 "City of Winnipeg" Squadron. He flew the DHC3 Otter aircraft later converting to the C-47 Dakota transport. He has logged over 4700 flying hours of which approximately 2500 were at the controls of a C-47.

While serving with 402 Squadron, he held positions as Squadron Standards Officer, Deputy Flight Commander and Aircrew Leader.

BGen Linden was instrumental in developing the Staff Training Air Reserve (STAR I) program and was the first instructor for this course at Canadian Forces Staff School, Toronto, Ontario, in 1978.

He served for ten years as Deputy Commanding Officer of 402 Squadron before attending the STAR II course at Canadian Forces Staff College in 1983. Upon graduation, he was promoted Lieutenant-Colonel and joined Air Reserve Group Headquarters as Senior Staff Officer Training. In 1988 he was promoted to the rank of Colonel and served as Chief Staff Officer Plans and Operations.

In May, 1990, Brigadier-General Linden was promoted to his current rank and on May 13, assumed command of Air Reserve

Group. In civilian life, he is a regular lecturer at the Canadian Police College in Ottawa, the author of

two books in criminology. Brigadier-General Linden is married to the former Olive Cormack and they have six children.

NLC Elects First Woman National President

OTTAWA — Mrs Marilyn Machum of Calgary Alberta was elected as the first woman National President of The Navy League of Canada during the League's annual General Meeting in Ottawa on Saturday, 28 April 1990.

Mrs Machum's election as the League's twenty-second president highlights a long association with the Navy League which began in 1956 when she joined the Navy League Wrenette program at HMCS TECUMSEH in Cal-

gary. She subsequently became a Navy League officer and was instrumental in establishing the first Wrenette Corps in Edmonton in 1961. She was first appointed to the League's National Council in 1974 as National Deputy Chairman for the Navy League Wrenette Committee. She has since chaired a number of League Committees, the most recent being that of Maritime Affairs.

Mrs Machum and her husband, a former member of the Canadian Forces, have travelled extensively. During tours at home and abroad she maintained her association with Navy League activities in Alberta, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Colorado, Bermuda and West Germany. In

recognition of her volunteer work with the League, Mrs Machum was awarded the Queen's Silver Jubilee Medal.

During her acceptance speech to delegates, Mrs Machum noted past League achievements over the past 95 years, particularly in its two major programmes — Maritime Affairs and Youth Training. She reminded Council members of the League's 1995 Centennial Theme — "Preparing Today for Tomorrow" and the formidable challenge which all face in meeting that goal.

Mrs Machum and her husband "Red" have two sons, Clive and Gordon, living in Winnipeg. Their daughter Cathy, who like her mother was once a Cadet, is a teacher in Calgary.

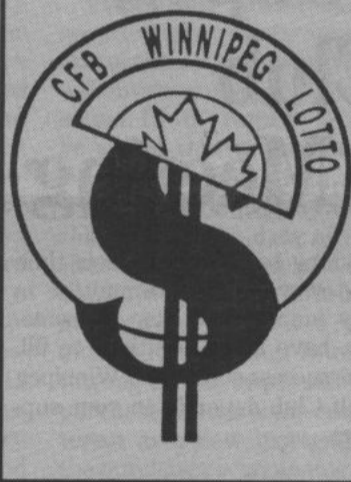
Recently, a number of lucky staff made the trip to the Yel-

CFB Winnipeg Golf Club Committee Meeting

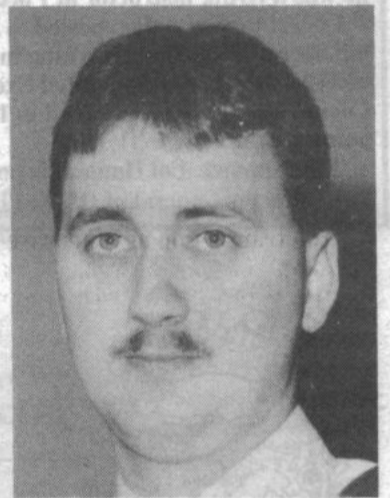

Real Estate Tip: The Offer To Purchase

Whether you are attempting to sell your home privately or with the assistance of a real estate agent, one of the major steps of the process occurs when you receive an offer to purchase real estate which should be upon the form prescribed under the Real Estate Brokers Act. The purpose of this overview is to deal with such document, hi-lighting the important things to take into account.

When one receives an offer to purchase real estate which is executed by a prospective purchaser, the options are three; either accept the offer as it is written, reject it outright, or attempt to vary any one of its terms by making a counteroffer to the purchaser. Note should be taken of the time limitation mentioned in the offer within which some action must be taken by you. If you have not accepted the offer or made a counteroffer within the prescribed period, then the offer is taken to have been rejected and as a result the deposit of such purchaser must be returned.

An obvious consideration is the total purchase price which you will be receiving for the sale of the property. However, almost as important is the way that it is calculated. First, one should insure that the deposit that has been given by the purchaser is sufficient to bind the purchaser to the transaction as otherwise for some reason which may arise in the future, the purchaser may elect to abort the deal and walk away from the deposit. Such is particularly prejudicial to the vendor if the possession date is quite some time into the future as this results in the house being taken off the market in the meantime. For the same reason, one should also insure that the cash payment by the purchaser on or before the possession date is not negligible.

In addition, in the offer to purchase the purchaser undertakes to attempt to obtain mortgage financing as indicated with specified terms and some consideration should be given to such terms to insure that they are reasonable considering current bank conditions. In this regard as

well, note should also be taken of the length of time that the purchaser is being given to arrange such financing as again, until such period expires, the house is taken off the market which is prejudicial to the vendor if the purchaser is not able to obtain such financing.

The vendor should also be aware of the fact that in accepting any such offer to purchase he is undertaking to transfer the property to the purchaser free from all encumbrances, either registered upon the title or otherwise and therefore the vendor should be aware of what encumbrances exist and whether there will be sufficient proceeds to pay off the same. The vendor is also undertaking that there are no encroachments either by structures from adjoining properties or by buildings on the subject property on adjoining land. If such is the case and as a result the property does not comply with any of the applicable zoning regulations, then it likely will be the responsibility of the vendor to either change the present situation or obtain the necessary zoning variance or tolerance.

One consideration that may seem trivial at the outset is the date set as the date of possession on which the purchaser is entitled to receive vacant possession to the property before 12 o'clock midnight. While often it is scheduled as being either the 1st or 15th days of a month, such days are often midweek and therefore not convenient for either party. Therefore, it may be more appropriate to schedule the possession date for a weekend day. As well, if the vendor is also purchasing property it may be necessary to allow sufficient time to find property to which he will move, or to allow a few days during which he owns both properties so that he can have that period to move.

Finally, it is important to note that no part of the purchase mo-

nies can be released to the vendor by his lawyer for use in relation to a purchase until after the registration of the transfer documentation has been finalized at the Land Titles Office, and after other conditions have been satisfied. As a result, unless the vendor will be moving into a home that he has purchased approximately one month after the date of possession in relation to that which he has sold, he will have to obtain interim financing from a financial institution, or find the down payment that he requires for his purchase from some other source.

Special note should be taken of the fixtures which the purchaser is anticipating will be included with the home in the purchase price. Fixtures are items which are attached to the premises. While the offer to purchase form specifies, in general terms, various things that are taken to be fixtures and therefore included with the purchase price, the vendor may wish to specify certain items which should not be included. Such will result in much less conflict after possession has already taken place.

Finally, the vendor may also want to make an accurate calculation of the net proceeds which he will obtain as a result of the transaction. In this regard, he should be aware that to the total purchase price will be added interest which must be paid by the purchaser from the date of possession on the balance of the purchase price which is not received until some time later as a result of mortgage financing. Interest in this regard will be payable by the purchaser at the same rate of interest as a new mortgage that the purchaser is arranging. From such monies must be deducted the outstanding balance of any encumbrances which are registered against the property at the Land Titles Office, including any prepayment penalties which exist for paying of the vendor's

mortgage prior to the completion of its term.

In addition, there will be a tax adjustment in relation to the purchase. If the possession date is scheduled during the year at a date prior to the payment of taxes for the entire year, then the purchaser will receive a reduction in the total monies payable in compensation from the vendor for those months during which the vendor has resided upon the property and therefore became liable for the payment of taxes. The adjustment will go in favour of the vendor, however, if the possession date is scheduled for a day during the year after the taxes are paid. In this regard, note should be taken that real property taxes are to be paid on or before June 30th of every year. As well, note should be taken of whether the taxes have been paid for the year if they

were due. If the taxes were due but have not been paid then the total amount will be paid out of the proceeds. In addition, the vendor should take into account an amount to be estimated for legal fees and disbursements in relation to the finalization of the transaction. Estimates can be received from legal counsel prior to finalization of the transaction.

Once all of the above matters are considered, the vendor will be in a much better position to determine whether the offer that has been made by the prospective purchaser is to be accepted as written, rejected outright, or be the subject of a counteroffer.

The actual birthday of the "Corps" (i.e., 20 April) began at 0730 hours at the Fort Osborne

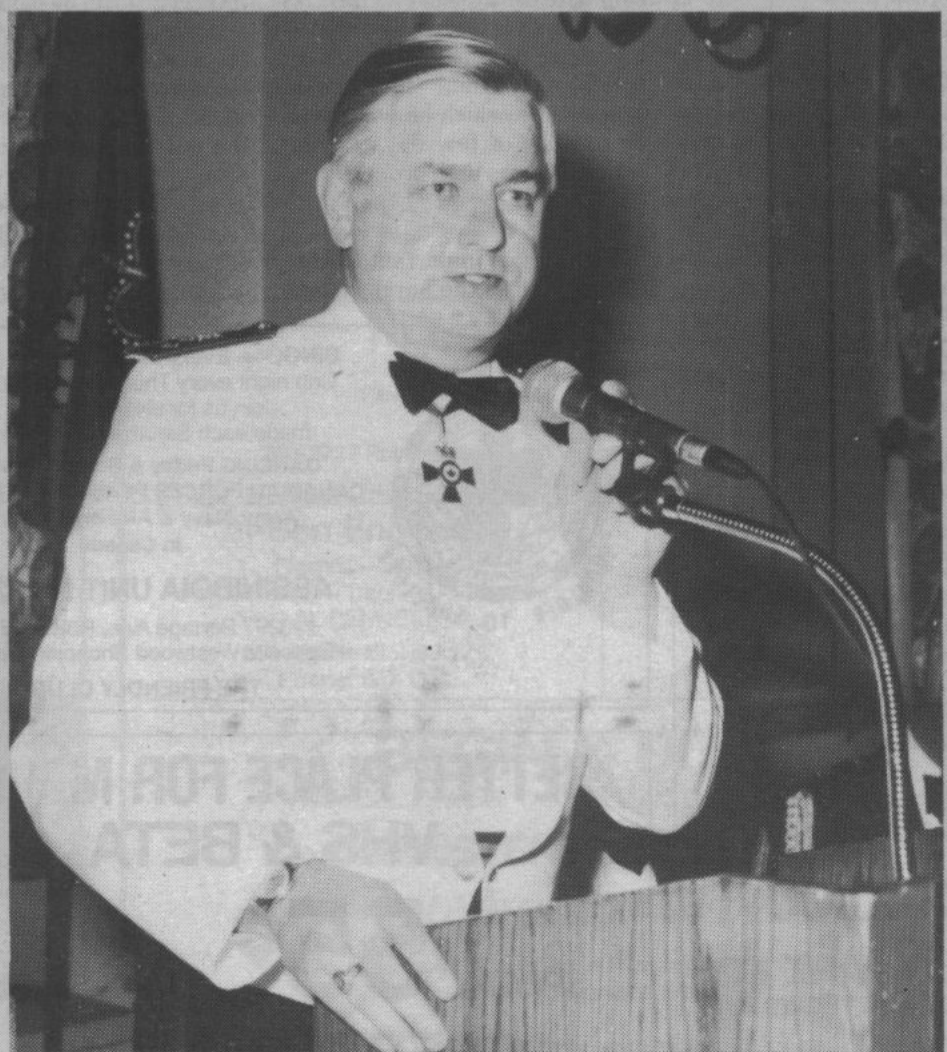

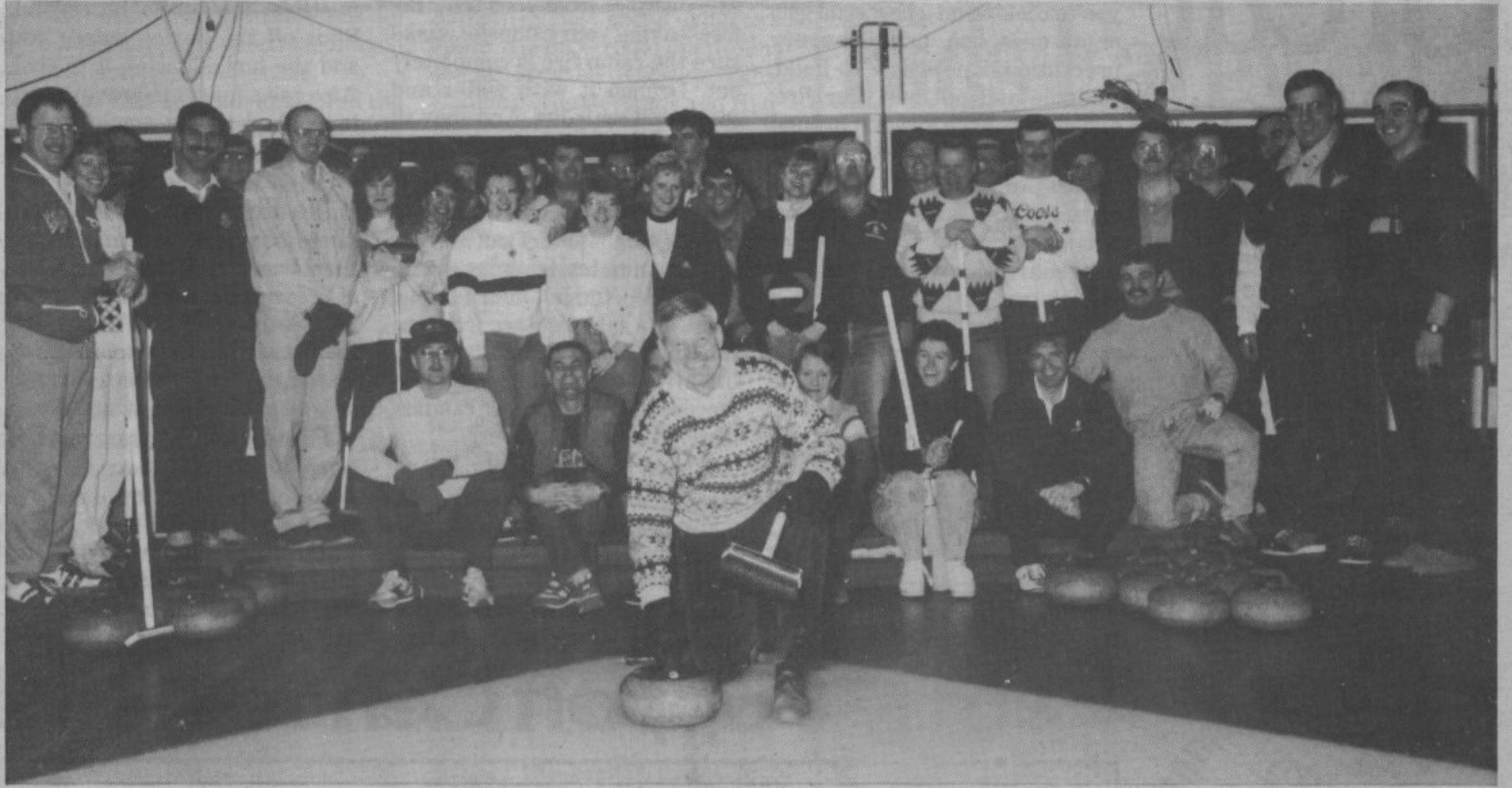

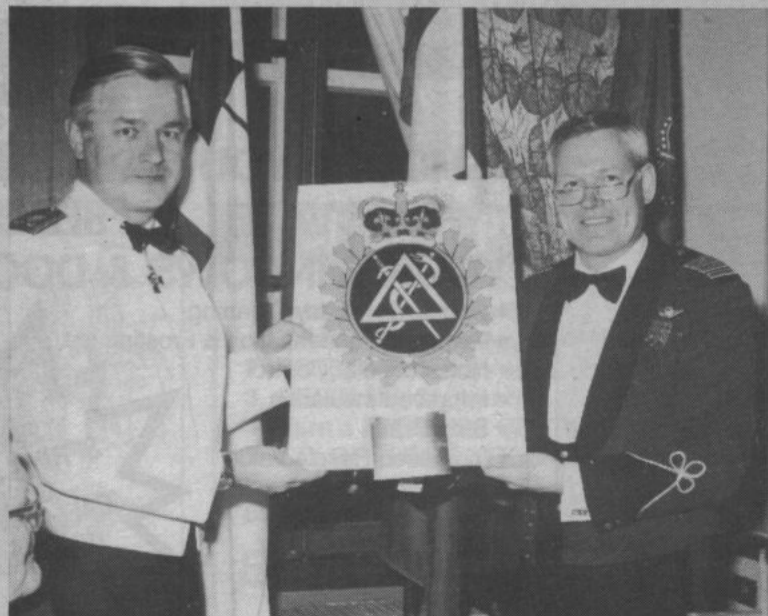

Firesafety In The Great Outdoors



Play It Safe. Keep family and friends as well as yourself protected from fire and burn injuries while you enjoy the Great Outdoors.

Cook With Care. Whether you're cooking on a barbecue grill or an open fire, practice every precaution. Know how to build, rekindle and put out your fire, and always have an adult around to supervise.

Barbecue Grills. To start charcoal fires safely, use an electric starter, cake fire starter or charcoal starter and match. Never use gasoline. To start a propane gas grill, always light the match before you turn on the gas. Store and use these grills outside the house and not on the porch. To rekindle a slow fire, tuck dry kindling under the coals and add charcoal if necessary. Never add any fluids to an existing fire.

Camp Fires. First, select your site. Avoid areas near buildings, fallen trees, tree trunks, or low, overhanging branches.

Scrape away all leaves and litter down to bare earth for at least five feet on all sides of the fire. Dig a pit in the centre of this circle and surround it with stones. Build fires downwind and at a safe distance from your tent. Before leaving your campsite, make sure the camp fire is completely out. Drench it with water and smother it with dirt. And obey all local regulations.

Tent Safety. Buy a tent made only of a flame-retardant fabric. One that is not can burn up in a few minutes, trapping everyone inside. And put your tent upwind, at a safe distance from the campfire. For lighting, use only flashlights or other battery-powered lights — never candles, matches or camp stoves.

Store Fuels Safely. Never store gasoline or any other flammable liquid inside the house. Put them in metal safety cans with tight-fitting lids, label them clearly and store them outside the house, away from heat and igni-

tion sources, such as the pilot light on a water heater.

Use Fuels Carefully. From gas-powered lawn mowers to snow blowers and chain saws, many household devices use combustible liquids. So be careful. Shut off the device before you add the fuel, allowing it to cool. Also use a funnel to prevent spillage. And never smoke while you're handling fuel — you might be in for an explosive reaction.

No To Fireworks. Thousands of people are injured by them every year. And thousands of fires are caused by them annually. So just say "No" and leave the fireworks displays to the professionals. You'll protect yourself as well as the Great Outdoors.

Burning Debris. Never burn trash outdoors in dry weather or on windy days. Always have available tools and water nearby. Don't burn debris near woods or buildings, fields or dry grass. Burn only on bare ground or in metal containers.

And before burning debris, clear everything down to bare ground for ten feet in all directions.

Smokers, Take Care. When riding or walking through the woods, be careful with discarded cigarette and cigar butts, pipe ash and matches. Never throw butts or burnt matches from a car. On foot, clear a spot down to bare earth for your used cigarette. Grind it into the ground with your heel. And before putting it into a trashcan, make sure the cigarette is cool to the touch.

Lightning Does Strike. During a thunder and lightning storm, seek shelter immediately. If no building is near, take protection inside an enclosed car with metal top and body. If neither building nor vehicle is available, lie down in the lowest point in the area. Never take cover under trees; and, during an electrical storm, do not watch television, walk in water or swim, or ride your bike; stay inside!

The Oldest AG

Many a WWII airgunner attained at least the rank of sergeant and faced the enemy long before he was old enough to vote or legally drink alcoholic beverages. And at the other end of the scale, one occasionally heard of the odd Second World War AG who wore WWI ribbons. However the "guru" of them all was Lionel Frederick William "Sos" COHEN.

"Sos", was born in 1874, raised in London, England and shipped off to South Africa at the end of his schooling. In 1893 he enlisted as a trooper and served in the MATABELE Wars. After this he "hobo-ed" about South Africa until he re-enlisted and served as an Intelligence cavalry commando in

the Boer War. He then took up ballooning as a sport while making and losing a fortune.

In 1914 he again answered the call and saw action as an officer in the 1st South African Horse. In 1916 he transferred to the Royal Naval Air Service and saw action as an observer/gunner on BF2's, Voisins and Farnams. By 1918 he had been awarded a DSO, MC and three Mentioned in Dispatches.

In 1937, along with several other ex-wartime aircrew colleagues "Sos" played a leading role in establishing the RAF Voluntary Reserve. In 1939 he again went on active service as a liaison staff officer in Coastal Command. Unknown to higher

authority, "Sos" began flying as a spare AG on Coastal operations seeing duty on Hudsons, Libs, Catalinas, Sunderlands and Halifaxes. After sixty-nine operations and several flak wounds he was awarded the DFC in February, 1944. Although just a few days short of his seventieth birthday his citation stated he was "fifty-nine years old".

In August 1960 Wing Commander "Sos" COHEN, DSO, MC, DFC, MiD, died peacefully in his sleep at the age of 86. Amen Brother - AMEN.

come the "Aerodrome of Democracy" through the establishment of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan. Few, if any wartime R.C.A.F. personnel were not at sometime during their career connected with this project.

In 1974, the Province of Manitoba took the opportunity to create a tribute to the B.C.A.T.P. by naming one of its northern lakes Commonwealth Lake.

To reflect the countries who participated in the agreement,

four of the islands in the lake were named Lion, Kangaroo, Kiwi, and Beaver.

Commonwealth Lake, located at 59 degrees 54 minutes N., 97 degrees 14 minutes E. is a peaceful and serene memorial to those airforce personnel who died while participating in "The Plan".

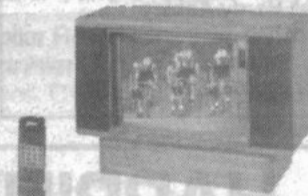

Greetings from the Chapels

Prayer Works



"I've tried praying, but it never works." That's what I've heard numerous times as the people I've met tell me about themselves.

No matter what a person's background, almost everyone will pray to God at some point, in some way. But very often, the answers to our prayers don't seem to come. Why doesn't God give us

the things — the car, good health, harmonious family life — that we've asked Him for?

To begin, it makes sense that if we don't understand something about prayer, that we should look to see what God, who hears our prayers, has to say about it. "When in doubt, read the instructions."

The Bible says that there are some kinds of prayer that God will not answer. "If I had cherished sin in my heart, the Lord would not have listened" (Ps 66:18) God knows our hearts inside and out — even when everyone else is fooled, even if we've somehow managed to fool ourselves, God knows our hearts and the motives for our prayers. And

when that motivation is sinful, he cannot answer the prayer.

Another warning is given to believers who pray for the wrong reasons: "When you ask [God], you do not receive, because you ask with the wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures." (Jas 4:3). The incredible privilege of prayer that we have must not be misused in ways that are not worthy of the God who hears prayers.

That's the bad news — the great news is that God loves us to come to Him in prayer. When Jesus taught us the prayer we have named the Lord's Prayer, we are to begin like little children crawling up onto the lap of their loving

Daddy: "Our Father, who art in heaven..." The spirit of our prayer isn't to be one of someone twisting God's reluctant arm and asking Him for just one little favour, but the spirit of a child who knows that their Father loves them and will eagerly listen to any requests.

And when, through Jesus, we come to God the Father as His children, Jesus told us that we have awesome privileges: "I tell you the truth, my Father will give you whatever you ask in my name." (Jn 16:23) This does not mean that we just need to add some little phrase to our prayers (that would be a form of magic), but that we pray in a way consistent with the heart and mission of Jesus. In other words, prayer is like a blank cheque, with Jesus' signature at the bottom — but it can only be used in a way that's honouring to that name.

Prayer isn't a matter of saying the right words, or of catching God in a good mood, or even of being "good enough" to qualify to be heard; prayer is communicating based on a relationship of love. If you feel like God is far away, and you'd like to be closer to Him and know Him personally and intimately as your heavenly Father, then open your heart to Him and ask Him to show you how you can pray more effectively. "You are forgiving and good, O Lord, abounding in love to all who call to you." (Ps 86:5) God is a God who delights to hear and answer our prayers, and we need to draw closer to Him by this tremendous privilege.

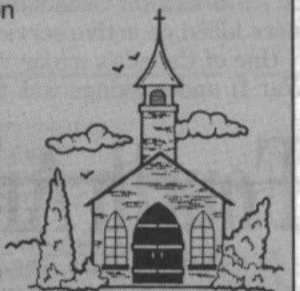
